The Flyers made the midweek trip to last season's Grand Slam winning Sheffield Steelers looking to end a number of unwanted winless records. The visitors were without the injured Austin Farley with Yanis Voris, James Spence and Fynn Page also scratched. Added to their line up was 19 year old Aiden Wilson who had recently been signed on a two way from the Romford Raiders. The Steelers scratches were Joel Janatuinen along with two way players Ivan Bjorkly Nordstrom, Nathan Ripley and Sam Cooper.

The Flyers made a positive start to the game and had an extended period of time in the Steelers zone with Olivier LeBlanc forcing the first save of the game from Matt Greenfield. Brandon Whistle had the Steelers first effort on goal in the 2nd minute but Shane Owen was square to his shot. The visitors stunned their hosts in the 4th minute when Phélix Martineau dogged Dominic Cormier all the way down the ice to steal the puck from him and from the right circle he picked the far corner on Greenfield. In the 6th minute Greenfield was once again in action when he stopped a tip on the edge of his crease from Martineau. From the face of Madi Dikhanbek got another shot in on the Steelers goal. In the 8th minute the Flyers were caught on a quick transition and as Marc-Olivier Vallerand skated through on Owen he was slashed and the referee awarded a penalty shot. Vallerand skated in on Owen and drew the puck around the keeper to find the right hand side of the net. Moments later Tyler Heidt did well to get a stick on the puck at the edge of his crease to break up a 2 on 1 with a Steeler lurking at the back door. Daniel Leavens tested Owen when he batted the puck out of midair from the slot in the 9th minute. Cole Shudra was positioned at the top of Owen's crease in the 11th minute but his tip was well dealt with by the Fife keeper. The Steelers went on the first power play of the night when Noah Delmas was called for a trip on Mitchell Balmas. The Flyers came up with a solid kill with Owen facing just a couple of comfortable shots as the visitors broke up the Steelers cycle a number of times. In the 17th minute Owen sticked away a blast from the point and going the other way Martin Látal set up a chance for Drake Pilon whose shot from the high slot was blockered into the netting by Greenfield. Owen had to be alert in the 18th minute as he shut down a sneaky effort from Daniel Ciampini who tried to stuff the puck home on the short side.

PERIOD 2

The Steelers had the opening shot of the second period when Cormier drove one on net following a stretch pass which Owen was alert to. Just as they did in the first period the Flyers were quick to get on the board again when a nice rush up ice involving Michael Cichy, Lucas Chiodo and Martineau ended with a pass over from Chiodo to Martineau who stuffed the puck in at the post off the skates of Greenfield. In the 24th minute Látal drove the Steelers zone and cut into the middle of the ice where he fired a shot into the glove of Greenfield. A minute later and a Balmas pass to Colton Saucerman was tipped just wide. Daniel Krenželok had a shot in the 27th minute from the blueline that was saved by Greenfield but moments later the Steelers got back on terms when a saucer pass from Patrick Watling opened up the Flyers defence and Mikko Juusola came down the left boards

before going five hole on Owen. In the 30th minute there was a delay as Patrick Kyte took a puck to the face and left the game to get repairs as the ice was then cleaned up. The Steelers were back on the power play in the 31st minute when the Flyers were called for delay of game as Chiodo shot the puck over the glass into the Steelers bench. Owen made a sprawling save on Whistle who came in at the back post and then he held a Vallerand one timer as the Fife penalty killers once again did a good job. In the 35th minute Juusola had a half chance but Owen covered up. The Flyers were out of luck in the 36th minute as Cichy dragged the puck into the Steelers zone and his quick snapshot beat Greenfield but rang the post and from the follow up play Martineau was robbed as he had an empty net but somehow Greenfield got his stick on the puck to deflect it over. In the final minute Sacha Guimond was up on the rush and forced a blocker save from Owen.

PERIOD 3

Kyte returned to the Flyers bench to start the third period wearing the #18 jersey. Pilon had the first shot of the period after 30 seconds that Greenfield saved comfortably. It was the Steelers though who struck quickly with the go ahead goal inside the opening minute. The puck was misplayed and broke nicely into the path of Cormier who buried it stick side on Owen. Watling was next to threaten in the 42nd minute when he stole into the Flyers zone but he couldn't beat Owen one on one. In the 46th minute Ciampini couldn't finish on a 2 on 1 break and the Flyers went the other way with the trademark speed of Látal creating an opportunity but he was denied by Greenfield. From the face off there was nearly a great set up play between Cichy, Chiodo and Martineau but a Steelers stick got a piece of the puck with Greenfield out of position. In the 48th minute Watling tipped a shot wide and the Flyers were back on the penalty kill as Heidt was called for tripping. Saucerman tested Owen who saw the puck through a crowd to hold on and it was another sterling effort from the penalty killers as they prevented the Steelers from creating any quality scoring chances as the visitors returned to full strength. A killer fourth goal for the Steelers came in the 52nd minute when a bad pinch at the Steelers blueline by a defenceman allowed the Steelers an odd man rush and it looked as though Watling would score with the net gaping but Owen made a miraculous save only for the rebound to fall for Finlay Ulrick who hit the wide open net. In the 54th minute Greenfield had to be sharp to make a good pad save before the Flyers only power play of the night when Vallerand got the gate for a trip on Kyte. The Flyers got nothing set up in the Steelers zone and on two occasions almost gave up a short handed goal on breakaways. Firstly Mark Simpson went in all alone on Owen who denied him then a turnover at the Steelers blue line by the Flyers saw Whistle skate in uncontested and he tried to go five hole but Owen shut the pads to deny him. Owen was again in action in the 56th minute when he stopped a close in tip by Leavens. With 80 seconds to go Fife called their timeout and Owen was pulled for the extra skater. A shot on the Steelers net went wide and the puck broke out of the zone where Watling made no mistake in finding the empty net from the neutral zone to ice the win.



The Flyers travelled to Belfast for the first time this season with just an outside chance of Challenge Cup qualification. The Giants with a win would all but confirm top spot in the group and a seeded place in the semifinals with the Flyers then being officially eliminated. The Flyers were hit by further injury woes as they were without Austin Farley, Maxim Musorov and Drake Pilon along with long term absentee Johnny Curran. Jānis Voris was given his second start in net. The Giants had similar injury issues and were missing Joe Cassetti, Bobo Carpenter, Mike Lee and two players Mason Alderson, Mack Stewart and Rhodes Mitchell-King.

