

COOLEN'S COMMENTS

Last Friday night in Dundee I look at the shots on goal we had (44) and firstly I hand it to their goalie who played real well, the Stars took their chances but we did not capitalise on our opportunities and that effectively was the difference in the game. It was a closely fought game in the early stages despite us being a couple of goals down after the first period. As I said the Stars were able to put the puck in the net throughout the game and we didn't get anything out of all of our chances. We gave up too many chances however, too many turnovers and all in all I wasn't happy with how we played. We played much better in our previous game down in Cardiff and I thought there was another level of intensity that we could have found. After some discussions I expected a positive reaction the next night when we played Guildford at the Auld Barn and I felt that we had that. I thought that we competed hard, we found a way to put the puck in the net. For sure we would like to have had a couple of the goals back that were scored against us.

Janis on his debut didn't have a great game and the statistics and his experience doesn't reflect the game he can play. It was his first game in some time and he's working hard and he'll make the saves as we move forward. I think we played well enough that we could have won the game and on a good night we probably would have but we still have to play better. Ryan Foss came in and did well after just arriving the night before the Dundee game, he fitted in well and gives us some size and presence around the net. I liked a lot of guys games but we still have to be better defensively. This week we have been spending time on some key areas of our game that we know we need to improve upon to tighten things up. We don't want to give up any 3 on 2's or 2 on 1's and we don't want to turn the pucks over and we need to more mindful of our positioning. That was a focus of our video sessions this week, we have to think the game better, read the rushes and don't give up the middle of the ice. As the coach it is my responsibility to have the guys understand and buy into those changes. It doesn't mean that it's ever going to be a perfect game but it's all that coaches talk about is reducing your mistakes and you cut down on your errors and you give yourself a better chance of success. We released Artur Gatiyatov at the start of the week and ideally I'd like to bring in another forward, a centre or a winger that has some size, I'd like to get bigger if we can but the bottom line is we need someone who can contribute to our offence. We are starting to get back to that so called healthy level with Nikolai Shulga expected to play and Olivier LeBlanc who should get one of the games this weekend. It is a couple of derby games this weekend and anything can happen but we will be giving it everything we have to get back on the winning track.

Away we go.

It was a game where both teams were desperate to pick up points in the chase for second spot and qualification in the Challenge Cup. Flyers were looking to snap a three game losing skid and with Olivier LeBlanc, Nikolai Shulga, Fynn Page and Johnny Curran, who had earlier been confirmed as suffering a long term injury all scratched. They handed a debut to centreman Ryan Foss who arrived in the country less than 24 hours before puck drop. Patrick Kyte was also welcomed back into the lineup after recovering from injury. The Stars were without Xavier Pouliot and Brogan O'Brien. The Stars were first to threaten in 30 seconds when Jake Elmer split the visitors defence and Shane Owen had to make a save. The home side got the breakthrough with just over 90 seconds on the clock when the Flyers turned the puck over in the neutral zone allowing the Stars to break 3 on 2. A tic tac toe play set up the chance for Alex Tonge to hit the open net with Owen having no chance. In the 4th minute debutant Ryan Foss won a puck battle behind the Stars net and he stepped out to try and stuff the puck home but Richard Sabol was alert and smothered the puck. The Flyers again threatened in the 6th minute when Lucas Chiodo combined with Michael Cichy whose redirect of the puck slithered just wide of the post. A good forecheck by Austin Farley and Chiodo set up a chance for Foss whose shot was straight into the logo of Sabol. Back came the Stars in the 8th minute when Domenic Alberga stickhandled his way through the Flyers defence and forced a pad save from Owen. The Stars gave the puck away in their own zone in the 10th minute and Sabol had to deal with a long range effort from the right hand point. Moments later and Owen was thankful to cover up a puck with a pile of bodies around his net after the Flyers gave the puck up in their own zone. In the 11th minute a huge save from Owen who denied Brendan Harms on the top of his crease after he had been set up by Elmer. Flyers responded and Martin Látal fed the puck to Phélix Martineau and Sabol made a smart blocker save. Owen held on to an Elmer backhand shot in the 13th minute but 30 seconds later could do nothing about a tip from Brett Gravelle from the slot that found the bottom corner after a puck through from the blueline by Drydn Dow. In the 16th minute Sabol made his bid for save of the week as Chiodo set up Cichy who had a wide open net to aim for but the Stars goalie flicked out his stick to get something on the puck to deflect it clear. Sabol was under pressure in the 17th minute when he covered up with Daniel Krenželok down low on the play looking for an opening. A minute later and it was Krenželok again with a shot from the circles that forced a fine pad save from the Stars goalie. In the final minute of the period Sabol had to make two saves in quick succession to preserve the Stars two goal lead as he denied Farley who was on the edge of his crease.

PERIOD 2

The Flyers were first to show in the second period when Martineau stole the puck and drove the net but Sabol made the save. A shot by Látal in the 24th minute was too hot to handle for Sabol and Martineau pounced on the rebound but the Stars goalie got a piece of the puck and finally calmed things down when he held a snapshot from the slot by Maxim Musorov. The Stars hadn't been a threat in the period until the 26th minute when they increased their lead with Cole MacDonald up on the rush and the blueliner picked the bottom corner on Owen's glove side.

In the 27th minute there were offsetting minors for roughing for Harms and Martineau and as the teams skated 4 on 4 the Stars found the twine again in the 28th minute when a Tonge shot rebounded and the puck was recycled by the Stars by Alberga who fed Ben O'Connor to laser one past Owen. Stars were full of confidence now and Zachary Tsekos went down the right wing and his shot was well saved by Owen who moments later was happy to see a backhand effort from close range by Keanu Yamamoto go over the crossbar. The Stars went on the first power play of the game in the 32nd minute as Drake Pilon was called for interference. The Flyers had a brief 3 on 1 break but were too slow with their deliberations and the Stars recovered to mop up the danger. Owen made a fine save on a huge Elmer blast and from the ensuing scrum around the net Owen was called for a cross check with Harms and Patrick Kyte getting offsetting minors for roughing putting Stars on a 5 on 3 for a minute. O'Connor missed the net with a blast as the Flyers returned to four skaters and were able to kill the rest of the penalty. In the 35th minute a shot from the right wing by Kameron Kielly rebounded off the pads of Owen out into the slot and landed on the stick of Gravelle who made no mistake. Sabol again produced a wonder save in the 37th minute when he went post to post to rob Chiodo who couldn't elevate the puck enough following a Farley feed. Krenželok had a drive from the top of the circles in the 38th minute held by Sabol before the Stars almost added another in the final minute when Jonathan McBean stole the puck from Tyler Heidt and his feed into the slot to Elmer was fired wide.

