

COOLEN'S COMMENTS

Last Saturday in Glasgow I thought we got off to a pretty good start and we created some quality opportunities but again we didn't score. Maybe if we score with those chances it becomes a different night. It was a close game and Glasgow capitalised on one of their power plays and again we couldn't. I couldn't fault our teams effort, everybody emptied the tank but we have to start putting the puck in the net. On to last Sunday and I was hoping for something much better than we gave. Again a close opening period and although we were behind I thought it was anyone's game. We scored on the power play which was good for us as this has clearly been one of the areas of concern. Then however the wheels kinda fell off, I didn't expect that. It was just too many mistakes and too many goals, it was just not good enough obviously. It's a situation that in all my coaching years I'm not used and ho one in our group is happy with where we are and we have to figure a way out of it

and we can only turn this around with hard work and that's a challenge that we all will give everything to achieve. We have to be better with the group we have although I am now in discussions with agents and contacts and with the two remaining moves we can make under the regulations I will be aiming to get players in that will help us move in the right direction. All that said our game midweek in Sheffield gave us a real confidence boost. We had the lead twice and had the game tied going into the third but for the width of the post we might even have had a lead and that might have changed things. For us to go into the home of last season's Champions and a team that is loaded up for the Champions League I thought we fared well. You strive for perfection in a game but it's often impossible to do and we made a few key mistakes, not near as many as we made last Sunday and were punished for them but psychologically I thought that game gave us some more light at the end of the tunnel.

I should mention the addition of young Aiden Wilson, I like what I've seen in the few practice sessions he has had with us and so we've spoken and put him on a two way contract and we will be looking to get him into more practices and see how we can use him going forward.

In a league that I think has improved from last season our team has had its ups and downs and we can't get away from recognizing the impact of injuries. But I think we found something in our game on Wednesday night that we can use moving forward. We changed our structure following the Dundee game, our approach in Sheffield was more of a patient system where we counter attack and so no matter what we do we will be giving it our all again this weekend to get our team moving in the right direction.

As always your ongoing support is much appreciated and together we can work our way through this.

MATCH REPORT



The Flyers travelled for the first time this season to meet the Braehead Clan with both teams looking to get off losing skids. The Clan who were winless in their last four were favourites to secure at least second spot in the Challenge Cup group with four of their five remaining games on home ice. The Flyers were looking to halt their run at five consecutive defeats and they had Nikolai Shulga return to the line up whilst they scratched Olivier LeBlanc, Johnny Curran, James Spence and Janis Voris. The Clan scratched Matt Stieff, Nick Prkusic, Kyle Carruth and Cade Neilson.

The Flyers opened with the first chance of the game when Martin Látal charged down a shot in his own zone and then broke up the ice with the puck going one on one with Landon Bow but the Clan netminder came up with a huge save. In the 2nd minute Drake Pilon had a partial breakaway but as he closed in on the Clan net he was crowded out in what was an encouraging start for the visitors. Shane Owen made his first save in the 4th minute when he held a shot from distance by Deven Sideroff. The Clan went on the first power play of the game in the 5th minute when Austin Farley was called for hooking on Liam Finlay. Owen made a blocker save from a Rylan Schwartz effort and the Fife keeper followed that up with a strong save when he was out at the top of his paint to stop a Tyson McLellan shot from the slot. The Flyers completed the kill with some fine blocks and at full strength they went the other way when Pilon set up Maxim Musorov who tested Bow who made a pad save. The Flyers first power play came in the 8th minute when Reece Kelly got the gate for interference. The first minute of the man advantage saw the visitors create a couple of good chances following some good puck control and Lucas Chiodo put a snapshot on Bow. The Clan complete the kill but at even strength the Flyers again came close to opening the scoring when Pilon saw his shot catch a piece of Bow and pinged the crossbar. 30 seconds later the Clan went close when Kelly came in at the back post but sent his shot wide. Owen made a good stop in the 11th minute when he gloved a Schwartz shot but the game was turned on its head with two goals in 28 seconds for the home side in the 15th minute. The opener came from Cole Ully who was found in the slot and his low shot on the back hand found the net through Owen's five hole. The Clan struck again when Finlay came in off the left hand boards and from an angle he picked the top corner over the glove of Owen. The Flyers steadied the ship but the closest they came was a shot from distance from Daniel Krenželok that was swallowed by Bow.

PERIOD 2

The Clan went back on the power play just 19 seconds into the middle period when Tyler Heidt was called for tripping with the Clan player clearly catching an edge and falling without being touched. Sideroff threatened with two shots but the Flyers came up with a strong kill by protecting the house well. In the 23rd minute Darien Kielb forced a pad save from Owen with a shot from the slot and moments later the Clan were again on the power play as Madi Dikhanbek took a high sticking minor. The Clan had a lot of solid puck possession during their power play and Owen had to make a fantastic save from McLellan who was in great position to score. With the Flyers back at full strength Látal's speed took him into the Clan zone in the 27th minute and Bow got a piece of his shot to deflect it

wide of net. Fife were called for too many men on the ice moments later. The home side again possessed the puck well in the Flyers zone and Keaton Jamieson was denied with a snapshot that was blockered away by Owen. The Flyers came up with another big kill though to leave the Clan 0 for 4 on the game. The Flyers came close in the 31st minute as Bow was called into action dealing with a shot from Látal and then he got lucky as the puck got behind him and was scrambled clear. Musorov with a close range effort was stoned by Bow in the 33rd minute and the Glasgow netminder followed that up with a strong save on Krenželok. The Flyers gave up a 3 on 1 chance in the 34th minute but Patrick Kyte came up with a superb defensive play to break up the attack and prevent the shot on Owen. In the 35th minute Sideroff had a shot from the right wing saved by Owen who then moved across his net to swallow the shot from the rebound. In the 36th minute Ryan Foss had a sight of goal but Bow dislodged the net. Musorov went between two Clan defencemen in the Flyers next attack and caused chaos with the puck almost sneaking past Bow. The Clan were back on the power play with three minutes of the period remaining with Foss binned for cross checking. This time the Clan made the visitors pay as Ully fired past an unsighted Owen. The period ended with the Flyers on a power play and a snap shot by Phélix Martineau was just over before the same player saw his shot hit the pad of Bow and glance off the outside of the post.

PERIOD 3

The Flyers started the third period with a minute of the man advantage remaining and Schwartz made a huge shot block on Musorov. With 7 seconds of the kill left the Clan took another penalty as Simon Despres got the gate for slashing the stick on Kyte. With the teams skating 5 on 4 Krenželok saw his shot go in and out of Bow's glove and land in the crease before being swept away to safety as the home side completed the kill. In the 44th minute Owen blockered away a shot by Kelly before Martineau tested Bow in the 46th minute with a shot from the circles and the big rebound saw no Fife takers. Chiodo had to get repairs to a facial injury and the Flyers also saw Farley being replaced by Dikhanbek who moved up from the blueline. Mitchell Heard had a good look in the 47th minute from the high slot that Owen made a pad save from. A minute later and Musorov stole the puck at the Clan blueline and went in all alone on Bow. He tried to deke the netminder who stuck with him and was able to make a pad save. In the 50th minute Owen produced a fine save as he denied Sideroff who had been set up at the side of the Fife net. The Flyers were then called for a cross checking penalty by Heidt. The home side thought they had added a fourth goal on the ensuing power play when Sideroff deftly tipped the puck into the top of the net from the edge of the crease with some contact being made on Owen. The call on the ice was no goal and the Clan used their Coaches Challenge. After a very lengthy review the on ice decision was upheld and the Clan were assessed a minor penalty. At 4 on 4 Heard had a shot from the left wing turned away by Owen before the Flyers had a shortened power play and Bow stopped a shot from Chiodo with the top of his mask. In the 54th minute Owen steered a shot from Jamieson wide of his net and a minute later he gloved a snapshot by Alex Forbes. The Clan comfortably saw out the remaining five minutes of the match.