The Giants were quickly out of the traps and they generated the first chance of the game when Voris made a save from Ben Lake just shy of 30 seconds into the game. Voris was again in action when he had to deal with an Elijiah Barriga shot from the circles and then he had to deny Scott Conway who was in a downlow position. The Flyers keeper made another save in the 3rd minute when he turned away a huge blast from the right wing by Pierre-Olivier Morin. It was nonstop pressure from the Giant who had played the entire time in the Flyers zone from the opening face of until Voris was able to hold the puck and get a whistle with 3:30 on the clock. In the 5th minute the Flyers first foray into the Giants zone saw Patrick Kyte go to the net and collide with Jackson Whistle who looked a little shaken up afterwards. The Flyers stunned the home crowd in the 7th minute when Lucas Chiodo and Michael Cichy combined with the latter feeding the puck out front from behind the net and Phélix Martineau showed great hands to deke around Whistle and find the net. In the 9th minute Olivier LeBlanc made a great shot block and the puck was fed to Ryan Foss on a stretch pass but his shot was snagged by Whistle who was at the top of his crease. A shot from Noah Delmas in the 10th minute handcuffed Whistle who fought off the puck as the visitors grew into the game. Moments later however the Giants missed a great chance when Ciaran Long fired the puck wide from a good position in front of the net. In the 11th minute Conway fanned on his attempted shot at the top of the crease and the puck fluttered wide of goal. JJ Piccinich then found the side netting from a dangerous position. The Flyers doubled their lead in the 13th minute when Tyler Heidt took the puck into the high slot and let a shot go, Whistle got a piece of it but it bounced behind him and hit James Spence before rolling into the net for his first ever Flyers goal. The Flyers almost had another a minute later but Whistle came up with a solid stop on Martineau who then fired the puck wide of target from a bad angle. Martineau threatened again in the 16th minute in a swift counter attack but Whistle gloved his shot. Conway then went end to end with the puck and almost got a shot on goal but Voris poked the puck away from him at the last moment. **PERIOD 2** The Giants were on the offensive to start the second period and in the 23rd minute a shot block by Spence hobbled him before Voris was square to a one time shot by Mark Cooper that was turned away into the corner. The Flyers first chance of the period came in the 27th minute when Martineau picked up the puck following a turnover and he skated out from behind the net and on the turn fired in a shot but Whistle made sure he had all the angles taken away. A minute later and the Flyers once again threatened the Giants net when Madi Dikhanbek and Nikolai Shulga worked the puck up the ice and the shot on Whistle was tipped close in by Spence but stayed out. Voris flashed a right pad to deny Grant Mismash and in the 31st minute another shot from Martineau saw Whistle again alert to make the stop.

REPORT The Giants halved the deficit when the Flyers were caught on an odd man rush for the first time in the

game as they skated down ice 4 on 2 and Conway feathered the puck through to Piccinich who found the net with a low hard shot from the side of the goal. In the 36th minute the Giants threatened again when Conway cut in from the blueline and his wrister was labelled for the top corner before Voris gloved it. Moments later the puck was bouncing around in the Flyers paint with Barriga swatting at it but the visitors scrambled it clear. The Flyers went the other way in the 38th minute when Dikhanbek dropped the puck for Heidt and he skated in on Whistle who made a huge save. The Giants next attacked was halted when Martin Látal was called for a hook as the home side went on the first power play of the night with just under two minutes to play. The Giants controlled the puck in the Flyers zone the entire time with Voris making a beauty of a post to post save to deny Conway on a one timer with 30 seconds of the period remaining. Voris however could do nothing moments later when Gabe Bast found the top corner past the unsighted Fife goalie with just 11 ticks left on the clock. **PERIOD 3** The Giants struck quickly in the third period when Conway with speed went down the left hand boards and with Mark Cooper wide opened he made the pass for the Giants captain to bury the puck past a helpless Voris. The Flyers first effort on goal in the period came in the 45th minute when Cichy saw his one timer sticked away by Whistle. The Giants missed a glorious chance a minute later when Jordan Kawaguchi was all alone in front of Voris but he fluttered the puck wide of the net. In the 49th minute Heidt had a one timer flash just past the post but the Giants went down the ice and Bo Hanson took the puck to the net which Voris covered up but Kyte was called for a hook on the play. It took 13 seconds of the man advantage for the Giants to double their lead when Conway from the right hand circles beat Voris with a hard one time shot. From the restart the Flyers had a lucky escape as Morin pinged the post. In the 54th minute the Giants added a fifth but only after two reviews of the play. The initial shot was saved by Voris and as the puck spun up in the air he tried to swat it as players from both sides tried to get a touch. Barriga took a swing and got something on the puck as it drifted towards the goal and Voris sprawled across his line to try to stop it. The refs called goal on the ice without there being a clear view of where the puck was. The referees took a long time to review and they upheld their call. Tom Coolen used his Coaches Challenge to start another lengthy review but the outcome was the same and the Flyers were assessed a minor penalty for the failed challenge. 30 seconds into the Giants power play Lake ran through the numbers of Martineau along the boards and was given a major penalty. Voris left his crease during a melee behind the goal and was assessed a minor penalty. Skating 4 on 3 the Giants forced a fine pad save from Voris following a Bast shot. Eventually the Flyers went on the power play with three minutes of the major remaining. Heidt had a shot from up top that went wide and then LeBlanc saw his shot go in and out of Whistle's glove. The Flyers recycled the puck and a fantastic reverse pass from behind the net by Foss found Martineau for his second of the night with 90 seconds remaining. From the restart the Flyers pulled Voris to skate 6 on 4 but they couldn't fashion another quality chance with Kyte getting the gate for a slash with 19 seconds remaining.