PERIOD 3

Within the opening minute of the 3rd period Látal stung the shoulder of Sabol with a slapshot. The Flyers were on the power play in the 42nd minute when Kris Inglis was called for a trip on Chiodo. Krenželok put the first of several shots on net but somehow it hit Sabol and landed between his legs before he fell backwards on the puck to cover it up. Farley was next to be denied this time by a blocker save by Sabol as the Stars killed the penalty. In the 44th minute Sabol got the shaft of his stick on a shot by Heidt. The Stars added to their tally in the 46th minute with an absolute rip of shot by Alberga from the right hand face off dot that went top corner on Owen. Sabol continued to thwart the Flyers with a mixtures of solid saves and unconventional stops all of which however proved to be effective. The Flyers went back on the man advantage in the 49th minute when Yamamoto was called for tripping. Krenželok had a booming shot saved and the Stars somehow survived another couple of scrambles around their net as the visitors did everything apart from put the puck in the net with that man Sabol again standing tall. Owen scrambled across his crease to deny Tsekos in the 54th minute but a seventh goal was just delayed as Noah Delmas lost possession in the neutral zone as he tried to lug the puck up ice and Alberga broke into the Flyers zone to pick the stick side on Owen. Owen stopped a hard shot by O'Connor a minute later and Krenželok sold out his body to make a brave shot block as the Stars kept pushing. Another Flyers power play followed in the 56th minute after a high stick by Harms on Kyte. Sabol scrambled the puck away to safety following a Krenželok effort before he stoned Kyte from close in on a night where he would simply not be beaten as the Flyers continued to look for their first win on the road after having played six games so far this season.

Both teams came into this game looking to get back into the winning side of the ledger with the Flames winless in their last three games and the Flyers on a four game skid. The Flyers gave a home debut to Latvian netminder Janis Voris with Fynn Page back in the lineup and James Spence dropping out. Olivier LeBlanc and Johnny Curran were both out injured and they had one game time decision to make after the warm up skate and the additional scratch was Nikolai Shulga. The Flames scratches were Stephen Calisti, Daniel Tedesco, Travis Brown, Jake Coughler and long term injury casualty Brett Welychka. Jake Kupsky got the start in nets in place of Eamon McAdam.

The Flyers opened brightly and a Martin Látal steal after 90 seconds allowed him to feed the puck across the slot to Maxim Musorov who was just wide of the target with his backhand effort. The Flames however stunned the home side in the 3rd minute when Brett Ferguson fired a speculative shot on net from the high slot that looked as though it crept under the arm of Voris. A minute later and the Flyers were level when Tyler Heidt fired a shot that Kupsky couldn't hold and Musorov was first to react to fire the puck home. The Fife keeper made his first save a minute later when he stuck out a pad to stop a Charlie Curti shot from the point. The Flames were once again threatening in the 7th minute when Voris had to be alert to stop a turnaround shot by Lewis Hook. Great tenacity by Musorov in the 10th minute saw him gain the Flames zone and his drop pass to the slot was met by Lucas Chiodo who forced a fine glove save by Kupsky. Moments later Voris survived a scramble around his net and with the puck still loose he got the benefit of an early whistle. The Flyers then gave the puck away and Josh Waller went in all alone on Voris who shut the five hole on him. Tyler Heidt was called for the games first penalty in the 11th minute as he batted the puck over the glass for a delay of game. Voris was square to Matt Alvaro's shot early in the man advantage but could do nothing to stop a blast from the blueline from Charlie Dodero with the Fife keeper clearly unsighted. The Flyers went on the powerplay in the 13th minute with Lewis Hook called for a slash but they didn't get anything set up and Voris late on had to scramble the puck from his net as the Flames returned to full strength. In the 18th minute a Látal backhand was blocked and the puck recycled and passed to Musorov in the slot and his shot produced a big block by a Flames defenceman. Flames went the other way and Voris made a big pad save. The Flyers ended the period with a massive chance when Musorov set up Phélix Martineau who forced a stellar save by Kupsky.

PERIOD 2

Austin Farley who left the game early in the first period with a facial injury didn't return to the bench for the remainder of the game. Flyers came out hitting to start the second period and their forecheck kept the Flames pinned in their own zone in the opening minute. In the 22nd minute Voris had to make two saves in quick succession from Alvaro and Waller. The Flames Marcus Tesink was called for a trip on Brodie Kay in the 23rd minute and Daniel Krenželok had a big shot saved by Kupsky's pads. On the powerplay Ryan Foss was on the edge of the crease but just couldn't get his hands turned to get his shot away. Martineau then had a good look at goal but fired wide and the Flames in quick transition were clinical as a shot from the right wing from Daniel Catenacci found a way through Voris for a shorthanded goal to extend the Flames advantage. The Flyers responded in the 26th minute when they had an odd man rush and a nice shot pass off the pads of the Flames goalie by Martineau

landed on the stick of Michael Cichy who made no mistake. In the 28th minute Dodero was called for boarding and on the delayed penalty the Flyers skated 6 on 5 for nearly a minute in the Flames zone bit couldn't fashion any clear cut sights on Kupsky. On the power play Kupsky did well to hold a shot from distance with Foss standing in his kitchen looking for the scraps. Krenželok then had a drive from the blueline that went just wide as the Flames returned to full strength. In the 33rd minute Krenželok once again showed his offensive side as he weaved around the Flames zone and got his shot away from the slot that went straight into the logo of Kupsky. The Flames stretched their lead in the 35th minute when Voris came out to play the puck but gave it up to Ethan Strang and his shot found the bottom corner as the Flyers goalie tried to get back into position. Foss was called for holding the stick in the 36th minute but the Flyers penalty kill came up big as the Flames failed to get a shot on goal. In the dying seconds of the period there was another let off for Voris who let a puck slip from his grasp and the referee quickly blew the play dead just as a Flames player put the puck in the net.

PERIOD 3

The third period commenced with the Flyers going back on the powerplay as Lucas Chiodo was tripped along the boards by Mike Crocock, Flyers best chance in the two minutes fell to Martineau who fired one high over the net from the slot and the Flames completed the kill following a scramble around their net with Pilon, Musorov and Artur Gatiyatov sniffing for a chance. With the Flames at full strength the Flyers did pull a goal back almost immediately when a shot from Martineau rebounded from Kupsky's pads and was picked up by Cichy who found the far corner of the net as he swiveled and shot. Within 30 seconds a great pass up the center of the ice released Waller and he went in one on one with Voris who made a great blocker save. The Fames did however strike back just two minutes after the Flyers goal when Brodie Kay coughed up the puck along the boards and Ferguson stole the puck to feed it to Sean Norris who skated in and beat a helpless Voris. The Flyers desperately needed a response and Látal almost provided it a minute later when he surged down the right wing and cut in on goal but Kupsky made a strong save with his paddle down. The Flyers were within a goal again in the 48th minute when Martineau took the puck into the slot area and worked an angle for a shot which deflected off of Cichy on its way into the top corner of the net to mark his hat trick counter. The Flyers yet again gave up another goal quickly and within a couple of minutes the lead was again two for the Flames as Catenacci finished off a quick transition by putting the puck five hole on Voris. Flames speed on he breakout continued to give Flyers trouble and Strang tested Voris with a shot from the high slot off the rush which the Fife keeper gloved. In the 53rd minute a hit from behind on Martineau by Jack Jacome brought a reaction from Patrick Kyte as he and Dodero were binned for roughing minors and the original hit called as an interference minor putting the Flyers back on the powerplay. Despite plenty of possession in the Flames zone the Flyers were once again unable to open up space to test Kupsky although the Flames as they had done all night long put on a shot blocking masterclass. Martineau came close with a one timer in 55 minutes and moments later he and Kyle Locke got the gate for roughing. With two minutes to go the Flyers rolled the dice and pulled Voris for the extra skater. Strang won a race for the puck down the right boards and found the empty net to ice the win for the visitors

WEEK 7 - FLYERS STATS RECAP

On Friday night.....