With both teams chasing the Glasgow Clan for a possible Challenge Cup play-off position a defeat for either would effectively end their Cup campaign for this season. For the Flyers it was more important to arrest a run of six consecutive defeats, their longest winless streak so far as we closed out the second month of the season. The Stars were without Xavier Pouliot, Brogan O'Brien and the recently announced returnee Philippe Sanche. The Flyers made one change in their roster from the team that lost the previous night in Glasgow with Austin Farley joining Johnny Curran, Janis Voris and James Spence as the scratches as they welcomed back captain Olivier LeBlanc having missed the last six matches.

It was a fairly low key start to the game with Kris Inglis having a shot from the blueline sticked away by Shane Owen whilst at the other end Jarrett Fiske did likewise from a shot by Nikolai Shulga. In the 3rd minute the Flyers went on the first power play of the match when Craig Moore was called for interference. The Flyers almost cashed in on the man advantage with a wrister from Patrick Kyte striking iron and bouncing to safety. The Stars returned to full strength and in the 7th minute they were again under pressure when Drake Pilon and Phélix Martineau combined with the latter firing wide of the target. The Stars went the other way and Zach Tsekos just couldn't get enough on the puck as he tried to redirect it past Owen who was scrambling in net. The Stars at that point called a timeout. Moments later the visitors took the lead when Jonathan McBean found himself in the slot in splendid isolation and he had two bites of the cherry to force the puck past Owen in the 7th minute. In the 9th minute Fiske had difficulty handling a shot from Martin Látal but covered up at the second attempt. Owen made a smart save in the 11th minute when he covered his nearside post as Jake Elmer tried to stuff the puck home. In the 12th minute Brett Gravelle tested Owen from the slot and moments later on an odd man rush the Stars missed another chance when Kameron Kielly fluffed his shot as he came down main street. The second Stars goal however was only delayed a few seconds as Alex Tonge stepped into the Flyers zone and drove the net before roofing the puck over Owen's glove. Inglis was called for interference in the 15th minute and the Flyers made the Stars pay. Ryan Foss was in tight on Fiske who made the stop but Martineau followed up and poked home the rebound. In the 17th minute a close in tip by Maxim Musorov was stopped by an alert Fiske and from the ensuing scramble the puck could not find a Flyers stick as the Dundee netminder was left swimming in his crease. The Stars forced a couple of saves in quick succession from Owen before Daniel Krenželok saw his long range effort gloved by Fiske. With 30 seconds of the period remaining Musorov was called for a hold and McBean for a rough in offsetting penalties as the teams stayed at 5 on 5.

PERIOD 2

In the opening minute of the middle period Domenic Alberga had a shot that Owen couldn't hold and a minute later the Fife keeper did well to get his pad on a redirected shot that then caused a scramble around his net but the Flyers survived. Stars went on their first power play of the match in the 24th minute when the Flyers were called for too many men.

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Ilt was a solid kill by the home side and Látal used his speed to set up a shorthanded chance for Foss who saw Fiske make a save with his shoulder. The Stars best chance was by Tonge but Owen went post to post to make the save as Flyers returned to full strength. The visitors did however score again shortly after when Owen made an initial save on Kielly but could do nothing to prevent a rebound that McBean dispatched. The roof fell in on the Flyers over the next five minutes as the Stars scored three goals. Owen had to make a number of saves in quick succession from Elmer, Ben O'Connor and Brendan Harms whilst at the other end Fiske made a fine save with an outstretched pad to deny Lucas Chiodo who got his stick on a cross crease pass from Martineau. A fourth Stars goal arrived when Harms drove the net and Owen again made the initial save before Elmer put the rebound top corner. The Flyers went on the power play again a minute later as Tonge was called for hooking but the Flyers man advantage lasted only 11 seconds before Patrick Kyte hooked Kielly after he had blocked the blueliners shot and made a break up the ice. With the teams skating 4 on 4 Látal took advantage of the extra space and took the puck to the net but couldn't force it home but the Flyers did get back into the game just seconds later when Foss picked up a giveaway by O'Connor and he beat Fiske with a neat shot. Within 45 seconds the Stars had doubled down on their lead with two quick fire goals. The first came when Harms set up Tsekos in the slot to give Owen little chance and then Gravelle picked the far bottom corner as the Stars pounced on a turnover in the neutral zone to transition quickly into the Flyers zone. With a four goal cushion the Stars went back on the power play in the 38th minute and were quick to stretch their lead as Elmer did all of the spade work as he burst down the right wing and fed the puck over to Tsekos who had an easy tap in at the top of Owen's crease as the Flyers looked in complete disarray. In the final minute of the period Craig Garrigan got the gate for the Stars for a slash. The Flyers were unable to fashion any chances on the power play before the period ended.

PERIOD 3

Into the third period and the carry over penalty was killed by the Stars before Krenželok and Alberga were both binned on five minute fighting majors. Fiske made a blocker save in the 44th minute from a Martineau shot and another power play came the way of the Flyers in the 48th minute when Elmer was penalised for a trip. Inglis made a huge shot block from a Krenželok drive that hobbled him as he struggled to get back to the bench and the Stars were in no mood to give the Flyers any life as they completed the kill. It was Stars turn on the power play in the 52nd minute when Pilon was called for interference. Owen made a shoulder save midway through on an effort from Cole MacDonald as the Flyers killed the penalty. Pilon drove just wide of target in the 54th minute and a minute later a tip from the slot by Keanu Yamamoto clipped the top of the crossbar as the Stars comfortably saw out the remaining minutes of the match.

WEEK 8 - FLYERS STATS RECAP

On Saturday night.....

Glasgow Clan 3 Fife Flyers 0 - Challenge Cup

The Flyers remained winless on the road this season after 7 games. Last season they lost 8 consecutive road games through November/December.

To start a season the longest winless run on the road is 15 games in season 2011/12 with 13 decided in regulation.

The Flyers have had 1 power play goal in their last 9 matches going 1 for 31 (3.03percent) – before that in their opening six matches of ten season they were 6 for 22 (27.3 percent) In all EIHL competitions this was the 64th time the Flyers have been shutout and the 5th time by Clan with 4 of those being on Braehead ice.

On Sunday night......

Fife Flyers 2 Dundee Stars 7 - Challenge Cup

The Stars have now won on four of their last five visits to the Auld Barn.

The Flyers winless streak was stretched to seven games which is most amongst all teams so far this season. Last season the Flyers had a streak of 8 consecutive regulation losses during December. The Flyers gave up 7 shots in the final period which is the fewest in a period in any game this season. The five second period goals scored by Stars is the most given up by the Flyers in a single period this season.