The Flyers hosted the Nottingham Panthers for their first visit to the Auld Barn this season and were looking to avoid taking their winless streak into double figures. Shane Owen was recalled to start in net and Maxim Musorov also returned to the bench with Austin Farley, Drake Pilon and Fynn Page the scratches. The Panthers scratched Cooper Zech and gave the start in net to Ryan Bednard. In a lively opening to the game the Panthers were first to threaten when they broke 2 on 1 into the Flyers zone and Matt Spencer elected to take the shot which was labelled for the top corner before Owen snagged it with his glove. Bednard was in action a minute later when he made a save from a Daniel Krenželok shot. Although play raged form end to end both teams were taking care of their defensive duties and neither goalie was called into serious action. In the 7th minute Oliver Betteridge got a clear sight of goal and his shot pinged off the outside of Owen's right hand post. Owen was again in action in the 10th minute when he did well to hold to the puck following a tip down low from Sam Herr. The Flyers responded immediately when Martin Látal sped down the right hand boards and cut in to go back hand on Bednard who made the save. The first penalty of the night was called on Tyler Heidt for a hook on Adam Berg in the 16th minute. Owen made a big post to post save on a blast from Reid Stefanson and Phélix Martineau sold out to make a brave shot block as the Flyers successfully killed the penalty. Jordan Kelsall was denied by Owen in the 19th minute and in the last seconds of the period Bednard made saves on Ryan Foss and Patrick Kyte to keep the scoreboard blank.

PERIOD 2

The Panthers were quickly on the attack to start the second period and Owen had to make saves on Herr and Logan Neilson in the opening minute. However it was the home side that broke the deadlock in the 23rd minute after a great piece of puck possession by Madi Dikhanbek who then fed the puck cross ice for Musorov to fire a one timer past Bednard. The lead however was relatively short lived as the Panthers were back on terms 90 seconds later when Hugo Roy batted a puck out of the air and into the net after Owen had made the initial save on a Davis Bunz shot. In the 26th minute strong skating by Kyte saw him split the Panthers defence and as he went in on Bednard he just couldn't get enough on his back hand shot to trouble the Panthers keeper. Látal used his speed again when he drove the net and he was tripped by Spencer to put Flyers on their first power play. The Flyers struggled to get anything cleanly set up and just as the penalty was expiring Látal burst into the Panthers zone and fired a shot that knocked Bednards mask of as the Panthers completed the kill. The teams were still trading rushes and Bednard had to look sharp to stop Kyte who worked his way towards goal before the Panthers went the other way and Didrik Henbrant crashed into the net after Owen had made a strong stop on him. The Panthers took the lead in the 32nd minute when a shot pass by Tim Doherty off the pads of Owen was swept home from close range by Otto Nieminen. Flyers responded with Bednard making a toe save and the Panthers keeper made his best save so far in the game in the 34th minute when he stoned Musorov on a one timer after great interplay between Ryan Foss and Látal.

REPORT Owen made a fantastic shoulder save in the 37th minute to deny Doherty from close range and the

Flyers soon went back on the power play as Stefanson was called for boarding on Tyler Heidt. With the penalty in its late stages the Flyers finally managed to work the puck around the box and when the puck found Nikolai Shulga in the bumper position in the slot he went top shelf with his shot to tie the game up once again.

PERIOD 3

The first action of the third period saw Látal again burst through the Panthers rearguard and he sent his shot just wide of target. Within a few seconds the game swung in the Flyers favour as Owen made two outstanding saves in quick succession before Michael Cichy found Lucas Chiodo with a stretch pass up the gut and he sped into the Panthers zone before he deked around Bednard to plant the puck into the net. Once more however the Panthers responded in quick fire time and they were level again in 90 seconds with a greasy goal when a cross crease pass deflected off the skate of Neilson on the edge of the crease and into the net. In the 50th minute Látal created an opportunity on the rush when he found Musorov but his shot from the high slot was off target with plenty of net on show. Owen stopped Betteridge in the 53rd minute and Chiodo tried to break the other way but at the end of a shift could only fire over the net. The Flyers had an odd man rush a minute later but Bednard made a strong save on Látal. Owen was then square to the shooter in the 55th minute as he held on to a Roy shot from the circles. The Flyers survived an almighty scramble around their net in the 57th minute as a mass of humanity converged on Owen and in the 58th minute Heidt went close with a shot. The Flyers called their time out in the final minute but neither team could find a regulation winner.

OVERTIME

Into overtime and Owen made the first save as the Panthers started with possession of the puck. The visitors had a chance to end it when Herr skated in all alone on Owen who made a beauty of a right pad kick save before Foss went the other way and Bednard made a comfortable save. Tom McCollum stopped 32 shots as Belfast Giants moved a step closer to booking their place in the Challenge Cup Semi-Finals with a shutout home win over Glasgow Clan in front of 6,795 fans on Wednesday night at the SSE Arena. "I thought the whole team was great tonight. We did a great job putting a lot of pressure at their end," said McCollum after his shutout win. "Full credit to their goalie, he played very well and it was a very hard fought game both ways. Fortunately we were able to find a way to get the power play goal at the end of the second and really hold onto it the rest of the game." There was little to report on in the first period. Michael and the Pelech siblings story...

Tuesday 14th February 2023 and a Valentine's Night to remember for Mike Pelech as the South Carolina Stingrays met the Atlanta Gladiators. History was made the second the puck dropped as Atlanta forward Pelech was in the lineup for the game, marking his 860th career contest in the ECHL, making him the alltime games played leader in the league's history. Pelech surpassed ECHL Hall of Famer Sam Ftorek, who skated in 859 games over a 10-year span from 1998-2008. "On behalf of the ECHL, I would like to congratulate Mike Pelech on breaking the ECHL record for career games played," ECHL Commissioner Ryan Crelin said in a statement. "In our decorated 35-year history, this accomplishment speaks volumes to the hard work, dedication, professionalism and love of the game that Mike has portrayed for all of these years in our league." In addition to the Gladiators, the Toronto, Ontario native has suited up for the Ontario Reign, Toledo Walleye, Cincinnati Cyclones, Utah Grizzlies, Norfolk Admirals, Reading Royals, Greenville Swamp Rabbits, Wheeling Nailers and Indy Fuel over a career that has spanned 14 ECHL seasons. Pelech entered the contest fourth in league history with 655 points, including 457 assists which was just three shy of second all-time in the ECHL. Mike would go on to set his record at 884 regular season games and he claimed second all-time in assists with 478 and his 686 points is currently good for third overall all-time. The 33-year-old had shown no signs of slowing down as he was in the midst of one of the more productive campaigns in his ECHL career. He entered the game with 44 points in 46 games for Atlanta. The 0.96 points per game he was averaging was the second highest scoring rate over 14 seasons.