Dundee Stars 7 Fife Flyers 0 - Challenge Cup

It was the first time in 8 games that the Flyers lost a Challenge Cup game against the Stars in regulation time.

Flyers had 44 shots on Stars net which is their most shots in a game in the EIHL era that they have been shutout in – the previous most 39 was also against Dundee at Dundee Ice Arena in a 1-0 loss on 21st October 2012.

It ties the all-time record set previously in season 2004/05 when Flyers were shutout by the Guildford Flames.

In all EIHL competitions this was the 63rd time the Flyers have been shutout and the 8th time by Dundee with 6 of those being on Stars ice.

10 shots on goal for Phélix Martineau was a new team high for the season.

Ryan Foss was the 15th player to make his Flyers debut so far this season.

Glasgow Clan 0 Coventry Blaze 6 Elite League

(0-0, 0-2, 0-4) SOG 22-33 PIMs 52-38 Att 3612

Coventry Blaze maintained their record as the only team unbeaten in League action this season with a sixgoal, shutout win over Glasgow Clan. The game was scoreless for well over 30 minutes at a sold-out Braehead Arena, but was paused midway through the second period due to a medical emergency in the crowd. After things resumed, the Blaze were quicker out of the blocks and took the lead. While Rob Lachowicz sat for roughing, Kim Tallberg got onto a rebound from his initial shot to put the Blaze ahead at 31:46. Grayson Constable turned the puck over off Matt Stief on the Blaze blue line and raced away to then feed Michael Regush for a bottle-popping finish to put the visitors two ahead with 71 seconds left in the middle frame. Regush then turned provider for a Chase Gresock one-timer in the slot to make it 3-0 just 23 seconds into the third as the game quickly slipped away from the Clan, while Alexander Kuqali snuck one through Lucas Brine's five-hole at 43:44 to make it 4-0 shorthanded. Brine got the better of Alessio Luciani to deny the Blaze forward scoring a penalty shot on the 44-minute mark, but the visitors did add a fifth just 1:2 later as Zach Heintz finished off a neat tic-tac-toe play on the powerplay. After some late rough stuff which saw Mitchell Heard ejected and Deven Sideroff called on an Instigator penalty, Luciani beat Brine shorthanded to round off a comfortable win for the Blaze. Mat Robson posted a 26-shot shutout, his first in the EIHL.

Department of Player Safety Outcomes

On Wednesday night in Glasgow, Clan forward #13 Mitchell Heard was assessed a five-minute major penalty and a game misconduct for Fighting. At no time does Kuqali want to become engaged with Heard, who delivers an intentional and dangerous punch to an unsuspecting and unwilling combatant. Dangerous Punch - "Sucker-Punch" Effective immediately Glasgow Clan forward Mitchell Heard is fined and suspended for two games.

On Sunday night in Coventry, Steelers forward #12 Daniel Ciampini made an illegal cross-check on Blaze defenseman Jakob Stridsberg. Ciampini chooses to deliver a second cross-check to the head and neck area of Stridsberg, approaching from behind and delivering a forceful strike to an opponent's head/neck area. In short, this is not a hockey play. This is an intentional and forceful strike to an opponent's head using his stick as a weapon to take retribution. Cross-Checking - Intentional and forceful strike to an opponent's head/neck area. Effective immediately Sheffield Steelers' Daniel Ciampini is fined and suspended for three games.

Friday 18th October

Manchester Storm 7 Glasgow Clan 3 Elite League

Manchester Storm won their second straight home game and moved into third place in the league table with a 7-3 win over Glasgow Clan on Friday night at the Storm Shelter. The hosts raced into an early lead, going two up inside seven minutes. Tyler Hinam carried the puck into the offensive zone himself and shot high past Landon Bow to open the scoring with 3:48 played, followed by Grant Herbert's first of the night at 6:10 as he followed up on a Ryan Hughes shot. Steven Seigo pulled one back for Clan at 16:22, but just 44 seconds later Loren Ulett stopped CJ Garcia's shot in front and picked his spot past Bow to make it 3-1. Hughes, who assisted on both of the first two Storm goals on the night, got his own 5:32 into the second with a 2-on-1 breakaway that saw him slot past Bow, while Joe Hazeldine kept Clan in things with a powerplay goal just over two minutes later. Cardiff Devils continued their league form at the top of the standings with a narrow home win over Manchester Storm in a tight game at a sold-out Vindico Arena. "We've started pretty well, I think it's been pretty good. Obviously there are things we need to get better at and work on, but if we play a solid game and everyone chips in, we'll be pretty good," said Josh MacDonald after the win, he himself scoring the goal that put the Devils 2-1 ahead in the second. The Devils carried much of the play throughout the majority of period one, allowing for multiple breakaways and attacks. Despite this, an impressive performance from Evan Weninger allowed Storm to keep the score level 0-0. A huge hit from Riley Brandt in the closing stages saw the Devil ejected on a Check to the Head major, leaving the Devils shorthanded heading into the second period. Period two was a little more chaotic. The goal was upheld after review, with the puck long in the net before any contact. Cardiff answered back quickly as Josh MacDonald struck with a goal of his own, levelling the score to 1-1. Tensions on the ice began to rise as Fawcett and Sanford both saw themselves receive penalties for roughing. During the powerplay, with Storm taking an additional minor on the play, Zach O'Brien found the back of Weninger's net to put the Devils ahead. "Whether it's making hits, blocking shots or putting points on the board, you've got to do whatever you can to help the team. It was nice to capitalise on the goal and we know we have to work hard every shift" added goal-scorer MacDonald. The Devils got the all-important next goal inside the final 10 minutes of the game. With Jake Durflinger in the box, Fournier found O'Brien who put the puck on the stick of Tyler Busch in front of the crease to fire high into Weninger's net and put the Devils two ahead with 7:45 to go. Sheffield Steelers 6 Glasgow Clan 3 Elite League

Robert Dowd set a new Elite League points record with a key goal to help Sheffield Steelers to a 6-3 home win over Glasgow Clan, surpassing Colin Shield's record of 739 with his 740th in the EIHL. A Scrappy and scoreless first ten minutes included close efforts from both sides, most notably two close efforts from Steelers Captain Robert Dowd. The opening goal went the way of the Steelers off the stick of American defenseman Brien Diffley at 14:12. A heavy forecheck from Mikko Juusola forced the Clan to cough up the puck behind their own net, and Juusola's quick pass into the slot found oncoming Diffley finishing low past the pad of Clan netminder Landon Bow. The hosts doubled their lead through British forward Finlay Ulrick at 16:18: a cycle play from Diffley, Joona Huttula and Ulrick led to space opening for the young Brit. The onetime effort squeaked through Bow's pads as the Clan goalie looked to thy is disbelief. The Steelers opened up the second period with a close one-time effort from Colton Saucerman, followed by a couple of close chances from the Clan, a shot from Jameson deflected over the bar and a tip from Michael Pelech. A significant amount of offensive zone time eventually lead to a goal tipped in from Tyson McLellan on a shot from Steven Seigo at 29:15, trickling through the pads of Greenfield and over the goal line. 