It also equals the most goals given up in a period on home ice in all EIHL competitions with Nottingham Panthers doing so in March 2013 – The Stars hold the record for most goals scored against the Flyers in a period with 6 from the encounter last December at Dundee Ice Arena. The Flyers got their first power play goal against Dundee this season and are now 1 for 13 (7.7 percent) against the Stars.

Congratulations to Ryan Foss who scored his first points for the Flyers with a goal and an assist. The month ends as statistically the second worst October in the Flyers EIHL era, the full record reads:

The Flyers currently have the longest winless streak of the season with seven straight defeats and the Steelers will be looking to stretch their winning streak to seven which will be the best of all teams this season

The Flyers will also be looking to snap their longest active drought on an opponents home ice as they have now gone 16 games in all EIHL competitions without a win in Sheffield.



As teams make their first visits to the Auld Barn this season we continue to look back at the changes made to their rosters in the close season. Panthers first move came on April 15th when they announced that Head Coach Jonathan Paredes would not be returning to the team in 2024/25. The Frenchman took up an opportunity with Ducs D'Angers. A few days later and the first announcement on the player front was a the return of Finnish forward Otto Nieminen. The new man behind the bench for this season was announced on April 30th as **Danny Stewart** from the Coventry Blaze. The 45-year-old has over a decade of experience in the Elite League as a coach and joins the Panthers from Coventry Blaze. The Canadian-born former forward first took up a coaching role as player-coach with Newcastle Vipers in 2010-11, winning Coach of the Year in the EIHL's end-of-season awards. He spent five seasons as player-assistant coach and then associate coach with the Flyers before moving to Coventry for the 2016-17 season. Stewart first arrived in the UK as a player for Coventry in 2006-07 and was part of the Blaze side that won back-to-back Elite League titles. "There were many things that attracted me to the role," said Stewart. "The history of Nottingham, the resources available, the staff and people involved with the club. I'm excited. We will play fast but we will also be a team that plays for each other. My teams have done that in the past and that will be our expectation. Nottingham is a great fanbase and a great city and I have a bit of history as back in my playing days Coventry and Nottingham were great rivals. I say it every year when I get asked that Nottingham is my favourite venue. Being able to experience that week in, week out will be exciting." Into the month of May and the Panthers re-signed homegrown forward Jordan Kelsall for a sixth successive season. The 24-year-old, who was born in Nottingham, had a standout campaign in 2023-24 and was named British Player of the Year. Kelsall first iced for the Panthers in 2017-18 on a two-way deal with NIHL side Swindon Wildcats and spent the following year on-loan with Dundee Stars. He joined Panthers full-time in 2019-20 and was part of the roster than won the behind-closeddoors Elite Series in 2021. On May 6th it was confirmed that Joe Hazeldine would depart the club as he moved North to join the Glasgow Clan. Another homegrown forward, Oliver Betteridge was returned to the roster. The 28-year-old, who is a hugely popular member of the Panthers roster on and off-the ice, first iced for the club as a teenager in 2011-12 and signed his first full-time deal in 2015-16. He's since made over 350 appearances, winning the Challenge Cup twice, the playoff title, the Continental Cup and the behind-closed-doors Elite Series. Betteridge was also part of the Great Britain set up over the summer in the World Championships in Prague and the Olympic qualifiers. Defenceman Joshua Tetlow was the next to resign. The 26-year-old first joined the club in 2017 and has gone on to make over 250 appearances in the black and gold. This season will be his sixth year with the club with the only spell away coming in 2022-23 when he played 55 games for RoKi in the Finnish second tier. Tetlow, who has won 19 international caps, was again part of the GB teams over the offseason months. Another returnee was announced next, forward Logan Neilson, the 21-yearold having completed his first professional season and voted the Elite League's Under-23 Player of the Year. Neilson scored eight goals and added nine assists for 17 points before injury ended his season early. The campaign included a six-game scoring streak and eight goals in a 10-match span in February/March. He was selected for GB's training camp squad ahead of the World Championship and played in two matches against Poland at Planet Ice Leeds and the Motorpoint Arena Nottingham.

The first non-homegrown returnee was forward **Hugo Roy**. The 26-year-old played in every Elite League game last season and scored 48 points, which included 24 goals and 24 assists in 54 matches. Roy won the prestigious Players' Player of the Year last season as voted for by his team-mates and was also named MVP by the coaches in a joint-award with Otto Nieminen. The Panthers first new addition was announced on 29th May as being Calgary-born forward Matt Alfaro from Ravensburg. The 27-year-old joined the Panthers from Germany where he played last season for Ravensburg Towerstars in the DEL2, scoring 14 goals and contributing 22 assists for 36 points in the regularseason. He added six points in the post-season (3+3) as he helped the Towerstars to the quarter-finals of the playoffs, before losing a thrilling seven-game series to eventual winners Polar Bears Regensburg. After playing three years of college hockey for the University of Calgary in the USports league, Alfaro turned professional with East Coast Hockey League side Wheeling Nailers in 2020-21. He made an immediate impact and was named Alternate Captain in 2021-22 and became a top-line centre in the league, scoring 70 points (21+49) in 88 matches. Alfaro earned multiple call-ups to the highly-rated American Hockey League and secured an AHL contract for the 2022-23 season. In total, Alfaro has iced in 70 AHL games for Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins, Manitoba Moose and Abbotsford Canucks. June commenced with confirmation that Simon Despres would not return and would also join the Glasgow Clan. June 5th and news that the Panthers were thrilled to welcome back fans' favourite Sam Herr for the 2024-25 season. The 31-year-old was the Elite League's leading points-scorer when he was last with the Panthers in the 2019-20 campaign which was cut short by the covid pandemic. Herr, who was the Panthers captain, was named on the EIHL's First All-Star Team as he scored 30 goals and contributed 29 assists for 59 points in just 46 league matches. The USA-born forward added 17 points (6+11) in 12 games in the Challenge Cup and nine points (5+4) in six matches in the Continental Cup as Panthers won the silver medal. After leaving Nottingham, Herr had a season in Austria with Innsbruck where he scored 19 goals and 21 assists for 40 points. He's spent the past three years in the DEL2 with Ravensburg Towerstars, scoring 149 points (76+73) at just under a point per game. Herr scored 43 points (24+19) in 39 post-season matches and captained Ravensburg to a championship in 2022-23. "I'm smiling, I'm head over heels excited, my family's excited and we're so happy to be coming back," said Herr. "I felt the love from day one in Nottingham last time. The fanbase in Nottingham, I have not experienced anything like it anywhere else and that's the truth. It was a new face next when experienced Canadian defenceman Matt Spencer was confirmed. The 27year-old had an impressive junior career with the Peterborough Petes of the Ontario Hockey League, earning a call-up to the Canada U18 World Championship team where he won a bronze medal along with current NHL stars Matthew Barzal and Thomas Chabot. He was picked in the second round, 44th overall, by Tampa Bay Lightning in the 2015 NHL Entry Draft. The Canadian began his professional career in North America and has played over 150 games in the East Coast Hockey League for Adirondack Thunder, Orlando Solar Bears and Cincinnati Cyclones. He's also received numerous callups to the highly-regarded American Hockey League, playing 54 games across stints with Syracuse Crunch and Rochester Americans. Spencer moved into Europe for the 2021-22 season to play for Austrian side Dornbirner EC before moving to the HC Pustertal of Italy. Last year, he scored 14 points (3+11) in the regular season and then added five points (2+3) in the playoffs as he helped SønderjyskE become Danish Champions. Two further departures were announced, Tyler Welsh and Stephen Anderson before another new arrival. Defenceman Davis Bunz, the 25-year-old linked-up with the Panthers after two impressive seasons in the ECHL with Wheeling Nailers. The USA-born blueliner spent five years with Providence College in the NCAA - the top college league in North America. Bunz turned professional in 2022-23 and scored three goals and added 20 assists for 23 points in 58 league games for the Nailers. His leadership skills saw him named Alternate Captain last season and he returned 31 points (10+21) in 58 regular-season matches. He added five points (2+3) in the postseason as he helped Wheeling to the Divisional Finals of the ECHL playoffs.