Mike played Major Junior in the Ontario Hockey League with the Toronto/Mississauga St. Michael's Majors over three seasons. His first during the 2006-07 season he was ranked third on Toronto's team with 35 assists. The with the team relocated to Mississauga he finished two seasons (2007-09) with 114 points (36+78) and 193 penalty minutes in 136 games. In his final season he was ranked first on Mississauga's team in points (65), third in goals (19) and second in assists (46) and penalty minutes (121). The summer of 2009 saw him selected by the Los Angeles Kings in the sixth-round (156th overall) in the 2009 NHL Entry Draft. His long association with the ECHL started when he made his professional debut with the ECHL's Ontario Reign against Bakersfield on October 16 2009. He recorded his first professional point, an assist, with the Reign against Bakersfield on October 28 and tallied his first professional goal with Ontario against Bakersfield on November 18. He was tied for seventh on the team in points with 35 points (10+25)



in 72 games and ranked first among club rookies in points (35), third on the team in penalty minutes with 133 and fifth among league rookies in penalty minutes. He signed a one-year contract in the American Hockey League with the Manchester Monarchs on August 25, 2010 and would go on to play five games that season whilst continuing to be a hardnosed player with the Reign in the ECHL where he returned 28 points (9+19) and 127 penalty minutes in 63 games. For the next couple of seasons Mike bounced around a bit with stops in the ECHL with the Toledo Walleye before being traded to the Cincinnati Cyclones where he wore the "A" along with stints in the AHL with the Norfolk Admirals, Worcester Sharks, Connecticut Whale and Peoria Rivermen. He found a home in the ECHL for the next couple of seasons with the Utah Grizzlies where he played alongside future Flyer Kris Hogg in his first season and in his second season played a short while with brother Matt as he ended second top points scorer. Season 2015/16 Mike returned to play for the Norfolk Admirals who were now and ECHL team following his one game for them in the 2011/12 season and he wore the "A".



In March 2016 he was traded to the Reading Royals and ended the season playing alongside current Flyer Austin Farley. His time in Reading ended in December 2016 when he resigned for the Utah Grizzlies. 2017/18 saw Pelech enter his fourth season with the Grizzlies after totalling 37 points in 48 games on 16 goals and 21 assists the previous campaign His return to the Utah lineup helped start a 27-13-4-1 run to finish the season, and he was named the team's Most Valuable Player at the year-end Player Awards Banquet. He would be second in scoring that season and over the 2010 decade Pelech had the most points by a Grizzlies skater with 189 (72 goals, 117 assists) and also played in the most games with 224. In June 2018 he was acquired in a trade by the Greenville Swamp Rabbits and he served as team captain and had a banner year in the Upstate by scoring a career-high 65 points, and by owning a share of 33.9% of the team's scoring—a league high mark. Pelech led the Swamp Rabbits in assists (47), points (65), shorthanded goals (2), power play assists (10) and shorthanded assists (3), and finished third in goals (18). His strong point total was good for ninth in the league, and his assist total was good for fourth in the league. He was also the only Swamp Rabbits player to play in all 72 games. The following season he was once again the Swamp Rabbits points leader with 53 (16+37). For season 2020-21 Atlanta was to be his destination but with the pandemic the Gladiators opted out of play and Mike spent that season between the Wheeling Nailers and the Indy Fuel before returning to Atlanta for the 2021/22 and 2022/23 seasons before his move to join the Clan.

Mike comes from a strong hockey family in the Greater Toronto Area. His older brother Matt was a first-round draft pick of the Calgary Flames and also appeared in 15 ECHL games over his career. His younger brother, Adam, is currently a defenseman for the New York Islanders. The siblings uncle, Mike Gillis, was drafted into the NHL 5th overall by the Colorado Rockies (now the New Jersey Devils) in the 1978 NHL Entry Draft. However, he never truly lived up to the expectations of being a top five pick, only playing 125 career games across seven seasons. However, Gillis did see success as the General Manager of the Canucks, during his tenure, the Canucks won the presidents trophy in back to back seasons and made the Stanley Cup final in 2011 for the first time since 1994. Mike Pelech's career is a story of perseverance and passion to have played both as long as he has and as successfully. He will undoubtedly one day find himself alongside Ftorek and many other luminaries of the league in the ECHL Hall of Fame soon after his career concludes.

Let's take a quick look at his siblings careers starting with older brother Matt.

Matt who was born September 4, 1987 was a defenseman/forward who last played for and captained the Belfast Giants. He formerly played with the Calgary Flames and the San Jose Sharks of the National Hockey League. He was a draft pick of the Flames, selected in the first round, 26th overall in the 2005 NHL Entry Draft and made his NHL debut in 2009 as a defenceman with the Flames. As a youth, Matt played in the 2001 Quebec International Pee-Wee Hockey Tournament with a minor ice hockey team from Vaughan. Matt played four seasons in the Ontario Hockey League with the Sarnia Sting, London Knights and Belleville Bulls. In 2007, he was assigned to the Quad City Flames of the American Hockey League. He was recalled by the Flames on April 4, 2009, making his NHL debut that night against the Minnesota Wild. He recorded his first career point, an assist, three nights later against the Los Angeles Kings. He joined the Abbotsford Heat for the 2009–10 season when the Flames relocated their AHL team. He was sidelined in January 2010 with a blood clot in his arm, an ailment team doctors initially feared was season ending. Matt recovered in time to join the Heat for their playoff run, appearing in all 13 of the team's post-season games. He appeared in 59 games for the Heat in 2010–11, scoring 3 goals, 2 assists and adding 198 penalties in minutes (PIM). The Flames chose not to offer him a new contract following the season, making him an unrestricted free agent. Marr signed with the San Jose Sharks, spending the season with their AHL affiliate, the Worcester Sharks. He appeared in 59 games during the 2011–12 AHL season, where he scored eight points and had 168 PIM. He was an alternate captain in Worcester, and was voted the team's "unsung hero". Matt, who was moved to the right wing and developed into an enforcer role in the Sharks organization, returned to Worcester for the 2012-13 season where he recorded seven points in 58 games and added a career-high 238 PIM. He also appeared in two games with San Jose. The Sharks again re-signed him to a one-year contract prior to the 2013–14 NHL season. Following a training camp in which he worked to prove he could be more than just a fighter, Matt was initially assigned to the San Francisco Bulls of the ECHL, but was recalled to San Jose for the season opening game when the Sharks' coaching staff felt the team required a greater physical presence.