KAMERON'S STORY...

Charlottetown is the capital and largest city of the Canadian province of Prince Edward Island, and the county seat of Queens County. Named after Queen Charlotte, Charlottetown was an unincorporated town until it was incorporated as a city in 1855. Kameron Kielly was one of the first Island-born players to dawn the Charlottetown Islanders colours. He, along with Craig MacLauchlan and Zach Beaton were the first from Prince Edward Island to call the Eastlink Centre home in an Islanders jersey. Beaton comes from Stratford, MacLauchlan a native of Stanhope, and Kielly himself from Charlottetown. The Charlottetown Islanders are a Canadian junior ice hockey team in the Quebec Maritimes Junior Hockey League (QMJHL) based in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. They are members of the Maritimes Division, and play their home games at the Eastlink Centre. Originally located in Montreal, and called the Montreal Rocket, the team relocated to Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, in 2003. They were named after Maurice "Rocket" Richard of the Montreal Canadiens, and their team crest depicted his number, 9. In their first season the Prince Edward Island Rocket won 40 regular season games and made it to the second round of the playoffs, where they lost in six games to the Moncton Wildcats led by future NHL star goaltender Corey Crawford. During their time called the Rocket they had a number of future EIHL alumni; Joey Haddad, Guillaume Doucet played alongside Martin Latal (below right) in season 2006/07. Martin would be top five in scoring that season and the following season when he played with another future Flyers Dylan Qualie. Beginning in the 2013-14 season, the Rocket rebranded as the Charlottetown Islanders. President and governor Serge Savard Jr. confirmed on April 17, 2013, that the QMIHL had contacted the Rocket two days earlier with a proposal to buy the struggling franchise. Savard said he intended to accept the offer, somewhere in the area of \$3.5 million, unless he was able to find a local buyer or buyers for the team. Savard said league commissioner Gilles Corteau had given him until April 26 to secure a buyer. One interested group intended to relocate the team to Sorel, Quebec. However, an ownership group led by Geoff Boyle agreed to purchase the team, ensuring its future in Charlottetown for 2013-14 and beyond. The new Islanders logo and colour scheme was unveiled on May 27. In the 2014-15 season, for the first time since the franchise's inaugural season as the PEI Rocket, the Charlottetown Islanders advanced to the second round of the QMJHL playoffs, after defeating the Sherbrooke Phoenix 4–2 in the first round. However, in the second round, they were eliminated by the Quebec Remparts 4-0. On June 29, 2015, the Islanders hired Jim Hulton as head coach after Gordie Dwyer was relieved of his duties as head coach. On March 29, 2016, the Islanders set a new QMJHL record for most shots on goal in one period of a playoff game with 32. The previous record was 30, shared by four teams. On June 4, 2016, the Charlottetown Islanders hosted the 2016 QMIHL Draft, a first for the franchise since 2006 when they were known as the P.E.I. Rocket. On April 13, 2017, the Islanders advanced to the third round of the playoffs for the first time in franchise history, eliminating the Cape Breton Screaming Eagles who had Phélix Martineau and Olivier LeBlanc in their lineup, four games to none in the second round. On May 30, 2022, the Islanders won their third round series to make their first-ever appearance in the President's Cup Final where they were eliminated by Shawinigan. This also marked the fourth time in



Kielly, however, wasn't originally destined to play for his hometown team. He was taken 18th overall in the 2012 QMJHL Entry Draft by the Gatineau Olympiques. Despite playing 60 games for Gatineau, the moment he remembers most from that rookie season was when he was traded to the newly revamped Islanders franchise. "I'll never forget calling my friends and family to tell them I got traded to Charlottetown. There was a ton of excitement already around the Island with the re-branding and to be a part of it was something I'll remember for the rest of my life," said Kielly. Then General Manager Grant Sonier acquired the six-foot-one forward during the 2013 off-season for Alexandre Chenier-Allard, a fourth-round pick and a first-round pick. Kielly noted that being one of the first players to wear the Islanders sweater was special. "Everyone was thrilled, it was new, it was exciting." To look at where the team is now is something a lot of us former players are very proud of. It's considered one of the league's top organizations now." Growing up playing hockey, kids often dream of playing for the team they grow up watching, Kielly was no different. Simply playing for the Islanders was one of the highlights of his career. "Hard to point out just one memory. Playing in my hometown and in front of friends and family night in and night out is something I'll remember forever," said Kielly. "My 20-year-old season in particular going on the long playoff run was arguably still the most fun I've had in my career with that group." The season in question was the 2016-17 campaign which saw the Islanders make it to the franchise's first QMJHL semi-finals.

Kielly had a career year posting 74 points in 65 games, 25 more points than his previous season-high. "My teammates were obviously a big part of that, I played with great players. The role Jim allowed me to have every night and you hear it all the time about being a tight group but that team was special and very tight-knit. We did everything together which led to a lot of success on the ice." The now 27year-old right-shot forward credits the way the organization conducted itself helped prepare him for the next phase of his hockey journey. "With how professional we ran things in Charlottetown, it was really similar to the professional leagues and that's how we were treated so I think the transition was easier because of it," said Kielly. "I made lifelong friends during my time playing at home and the staff I still see around all the time." Following his five-year QMJHL career, Kielly committed to UPEI where he played three very productive seasons. He tallied 127 points in just 90 games during his Panthers tenure. "I wanted to finish my degree first and foremost. My time at UPEI was great for getting my education and building a foundation for pro as well. I just felt that after my three years there it was time for me to try and make a run at the pro side of the game as I felt ready."