Swedish forward Didrik Henbrant was confirmed as returning. The 26-year-old scored 13 goals and contributed 27 assists for 40 points in his first full professional season. Henbrant netted a number of highlight-reel goals as he lit-up the Elite League with his speed and skill. "I am super excited to be back," said Henbrant. "I have never experienced support like we did last season. It was truly amazing". Henbrant made his professional debut in 2016-17 in the SHL - the top league in Sweden - for Linköping HC after coming through their junior system. Prior to joining the Panthers, he spent four years playing in the highly-rated NCAA - the top level of college hockey in North America. American defenceman Cooper Zech became the latest new addition to round out the month of June. The 25year-old was a free-scoring defenceman as a junior and continued that in the NCAA, as he led Ferris State University in scoring with 28 points (8+20) in 36 matches. His performances brought him to the attention of the Providence Bruins and he signed his first professional contract with the AHL side in March 2019. He spent two-and-a-half years with the Bruins organisation which included a loan stint with top Slovakian side HK Nitra in 2020-21 when the AHL had a delayed start because of the pandemic, before returning to play for Providence for the rest of the season. After impressing in Providence, Zech went on to sign an NHL contract with Philadelphia for the 2021-22 season, icing for the Flyers' AHL affiliate Lehigh Valley Phantoms. Zech then joined the Chicago Blackhawks organisation in 2022-23, playing mainly for their AHL affiliate side Rockford Ice Hogs, as well as a brief stint in the ECHL with Indy Fuel before being traded to New York Rangers as part of the Patrick Kane deal. Last season, Zech made the move to reigning Slovakian champions HC Kosice, scoring 18 points (3+15), July 4th saw American forward **Tim Doherty** added to the new faces. The 28-year-old arrived at the Panthers from Cortina who he helped reached the final of the Alps Hockey League playoffs. He joined the Italian side from North America at the backend of last season and scored seven points in eight regular-season matches, before added 21 points (7+14) in the playoffs and was the league's leading scorer in the post-season. Doherty scored nearly 100 points in his four years in the NCAA and turned pro in his final year at college, earning himself a contract at ECHL side Allen Americans. He made the move to Wheeling Nailers the same season and the following year scored 45 points (27+18) in his first full campaign as a professional, playing on the same team as recent signing Matt Alfaro. In 2022-23 he joined Maine Mariners where he led the team in points (73) and assists (52) in 69 regularseason matches. After splitting his time between Maine and Cincinnati Cyclones last season, Doherty made the move to Europe to join Cortina. A week later and it was another player new to the EIHL in the shape of Canadian forward Adam Berg. The 27-year-old Calgary-born winger joins the Panthers after two seasons in the ECHL. The 6'1" forward spent five years with Brock University in the USports league and signed his first professional contract with Cincinnati Cyclones in his final season at college. Last season, Berg began the year with the Cyclones before a trade to Utah Grizzlies where he scored 23 (9+14) points in 50 regular-season matches. July 24th and the Panthers signed ECHL all-star netminder Ryan Bednard. The 27-year-old joined the Panthers with an impressive career in North America already on his CV, which started with him being picked as an 18-year-old by Florida Panthers in the seventh round of the 2015 NHL Draft. After three years in college in the NCAA with Bowling Green State University, Florida signed Bednard to a two-year entry-level NHL contract in March 2018. The USA-born netminder has since had regular spells in the AHL, most recently with Grand Rapids Griffins in 2022-23 and last season with Ontario Reign. He's also spent four of the past five seasons with ECHL side Greenville Swamp Rabbits, playing under former Cardiff Devils coach Andrew Lord since 2020-21. Last season, Bednard set a franchise record in Greenville when he secured his seventh career shutout for the Swamp Rabbits. On the same day the Panthers completed their goaltending tandem with the signing of Hunter Vorva. The 28-year-old highly-rated prospect joined the Panthers after an impressive season with his hometown club Kalamazoo Wings in the ECHL where he returned a 0.92 save percentage. The USA-born goalie had a solid four-year college career in the NCAA, being named Player of the Season in 2018-19, before spending part of the lockdown 2020-21 campaign in France as he helped Marseille to the championship title. In 2020-21, he led the SPHL with Huntsville Havoc in goals against (1.93) and save percentage (.934) and was named the league's Goaltender of the year. His performances in the minor leagues and the ECHL attracted the attentions of the AHL scouts, earning him professional tryout contracts with Cleveland Monsters and Rochester Americans.

The new faces kept on coming with experienced forward **Kristoff Kontos** added to the roster on July 26th. The 30-year-old Canadian centre, who began his career in North America, arrived in Nottingham after six free-scoring years across Europe. After stints in the ECHL with Toledo Walleye and Orlando Solar Bears very early in his career, Kontos helped lead St Francis Xavier University to two successive college championships in 2016 and 2017. Kontos joined French side Gap and returned 38 points (9+29) in 44 regular-season matches. The following year he immediately made an impact for Vimmerby HC in the HockeyEttan in Sweden with 25 points in 18 games, but lockdown ended the season early. The forward lit the league up with Bodens HF a season later, scoring 23 goals and leading the league in assists (39) and points (62). Kontos then moved up to the HockeyAllsvenskan to join Kristianstads IK and scored at just under a point per game, leading the team in assists (33) and points (48) which saw him finish in the top-10 points-scorers in the league. He joined Slovakian topflight side HC Banska Bystrica in 2022-23 where he was the top-line centre, scoring 41 regular-season points (16+25), before returning to the HockeyAllsvenskan to ice for AlK in the 2023-24 season. Another departure to the Glasgow Clan was confirmed as Felix Pare. British netminder Luca Sheldon was resigned as the 22-year-old Nottingham-born goalie returned for his third successive season. Sheldon, who came through the Nottingham Ice Hockey Club junior system, will again be on a two-way deal with NIHL 1 side Nottingham Lions. Early August and Finnish defenceman Jaakko Niskala was announced. The 25-year-old has four years' experience in Finland's top division Liiga, icing in over 100 games. Last year, the 6'2" blueliner made the move to France where he scored 15 points (1+14) for Amiens in the regular season. The Panthers appointed **Linton Grant** as the club's new Assistant Coach. The 27-year-old, who was born in Birmingham, has spent the past decade working in North America. He played for Solihull Barons as a junior before moving with his family to Canada as a teenager. Grant spent five years working in Mount Royal University in Canada in the CIS and USports leagues, before moving to work in the NCAA with the University of Michigan. Last season, Grant was Assistant Coach with Okotoks Oilers in the Alberta Junior Hockey League. August 10th and Mathieu Lemay departed to join Jonquiere Marquis. The Panthers added some British depth for the future with Peterborough Phantoms defenceman Bradley Bowering, Leeds Knights forward Oliver Endicott and Milton Keynes defenceman/forward Ben Brown signing two-way contracts. Peterborough-born Bowering came through the Phantoms junior system and is now a regular in the NIHL. The 22-year-old made 10 World Championship appearances for GB as a junior, five for the under-18s and five for the under-20s, and was selected as one of the NextGen prospects for GB Men's training camp in Cardiff in