He scored his first NHL goal - the game winner – against goaltender Roberto Luongo in a 4-1 victory over the Vancouver Canucks on October 10, 2013. On May 13, 2015, Pelech agreed to a one-year contract with German outfit, Schwenninger Wild Wings of the DEL. He made 49 appearances in his sole season with the Wild Wings, tallying eight goals and twelve assists. In April 2016, Matt inked a two-year deal with fellow DEL team Hamburg Freezers. However, the Freezers folded the following month. In September 2016, he signed with the Graz 99ers of the Austrian Hockey League. After one season in Austria, he moved back to Germany for the 2017–18 season as he inked a one-year deal with ERC Ingolstadt on May 23, 2017. On July 10, 2019, Matt moved to the Elite Ice Hockey League, signing for defending league champions the Belfast Giants whom he captained.



Younger sibling Adam was born on August 16th 1994 in Toronto and he played minor ice hockey with the Toronto Marlboros under Connor Brown's father. He later gave this response to the question -Outside of family, who has the greatest impact on you in hockey? - "Probably my minor hockey coach, Dan Brown with the Toronto Marlboros. He was my coach from the time I was six or seven years old until my minor midget year. He taught me pretty much everything I know. His son, Connor Brown, is on my team in Erie right now so I see him all the time. He was a huge influence on my career. He stressed the defensive end of the game and that's something that is a strong part of a game.", Yup that's ex-Flyer Danny Brown from the Heineken era of the mid 1980's. Following the 2010 OHL draft, Adam joined the Otters for the 2010–11 season. He played in 22 games, tallying five points, before being selected to represent Team Ontario at the 2011 World U-17 Hockey Challenge. At the same time he was named the Midwest Division OHL Academic Player of the Month for October for maintaining a high GPA while attending McDowell Senior High School. During his rookie season, Adam was partnered with Brett Cook and they became a shutdown pair. He finished the season with one goal and 12 assists for 13 points through 65 games[2] and earned the Otters' Rookie of the Year award. Prior to his sophomore season, Adam was invited to attend Canada's Men's Summer Under-18 Team selection camp leading up to the 2011 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament. He subsequently helped Team Canada win their fourth straight gold medal at the tournament before returning to North America. As the 2011–12 season continued, he recovered from an injury and recorded six assists in eight games to become the first Otters defenceman since 2002 to be selected for the CHL/NHL Top Prospects Game. Following the game, Adam earned a midterm ranking of 54th from the NHL Central Scouting Bureau and was selected to represent Team Canada at the 2012 IIHF World U18 Championships. At the time of the selection he had recorded two goals and 18 assists for 20 points in 44 games. He finished the season as the first OHL player in history to win the Ivan Tennant Memorial Award, the Bobby Smith Trophy, and represent Team Canada at the Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

Leading up to the 2012 NHL Entry Draft, Adam earned a final ranking of 120th among North American skaters by the NHL Central Scouting Bureau. He was eventually selected in the third round, 65th overall, by the New York Islanders. Following the draft he was selected to participate in the 2012 CHL Canada/Russia Series. He was also named an alternate captain for the Otters alongside Troy Donnay and Stephen Harper. By November 2012 Adam led Otters defencemen with 19 points in 20 games and tied for third among league defencemen.

On March 15, 2014, he signed a three-year, entry-level contract with the Islanders. At the time of the signing, he ranked third among OHL defencemen with 54 points in 59 games. Following the Islanders' 2014 training camp he was loaned to their American Hockey League affiliate, the Bridgeport Sound Tigers, to start the 2014–15 season. He spent the entire season with the Sound Tigers and tallied 11 assists through 65 games.

Adam returned to the Islanders for the 2015–16 season where he was again reassigned to the Sound Tigers. After tallying four points through 14 games, Adam received his first NHL recall on November 9, 2015. He eventually made his debut a few games later on November 13, in a 4–1 win over the Anaheim Ducks. He was reassigned to the AHL shortly thereafter but was again recalled to the Islanders later in the season on January 1, 2016, after Johnny Boychuk was injured. While playing with the Islanders, he left warmups prior to a game with a seemingly minor injury, and was subsequently diagnosed with an "undisclosed injury". Adam was held out for over two months before returning to the Islanders' minor league affiliate, and upon his return, his prior diagnosis of thoracic outlet syndrome was publicly announced. His treatment for this condition included surgery removing his first rib and portions of muscle and tissue. He finished the 2015–16 season by playing in nine games for the Islanders and averaging 17:34 per game.

In the final year of his contract, he was again reassigned to the Sound Tigers for the 2016–17 season. In a similar fashion to the previous season, Adam was recalled to the NHL level in November following injuries to their lineup. At the time of the recall, he had accumulated one goal and three assists in 10 games. During this recall, he tallied his first career NHL goal on November 23 in the first period to help the Islanders win 3–2 over the Ducks. His success was short-lived however as he suffered an upperbody injury during a win over the Calgary Flames on November 28.

He was eventually placed on the Islanders long-term injury reserve. After missing 14 games to recover, the Islanders reassigned Adam to the AHL on December 31. He finished the season with three goals and seven assists in 44 games with the Islanders and earned praise from the teams' general manager Garth Snow as being "an important piece of our defensive core." On July 24, 2017, the Islanders resigned him to a four-year, \$6.4 million contract worth \$1.6 million annually.

