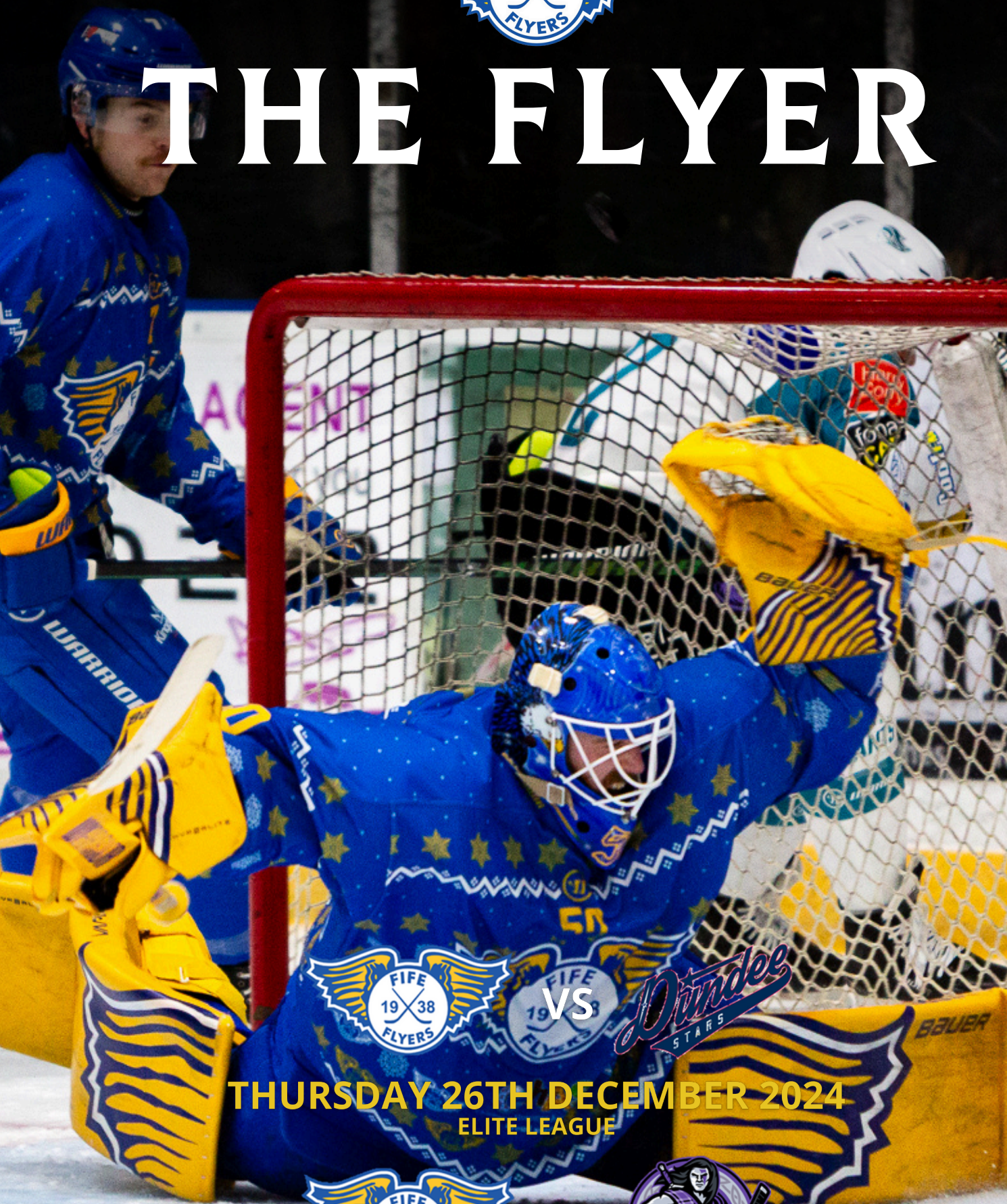

In what had been a tumultuous few weeks for the Flyers they welcomed the Belfast Giants to Kirkcaldy for the first of the league meetings between the teams this season. The visitors were the in form team having won their last six games on the back of their own injury issues starting to clear. Joe Cassetti was still a long term injury scratch with Tom McCollum also being given the night off as the healthy scratch with Jackson Whistle starting in net. The Flyers were without the injured Phélix Martineau and Olivier LeBlanc with an undisclosed number of other players icing despite not being 100% healthy. To meet league minimum game night roster requirements the club drafted in four players on two way contracts. The Kestrels Josh Saunders made his debut and he was joined by the return of James Spence. Owen Dell and Rhys Edwards also made their debuts having stepped up from the Leeds Knights and Hull Seahawks respectively. Recent signing Kieran Craig also made his first start having only arrived in Kirkcaldy 24 hours earlier.

The Giants started with the first chance on net after 40 seconds when Shane Owen did well to block a shot from Gabe Bast who had drifted into the slot to get his shot away. It was to be the start of a busy evening for the Fife netminder. The Flyers however were on the games first power play after 50 seconds when former Flyer Kyle Osterberg was called for tripping. The home side almost had the opening goal when Daniel Krenželok was parked on the edge of the crease and his tip went narrowly wide of the far post. The Flyers moved the puck around well during their man advantage but the Giants completed the kill. Owen was in action again in the 4th minute when he denied Ciaran Long on the backhand. The opening goal went the way of the visitors in the 5th minute when the puck fell nicely for Pierre-Olivier Morin who was in the slot and with Owen set for the initial shot he hit the wide open net. The Giants went on their first power play in the 6th minute when Krenželok was penalised for boarding Osterberg. The Flyers did well on their first kill with Owen only called into serious action once when he made a blocker save on Mike Lee before returning to full strength. Michael Cichy forced Whistle into action in the 9th minute when the Giants keeper padded the puck away. The Flyers were back on the man advantage in the 12th minute with Jordan Kawaguchi being called for tripping. Jordan Stallard almost levelled the game when he got on the end of a sweeping move but he chipped the puck just over the bar from close in. Austin Farley with a shot from the circles was then denied by Whistle and Morin almost got a shorthanded counter with a shot Owen had to look lively to keep out. The Flyers did draw level with their man advantage when Massimo Carozza was able to redirect the puck home from the slot. The Flyers threatened again in the 14th minute when Cichy forced a fine leg save from Whistle and shortly after Bo Hanson was penalised for boarding as the Flyers went back on the power play. Craig was first to threaten with a shot from the slot that Whistle did well to save with his pad and the Flyers new boy was denied again from almost the same position seconds later. Owen denied Josh Roach a short handed chance as he made a glove save just before the Giants returned to full strength. The Flyers survived an almighty scramble around their net in the 17th minute as Owen made a couple of saves and the Flyers players collapse around him to block shots as the Giants couldn't get a final touch on the puck.