Swindon-born Endicott has spent the past two years with Leeds Knights and scored 37 points (12+25) for the NIHL side last season. Endicott, 20, was GB regular as a junior and was Alternate Captain for the under-20s in the past two World Championship campaigns. Dundee-born Brown, who can play in defence or as a forward, began his career with his hometown club and iced for the Stars in the EIHL in 2022-23. The GB junior international moved to Milton Keynes Lightning last season where he scored 20 points (6+14) in his first NIHL campaign. Mid-August and the Panthers have signed Canadian forward **Reid Stefanson**. The 27-year-old joins the Panthers from Austrian side Vienna Capitals who play in the Central European league, the ICEHL. Stefanson iced for UMass-Lowell in the NCAA and was named Rookie of the Year in his first season, before going on to have four successful years in the top university league. The 6'0" forward, who can play at centre or on the wing, turned pro midway through the 2021-22 campaign when he joined ECHL side Maine Mariners. In the 2022-23 season, he played with another new Panther, Tim Doherty, as he scored 47 points (22+25) for the Mariners and was the leading forward in the plus-minus column with +22. The final blueline addition was made on August 19th when the Panthers signed defenceman Quinn Wichers. Wichers, who celebrated his 27th birthday that day arrived in Nottingham from ECHL side Utah Grizzlies where he scored 16 points (2+14) last season on the same team as fellow new Panther Adam Berg. After four years in the NCAA with Mercyhurst University, Wichers turned pro in 2021-22 when he signed a contract with Rapid City Rush. The 6'4" blueliner has since had extensive experience in North America and has played 26 times in the American Hockey League, with call-ups to Tucson Roadrunners and San Diego Gulls. Since the start of the season the Panthers have made another couple of moves.

At the start of October Panthers signed Hungary International defenceman **Zsombor Garát**. The 6 foot 1 blueliner has played 40 games for Hungary in World Championship tournaments and Olympic Qualifiers - and has domestic experience in Europe and North America. Garát, 27, has played in Nottingham at the Motorpoint Arena before, being part of the Hungary team that beat Great Britain in the Olympic Qualifiers in February 2020. After turning professional in the 2018-19, Garát played in both the Slovakia top-flight and the Erste Liga before moving to North America last season. He played 62 times for Worcester Railers in 2023-24, scoring 15 (2+13) points. Netminder **Rok Stojanovic** returned to the Nottingham Panthers on a two-month contract as cover for the injured Hunter Vorva. The 34-year-old played 45 times in the regular season for the Panthers in 2023-24, securing two shutouts. Stojanovic - a Slovenian international - iced for Sheffield Steelers in the 2021-22 campaign and has extensive experience across Europe. He won championships in Slovenia in 2017 and France in 2018 and led Polish side Krakow to the regular-season title in 2022-23.

TWO NUMBER SIXES - ABEL AND FLETCHER

This article covers a couple of Flyers who wore number 6 during their time with Flyers, a Kirkcaldy junior development success from the Heineken era and an import from the British National League days.


Neil Abel was a local boy who played in eleven seasons for Flyers and also appeared for a number of other UK clubs during his playing career. "Big Neilly" made his debut for Flyers in 1979/80 season as an 18 year old, playing in four games and registering one assist. He became a regular fixture in Flyers' line-up the following season totalling 30 appearances, second only to Jimmy Jack and scored 4+8.

His first Flyers' goal was in a 16-2 win over Durham on 10/01/81. The excitement of his first marker obviously had an effect on the Fife Free Press reporter, who credited his goal to Ian Able!! Towards the end of 81/82, Neilly and Andy Linton made the move to Nottingham, but Abel only played a handful of games before returning back North. Linton returned to Flyers in 84/85. Abel was an ever present in the first season of the British League in 82/83 scoring 10+12 and also was credited with a hat trick in a challenge game against Ayr in the middle of April 1983. He was a resilient player who could be depended upon over the next eight seasons, only missing a handful of games over that time. He was a valuable member of Flyers' Heineken Championship winning team at Wembley in May 1985 and played in the squads that were beaten finalists in the Autumn Cup of 1984 and 1986.

His Flyers career came to an unfortunate end in 1991/92 season as Flyers battled to regain their Premier Division status, following the catastrophic relegation the previous season. His last game for Flyers was a 6-10 defeat at Telford on 01/02/92 and was dropped from the squad following that game. His last Flyers' goal was the previous weekend, in a 7-5 win against Lee Valley Lions.



After his Flyers' career finished he played for an extended time for a number of clubs including Edinburgh, Blackburn and Sheffield clubs Steelers and Scimitars. At Scimitars he had spells as player coach and Head Coach and was then Assistant Coach at Steelers. His value to Scimitars was rewarded in February 2007, when he was given a testimonial in respect of his services to the club. Appropriately he had a second testimonial at Kirkcaldy on 3rd May 2008 when he iced in a Flyers select against a Best of British select with the same programme being used for both testimonial matches. My memories of Neil Abel, are that of a solid no nonsense defenceman with a booming slapshot from the blue line.



Ian Fletcher (left) was an import defenceman, who joined Flyers for 2003/04 season and was part of a talented defence corps including fellow import Greg Kuznik and local Dmen Derek King, Kyle Horne and Euan Forsyth, ably back stopped by goalie Steve Briere. Prior to signing for Flyers, Fletcher had played for University of Alabama-Huntsville in the NCAA. He made his Flyers' debut in a 3-2 win over Hull Stingrays in the Findus Cup on 06/09/03, scoring Flyers' second goal at 10.39 of his debut. Flyers' defence in the league that season could have been described as uncompromising, only conceding 97 goals in 36 games. Flyers only lost seven regulation time games and a further three in overtime as they won the BNL title by one point over Guildford Flames.

This was after a disappointing start in the Findus Cup group stages, where Flyers only won five of twelve games, but managed to qualify for the semifinal stage where Newcastle Vipers booked their final place on penalty shots after a two legged semi tie. Fletcher only missed six games all season.

This was due to a knee injury, picked up on 04/01/04 at Guildford, but was back to help Flyers clinch the title with a 4-3 overtime victory at Hull on 28/02/04. Six Play-off wins, three defeats and a 2-2 draw against Guildford at home, a game in which Fletcher scored his last Flyers goal meant Flyers again qualified for the semi-final stage, but lost over two legs to Bracknell Bees. His final outing as a Flyer was in the second leg of the Caledonian Cup final at Edinburgh, a 7-6 success against Capitals as Flyers took their second piece of silverware of the season. 2003/04 was lan Fletcher's last season as a pro hockey player and he left Kirkcaldy as an unsung

In the second part of our look at the "Types of Penalties" we cover Rule 24 to 28. Again the full text of the IIHF rule is provided along with any annotations as per the EIHL Casebook.