Following the signing, Adam began the 2017–18 season at the NHL level for the first time in his career. He experienced an uptake in offensive output and set career highs in both assists and points by December. In his 100th career NHL game on January 30, 2018, he scored the Islanders only goal in the 4–1 loss to the Florida Panthers. He later recorded his first career game-winning goal in a 4–1 win over the Pittsburgh Penguins on March 20. Adam ended his first full season at the NHL level with a career-high three goals and 16 assists for 19 points through 78 games. During the 2018 offseason, Calvin de Haan left the Islanders for the Carolina Hurricanes and he was expected to replace him in the lineup. Throughout the preseason with new coach Barry Trotz, Adam was paired alongside Ryan Pulock. By March 2019, Adam recorded a career-high five goals to tie for second with Devon Toews among team defencemen in goals. He eventually finished the regular season establishing career highs in goals and points. His offensive and defensive play helped the Islanders qualify for the Stanley Cup playoffs for the first time since 2016. In the first round of the 2019 Stanley Cup playoffs, he tallied two assists through an average 86:21 minute of ice time as the Islanders swept the Penguins. However, the team was eliminated during the second round by the Hurricanes.

Following another career-best season, Adam returned to the Islanders for the 2019–20 season alongside his defensive partner Ryan Pulock. His season would be short-lived however as he suffered an injury to his Achilles tendon during the pregame warmup prior to a January game against the New Jersey Devils. Prior to the injury, he was averaging the second-most minutes on the team and averaged the most shorthanded time per game. He had also recorded 2.18 blocks per game. Following the NHL restart after the COVID-19 he helped the Islanders beat the Panthers in the 2020 Stanley Cup playoffs Qualifiers by logging a team-high 20:13 of ice time per game and blocking a teamhigh 10 shots. In the second round, he recorded 46 hits through an average of 22:59 minutes of ice time per game as the Islanders beat the Washington Capitals in five games. Adam continued to produce during the Eastern Conference Second Round against the Philadelphia Flyers to help the Islanders qualify for the Conference Finals. As the Islanders met the Tampa Bay Lightning in the Conference Finals, he suffered an injury that kept him out of Game 6. He subsequently concluded the postseason with one goal and four assists through 21 games while averaging the second-most ice time on the team at 22:26 per game. After undergoing surgery on his wrist, Adam returned to the Islanders for the 2020–21 season. On May 4, 2021, he played in his 300th career NHL game as the Islanders lost 4–3 to the Buffalo Sabres. He finished the regular-season with four goals and 10 assists through 56 games and added five points through 19 Stanley Cup Playoff games.

On August 6, 2021, Adam signed an eight-year, \$46 million contract extension with the Islanders. Following the contract extension, he returned to the Islanders for the 2021–22 season. He continued to be productive on the defensive end for the Islanders as he recorded 45 hits and 46 blocks by January. On February 6th 2022 Adam would make his first NHL All-Star Game appearance in Las Vegas. Last season which was once again beset with injuries and spells on Long Term Injured Reserve he went on to make his 500th regular season appearance for the Islanders



FLYERS LATVIAN CONNECTIONS

During Flyers' rich history the club has played teams from many different countries and have employed imports from predominantly North America but also from Scandinavia and Eastern Europe. With Latvian goalie Janis Voris joining this season this article covers his fellow countrymen who have played for Flyers over the past 30+ years. Following the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, Europe's Baltic States regained their independence and a team from Latvia, one of the Baltic States visited Kirkcaldy on 22/09/92. HC Saga undertook a short tour of the UK and Flyers were lined up as one of their opponents. This was one of the rare occasions that Flyers did not produce a match programme for this Tuesday night game that Flyers won at a canter. From the time that lain Robertson opened the scoring at 6.12, it was one-way traffic, with Flyers winning each period, 3-0, 4-1 and 4-0. Frank Morris and Rob Abel notched hat tricks, Bobby Haig scored two and Cal Brown and Dean Edmiston getting the other goals in an 11-1 win against a disappointing Saga side.



Flyers' next "Latvian" opposition was based in Dundalk, Ireland and the teams played each other in the 2008/09 Celtic League. Latvian Hawks were one of two Irish clubs to play in that season's Celtic League along with Dundalk Bulls. Hawks' line up included a number of Latvian ex pats living in Ireland and the team was named in homage to the large number of Latvian nationals who had settled in Ireland. Flyers played Hawks four times in the league, the first on 15/11/08 at Kirkcaldy which resulted in a welldeserved 5-1 win for Flyers. Steven Gunn and Iain Bell both got doubles and Steven King scored the game winner. The following weekend Flyers travelled to Dundalk for a double header against Bulls on the Saturday and Hawks the next night, losing 3-5 to Hawks after beating Bulls 7-3. Flyers had led Hawks 2-1 thanks to Andy Samuel and Steven Lynch, but three unanswered goals gave Hawks the advantage. Goalie Blair Daly was pulled and Todd Dutiaume got one back but Hawks sealed the win with an empty netter. Flyers got their revenge on 17/01/09, but were made to work hard for their win. Hawks were 5-0 in front after 26.13 and Flyers faced an uphill task. Flyers made inroads into Hawks lead and had pulled it back to 3-5 by 40 minutes played, thanks to goals from King, Dutiaume and Willie Nicolson. Flyers continued to pile on the pressure in the third and drew level with goals from Chris Wands and Samuel, sending the game into overtime. Danny McIntyre netted the winner 6.55 into the extra session to send the 734 crowd home with a game to remember.



A Steven King hat trick the next weekend in Dundalk gave Flyers a comfortable 5-2 win against Hawks. The last ever game against Latvian Hawks was in the Celtic Cup play-off semi-final at Kirkcaldy on 28/03/09. Flyers beat Hawks 3-1 with goals from Gunn, Wands and Dutiaume, en-route to beating Dundee in the final the following day.

Hawks played Flyers in the Celtic Cup the next season, but by that time had changed their name to Charlestown Chiefs and one of the players in that squad and that of the Hawks was one of six Latvian nationals to play for Flyers, Aigers Brencis. Brencis' short Flyers career in the club's first season in the Elite League was a disappointing one for both player and club. His time at Kirkcaldy has previously been covered in an earlier article, but his 13 competitive outings for Flyers yielded no goals and only one assist, recorded in his last game at Edinburgh on 23/10/11.