# MATCH REPORT

## PERIOD 2

The Giants opened the second period on the front foot and had the Flyers pinned in their own end of the ice for long spells. In the opening minute Lee brought out a fine pad save by Owen who then snagged a shot from the blueline. Owen and Lee renewed their battle in the 23rd minute with the Fife keeper again coming out on top. In the 24th minute Owen was out at the top of his crease to swallow shot from Morin and a minute later he produced a shoulder save to deny Mark Cooper. In the 26th minute however the Giants got the go ahead goal when Lee did beat an unsighted Owen with a wrist shot from up on the blueline that went through a crowd of players. Scott Conway was called for hooking and Carozza went end to end with the puck before appearing to be tripped but no call was made as the Giants killed the latest Flyers power play. Then came a decisive two goals inside 20 seconds. The first had a real stroke of misfortune for the Flyers about it as Conway shot the puck wide of goal and it came back up off the kickplate and over the net hitting Owen and a Flyers defenceman and rolled into the net. The Giants made it 4-1 with a well-executed goal by Karl Boudrais who was sprung up the middle of the ice by a fine heads up pass by Hanson which resulted in the Flyers calling a time out. In the 31st minute Owen made a big pad save on Hanson but moments later the Giants increased their lead when they went down the left wing and Lee zipped the puck across the slot for Ben Lake to fire a one timer past Owen. Whistle had had very little to do in the period but in the 35th minute he was alert to stop a Krenželok tip on the edge of his crease making a reactionary pad save. The Flyers ended the period by creating a couple of half chances which Farley and Ryan Foss were unable to beat Whistle with.

## PERIOD 3

The third period started with the Giants content to play with their lead and the first real chance was in the 45th when Whistle survived a scramble around his net with Carozza just failing to get a decisive touch on the puck. A minute later and Cooper with a shot from below the circles was shut down by Owen. Elijah Barriga was next to be thwarted by the Fife keeper when his snapshot from the slot was gloved by Owen. The Giants went on their second power play in the 49th minute with Stallard guilty of holding. Morin was denied by a fine pad save by Owen and then stymied Bobo Carpenter in similar fashion. Farley created a shorthanded chance with a steal but Whistle produced a poke check as the players collided and the Giants completed the kill. In the 52nd minute Owen held a Zak Galambos shot and two minutes later produced a piece of grand larceny to deny the same player who had an open goal to aim at before the Fife netminder flung himself across his net and got a piece of the puck. Play continued and the Giants claimed that the puck had crossed the line with the referee indicating that play should continue. At the next stoppage the play went to video review but the on ice call was upheld. In the 57th minute the Giants added the final goal of the night when persistence around the net by Morin enabled him to stuff the puck past Owen who had made a couple of saves in quick succession.

# WEEK 16 – FLYERS STATS RECAP

On Saturday night.....

**Fife Flyers 1    Belfast Giants 6    - Elite League**

Johnny Curran coached his first Flyers game and became the 31st coach all-time to do so.

Tom Coolen coached 95 games with a 28 and 67 record which is a 29.5 win percentage.

Congratulations to Kieran Craig, Josh Saunders, Owen Dell and Rhys Edwards who all made their debuts for the Flyers.

In total 24 players have so far made their debuts for the Flyers this season, that is an all-time record for a season eclipsing the 21 from last season.

30 players have iced so far for the Flyers this season which is also a record during the EIHL era – 27 being the highest total last season.

Noah Delmas now remains as the only player to be ever present this season.

Flyers 14 shots on Giants goal is their lowest for a game this season. It is the Flyers lowest shots on goal total since being held to 10 against the Sheffield Steelers in October 2023.

Belfast made it 7 consecutive wins which is their best streak of the season and is the best amongst all other teams.

Across all games played this season the time that the Flyers have been level, ahead or behind is as follows:

Level 9:17:25 (28.82 percent)

Ahead 4:38:52 (14.42 percent)

Behind 18:17:44 (56.76 percent)

Scott Conway tied Mark Cooper with 16 goals as the Giants top scorer against the Flyers in all EIHL competitions.

The Flyers are now 11 for 16 (68.75 percent) on the penalty kill against the Giants and 3 for 12 (25 percent) on the powerplay.

### Recent Form Guide

The teams last met in mid-November in Dundee. Since that game on their travels the Stars next visited the Manchester Storm where they left empty handed following a 6-3 defeat. A week later however and they secured arguably their best result of the season when they visited Sheffield and defeated the Steelers 4-2 for their first win at the Utilita Arena in two years. To start December they visited the Nottingham Panthers and lost out narrowly 3-2 before another odd goal defeat the following weekend in Glasgow as the Clan won 4-3. A midweek trip to play the Giants in Belfast ended with a heavy 7-1 reversal and three days later in the Midlands the Coventry Blaze ran up the same scoreline. The weekend before Christmas the Stars returned to Glasgow and once again fell short in a 3-2 loss that stretched their winless run to 8 consecutive games, the second longest winless streak amongst all teams this season. The Stars have made two additions to their roster since their last meeting with the Flyers. Forward Alex Robert who started the season with the Manchester Storm joined at the end of November and in mid-December Spencer Naas who was their second top scorer in league play last season made his way back to Tayside after starting the season in Germany with Freiburg in DEL 2.

The Clan started December with a double header on home ice. On the Friday night the Manchester Storm visited and were defeated 4-1 before the Clan made it a four point weekend when the Stars lost 4-3 at Braehead Arena on the Saturday night. The following weekend the Guildford Flames were the visitors and the game was abandoned at the end of the first period due to dangerous ice conditions as the temporary ice plant at Braehead Arena failed. # VISITING THE BARN

## ON THEIR ROSTER

Throughout the season we will pick out a story on a player(s) on the opposition bench as well as summarise their career to date.