Kielly has spent the past four seasons mainly playing in the ECHL. However, he had short stints in both the AHL and last season of course with the Sheffield Steelers. "It's been good, I've experienced every side of the pro game. It can be crazy at times, but a lot of life experiences and great memories. Hopefully, I can have a few more good seasons wherever the game takes me," said Kielly. He's played for the Allen Americans, Indy Fuel, Atlanta Gladiators, Toledo Walleye and South Carolina Stingrays of the ECHL. In between those teams, he suited up for two games with the Belleville Senators of the AHL in 2021-22 and six games for the Sheffield Steelers in the EIHL last season. Kielly had to take a moment to reflect on which team and city had the biggest impact on him. "That's tough to say, everyone in their own way has had a different impact on me but I would say Atlanta was one of the more enjoyable years on and off the ice," said Kielly. "Atlanta was a great group; I played my first games in the AHL that year which was a big step in my career." Across a season and a half in Atlanta, Kielly tallied 46 points in 60 games, his best professional run to date. Unfortunately, injury prohibited Kielly from getting much experience playing in Europe. However, the time he spent in Sheffield was still memorable, he also got to play with former Islanders teammate Mitchell Balmas while he was there. "I ended up playing six total games with the Steelers, one league game. Sheffield was a top-class organization and they ended up winning every trophy in the league. It spoke for itself on why I went; I enjoyed my time there but after my knee injury last season, I needed to play more valuable minutes to further my career in my opinion so that led to coming back to North America," said Kielly. The game he loves has provided him with opportunities most kids in hockey can only imagine. Those who have helped him during his journey are not forgotten about either. "It's been a great experience for life and hockey. Seeing different parts of the world has been exciting. I'm very grateful for the opportunity my parents and family have given me and for their sacrifices over the years." As for what the future holds for the Prince Edward Island native, hockey remains his top priority. However, he has put time into planning for life after the game. "I will hopefully have a few more years pro, maybe overseas, maybe in North America, I'm still in that process now. I've also been looking at some business job options, something that I'd be passionate about down the road to make the transition post-career a little easier. For right now though, I'm enjoying the summer and time with my friends and family," said Kielly. Kielly had some final words of wisdom to pass along to the kids coming through the path that he took; some they have heard before but still an important message nonetheless. "It sounds very cliche, but honestly, it would be to just enjoy every day. You can take it for granted pretty easily when you're young and it flies by. They really are the best years of your life."



ONE TO REMEMBER ONE TO FORGET versus DUNDEE ROCKETS

Dundee Rockets were the all-conquering in the UK when I first started watching hockey in 1983/84. In that season Flyers generally played poorly and it was the following season, because of Flyers' vast improvement that a strong rivalry between the two clubs built up. This article looks at two games from the Heineken era, one a pure pleasure to watch from a Flyers fans perspective and one the complete opposite.

A league encounter at Dundee
Angus Ice Rink on 01/12/85 was
one that halted a losing streak for
Flyers and a game that a Flyers
stalwart would move from his
normal position at Centre into
defence, a position he would play
for the remainder of his career and
the next night's Evening Telegraph
led their coverage of the match
with one of my favourite hockey
headlines.



Heading into this game, Flyers had lost three games in a row, 4-6 at Streatham, where Todd Bidner and Gordon Latto were given two game suspensions for Abuse of an Official. Their absence was felt in a 7-8 reversal against Ayr Bruins on 23/11/85 and a 4-8 defeat at Murrayfield the following evening, contributing to Flyers slipping down to 5th place in the table.

Bidner's and Latto's suspensions were complete as Flyers took to the ice at Dundee on 01/12 and the biggest surprise for the large travelling support was Latto's move into defence instead of his customary position at centre ice. Regular defenceman Brian Peat missed the match with a rib injury. Flyers had a great first period as goalie Craig Dickson stopped all 12 Rockets shots on his net. Bidner scored twice in the first 20 minutes, Danny Brown got one and Gordon Goodsir's tally meant Flyers led 4-0 after the first period. The 12-12 shots on goal tally failed to reflect Flyers' dominance of the opening stanza. The second was much the same with Dickson defying Rockets' marksmen and Flyers easing further ahead with two goals in under two minutes, Bidner getting his hat trick and Brown notching his second to make it 6-0. Flyers kept a clean sheet in the second despite referee Alex McWilliam dishing out five minor penalties to Flyers as opposed to the two Dundee penalties. Brown got his hat trick marker a minute into the third and Flyers looked comfortable at that stage, but a Roch Bois short-handed goal seemed to give Flyers a shake and spurred them on to score four goals in two minutes 59. Bidner on the powerplay, Murray McLellan, Brown again and Charlie Kinmond made it 11-1, before Brown completed the scoring with less than a minute to play.



In Rockets' line up that night were future Flyers Ally and Ronnie Wood, Mark Slater and ex Flyer Gary McEwan. It was a dominating display by Flyers, especially from imports Brown (5+2) and Bidner (4+1) and this inspired "Centre Ice" in Monday's Evening Telegraph to describe the performance as "A "Toddle" for Flyers". In the report "Centre Ice" stated that "even with a board in front of Rockets' net, I'm sure in their goal hungry mood the Fifers would have found a way through" This summed up Flyers' efforts that night perfectly and was possibly Bidner's best game in a Flyers jersey.


A game to forget for Flyers watchers took place the following season in the Regal Scottish Cup semi-final tie on 28/02/87. Five Scottish senior teams took part in the group stages of that years cup, with Division 1's Glasgow Eagles finishing bottom, leaving the four Premier Division sides to compete for the trophy over one weekend at Kirkcaldy.

Flyers won all four home games including a 9-9 draw against Murrayfield on 18/10/86. This game should have went to a penalty shoot out to decide the tie, but the shootout was overlooked and the penalty shootout went ahead before the start of the return game on 20/01/87, with Flyers winning the penalties 3-2.

Flyers had finished third in the group and were paired with second placed Rockets in the first semi-final. Any thoughts of Flyers having any "home" advantage by playing at Kirkcaldy were quickly dispelled in the afternoon face off. Flyers had won their previous five games, at home to Solihull and Nottingham, away to Streatham and Whitley and 15-10 against Glasgow, Flyers' only away win in the Scottish Cup.

In the first period Dundee took the lead but Steve Moria evened up the score before Rockets' ex NHLer Glen Sharpley had made it 2-1 before the initial 20 minutes were over. Sharpley had recorded his hat trick before the end of the second period as Rockets stretched their lead to 6-1 against a disheartened Flyers team.

A Dave Stoyanovich short-handed goal in the first minute of the third gave Flyers a little hope, but that was the last of the scoring as far as Flyers were concerned. Rockets completed that scoring with three late goals for a comprehensive 9-2 hammering of Flyers. Flyers were outshot 23-51 and thoroughly deserved this forgettable thrashing.







In our look through the rules of the game we have now reached the point where we can introduce penalties. Before we look at the individual penalties we will spend the next few additions looking at the "Types of Penalties" which covers Rules 15 to 29.

Again the full text of the IIHF rule is provided along with any annotations as per the EIHL Casebook.

RULE 15 CALLING OF PENALTIES

15.1 CALLING A PENALTY

Should an infraction of the rules which would call for a Minor, Bench Minor, Major, Misconduct or Game Misconduct, be committed by a Player or Team Personnel of the side in control of the puck, the Referee shall immediately blow their whistle and penalize the offending Player or Team.

Should an infraction of the rules which would call for a Minor, Bench Minor, Major, Misconduct or Game Misconduct be committed by Player or Team Personnel of the Team not in control of the puck, the Referee shall raise their arm to signal the delayed calling of a penalty. When the Team to be penalized gains control of the puck, the Referees will blow their whistle to stop play and impose the penalty on the offending Player or Team.