Brencis was replaced by a fellow countryman. Toms Hartmanis, whose speed and skill was of a higher level than his predecessor. He had previous Elite League experience with Newcastle Vipers the season before, recording over a point per game. He made his Flyers debut on 29/10/11 at home to Hull and opened his account with two assists at Dundee the next Saturday. His first goal for Flyers came the next evening at Nottingham in a 2-3 overtime defeat in which flyers were outshot 11-76, with goalie Garret Zemlak making over 70 saves. Toms' last Flyers goal was in a 1-7 thrashing by Coventry and played his last game in Flyers 'colours in a fight filled 3-11 defeat at Edinburgh in the season's last game. After his time at Kirkcaldy where he recorded 13+24 in 44 games, Toms moved to Kazakhstan and Braehead for 12/13 and then played a decade his homeland before retiral at the end of the 2022/23 season.



Flyers' next Latvian import was Ricards Birzins, who had briefly played for Manchester Storm in a well-travelled career, and had two solid seasons in a Flyers jersey in 2017/18 and 18/19.

Birzins made his competitive debut in a 5-2 Challenge Cup win against Edinburgh on 16/09/17 and scored his first Flyers goal in a 7-1 hammering of Braehead away on 07/10/17. In his two seasons at Kirkcaldy Birzins played in 133 games and was a steady dependable defencemen who put up 11 gaols and 43 assists, playing his last game for Flyers in a 0-3 play-off quarter final second leg defeat at Nottingham. Since leaving Flyers he has played in Latvia, Poland and the last three seasons in the French second tier.

At the start of 2018/19 season Rihards Grigors made a handful of pre-season challenge game appearances for Flyers having turned out for Edinburgh Capitals in 2017/18.

He was not retained for Flyers' regular season and spent the year at Milton Keynes and Murrayfield. Grigors re-appeared in a Flyers jersey at the start of 2021/22 and his stay at Kirkcaldy was not any longer than his first. He played in two league games, two Challenge Cup ties and one challenge match before he headed for Whitley for the last two seasons. This season he returns to the Edinburgh Capitals. In his most recent spell at Flyers he failed to record a point.



In 2021/22 Flyers signed another Latvian defenceman, Imants Lescovs, who came to Flyers having played 2020/21 in Poland and made his competitive Flyers debut in a 0-2 defeat at Coventry on 25/09/21. He was an ever present until his final game as a Flyer, a 2-6 defeat by Sheffield on 30/01/22. In his 38 Flyers games he scored 5+13, his first goal coming in a 8-0 thrashing of Manchester on 17/10/21 and his last on 19/01/22 in a 2-4 Challenge Cup guarter final defeat by Sheffield. Lescovs was released at the end of January 2022 and played the remainder of the season in Poland. He played the following season in Latvia before retiring on 2023.

Last but by no means least the final Latvian to wear Flyers colours was Vitalijs Pavlovs who joined the club at the start of December last season. Originally signed as injury cover for Ben Hawerchuk the 34 year old forward came



to Fife with a wealth of experience including 281 KHL games with Dynamo Riga and 78 games in the ECHL with the Colorado Eagles on his resume. Pavlovs has also made 154 appearances for the Latvian National team at various levels, crossing paths with current Fife Flyers head coach Tom Coolen during his tenure as Assistant Coach of the Latvian National Team between 2012-2014. He made his debut against the Coventry Blaze on 02/12 having arrived in the country that morning and recorded an assist in a 2-4 Flyers loss.



tHe scored the first of his 10 goals for the club at home the following weekend against the Sheffield Steelers and would miss only one game the rest of the season to end with 20 points from 43 games.

Of the five Latvian imports to have played for Flyers, in my opinion, Ricky Birzins was the most consistent performer, but perhaps Toms Hartmanis may have produced more in a better quality line-up.







In the concluding part of our look at the "Types of Penalties" we cover Rule 29 which describes to signals used by the game officials.

Again the full text of the IIHF rule is provided along with any annotations as per the EIHL Casebook.

RULE 29 GAME OFFICIAL SIGNALS

The compilation and the explanations of the signals of the Game Officials are as follows:



RULE 24 - PENALTY SHOT Both arms crossed over the head.



RULE 42 - CHARGING Rotating clenched fists around one another in front of the chest.



RULE 41 – BOARDING Striking the clenched fist of one hand into the open palm of the opposite hand in front of the chest.



RULE 43 – CHECKING FROM BEHIND A forward motion of both arms, with the palms of the hands open and facing away from the body, fully extended from the chest at shoulder level.



RULE 44 – CLIPPING Striking leg with either hand behind the knee, keeping both skates on the ice.



RULE 45 - ELBOWING Tapping either elbow with the opposite hand.







RULE 47 - HEAD BUTTING No Signal



RULE 49 - KICKING No Signal



RULE 48 - ILLEGAL CHECK TO THE HEAD OR NECK Patting flat (open palm) of the non-whistle hand on this side of the head.



RULE 50 - KNEEING Slapping either knee with the palm of the hand, while keeping both skates on the ice.



RULE 51 – ROUGHING / FIGHTING Fist clenched and arm extended out to the side of the body.



RULE 52 - SLEW-FOOTING No Signal







RULE 53 - THROWING EQUIPMENT No signal.



RULE 54 - HOLDING Clasping either wrist with the other hand in front of the chest.



RULE 54 - HOLDING THE STICK (TWO STAGE SIGNALS) Two stage signals involving the holding signal followed by a signal indicating you are holding onto a stick with two hands in a normal manner.



RULE 55 - HOOKING (TWO STAGE SIGNALS) A tugging motion with both arms as if pulling something from in front toward the stomach.







RULE 56 - INTERFERENCE Crossing arms stationary in front of the chest in an "X" formation.



RULE 58 - BUTT-ENDING

Moving the forearm, fist closed, under the forearm of the other handheld palm down.



RULE 57 – TRIPPING Striking leg with either hand below the knee, keeping both skates on the ice.



RULE 59 - CROSS-CHECKING

A forward and backward motion of the arms with both fists clenched, extending from the chest for a distance of about one foot.




RULE 60 - HIGH-STICKING Holding both fists clenched, one slightly above the other (as if holding a stick) at the height of the forehead.