In this edition we feature **Domenic Alberga**

Domenic Alberga is a native of Maple which is a neighbourhood in Vaughan in York Region which is located northwest of Toronto, Ontario. Born in July 1992 he played, like many kids around his hometown area, in the Greater Toronto Hockey League at U16 level before having a season in the Ontario Junior Hockey League with the Villanova Knights whom he lead in scoring alongside current Guildford Flame's Daniel Catenacci. He started four seasons in the Ontario Hockey League with the Brampton Battalion in season 2009/10. Alberga was amongst the Brampton Battalion rookies who stood to benefit from the heavy workload that had fallen to them that Ontario Hockey League season. In January he was profiled in the following interview. Alberga, a fifth-round pick in the 2009 OHL Priority Selection, contributed an assist in a 4-1 victory Thursday over the Mississauga St. Michael's Majors and now has points in three of the last four games. "I'm feeling more comfortable, I'm getting used to it and I'm getting some points now," said centre Alberga, a 17-year-old native of Toronto who has two goals and eight assists for 10 points in 36 games. Coach Stan Butler said he's had no problem with the play of Alberga and his rookie linemates, left winger Ian Watters (who went on to play four seasons with the Guildford Flames) and right winger Matt MacLeod. They combined for three points, including two goals, against the Majors. "That line has been getting better and better," said Butler. "What we hope is that the ice time we've given all our young guys in the first half pays off the rest of the way." Increased prominence may help Alberga overcome a longstanding misconception. He noted that, since his childhood days, people have taken his surname to be "Algebra." Some Battalion teammates have dubbed him Math, which ranks as nicknaming genius in hockey circles, where the likes of "Smitty" and "Browner" are the norm. "I've heard 'Algebra' since I was small, and I usually just asked them to call me by my first name. It's all right. I never had a problem with it. It's funny to be called Math, too." With veteran centres Cody Hodgson and Craig Moore out of the lineup indefinitely, Alberga said he's excited about stepping into a bigger role. "I'm using this as motivation to have a really strong second half. It's great to have more responsibility, especially with those guys out of the lineup. You really have to step up and try to fill those spots."



# VISITING THE BARN

Alberga scored Wednesday night at Mississauga, redirecting a MacLeod shot in the first period of a 3-2 overtime loss. Alberga's other goal came Sept. 25 in a 3-1 loss to the visiting Belleville Bulls, the Troops' third game of the season. "I hadn't scored in a long time, but now hopefully I can build off that. I'm starting to carry the puck more and shoot it. I figure nothing bad can happen if I put it on the net." Alberga said he hopes for a long run with his linemates. "We're playing well as a line, and I think we go hard every shift. MacLeod and Watters are great on the boards. They're great at getting the puck, and I'm trying to support them all the time. They win the battles in the corner. We cycle the puck well and communicate with each other. Watters has some great hands, and MacLeod is a really intelligent player. I like to bring my defensive game to that line." Alberga's defensive prowess and skating ability have earned him duty on the Battalion's penalty-killing unit, which ranks sixth in the OHL. "Our penalty killing has been great. We're moving our feet and being aggressive on the puck." In his two seasons with the Battalion he played 148 games across the regular season and playoffs with 14 goals and 29 assists.

It was announced in June 2011 that Sarnia Sting General Manager Jacques Beaulieu had acquired the 18-year old Alberga from the Brampton Battalion. The Sting sent a 4th round pick in the 2012 OHL Priority Selection to the Battalion in exchange for Alberga. Beaulieu explained his thoughts on the transaction. "Domenic is a gritty, hardworking centre who competes hard. He is a difficult player to play against and I feel like he will be an excellent complement to some of the top end forwards we have in our lineup. He is a blue collar player who exemplifies the type of player Sarnia fans love. We are very excited to add him to our lineup." In his single season with the Sting he scored 39 points in 72 games before finishing his time in Major Junior hockey with a season in Kitchener with the Rangers where he played 68 games and put up 14 points.

He then spent the following two seasons back in school with the Ryerson University Rams who are now known as TMU Bold, the athletic department of Toronto Metropolitan University. In November 2011, Toronto Metropolitan University (TMU; then Ryerson University) announced that Peter Gilgan, Founder and chief executive officer, Mattamy Homes Ltd., contributed a donation of \$15 million to the university. In honour of Gilgan, the new athletic complex was renamed Mattamy Athletic Centre at the Gardens. The ice rink, which is located on the third level, was named Mattamy Home Ice. It sits within the shell of the former Maple Leafs Garden. The athletic centre construction was completed in the summer of 2012, and the ice rink became the new home for the Ryerson Rams hockey team. Before coming to Ryerson, Domenic Alberga was considered nothing more than a third-line grinder playing on a contending Ontario Hockey League team. But following his move to Ontario University Athletics (OUA), Alberga became an offensive threat for the Ryerson men's hockey team. The 21-year-old rookie forward was a scoring sensation in his first season with the Rams, doing everything in his power to demonstrate abilities that some thought he never had. "Past coaches had definitely said, 'Maybe you have to play [on the] third line, you're not good enough to be this kind of role or this kind of player,'" said Alberga. But that hadn't been the mentality of Ryerson coach Graham Wise, who has Alberga playing on the team's top line alongside fellow OHL veterans Michael Fine and Jamie Wise. "Coming here, Mr. Wise wanted me to be a guy that's going to provide offence and get into a groove playing with Michael Fine and Jamie," said Alberga. "And with those two guys and the calibre that they've got, it's pretty easy to just go to the net, and we have a lot of potential as a line." Alberga definitely appeared to be fulfilling that potential, posting a highly impressive 11 goals and 23 points in 11 games played that first season. Alberga credits the combined OHL experience and excellent chemistry between Fine, Wise and himself as major factors in their success, which has also saw Wise climb to third in OUA scoring with seven goals and 22 points. "Obviously, he's stepped right in and contributed right off the bat to the hockey team," said Wise. "He's been a great addition to our program." Alberga was in his first year of an undeclared arts degree at Ryerson. Being used primarily in defensive situations in Brampton and Kitchener, Alberga made the switch from centre to the wing in Sarnia. The shift was instrumental in his offensive production with the Rams. "In Brampton, for my first two years I was third-line centreman, more of a shut-down role," he said. "And then when I got moved to Sarnia I got moved to left wing, and had probably my best OHL career there." Alberga chose Ryerson to be closer to home after four years of living away for junior hockey, and is was more than pleased with his decision. "It was great," said Alberga. "The people were very welcoming, the staff and everyone, the community." Alberga said that with many of the team's veterans playing in the final year of their university careers, he would relish the chance to assume a leadership role with the team in

years to come, but not without seeing where else his scoring touch can take him. "If something comes to me next year, maybe, say, in Europe or something, where I have the chance to make money, I'm going to jump to it," said Alberga. "Hockey has always been my first mentality. It's my dream." And while a European contract isn't far-fetched, especially since he recently obtained dual citizenship between Canada and Italy, Alberga's focus right now is on success with the Rams. "It'd be good to end up in the top four," he said. "I believe that the team ourselves, we're capable of beating Western and teams like McGill and those guys, and I think we can be right at the top, too."