When a Player, Team Manager, Coach or team personnel is ejected from the game for a violation of the playing rules, that individual must vacate the Players' Bench area and may not, in any manner, further participate in the game. This includes directing the Team from the spectator area or by radio communications. Any violations shall be reported to the Proper Authorities.

15.2 CALLING A MINOR PENALTY - GOAL SCORED

If the penalty to be imposed is a Minor Penalty and a goal is scored on the play by the non-offending side, the Minor Penalty shall not be imposed but Major Penalties shall be imposed in the normal manner regardless of whether or not a goal is scored.

If two (2) or more Minor Penalties were to be imposed and a goal is scored on the play by the non-offending side, the Captain of the offending Team shall designate to the Referee which Minor Penalty(ies) will be assessed and which Minor Penalty will be washed out as a result of the scoring of the goal.

15.3 CALLING A DOUBLE-MINOR PENALTY - GOAL SCORED

When the penalty to be imposed is applicable under Rule 47 for "Head-butting", Rule 58 "Butt-ending", Rule 60 "High-sticking" or Rule 62 "Spearing", and a goal is scored, two (2) minutes of the appropriate penalty will be assessed to the offending Player.

This will be announced as a Double-minor Penalty for the appropriate infraction and the Player will serve two (2) minutes only.

15.4 CALLING A PENALTY - SHORT-HANDED TEAM - GOAL SCORED

When a Team is "short-handed" by reason of one or more Minor or Bench Minor Penalties, and the Referee signals a further Minor Penalty or penalties against the "short-handed" Team and a goal is scored by the non-offending side before the whistle is blown, then the goal shall be allowed.

The penalty or penalties signaled shall be assessed and the first of the Minor Penalties already being served shall automatically terminate under Rule 16 – Minor Penalties. Major Penalties shall be imposed in the normal manner regardless of whether or not a goal is scored.

Should a Minor or Bench Minor Penalty be signaled against a Team already "short-handed" by reason of a Major Penalty, but before the play can be stopped to assess the Minor or Bench Minor Penalty, and a goal is scored by the non-offending side, the signaled Minor or Bench Minor Penalty shall not be imposed due to the scoring of the goal.

Should a penalty be signaled against a Team already "short-handed" by reason of one or more Minor or Bench Minor Penalties, and the signaled penalty would result in the awarding of a "Penalty Shot", but before the Referee can stop play to award the "Penalty Shot", the non-offending Team scores a goal, then the signaled penalty (that would have resulted in a "Penalty Shot") shall be assessed as a Minor (Double-minor or Major) Penalty and the first of the Minor Penalties already being served shall automatically terminate:





15.5 FACE OF LOCATIONS

When Players are penalized at a stoppage of play so as to result in one or more penalties being placed on the penalty time clock to one Team, the ensuing "face-off" shall be conducted at one of the two Face-off Spots in the offending Team's End Zone. There are only three (3) exceptions to this application:

- (I) when a penalty is assessed after the scoring of a goal "face-off" shall be conducted at Center ice;
- (II) when a penalty is assessed at the end (or start) of a period "face-off" shall be conducted at Center ice;
- (III) when the defending Team is penalized, and the attacking Players enter the Attacking Zone beyond the outer edge of the End Zone Face-off Circle "face-off" shall be conducted in the Neutral Zone.

The Team awarded the "Power-Play" will have the choice of which End Zone spot the "face-off" will take place at to start the "Power-Play".

When an infringement of a rule has been committed by Players of both Teams in the play resulting in the stoppage, the ensuing "face-off" will be conducted at the nearest Face-off Spot in that zone.

RULE 16 MINOR PENALTIES

16.1 MINOR PENALTY

For a Minor Penalty, any Player, other than a Goalkeeper, shall be ruled off the ice for two (2) minutes during which time no substitute shall be permitted.

16.2 SHORT-HANDED

"Short-handed" means that the Team is below the numerical strength of its opponent on the ice at the time the goal is scored. The Minor or Bench Minor Penalty which terminates automatically is the one with the least amount of time on the clock. Thus Coincident

Minor Penalties to both Teams do not cause either side to be "short-handed" – see Rule 19 – Coincidental Penalties.

If while a Team is "short-handed" by one or more Minor or Bench Minor Penalties, the opposing Team scores a goal, the first of such penalties shall automatically terminate.

This rule shall also apply when a goal is awarded. This rule does not apply when a goal is scored on a "Penalty Shot" (i.e., offending Team's penalized Player(s) do not get released on the scoring of a goal on a "Penalty Shot").

Minor Penalty expiration criteria:

- (I) Is the Team scored against "short-handed"?
- (II) Is the Team scored against serving a Minor Penalty on the clock?

If both criteria are satisfied, the Minor Penalty with the least amount of time on the clock shall terminate except when "Coincidental Penalties" are being served.

When the Minor Penalties of two Players of the same Team terminate at the same time, the Captain of that Team shall designate to the Referee which of such Players will return to the ice first and the Referee will instruct the Penalty Timekeeper accordingly.

16.3 INFRACTIONS

A list of the infractions that can result in a Minor Penalty being assessed can be found in Table 2. Note – we will look at each of these infractions in details in future issues.

RULE 17 BENCH MINOR PENALTIES

17.1 BENCH MINOR PENALTY

A Bench Minor Penalty involves the removal from the ice of one Player of the Team against which the penalty is assessed for a period of two (2) minutes.

Any Player except a Goalkeeper of the Team may be designated to serve the penalty by the Coach through the playing Captain and such Player shall take their place in the Penalty Box promptly and serve the penalty as if it was a Minor Penalty imposed upon them.

17.2 SHORT-HANDED

Explanation "short-handed": Rule 16.2 – Short-handed.





17.3 INFRACTIONS

A list of the infractions that can result in a Bench Minor Penalty being assessed can be found in Table 3. Note – we will look at each of these infractions in details in future issues..

RULE 18 DOUBLE-MINOR PENALTIES

18.1 DOUBLE-MINOR PENALTY

For a Double-minor Penalty, any Player, other than a Goalkeeper, shall be ruled off the ice for four (4) minutes during which time no substitute shall be permitted.

18.2 SHORT-HANDED

When a Double-minor Penalty has been signaled by the Referee and the non-offending Team scores during the delay, one (1) of the Minor Penalties shall be washed out and the penalized Player will serve the remaining two (2) minutes of the Double-minor Penalty.

The penalty will be announced as a Double-minor Penalty but only two (2) minutes would be shown on the penalty time clock.

18.3 INFRACTIONS

A list of the infractions that can result in a Double-minor Penalty being assessed can be found in Table 4. Note – we will look at each of these infractions in details in future issues..

18.4 ON-ICE VIDEO REVIEW OF DOUBLE-MINOR PENALTIES FOR HIGH-STICKING

Referees shall have the option to review all plays that result in the assessment of a Double-minor Penalty for "High-sticking" for the purpose of, 1. Confirming the call on the ice or 2. Nullifying the call on the ice. Such reviews will be conducted exclusively by the Referee(s) on the ice in consultation with other On-ice Official(s), as appropriate, using the technology (for example, a handheld tablet or a television or computer monitor) specified in and provided pursuant. Rule 38.5 – Process for Reviewing.