RULE 24 PENALTY SHOT

24.1 PENALTY SHOT

A "Penalty Shot" is designed to restore a scoring opportunity which was lost as a result of an infraction being committed by the offending Team, based on the parameters set out in these rules.

24.2 PROCEDURE

The Referee shall announce the reason for the assessed "Penalty Shot" and shall have the Skater selected by the Team entitled to take the "Penalty Shot" announced over the Public Address System.

The puck shall then be placed on the Center Face-off Spot and the Player taking the "Penalty Shot" will, on the instruction of the Referee, by blowing their whistle, play the puck from there and shall attempt to score on the Goalkeeper.

The puck must be kept in motion towards the opponent's Goal Line and once it is shot, the play shall be considered complete.

No goal can be scored on a rebound of any kind (an exception being the puck off the Goal Post or crossbar, then the Goalkeeper and then directly into the goal), and any time the puck crosses the Goal Line or comes to a complete stop, the "Penalty Shot" shall be considered complete.

The "lacrosse-like move" whereby the puck is picked up on the blade of the stick and "whipped" into the net shall be permitted provided the puck is not raised above the height of the shoulders at any time and when released, is not carried higher than the crossbar. Rule 80.1 – High-sticking the Puck.

The "spin-o-rama type move" where the Player completes a 360° turn as they approach the goal, shall not be permitted. Should a Player perform such a move during the "Penalty Shot", the shot shall be stopped by the Referee and no goal will be the result.

Only a Player designated as a Goalkeeper or alternate Goalkeeper may defend against a "Penalty Shot". The Goalkeeper must remain in their crease until the Player taking a "Penalty Shot" has touched the puck. If at the time a "Penalty Shot" is awarded, the Goalkeeper of the penalized Team has been removed from the ice to substitute another Player, the Goalkeeper shall be permitted to return to the ice before the "Penalty Shot" is taken.

The Team against whom the "Penalty Shot" has been assessed may replace their Goalkeeper to defend against the shot, however, the substitute goalkeeper is required to remain in the game until the next stoppage of play.

While the "Penalty Shot" is being taken, Players of both sides shall withdraw to the sides of the Rink and in front of their own Player's Bench.

24.3 DESIGNATED PLAYER

In all cases where a "Penalty Shot" has been awarded, the "Penalty Shot" shall be taken by a Skater selected by the Coach or Captain of the non-offending Team from any non-penalized Skater of their Team. Such selection shall be reported to the Referee and cannot be changed.

24.4 VIOLATIONS DURING THE "PENALTY SHOT"

Should the Goalkeeper leave their Crease prior to the Player taking the "Penalty Shot" touching the puck, or committing any infraction, the Referee shall allow the "Penalty Shot" to be taken.

If the "Penalty Shot" fails, the Referee shall permit the "Penalty Shot" to be taken over again. When an infraction worthy of a Minor Penalty is committed by the Goalkeeper during the "Penalty Shot" causing it to fail, no penalty is assessed but the Referee shall permit the "Penalty Shot" to be taken over again. Should a Goalkeeper commit a second (2nd) violation and the "Penalty Shot" fails, they shall be assessed a Misconduct Penalty and the Referee shall permit the "Penalty Shot" to be taken over again.





A third (3rd) such violation shall result in the Goalkeeper being assessed a Game Misconduct Penalty and a goal shall be awarded.

When a Major Penalty is committed by the Goalkeeper that causes the shot to fail, the Referee shall permit the "Penalty Shot" to be taken over again and the appropriate penalties shall be assessed to the Goalkeeper. The Goalkeeper may attempt to stop the "Penalty Shot" in any manner except by throwing their stick or any object, deliberately removes their helmet and/or face mask, or by deliberately dislodging the goal, in which case a goal shall be awarded.

During the "Penalty Shot", should the Goalkeeper, in an attempt at making a save, dislodge the goal accidentally, the Referee shall make one of the following determinations:

- (I) Award a goal if they deem the Player would have scored into the area normally occupied by the net had it not been dislodged.
- (II) Allow the "Penalty Shot" to be re-taken if they do not score or it could not be determined if the puck would have entered the area normally occupied by the net.
- (III) If the goal becomes dislodged after the puck has crossed the Goal Line thus ending the "Penalty Shot", the above determinations do not apply, the "Penalty Shot" is complete.
- If, while a "Penalty Shot" is being taken, any Player, Coach or team personnel of the opposing Team interferes with or distracts the Player taking the "Penalty Shot" and, because of such action, the "Penalty Shot" fails, a second (2nd) attempt shall be permitted.

The Referee shall impose a Bench Minor Penalty to the offending Team, and if a Player on the Bench is responsible, a Misconduct Penalty on the Player responsible shall be assessed. When a Coach or team personnel is guilty of such an act, a Game Misconduct Penalty shall be assessed on the responsible person and the matter will be reported to the Proper Authorities for possible further disciplinary action. If, while the "Penalty Shot" is being taken, any Player, Coach or team personnel of the Team taking the "Penalty Shot" interferes with or distracts the Goalkeeper defending the "Penalty Shot" and, because of such action, the shot is successful, the Referee shall rule no goal and shall impose a Bench Minor Penalty to the offending Team.

If while the "Penalty Shot" is being taken a spectator throws any object onto the ice that in the judgment of the Referee interferes with the Player taking the "Penalty Shot" or the Goalkeeper defending the "Penalty Shot", they shall permit the "Penalty Shot" to be taken again. For incidents involving stick measurements refer to: Rule 10.5 Sticks Measurement and Rule 10.6 – Sticks Measurement – Prior to Penalty Shot.

24.5 FACE-OFF LOCATION

If a goal is scored from a "Penalty Shot", the puck shall be faced-off at Center ice. If a goal is not scored, the puck shall be faced-off at either of the end Face-off Spots in the zone in which the "Penalty Shot" was attempted, except when another rule dictates the "face-off" location should be in an alternate location, such as when the "point men" enter the zone beyond the outer edge of the End Zone Face-off Circle or when the attacking Team has been penalized on the same play. Rule 76.2 – Face-off Locations.

24.6 RESULTS

Should a goal be scored from a "Penalty Shot", a further penalty to the offending Player shall not be applied unless the offense for which the "Penalty Shot" was awarded is a Major or Misconduct Penalty, in which case the appropriate penalty shall be imposed.

If the offense for which the "Penalty Shot" was awarded would normally incur a Minor Penalty, then regardless of the outcome of the "Penalty Shot", no further Minor Penalty shall be served.

If the offense for which the "Penalty Shot" was awarded was to incur a Double-minor Penalty, or where the offending Team is assessed an additional Minor Penalty on the same play, the first Minor Penalty is not assessed since the "Penalty Shot" was awarded to restore the lost scoring opportunity. The second Minor Penalty would be assessed and served regardless of whether the "Penalty Shot" results in a goal. This will be announced as a Double-minor Penalty for the appropriate infraction and the Player will serve two (2) minutes only.

No penalty shall expire when a goal is scored against a Team on a "Penalty Shot".