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Alberga was awarded male rookie of the year and as quick as Domenic was to acknowledge his accomplishments, he was even faster to attribute where his success came from. "I give all the credit to my parents who put me through hockey," Alberga said. "Now I can give them something in return, something to be proud about." The 21-year-old right-winger — who racked up 44 points — was the second highest scorer on the men's hockey team in his rookie season with the Rams, was named the Ontario University Athletics (OUA) rookie of the year and ranks fourth in the nation for points scored. At the Ryerson Rams Athletic Awards Banquet on April 7, Alberga was awarded the male rookie of the year award. Alberga said that while he has his family to thank for his success, it's his father who's been his most supportive influence while growing in the world of competitive sports. Alberga said his father "never missed a game" and even followed him to Sault Ste. Marie when he was playing junior hockey. When head coach Graham Wise and scout Doug Hollinsky met Alberga at the end of last season, they offered him something the other seven OUA universities that tried to recruit him couldn't — a prominent spot on a progressive team and a way to stay close to his support system. "I had a lot of offers from other schools in the OUA, but I thought Ryerson was the best fit for me personally," he said. "It also helped that I'd be able to see my family more than when I was in Sarnia. "

He went on to lead the Rams in point scoring the following season and made the step up to professional hockey with the ECHL's Greenville Road Warriors late in the 2014-15 season and the 22 year old Alberga scored three goals in his first four games with Greenville and finished with four points in 13 games which saw him sign again for the 2015/16 season. He bounced around a bit that season with two other ECHL stops in Fort Wayne and Wichita before signing with the Norfolk Admirals with whom he spent three seasons. On his signing the Admirals Head Coach Rolf Aldoff said:

"Domenic is a heart and soul type of player that's going to come to work for us every single day. With his package, he's going to give everything he's got, whether it's a game or a practice and it's important to have someone like that. You can never overlook having someone like that on your team. He'll do all the little things right for us". His first season return was 29 points in 53 games before improving to 37 in 72 fixtures the next year and 46 in 41 matches over the 2018-2019 campaign which was good for second overall in team scoring.

Alberga was given a professional try-out in the American Hockey League with the Arizona Coyotes AHL affiliate team, Tucson Roadrunners in December 2018 and he would feature 16 times, scoring three points.


























In the 2019-2020 season, Domenic then hopped across the pond to begin his European career, signing with HC Bolzano in Northern Italy and he would stay there for the next five years. A call-up to the Italian national team arrived in 2022 as he was selected for the team to play in the Olympic Games Qualifiers and also another six international matches. He helped Bolzano to reach the playoffs in all five seasons and in the 2022-2023 campaign they narrowly missed out on a national championship, losing in the final, then also making it to the semi-finals this past season before joining the Stars in the summer.

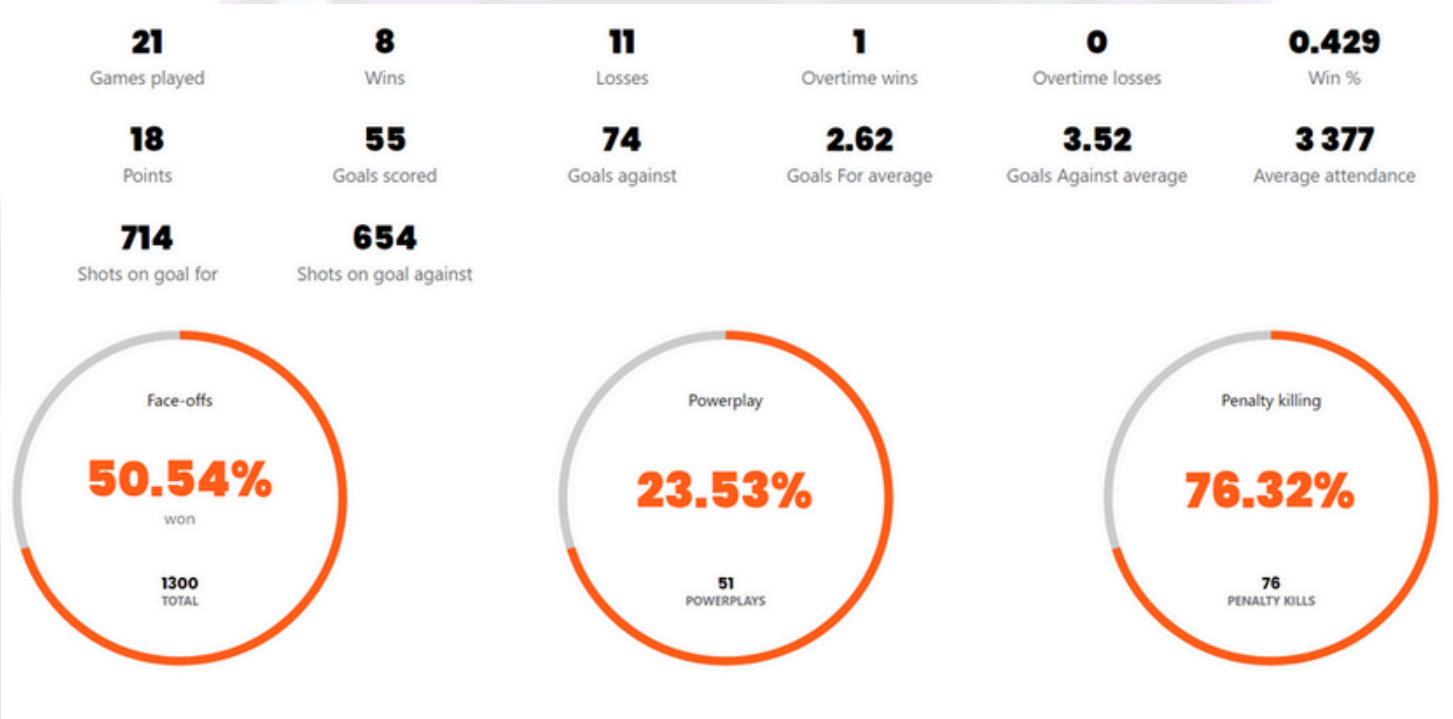

## ON THEIR ROSTER

Throughout the season we will pick out a story on a player(s) on the opposition bench as well as summarise their career to date.