Communication between the Video Review Operation and the On-ice Officials shall be limited to contact between the appropriate Video Review Consultant and the Referee to ensure the Referee is receiving any and all video they might request, as well as the appropriate replay angles they may need to review the penalty call.

There shall be no contact or consultation except between the On-ice Official(s) and the Video Review Operation.

The Referee shall only have the following options following Video Review of their own call:

- (I) Confirming the call on the ice or; or
- (II) Nullifying the call on the ice.

Note: This rule is only applied in certain IIHF Championships.

EIHL Annotation - RULE 18-DOUBLE-MINOR PENALTIES

18.4 On-Ice review of double-minor penalties for high-sticking Referees shall have the option to review all plays that result in the assessment of a Double-minor Penalty for "High-sticking" for the purpose of, 1. Confirming the call on the ice or 2. Nullifying the call on the ice. Such reviews will be conducted exclusively by the Referee(s) on the ice in consultation with other On-ice Official(s), as appropriate, using the technology (for example, a handheld tablet or a television or computer monitor) specified in and provided pursuant.

There shall be no contact or consultation except between the On-ice Official(s) and the Video Review Operation. The Referee shall only have the following options following Video Review of their own call:

- Confirming the call on the ice or; or
- Nullifying the call on the ice.





RULE 19 COINCIDENTAL PENALTIES

19.1 COINCIDENTAL MINOR PENALTIES

When "Coincidental Minor Penalties" or "Coincidental Minor Penalties of Equal Duration" are imposed against Players of both Teams, the penalized Players shall all take their places in the Penalty Boxes and such penalized Players shall not leave the Penalty Box until the first stoppage of play following the expiry of their respective penalties. Where Goalkeepers are involved, refer to Rule 27.1 – Goalkeeper Penalties. Immediate substitution shall be made for an "Equal Number of Minor Penalties or "Coincidental Minor Penalties of Equal Duration" to each Team penalized and the penalties of the Players for which substitutions have been made shall not be taken into account for the purpose of the "Delayed Penalty" rule. Rule 26 – Delayed Penalties.

When multiple penalties are assessed to both Teams, "Equal Numbers of Minor and Major Penalties" shall be eliminated using the "Coincidental Penalty" rule and any differential in time penalties shall be served in the normal manner and displayed on the penalty time clock accordingly – see Rule 19.5 – Applying the Coincidental Penalty Rule.

If there is no differential in time penalties, all Players will serve their allotted penalty time, but will not be released until the first stoppage of play following the expiration of their respective penalties. For "Coincidental Penalties" that carry over into, or are assessed during Overtime, see Rule 84 – Overtime Operations.

19.2 COINCIDENTAL MAJOR PENALTIES

When "Coincidental Major Penalties" or "Coincidental Penalties of Equal Duration", including a Major Penalty, are imposed against Players of both Teams, the penalized Players shall all take their places in the Penalty Boxes and such penalized Players shall not leave the Penalty Boxes until the first stoppage of play following the expiry of their respective penalties. Immediate substitutions shall be made for an "Equal Number of Major Penalties", or "Coincidental Penalties of Equal Duration" including a Major Penalty to each Team penalized, and the penalties of the Players for which substitutions have been made shall not be taken into account for the purpose of the Delayed Penalty. Rule 26 – Delayed Penalties. In such situations, if one or both Players have received a Game Misconduct in addition to their Major Penalties, no substitutes are required to take their places in the Penalty Boxes.

19.3 LAST FIVE MINUTES AND OVERTIME

During the last five (5) minutes of regulation time, or at any time in Overtime, when a Minor Penalty (or Double-minor Penalty) is assessed to one Player of Team A, and a Major Penalty is assessed to one Player of Team B at the same stoppage of play, the three (3)-minute (or one (1)-minute) differential shall be served immediately as a Major Penalty.

This is also applicable when "Coincidental Penalties" are negated, leaving the forementioned examples. The Team must place the penalized Player or replacement Player in the Penalty Box immediately. The differential will be recorded on the penalty clock as a three (3) minute or a one (1) minute penalty (as applicable) and served in the same manner as a Major Penalty. This rule shall be applied regardless as to the on-ice strength of the two Teams at the time the above outlined penalties are assessed.

19.4 APPLYING THE COINCIDENTAL PENALTY RULE

When multiple penalties are assessed to both Teams at the same stoppage of play, the following rules are to be utilized by the Referees to determine the on-ice strength for both Teams:

- (I) Cancel as many Major Penalties as possible;
- (II) Cancel as many Minor, Bench Minor and or Double-minor Penalties as possible.





RULE 20 MAJOR PENALTIES

20.1 MAJOR PENALTY

A Major Penalty shall be imposed on any Player who commits a physical foul and who recklessly endangers the fouled Player in a way that, at the discretion of the Referee, such Player would not be sufficiently sanctioned by imposing a Minor or Double-minor Penalty.

Such assessment of reckless endangerment shall be based on the severity of the infraction, severity of the contact, the degree of violence and the general reprehensibility involved.

For the first (1st) Major Penalty in any one game, the offender, except the Goalkeeper, shall be ruled off the ice for five (5) minutes during which time no substitute shall be permitted.

When one Player receives a Major Penalty and a Minor Penalty at the same time, the Major Penalty shall be served first by the penalized Player (or substitute for the Goalkeeper), except under Rule 19.2 – Coincidental Major Penalties are in effect, in which case the Minor Penalty will be recorded and served first.

20.2 SHORT-HANDED

Although a Major Penalty does cause a Team to be "short-handed", the penalized Player serving the Major Penalty does not leave the Penalty Box when the opposing Team scores a goal. The Player must wait for the entire Major Penalty to expire before they are permitted to exit the Penalty Box.

20.3 SUBSTITUTION

When a Player has been assessed a Major Penalty and has been removed from the game or is injured, the offending Team must place a substitute in the Penalty Box immediately. They may then legally exit the Penalty Box when the Major Penalty has expired.

20.4 AUTOMATIC GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY

An "Automatic Game Misconduct" shall be applied to any Player who has been assessed a second Major Penalty, or a second Misconduct Penalty in the same game. An "Automatic Game Misconduct" shall also be applicable whenever a Player is assessed a Major Penalty for any of the infractions listed in the Reference Tables.

When a Major and "Automatic Game Misconduct" are assessed, the Player shall be ruled off the ice for the balance of the game, but a substitute shall be permitted to replace the suspended Player after five (5) minutes have elapsed.

20.5 INFRACTIONS

A list of the infractions that can result in a Major Penalty being assessed can be found in Tables 5, 6 and 7. Note – we will look at each of these infractions in details in future issues.