Should two (2) "Penalty Shots" be awarded to the same Team at the same stoppage of play (two (2) separate infractions), only one (1) goal can be scored or awarded at a single stoppage of play. Should the first "Penalty Shot" result in a goal, the second "Penalty Shot" would not be taken but the appropriate penalty would be assessed and served for the infraction committed.

24.7 TIMING

If the infraction upon which the "Penalty Shot" is based occurs during actual playing time, the "Penalty Shot" shall be awarded and taken immediately in the usual manner notwithstanding any delay occasioned by a slow whistle by the Referee to allow play to continue until the attacking side has lost possession of the puck to the defending side, to which this delay results in the expiry of the regular playing time in any period. The time required for the taking of a "Penalty Shot" shall not be included in the regular playing time or Overtime.

24.8 INFRACTIONS

When a Player, in the Neutral or Attacking Zone, in "control" of the puck (or who could have obtained "possession and control" of the puck) and having no other opponent to pass than the Goalkeeper, is fouled from behind, thus preventing a reasonable scoring opportunity, a "Penalty Shot" shall be awarded to the non-offending Team.

Nevertheless, the Referee shall not stop play until the attacking Team has "lost possession" of the puck to the defending Team.

The intention of this rule is to restore a reasonable "scoring opportunity" which has been lost. If, however, the Player fouled is able to recover and obtain a "reasonable scoring opportunity" (or a Teammate is able to gain a reasonable scoring opportunity), no

"Penalty Shot" should be awarded but the appropriate penalty should be signaled and assessed if a goal is not scored on the play.

"Control of the puck" means the act of propelling the puck with the stick, hand, or feet.

In order for a "Penalty Shot" to be awarded for a Player being fouled from behind, the following four (4) criteria must have been met:

- (I) The infraction must have taken place in the Neutral or Attacking Zone (i.e., over the puck carrier's own Blue Line);
- (II) The infraction must have been committed from behind (except a foul committed from the front by the Goalkeeper on a "breakaway" situation);
- (III) The Player in "possession and control" (or, in the judgment of the Referee, the Player clearly would have "obtained possession and control" of the puck) must have been denied a reasonable chance to score. The fact that the Player got a shot off does not automatically eliminate this play from the "Penalty Shot" consideration criteria. If the infraction was from behind and the Player was denied a "more reasonable scoring opportunity" due to the infraction, then the "Penalty shot" should still be awarded;
- (IV) The Player in "possession and control" (or, in the judgment of the Referee, the Player clearly would have "obtained possession and control") must have had no opposing Player between themself and the Goalkeeper.

If, in the opinion of the Referee, a Player makes contact with the puck first and subsequently trips the opponent in so doing, no "Penalty Shot" will be awarded, but a Minor Penalty for "tripping" shall be assessed. It should be noted that if the attacking Player manages to get around the Goalkeeper and has no defending Player between them and the "open goal", and they are fouled from behind by the Goalkeeper or another defending Player, no goal can be awarded since the Goalkeeper is still on the ice. A "Penalty Shot" would be awarded.

RULE 25 AWARDED GOALS

25.1 AWARDED GOAL

A goal will be awarded to the attacking Team when the opposing Team has taken their Goalkeeper off the ice and an attacking Player has "possession and control of the puck" (or "would have gained possession and control") in the Neutral or Attacking Zone, without a defending Player between themself and the opposing goal, and they are "prevented from scoring" as a result of an infraction committed by the defending Team.





25.2 INFRACTIONS - WHEN GOALKEEPER IS ON THE ICE

A goal will be awarded when an attacking Player with "an imminent scoring opportunity", is "prevented from scoring" as a result of a defending Player displacing the Goal Post, either "deliberately or accidentally" and it must be determined that the puck would have entered the Goal between the normal position of the Goal Posts, Rule 63.7 – Awarded Goal.

25.3 INFRACTIONS - WHEN GOALKEEPER IS OFF THE ICE

If, when the opposing goalkeeper has been removed from the ice, a player in control of the puck (or who could have obtained possession and control of the puck) in the neutral or attacking zone is tripped or otherwise fouled with no opposition between him and the opposing goal, thus preventing a reasonable scoring opportunity, the Referee shall immediately stop play and award a goal to the attacking team. A list of the infractions that shall result in an awarded goal when the goalkeeper has been removed for an extra attacker is as follows:

Delaying the game (Goal post displaced)
Illegal substitution
Interference
Leaving the players' bench or penalty box
Throwing stick or other object
Fouling from behind (including hooking, holding, slashing, tripping, etc.)

25.4 INFRACTIONS - DURING THE COURSE OF A "PENALTY SHOT"

A goal will be awarded when a Goalkeeper attempts to stop a "Penalty Shot" by throwing their stick or any other object at the Player taking the "Penalty Shot" or by dislodging the goal (either deliberately or accidentally) or removes their face mask to force an interruption.

RULE 26 DELAYED PENALTIES

26.1 DELAYED PENALTY

If a third (3rd) Player of any Team is penalized while two (2) Players of the same Team are serving penalties, the penalty time of the third (3rd) Player shall not commence until the penalty time of one (1) of the two (2) Players already penalized has elapsed.

he third (3rd) penalized Player must proceed at once to the Penalty Box. They may be substituted for on the ice to keep the "on-ice strength" at no less than three (3) Skaters for their Team. When the penalties of two (2) Players of the same Team will expire at the same time, the Captain of that Team will designate to the Referee which Player will return to the ice first and the Referee will instruct the Penalty Timekeeper accordingly (this is done to expedite the release of a Player from the Penalty Box when the opposing Team scores on the "Power-Play").

26.2 PENALTY EXPIRATION

When any Team has three (3) Players serving penalties at the same time and because of the Delayed Penalty rule, a substitute for the third (3rd) offender is on the ice, none of the three (3) penalized Players in the Penalty Box may return to the ice until play has stopped.

When play has been stopped, the Player whose penalty has fully expired may return to the ice. During the play, the Penalty Time keeper shall permit the penalized Players to return to the ice, in the order of expiration of their penalties, but only when the penalized Team is entitled to have more than four (4) Players on the ice. Otherwise, these Players must wait until the first stoppage of play after the expiration of their penalties in order to be released from the Penalty Box.

26.3 MAJOR AND MINOR PENALTY

When a Major and a Minor Penalty are imposed at the same time on different Players of the same Team, the Penalty Timekeeper shall record the Minor Penalty as being the first penalty.





RULE 27 GOALKEEPER'S PENALTIES

27.1 MINOR PENALTY TO GOALKEEPER

A Goalkeeper shall not be sent to the Penalty Box for an offense which incurs a Minor Penalty, but instead, the Minor Penalty shall be served by another member of their Team who was on the ice when the offense was committed. This Player is to be designated by the Coach of the offending Team through the playing Captain and such substitute shall not be changed. A penalized Player may not serve a Goalkeeper's penalty. If the Goalkeeper is involved in Coincidental Penalties being assessed and as a result, their Team is required to play "short-handed" due to additional penalties assessed to the goalkeeper, the Player designated to serve the additional time penalties assessed to the Goalkeeper may be any Player as designated by the Coach of the offending Team through the Captain.

27.2 MAJOR PENALTY TO GOALKEEPER

A Goalkeeper shall not be sent to the Penalty Box for an offense which incurs a Major Penalty, but instead, the Major Penalty shall be served immediately by another member of their Team who was on the ice when the offense was committed. This Player is to be

designated by the Coach of the offending Team through the Captain and such substitute shall not be changed.