In this edition we feature **Cole Ully**

Cole Ully is a Calgarian who was born 20th February 1995. He played with his hometown junior teams before joining the Kamloops Blazers as a 16 year old to commence his Major Junior career in season 2011/12. In his rookie season he played with future Flyer Chase Schaber who was in his final year in Major Junior. From his 61 games across the regular season and play offs he scored 10 goals with 12 helpers. The following season he was backstopped by the Cardiff Devils Taran Kozun as well as being joined by current team mate Deven Sideroff who was just starting his time in Major Junior. He was drawing the attention of scouts who had this to say about the 18 year old. In hockey, size is important but it isn't everything. Bigger players can have mobility problems, while smaller players are often faster. That said, size is less important for major junior players – and small juniors can grow. Arguably the most interesting of the smaller forwards in the 2013 draft class is Kamloops Blazers winger Cole Ully. Ully is a bit of a beanpole. He's not short – at 5-foot-11, he's roughly average height for an adult male – but he hasn't got much meat on his frame yet. Despite this, he's thrived in Kamloops. Blessed with excellent speed and strong overall skating, Ully put together a strong draft-eligible season, racking up 50 points in 62 games. Ully's year can be broken into two pieces – before he missed time in December due to mononucleosis, and after that absence. In 28 games prior to his absence, he had 8 goals, 6 assists and 14 points, with a plus-3 rating, 2 game-winning goals and 2 power-play goals. In the remaining 34 games, he had 14 goals, 22 assists and 36 points, with a plus-34 rating, 5 game-winning goals and 6 power-play goals. Ully has good hockey instincts and that's no more readily apparent than it is when he's on the power-play. In short? He's excellent with the extra-man, as he has time and space to wheel and deal. He's not as effective five-on-five, when the size disparity is a bit more pronounced. He's able to generate even-strength offense, though, as evidenced by his excellent plus/minus rating. Bear in mind, though, that Kamloops had a great season and were in the top-third of the WHL in goals-for. Plus/minus can be a deceptive statistic on strong teams. Ully's biggest weakness is his size. The upshot is that he's seemingly quite aware of it, having worked out in the off-season with NHLers in an effort to add some bulk to his frame. If he can fill out without losing the aspects of his game that have helped him excel at times at the WHL level, he may be a great find for a team in the middle rounds of the NHL Entry Draft. Either way, he'll be a very interesting project to follow. Ully finished the season with 58 points from 67 games and it was enough to attract the attention of the Dallas Stars who drafted him in the 5th round 131st overall.

Interesting to note other players to appear in the EIHL in that draft. Future Flyers Greg Chase was chosen 188th overall in Round 7 by the Edmonton Oilers, Mark McNulty who had a season with Cardiff and Manchester was 169th in the 6th round selected by the Detroit Red Wings. Terrance Amorosa of the Coventry Blaze this season was drafted in the following slot after Ully. Hunter Shinkaruk who has been out injured for most of this season for Cardiff was the Vancouver Canucks first round pick at number 24. Ully would go on to complete another two seasons with the Blazers and in March 2015 the 19-year-old was named to the WHL Western Conference First All-Star Team. In his final year the 5'11" and 180lb forward finished 5th in the WHL scoring race with 34 goals, 60 assists and 94 points. He also led the Blazers in all offensive categories including goals, assists and points. Ully, who was signed to an entry level contract by the Dallas Stars in December, was the WHL Player of the Month for September/October with nine goals and 26 points in 16 games. He also led the WHL that season in first goals to start a game with 10. In 256 career games with the Blazers, Ully had 95 goals and 237 career points which is 23rd in franchise history.

In April of 2015 the Texas Stars, American Hockey League affiliate of the NHL's Dallas Stars, announced that Ully would be assigned to their club from Dallas. On 17th and 18th of that month he made back to back appearances against the San Antonio Rampage where he picked up an assist in his first professional outing. He scored his first professional goal on October 16th 2015 at the Chicago Wolves in a 7-3 win.



At the start of December that year Ully was one of three Stars players assigned to the Idaho Steelheads in the ECHL. His stay was a short one with the Steelheads where he played 6 games and scored 6 points whilst making 42 appearances in the American Hockey League with the Stars and registering 18 points. A full season with the Stars followed where he had 13 goals and 11 assists. Starting the 2017/18 season in the AHL he played a further 16 games with three assists and in December Steelheads Head Coach and Director of Hockey Operations Neil Graham confirmed Ully had been reassigned again to the Steelheads from the American Hockey League's Texas Stars by the Dallas Stars.

He was exactly a point a game player the rest of the season for the Steelheads in his 50 games. He moved to the Utah Grizzlies where in November 2018 the Colorado Eagles, the AHL affiliate of the Colorado Avalanche, announced that they had him team's ECHL affiliate, the Utah Grizzlies. Ully had generated five goals and 12 assists in 12 games with the Grizzlies so far that season and would make only two appearances for the Eagles before ending the season with 43 points from 40 games for the Grizzlies. This season. The 23 year-old has 121 games of AHL experience with the Texas Stars, collecting 20 goals and 26 points during that stretch.

In August 2019 the Hershey Bears announced that they had signed Ully to an American Hockey League contract for the 2019-20 season.






















He wouldn't make an appearance for Hershey but instead spent the following two seasons with the South Carolina Stingrays, ECHL affiliate of the National Hockey League's Washington Capitals and American Hockey League's Hershey Bears. In what was his fifth professional season he played in 53 games with South Carolina in 2019-20 while on an AHL contract with Hershey. The Calgary, Alberta native racked up 48 points (12g-36a), which was tied for third-most on the team. Ully's assist total was also tied for the team lead, while his +21 rating was fourth-best among all SC skaters. His second season with the Stingrays saw him named to the ECHL Second Team for the 2020-21 season as determined in a vote of ECHL coaches, broadcasters, media relations directors and media. Ully, 26, is in his sixth professional season ranked eighth in the league with 58 points (22 goals, 36 assists) in 54 games. The forward was tied for third in the ECHL with 15 power play assists and is also tied for fourth with 20 power play points. The Calgary, Alberta native's 1.07 points per game was second highest in the league among skaters that had played in at least 15 games and both his 22 goals, and 58 points were career-highs.



Before heading to Glasgow Ully had a season with the Cardiff Devils, where he helped them to a second place league finish, and a semi-final berth in the play-offs in the 2023/24 season. He played 63 times for Pete Russell's side, including five appearances in the Continental Cup – he scored 20 goals and added 40 assists across all competitions. Prior to that, he had spells in Sweden with Vasterviks in 2022-23, and in Slovakia the season before that, where he featured for HKM Zvolen for whom Kyle Osterberg also appeared and HK Poprad who had James Livingston in their line-up. In total he played 52 times, scoring 18 goals and 27 assists hat season.

## FIRST FOOTING FLYERS

In the first 86 years of Flyers' history they have, by my reckoning played in over 60 rinks or arenas in the UK, Ireland and Europe. This got me wondering how many times Flyers had played in the first ever match at a rink and by my calculations Flyers have been "First Foots" at four rinks as well as of course playing in the opening night at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink.

Towards the end of the 1930's there were several similarly styled rinks built in Scotland including Perth, Falkirk, Dunfermline, Dundee and Kirkcaldy. Flyers took part in the opening games of the last two named rinks on back to back nights at the start of 1938/39 season. The game at Dundee Ice Rink on Friday 30/09/38 was Flyers first ever game and they faced off against the hometown Dundee Tigers in a challenge match.