20.6 ON-ICE VIDEO REVIEW OF MAJOR PENALTIES

Referees shall review all plays that result in the assessment of a Major Penalty for the purpose of confirming (or modifying) their original call on the ice. Exception to this rule is that situations under Rule 46 – Fighting can only be reviewed if they falls under Rule

46.5 – Dangerous puncher – "Sucker puncher". No other situations under Rule 46 – Fighting can be reviewed. Such reviews will be conducted exclusively by the Referee(s) on the ice in consultation with other On-ice Official(s), as appropriate, using the technology (for example, a handheld tablet or a television or computer monitor) specified in and provided pursuant to: Rule 38.5 – Process for Reviewing.

Communication between the Video Review Operation and the On-ice Officials shall be limited to contact between the appropriate Video Review Consultant and the Referee to ensure the Referee is receiving any and all video they might request, as well as the appropriate replay angles they may need to review the penalty call.

There shall be no contact or consultation except between the On-ice Official(s) and the Video Review Operation.

The Referee shall only have the following options following Video Review of their own call:

- (I) confirming their original Major Penalty call; or
- (II) reducing their original Major Penalty call to a lesser penalty for the same infraction.





(III) nullifying the original Major Penalty altogether.

Note: This rule is only applied in certain IIHF Championships.

20.7 REPORTING

The Referee is required to report all major penalties and the surrounding circumstances to the Proper Authorities immediately following the game in which they occur.

EIHL Annotation - RULE 20-MAJOR PENALTIES

20.6 On-Ice review of major penalties Referees shall review all plays that result in the assessment of a Major Penalty for the purpose of confirming (or modifying) their original call on the ice. Exception to this rule is that situations under Rule 46- Fighting can only be reviewed if they fall under Rule 46.5 Dangerous-"Sucker Punch". No other situations under Rule 46 Fighting can be reviewed.

Such reviews will be conducted exclusively by the Referee(s) on the ice in consultation with other On-ice Official(s), as appropriate, using the technology (for example, a handheld tablet or a television or computer monitor) specified in and provided pursuant to: Rule 38.5- Process for Reviewing.

The Referee(s) shall only have the following options following Video Review of their own call:

- confirming their original Major Penalty call; or
- reducing their original Major Penalty call to a lesser penalty for the same infraction.
- nullifying their original Major Penalty altogether.

RULE 21 DANGEROUS ACTIONS

21.1 MAJOR PENALTY AND GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY

A Major Penalty with an automatic Game Misconduct Penalty shall be imposed on any Player who commits an action that is not covered by the playing rules and, in the judgement of the Referee, endanger any person involved in the game.

21.2 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

If deemed appropriate, Supplementary Discipline can be applied by the Proper Authorities at their discretion. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline.

RULE 22 MISCONDUCT PENALTIES

22.1 MISCONDUCT PENALTY

In the event of Misconduct Penalties to any Players except the Goalkeeper, the Players shall be ruled off the ice for a period of ten (10) minutes each. A substitute Player is permitted to immediately replace a Player serving a Misconduct Penalty. A Player whose Misconduct Penalty has expired shall remain in the Penalty Box until the next stoppage of play. An "Automatic Game Misconduct" shall be applied to any Player who has been assessed a second (2nd) Misconduct Penalty in the same game.

22.2 MISCONDUCT PENALTY - GOALKEEPER

Should a Goalkeeper on the ice incur a Misconduct Penalty, this penalty shall be served by another member of their Team who was on the ice when the offense was committed. This Skater is to be designated by the Coach of the offending Team through the Captain.

22.3 SHORT-HANDED

A Player receiving a Misconduct Penalty does not cause their Team to play "short-handed" unless they also receive a Minor or Major Penalty in addition to the Misconduct Penalty.

When a Player receives a Minor Penalty and a Misconduct Penalty at the same time, the penalized Team shall immediately put a substitute Player in the Penalty Box and they shall serve the Minor Penalty without change. Should the opposing Team score during the time the Minor Penalty is being served, the Minor Penalty shall terminate (unless Rule 15.4 – Short-handed Team – Goal Scored is applicable) and the Misconduct to the originally penalized Player shall start immediately.





When a Player receives a Major Penalty and a Misconduct Penalty at the same time, the penalized Team shall immediately place a substitute Player in the Penalty Box and no replacement for the penalized Player shall be permitted to enter the game except from the Penalty Box.

22.4 REPORTING

All Misconduct penalties assessed for "Abuse of Officials" must be reported in detail to the Proper Authorities.

22.5 INFRACTIONS

A list of the infractions that can result in a Misconduct Penalty being assessed can be found in Table 9. Note – we will look at each of these infractions in details in future issues.

RULE 23 GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTIES

23.1 GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY

A Game Misconduct Penalty involves the suspension of a Player for the balance of the game, but a substitute is permitted to replace the Player removed. Twenty (20) minutes are applied in the records to the Player incurring a Game Misconduct Penalty.

23.2 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

A Player, Coach or other team personnel incurring a Game Misconduct Penalty shall be reported to the Proper Authorities which shall have full power to impose further Disciplinary Measures on the penalized person. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline.

23.3 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES - GENERAL CATEGORY

The respective process is outlined in the IIHF Disciplinary Code.

23.4 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES - ABUSE OF OFFICIALS CATEGORY

The respective process is outlined in the IIHF Disciplinary Code.

23.5 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES - STICK INFRACTIONS CATEGORY

The respective process is outlined in the IIHF Disciplinary Code.

23.6 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES - PHYSICAL INFRACTIONS CATEGORY

The respective process is outlined in the IIHF Disciplinary Code.

23.7 AUTOMATIC GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY

Rule 20.4 – Automatic Game Misconduct.

23.8 OTHER INFRACTIONS - THAT COULD RESULT IN A GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY

A list of infractions that can result in a Game Misconduct Penalty being assessed can be found in Table 10. In addition, the following list of infractions can also result in a Game Misconduct Penalty being assessed:

- (I) interfering with or striking a spectator.
- (II) racial taunts or slurs or sexual remarks
- (III) spitting, smearing blood on or at an opponent or spectator
- (IV) biting an opponent or spectator

Any Player or team personnel who physically interferes with the spectators, becomes involved in an altercation with a spectator, or throws any object at a spectator, shall automatically incur a Game Misconduct Penalty and the Referee shall report all such infractions to the Proper Authorities who shall have full power to impose such further Disciplinary Measures as they deem appropriate.

HOCKEY VIEWS FROM SECTION 'C' AND BEYOND




WEMBLEY WIZARDS SEASON 1984/85

This season is the 40th Anniversary of the Fife Flyers British Championship Wembley win. In a weekly feature we will recap, with thanks to the Fife Free Press for use of their reporting, the events of that historic occasion.

The Bluecol Cup final will be pushed to the back of Fife Flyers' minds for the next month with six vital Heineken Premier League matches to be played before December 1. "Our top priority is to make the play-offs, so league matches are of the utmost importance," explained player-coach Ronnie Plumb yesterday. "But if we can keep the momentum going and stay in top form, it should help us when the final comes 'around. "All the boys are excited at having qualified for Streatham, and it will be the first experience of a final for a lot of them.