When a Goalkeeper is assessed a Major Penalty plus a Game Misconduct, which is coincidental with a Major Penalty to the opposing Team, no Player is required to serve the Goalkeeper's penalties in the Penalty Box, since they have been ejected from the game.

Should a Goalkeeper incur two (2) Major Penalties in one game (results an automatic Game Misconduct Penalty), they shall be ruled off the ice for the balance of the game and their place shall be taken by a member of their own Team, or by a regular substitute Goalkeeper who is available. Such Player will be allowed the Goalkeeper's full equipment.

27.3 MISCONDUCT PENALTY TO GOALKEEPER

Should a Goalkeeper on the ice incur a Misconduct Penalty, this penalty shall be served by another member of their Team who was on the ice when the offense was committed.

This Player is to be designated by the Coach of the offending Team through the Captain and such substitute shall not be changed.

27.4 GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY TO GOALKEEPER

Should a Goalkeeper incur a Game Misconduct Penalty, their place will then be taken by a member of their own Team, or by a regular substitute Goalkeeper who is available, and such Player will be allowed the Goalkeeper's full equipment.

27.5 LEAVING GOAL CREASE

A Minor Penalty shall be imposed on a Goalkeeper who leaves the immediate vicinity of their Goal Crease during an altercation.

However, should the altercation occur in or near the Goalkeeper's crease, the Referee should direct the Goalkeeper to a neutral location and not assess a penalty for leaving the immediate vicinity of the Goal Crease. Equally, if the Goalkeeper is legitimately outside the immediate vicinity of the Goal Crease for the purpose of proceeding to the Players' Bench to be substituted for an extra attacker, and they subsequently become involved in an altercation, the Minor Penalty for leaving the crease would not be assessed. In addition, during stoppages of play in the game, they must not proceed to their Players' Bench for the purpose of receiving a replacement stick or equipment or repairs thereto, or due to an injury, or to receive instructions, without first obtaining permission to do so from the Referee. Otherwise, they must be replaced by the substitute Goalkeeper immediately (without any delay) or be assessed a Bench Minor Penalty.

27.6 PARTICIPATING IN THE PLAY OVER THE CENTER RED LINE

If a Goalkeeper participates in the play in any manner (intentionally plays the puck or checks an opponent) when they are beyond the center red line, a Minor Penalty shall be imposed upon them. The position of the puck is the determining factor for the application of this rule.





27.7 GOALKEEPER RESTRICTED AREA

A Goalkeeper shall not play the puck outside of the goalkeeper restricted area behind the net. Should the Goalkeeper play the puck outside of the goalkeeper restricted area behind the Goal Line, a Minor Penalty for "Delay of Game" shall be imposed. The determining factor shall be the position of the puck. The Minor Penalty will not be assessed when a Goalkeeper plays the puck while maintaining skate contact with their Goal Crease.

The designated trapezoidal area is marked with lines behind each goal. The lines run diagonally from the Goal Line to the Boards behind the goal. The outer dimension at the Goal Line is 6.80 m and at the Boards 8.60 m

27.8 INFRACTIONS - UNIQUE TO GOALKEEPERS

A list of the infractions that shall result in a penalty to the Goalkeeper are:

Illegal stick

Illegal equipment

Leaving crease during an altercation

Participates in the play beyond the Center Line

Playing puck outside restricted area

Proceeds to Players' Bench to replace stick

Deliberately shoots or bats puck out of play

Deliberately "freezes" the puck inside or outside the Goal Crease

Deliberately drops the puck in their pads or on the goal net

Piling snow or other obstacles

Throwing the puck towards opponent's goal

Using blocking glove to punch an opponent (Roughing)13.

RULE 28 SUPPLEMENTARY DISCIPLINE

28.1 SUPPLEMENTARY DISCIPLINE

The Proper Authorities may, at their discretion, investigate any incident that occurs in connection with any game played under the jurisdiction of the IIHF, including any championship, pre-championship, practice or exhibition games and league games.

The Proper Authorities may assess additional Disciplinary Measures for any offense committed during the course of a game or any aftermath thereof by a Player, Coach, or team personnel or Team executive, whether or not such offense has been penalized by the Referee(s).

28.2 SUPPLEMENTARY DISCIPLINE - PRE-CHAMPIONSHIP - AND EXHIBITION GAMES

For more information for Supplementary Discipline in pre-championship games and exhibition games, refer to the IIHF Disciplinary Code.

EIHL Annotation - RULE 28-SUPPLEMENTARY DISCIPLINE

Where there is reference to "The Proper Authorities" within the IIHF Rulebook, this shall refer to the EIHL Department of Player Safety (DOPS) and EIHL Hockey Operations.

EIHL Hockey Operations is the determining body where reference is made to the IIHF.

IIHF Disciplinary Code reference = EIHL DOPS

WEMBLEY WIZARDS **SEASON 1984/85**

This season is the 40th Anniversary of the Fife Flyers British Championship Wembley win. In a weekly feature we will recap, with thanks to the Fife Free Press for use of their reporting, the events of that historic occasion.

Fife Flyers face not one but two important Heineken League games this weekend. On Saturday, Durham Wasps visit Kirkcaldy Ice Rink and Flyers will be looking for revenge for their only league defeat so far this season and the following evening Flyers face Whitley Warriors – the team they beat so convincingly last | Saturday. Despite that high scoring victory, player-coach Ronnie Plumb still believes the Whitley match will be a tough one. "We had a good win against Whitley on Saturday" he said. "They had a fairly food first period but we wore them down after that but they will be a different proposition on their own ice. It will be a difficult game at Whitley, but we play to win all our games, on the road and at home, and we'll go there looking for a win. As for Saturday's match with the English Champions Plumb went on: "They have beaten us in the League, but now they are on the road, coming to us." The game against the top scoring side in England is one of the most vital Flyers will play this season, and they go into it with a side hit by injury. Although Plumb hopes Andrew Donald will be able to return following a week off after injury against Murrayfield Racers, a training accident on Tuesday has left Chic Cottrell with a depressed fracture of the cheekbone which will put on the sidelines for around eight weeks. Steven Kirk is also unavailable owing to a thumb injury, received in Saturday's Whitley tie and hattrick hero Jimmy Pennycook is also out due to work commitments. Returning to last week's victory Plumb was delighted with the high score but voiced a little concern at the number of goals conceded. "At 14 to 7, it's great to score so many" he said "but we need a little more concentration to keep goals against us down. We have the speed up front, especially in Dave Stoyanovich and Danny Brown, to get plenty goals and we caught their defence through the speed of our front players".

10/11/1984 Fife Flyers v Durham Wasps Premier League

Fife Flyers avenged their only defeat of the season so far when they brought Durham Wasps' 100 percent record to an end at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink on Saturday night. And it was Canadian Danny Brown who emerged from the shadow of his compatriot Dave Stoyanovich to give a brilliant display which brought him seven goals.

The Kirkcaldy side hit Wasps with another quick goal at the start of the final period when Danny Brown scored but the remainder of the match was something of an anticlimax with Flyers in command. Wasps did manage a second consolation goal through O'Connor two minutes from time but this was a very impressive performance by Flyers against a side who could prove the opposition in next month's Bluecol Cup final.