A sell-out crowd of 4000 spectators with an estimated 1000 would be fans unable to gain access to the Kingsway rink saw Flyers lose their first ever match. Len McCartney was the scorer of Flyers' first ever goal, making the game all square at 1-1 at the end of the first period. Flyers took the lead for the first time in their history with a goal by Jimmy Chappell but Tigers ran out 5-2 winners in the end.

The following night, 01/10/38, it was the turn of Kirkcaldy Ice Rink to open its doors for hockey for the first time. A reported crowd of 4625 packed the rink for the return challenge match against Dundee. The honour of scoring the first ever goal at Kirkcaldy went to Norman McQuade when he put Flyers one up about half way through the first period. Tigers equalised soon afterwards to square matters after 20 minutes. After a scoreless second period, Tigers netted three times in the third to win 4-1 in the first of thousands of games to be played at Flyers' home rink.

Fast forward to 15/11/86 when Flyers met Nottingham Panthers in the Norwich Union Autumn Cup Final at the NEC in Birmingham. Flyers had qualified with a 100% record in the group stages, winning all eight games against their Scottish rivals, scoring 104 goals in the process. Import Mike Jeffrey scored 30 of these goals. The NEC rink was transformed from a big shed in the Exhibition Centre to a hockey rink, complete with an electronic scoreboard, thanks to the use of a portable ice plant. 600 fans attended the game, which was partly shown on the BBC Grandstand Saturday afternoon sports programme and all who watched were treated to a tight game with an exciting finish. Jimmy Jack scored the first ever goal at the NEC to put

Flyers ahead just 2.38 in, but Panthers equalised before Gordon Latto put Flyers ahead once more. Panthers scored either side of the first period break, but this time it was Flyers who equalised, Dave Stoyanovich getting the credit. Panthers retook the lead early in the third, but Stoyanovich made it all square once more, shorthanded with Brian Peat in the penalty box. Normal time ended with the score tied 4-4, but it was the Midlanders who struck in overtime to win 5-4. Andy Donald in Flyers' net stopped 45 of 50 shots as Flyers failed to win their only ever appearance at the NEC, which was only used sparingly afterwards as a hockey venue.



Just under six years later Flyers were the first away team at The Lagoon in Paisley on 12/09/92. Flyers had previously appeared in Paisley at the East Lane rink, which is long gone unfortunately. In 1992 The Lagoon was the temporary home of Ayr Raiders and it was the "home" team who scored the first goal at the new rink after only 42 seconds into the match and had stretched their lead to 3-0 before Canadian import Ed Zawatsky scored Flyers' first Lagoon goal on the powerplay. Frank Morris then netted another goal with the man advantage, but Flyers lost this Autumn Cup tie 2-3 in front a capacity crowd of about 1500. Zawatsky's Flyers career was a short one, being released before the league campaign began.

Flyers' last "First Foot" to date was on 19/11/95 at Newcastle Arena in a British Premier League game against Newcastle Warriors, who before and since that season were known as Whitley Warriors. Another 4000+ attended and the fans present saw Mark Morrison net Flyers' opener around half way through the first period in a 6-4 Flyers win. Morrison became only the third Flyer to score the first ever goal in a UK rink after Norman McQuade and Jimmy Jack. In addition to the aforementioned, other Kirkcaldy teams have played in the first games at a number of rinks. Kestrels played in the first game at Inverness against Dundee Cougars on 04/12/88 and at the new Dundee rink at Camperdown on 01/10/2000 against Dundee Tigers. Kestrels were also due to play in the first match at Perth's "Dewars" rink against Perth Panthers on 14/11/96, but this game was cancelled. Fife Falcons played in the first game at Dumfries Ice Bowl, losing 4-13 to Ayr's under-19 squad on 07/09/92 and Kirkcaldy Flyers played in the first competitive game at Durham Ice Rink, beating the hometown Wasps 5-4, but wartime games featuring Royal Canadian Air Force personnel had taken part before the Kirkcaldy team made its debut there.

As rink building has slowed considerably in recent times, it might be some time until Flyers can be the "First Foot" once again at a new rink.

# RULES CORNER



Part 2 of our look at the next sections of the rulebook which deal with Stick Infractions and Other Infractions covered by rules 58 to 75. We continue with rules 67 to 70.

Again the full text of the IIHF rule is provided along with any annotations as per the EIHL Casebook.

## RULE 67 HANDLING PUCK

### 67.1 HANDLING PUCK

This rule outlines infractions that can result in a penalty when a Player illegally uses their hand on the puck. Rule 79 – Hand Pass for all references related to passing the puck with the hand.

### 67.2 MINOR PENALTY – SKATER

A Player shall be permitted to catch the puck out of the air but must immediately place it or knock it down to the ice.

A Player shall be assessed a Minor Penalty for “closing their hand on the puck”:

(I) If they catch it and skates with it, either to avoid a check or to gain a “territorial advantage” over their opponent.

(II) If they place their hand over the puck while it is on the ice in order to conceal it from or prevent an opponent from playing the puck. When this is done in their Team’s Goal Crease area, a “Penalty Shot” shall be assessed Rule 67.4 – Penalty Shot, or Rule 67.5 – Goal Awarded.

(III) If they pick the puck up off the ice with their hand while play is in progress

A Minor Penalty shall be assessed for “Delay of Game” – Face-off Violation to a Player taking the “face-off” who:

(I) Attempts to win the “face-off” by batting the puck with their hand.

Note: The two (2) Players involved in the actual “face-off” (the centers) are not permitted to play the puck with their hand without incurring a penalty under this rule until such time as a third Player (from either Team) has at least touched the puck. Once the “face-off” is deemed complete (and a winner of the “face-off” is clear) hand passes shall be enforced Rule 79 – Hand Pass.

### 67.3 MINOR PENALTY – GOALKEEPER

The object of this entire rule is to keep the puck in play continuously and any action taken by the Goalkeeper which causes an unnecessary stoppage must be penalized without warning.

A “Delay of Game” penalty shall be assessed to a Goalkeeper who:

(I) Holds the puck with their hands for longer than three (3) seconds unless they are actually being “checked / pressured” by an opponent;

(II) Deliberately holds the puck in any manner which, in the opinion of the Referee, causes an unnecessary stoppage of play;

(III) Throws the puck forward towards the opponent’s net; Note: In the case where the puck thrown forward by the Goalkeeper being taken by an opponent, the Referee shall allow the resulting play to be completed, and if goal is scored by the non-offending Team, it shall be allowed and no penalty given; but if a goal is not scored, play shall be stopped and a Minor Penalty shall be imposed against the Goalkeeper;

(IV) Drops the puck into their pads or onto the goal net;

(V) Deliberately piles up snow or obstacles at or near their net that, in the opinion of the Referee, would tend to prevent the scoring of a goal.