RULE 61 – SLASHING A chopping motion with the edge of one hand across the opposite forearm.







RULE 62 - SPEARING (TWO STAGE SIGNAL)

Jabbing motion with both hands thrust out immediately in front of the body and then hands dropped to the side of the body (essentially the opposite to the hooking signal – away from the body rather than towards the body).



RULE 63 – DELAYING THE GAME A moving motion in which the flat hand slides up from the lower hand from the center of the body.



RULE 64 - DIVING / EMBELLISHMENT Both hands on hips, plus pointing two (2) fingers as appropriate.



RULE 74 – TOO MANY PLAYERS ON THE ICE Indicate with six (6) fingers, one hand open, in front of the chest.



RULE 75 - UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT Both hands on hips, plus pointing two (2) fingers as appropriate.







RULE 76 – FACE-OFF VIOLATION WARNING One arm bent with the open palm up – on the side of the Team which conducted the face-off violation.



RULE 79 - HANDPASS

With the palm open and facing forward, a pushing motion towards the front of the body once or twice to indicate the puck was moved ahead with the hand.



RULE 78 - PUCK IN THE NET

A signal with the outstretched hand directed at the goal into which the puck has legally entered.



RULE 80 - HIGH-STICKING THE PUCK

Holding both fists clenched, one slightly above the other (as if holding a stick) at the height of the forehead.



RULE 81 - ICING SIGNALED

The back Linesperson signals a possible icing by fully extending either arm over their head. The arm should remain raised until the front Linesperson either blows the whistle to indicate an icing or until the icing is washed out.



RULE 81 - ICING CALLED

Once the icing has been completed, the back Linesperson will then point to the appropriate Face-off Spot and skate to it, turning backwards somewhere near the Blue Line and crossing their arms across their chest to indicate icing.







RULE 83 - OFF-SIDE DELAYED

Non-whistle arm fully stretched vertically upwards, with flat hand outstretched. To cancel out a delayed off-side, the linesperson must lower the arm to the side.



RULE 87 - TIME-OUT Using both hands to form a *T* in front of the chest.



RULE 83 - OFF-SIDE CALLED

Stop play by blowing the whistle and then extend the arm horizontally pointing towards the blue line with the non-whistle hand.



RULE 101.1 – WOMEN'S HOCKEY – ILLEGAL HIT The palm of the non-whistle hand is brought across the body and placed on the opposite shoulder.



DIFFERENT RULES – WASH-OUT SIGNAL LINESPERSON A sweeping sideways motion. Extend both arms outward in an outstretched position at shoulder level with palms down. Indicating no off-side, no-icing, etc.



DIFFERENT RULES - WASH-OUT SIGNAL REFEREE

A sweeping sideways motion. Extend both arms outward in an outstretched position at shoulder level with palms down. Indicating no goal, no handpass, no high-sticking the puck, etc.

This season is the 40th Anniversary of the Fife Flyers British Championship Wembley win. In a weekly feature we will recap, with thanks to the Fife Free Press for use of their reporting, the events of that historic occasion.

Having gone to the top of the Heineken Premier League last weekend, Fife Flyers intend to stay there by defeating Nottingham Panthers away from home tomorrow night. Flyers already have a 9-6 victory over the English side under their belts, and despite their recent injury problems, they will be looking for a repeat performance. "It is a nice feeling to be at the top of the league," commented player-coach Ronnie Plumb yesterday. stride. "A lot of our current players have never been in this position because it is a long time since Flyers were last there "People in the area are starting to recognise that the club is doing well, and it gives the local players a bit of prestige." Plumb knows that Nottingham will not make things easy for Flyers tomorrow, especially after defeating Dundee 8-4 at home and winning 7-2 at Southampton in their last two outings. . "Nottingham have improved greatly since we played them at Kirkcaldy, but our players now go into matches expecting to win," explained Ronnie Plumb. "We have had to juggle our lines about a bit but the guys we have brought in have responded well" said Plumb. Reflecting on last weekend's two victories Flyers coach commented "We caught Durham cold with two quick goals and never let them get into their stride. Danny Brown was a whirlwind and psychologically it was a good result because Durham could be our opposition in the Bluecol Cup final. "At Whitley on Sunday, we were a little tired after our long trip, but Andrew Donald made some good saves early in the game, and we did not look back after Dave Stoyanovich scored twice towards the end of the period," he added. Flyers complete their Bluecol Cup sectional programme at Dundee on Wednesday when they will be hoping to maintain their 100 per cent record.

STRANDED!

Fife Flyers players and supporters were left stranded in Edinburgh in the early hours of Monday morning after being ordered off their hired coach. Flyers were returning from their match at Whitley when the bus driver apparently took exception to the noise on the coach, and the 50-strong party had to summon a fleet of cars to ferry them back to Kirkcaldy. A spokesman for Kirkcaldy Ice Hockey Club said this week: "It would appear the driver completely over-reacted. "There was no damage done to the bus, and the only problem was one of noise which is quite normal for an ice hockey team." Flyers' player-coach Ronnie Plumb added: "There was a bit of singing, but the incident was blown up out of all proportion."

17/11/1984 Nottingham Panthers v Fife Flyers Premier League

A dramatic equaliser by Gordon Latto 25 seconds from time earned Fife Flyers a point against Nottingham Panthers on Saturday. But it took a last-ditch gamble by player-coach Ronnie Plumb to withdraw netminder Andrew Donald and ice six outfield men to save the match. Panthers took advantage of a poor start by Flyers to score twice in the first six minutes and although the visitors pulled one back Nottingham lead 3-1 at the buzzer. The Kirkcaldy side laid siege on the home net in the second period out-shooting Panthers 22-11 and they fought back to lead for the only time in the match at 4-3 two minutes from the buzzer only to be pegged back in the dying seconds. Flyers again out-shot Panthers 25-5 in the final period but the home aide made better use of their opportunities to lead 6-4 before being pulled back to all square. With 11 minutes remaining Nottingham went 7-6 in front and it stayed that way until 25 seconds from time when Latto who had replaced Donald on the ice just seconds earlier fired home to equalise. Flyers scorers were Brown (2), Stoyanovich, Plumb, Kirk, McLellan and Latto.