### 67.4 PENALTY SHOT

This rule is described under Rule 63.6 – Penalty Shot

### 67.5 AWARDED GOAL

When a Goalkeeper, prior to proceeding to their Players’ Bench to be replaced by an extra attacker, intentionally leaves their stick or other piece of equipment, piles snow or other obstacles at or near their net that, in the opinion of the Referee, would tend to prevent the puck from entering the net, a goal shall be awarded. In order to award a goal in this situation, the Goalkeeper must have been replaced for an extra attacker, otherwise a Minor Penalty shall be assessed. If a Skater, when the Goalkeeper has been replaced for an extra attacker, falls on the puck, holds the puck, picks up the puck, or gathers the puck into their body or hands from the ice in the Goal Crease area, the play shall be stopped immediately, and a goal awarded to the non-offending Team.





# RULES CORNER



## 67.6 DISALLOWED GOAL

A goal cannot be scored by an attacking Player who “bats or directs” the puck with their hand into the net. A goal cannot be scored by an attacking Player who “bats or directs” the puck and it is “deflected” into the net off any Player or Official. When the puck enters the net on a “clear deflection” off a glove, the goal shall be allowed.

## RULE 68 ILLEGAL SUBSTITUTION

### 68.1 ILLEGAL SUBSTITUTION

An “illegal substitution” shall be deemed to have occurred when a Player enters the game illegally from either the Players’ Bench (Teammate not within the 1.50m limit Rule 74 – Too Many Players on the Ice, from the Penalty Box (penalty has not yet expired), when a Major Penalty is being served and the replacement Player does not return to the ice from the Penalty Box Rule 68.2 – Bench Minor Penalty, or when a Player illegally enters the game for the sole purpose of preventing an opposing Player from scoring on a “breakaway” Rules 68.3 – Penalty Shot, or Rule 68.4 – Awarded Goal.

When an injured Player is penalized and leaves the game, if they return before the expiration of their penalty, they are not eligible to play. This includes Coincidental Penalties when their substitute is still in the Penalty Box awaiting a stoppage in play. The injured player must wait until their substitute has been released from the Penalty Box before they are eligible to play. Rule 8.1 – Injured Players.

### 68.2 BENCH MINOR PENALTY

When a Player receives a Major Penalty and a Misconduct or Game Misconduct Penalty at the same time, or when an injured Player receives a Major Penalty and is unable to serve the penalty themselves, the penalized Team shall place a substitute Player in the Penalty Box immediately and no replacement for the penalized Player shall be permitted to enter the game except from the Penalty Box. Any violation of this provision shall be treated as an illegal substitution under this rule calling for a Bench Minor Penalty.

### 68.3 PENALTY SHOT

This rule is described under Rule 70.7 – Penalty Shot

### 68.4 AWARDED GOAL

This rule is described under: Rule 70.8 Awarded goal.

### 68.5 DISALLOWED GOAL

This rule is described under: Rule 70.9 Disallowed goal.

### 68.6. DELIBERATE ILLEGAL SUBSTITUTION

Too Many Players on the Ice. Rule 74 – Too Many Players on the Ice.

## RULE 69 INTERFERENCE ON THE GOALKEEPER

### 69.1 INTERFERENCE ON THE GOALKEEPER

This rule is based on the premise that an attacking Player’s position, whether inside or outside the Goal Crease, should not, by itself, determine whether a goal should be allowed or disallowed. In other words, goals scored while attacking Players are standing in the Goal Crease may, in appropriate circumstances be allowed. Goals should be disallowed only if:

- (I) an attacking Player, either by their positioning or by a “relevant contact”, impairs the Goalkeeper’s ability to move freely within their Goal Crease or defend their goal; or
- (II) an attacking Player initiates intentional or deliberate contact with a Goalkeeper, inside or outside of their Goal Crease.

“Incidental contact” with a Goalkeeper will be permitted, and resulting goals allowed, when such contact is initiated outside of the Goal Crease, provided the attacking Player has made a reasonable effort to avoid such contact. The rule will be enforced exclusively in accordance with the on-ice judgement of the Referee(s), but may be subject to a Video Review: Rule 37 – Video Review, when applicable or to a Coach’s Challenge Rule 38 – Coach’s Challenge.

For purposes of this rule, “contact / relevant contact” whether “incidental or otherwise”, shall mean any contact that is made between or among a Goalkeeper and attacking Player(s), whether by means of a stick or any part of the body. The overriding rationale of this rule is that a Goalkeeper should have the ability to move freely within their Goal Crease without being hindered by the actions of an attacking Player. If an attacking Player enters the Goal Crease and, by their actions, impairs the Goalkeeper’s ability to defend their



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goal, and a goal is scored, the goal will be disallowed. If an attacking Player is in the Goal Crease and does not leave immediately, the Referee has the possibility to stop the game and the subsequent “face-off” shall take place at the nearest Neutral Zone Face-off Spot outside the Attacking Zone of the offending Team. If an attacking Player has been pushed, shoved, or fouled by a defending Player so as to cause them to come into contact with the Goalkeeper, such contact will not be deemed contact initiated by the attacking Player for purposes of this rule, provided the attacking Player has made a reasonable effort to avoid such contact. If a defending Player has been pushed, shoved, or fouled by an attacking Player so as to cause the defending Player to come into contact with their own Goalkeeper, such contact shall be deemed contact initiated by the attacking Player for purposes of this rule, and if necessary, a penalty assessed to the attacking Player and if a goal is scored it would be disallowed.

## **69.2 PENALTY**

In all cases in which an attacking Player initiates “intentional or deliberate” contact with a Goalkeeper, whether or not the Goalkeeper is inside or outside the Goal Crease, and whether or not a goal is scored, the attacking Player will receive a penalty (Minor or Major, as the Referee deems appropriate). In all cases where the infraction being imposed is to the attacking Player for hindering the Goalkeeper’s ability to move freely in their Goal Crease, the penalty to be assessed is for “Goalkeeper interference”. In exercising their judgment, the Referee should give more significant consideration to the degree and nature of the relevant contact with the Goalkeeper than to the exact location of the Goalkeeper at the time of the contact.

## **69.3 CONTACT INSIDE THE GOAL CREASE**

If an attacking Player initiates “a relevant contact” with a Goalkeeper, incidental or otherwise, while the Goalkeeper is in their Goal Crease, and a goal is scored, the goal will be disallowed. If a Goalkeeper, in the “act of establishing their position” within their Goal Crease, initiates contact with an attacking Player who is in the Goal Crease, and this results in an impairment of the Goalkeeper’s ability to defend their goal, and a goal is scored, the goal will be disallowed. If, after any contact by a Goalkeeper who is attempting to establish position in their Goal Crease, the attacking Player does not immediately vacate their current position in the Goal Crease (i.e., give ground to the Goalkeeper), and a goal is scored, the goal will be disallowed. In all such cases, whether or not a goal is scored, the attacking Player will receive the appropriate penalty for Goalkeeper “interference”. If an attacking Player establishes a “significant position” within the Goal Crease, so as to obstruct the Goalkeeper’s vision and impair their ability to defend their goal, and a goal is scored, the goal will be disallowed. For this purpose, a Player “establishes a significant position within the crease” when, in the Referee’s judgment, their body, or a substantial portion thereof, is within the Goal Crease for more than an instantaneous period of time.

## **69.4 CONTACT OUTSIDE THE GOAL CREASE**

If an attacking Player initiates any “relevant contact” with a Goalkeeper, other than “incidental contact”, while the Goalkeeper is outside their Goal Crease, and a goal is scored, the goal will be disallowed. A Goalkeeper is not “fair game” just because they are outside the Goal Crease. The appropriate penalty should be assessed in every case where an attacking Player makes “unnecessary contact” with the Goalkeeper. However, “incidental contact” will be permitted when the Goalkeeper is in the act of playing the puck outside their Goal Crease provided the attacking Player has made a “reasonable effort” to avoid such unnecessary contact. When a Goalkeeper has played the puck outside of their Goal Crease and is then prevented from returning to their Goal Crease area due to the deliberate actions of an attacking Player, such Player may be penalized for “Goalkeeper interference”. Similarly, the Goalkeeper may be penalized, if by their actions outside of their Goal Crease they deliberately interfere with an attacking Player who is attempting to play the puck or an opponent.

## **69.5 COACH’S CHALLENGE**

Rule 38 – Coach’s Challenge

## **69.6 FACE-OFF LOCATION**

Whenever the Referee stops play to disallow a goal as a result of “relevant contact” with the Goalkeeper (incidental or otherwise), the resulting “face-off” shall take place at the nearest Neutral Zone Face-off Spot outside the Attacking Zone of the offending Team.



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## 69.7 REBOUNDS AND LOOSE PUCKS

In a rebound situation, or where a Goalkeeper and attacking Player(s) are simultaneously attempting to play a loose puck, whether inside or outside the Goal Crease, "incidental contact" with the Goalkeeper will be permitted, and any goal that is scored as a result thereof will be allowed. In the event a Goalkeeper has been pushed into the net together with the puck by an attacking Player after making a stop, the goal will be disallowed. If applicable, appropriate penalties will be assessed. If, however, in the opinion of the Referee, the attacking Player was pushed or otherwise fouled by a defending Player causing the Goalkeeper to be pushed into the net together with the puck, the goal can be permitted. In the event the puck is under a Player in or around the Goal Crease area (deliberately or otherwise), a goal cannot be scored by pushing this Player together with the puck into the goal. If applicable, the appropriate penalties will be assessed, including a "Penalty Shot" if deemed to be covered in the Goal Crease deliberately. Rule 63 – Delaying the Game.

## 69.8 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

If deemed appropriate, Supplementary Discipline can be applied by the Proper Authorities at their discretion. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline.

### ***EIHL Annotation RULE 69–INTERFERENCE ON THE GOALKEEPER***

***When considering an incident worthy of Goaltender Interference, the 3 main criteria to consider/answer in making the appropriate decision:***

- 1. Is the goaltender able to play his position? If he is contacted does he have time to recover?***
- 2. Was the contact initiated by the defensive player or the cause of a player from the opposing team?***
- 3. Was the contact made inside (or outside) of the crease? Contact in the blue paint area calls for disallowing a goal.***

## **RULE 70 LEAVING THE PLAYERS' BENCH OR PENALTY BOX**

### **70.1 LEAVING THE PLAYER'S BENCH OR PENALTY BOX**

No Player may leave the Players' Bench or Penalty Box at any time during an altercation or for the purpose of starting an altercation.

### **70.2 LEGAL LINE CHANGE**

A Player who has entered the game while play is in progress from – own Players' Bench or legally from the Penalty Box (penalty time has expired) who starts an altercation may be subject to discipline in accordance with Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline. A Player or Players who have entered the game on a legal line change during a stoppage of play, who line up in preparation for the ensuing "face-off", and who participate in an altercation shall be penalized under the appropriate rule and will be subject to discipline in accordance with Supplementary Discipline (a Game Misconduct is not automatic in this situation unless provided for as a result of their actions in the altercation). Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline.

### **70.3 LEAVING THE PLAYERS' BENCH**

Players shall not be permitted to come on the ice during a stoppage of play or at the end of the first and second periods for the purpose of warming-up. The Referee will report any violation of this rule to the Proper Authorities for disciplinary action. Except at the end of each period or for entering the game legally, no Player may, at any time, leave the Players' Bench. If it is necessary to proceed to the Dressing Room during the course of the game (and when it is required to proceed by way of the ice to access the Dressing Room), the Player must wait for a stoppage of play and ensure there are not altercations in progress before proceeding. The Player who was the first or second Player to leave the Players' Bench (or Penalty Box) during an altercation or for the purpose of starting an altercation, from either or both Teams shall be assessed a Game Misconduct Penalty.

### **70.4 LEAVING THE PENALTY BOX**

Except at the end of each period or on expiration of their penalty, no Player may, at any time, leave the Penalty Box. A Player serving a penalty in the Penalty Box, who is to be changed after the penalty has been served, must proceed at once by way of the ice and be at their own Players' Bench before any change can be made. For any violation of this rule, a Bench Minor Penalty shall be imposed for "too many Players on the ice". Rule 74 – Too many Players on the Ice. A penalized Player who leaves the Penalty Box before their penalty has expired, whether play is in progress or not, shall incur an additional Minor Penalty after serving





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their unexpired penalty. Any Player who, having entered the Penalty Box, leaves the Penalty Box prior to the expiration of their penalty for the purpose of challenging an Official's ruling, shall be assessed a Game Misconduct Penalty. If deemed appropriate, Supplementary Discipline can be applied by the Proper Authorities at their discretion. This rule does not replace any other more severe penalty that may be imposed for leaving the Penalty Box for the purpose of starting or participating in an altercation as outlined in this rule. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline. Any penalized Player leaving the Penalty Box during a stoppage of play and during an altercation shall incur a Minor Penalty plus a Game Misconduct Penalty. The Minor Penalty plus the unexpired time remaining in their original penalty must be served by a replacement Player placed in the Penalty Box by the Coach of the offending Team. If a Player leaves the Penalty Box before their penalty is fully served, the Penalty Timekeeper shall note the time and signal the On-ice Officials who will stop play when the offending Player's Team obtains "control of the puck". An additional Minor Penalty must be served by this Player in addition to the time remaining in their original penalty (this unexpired time is calculated from the time they left the Penalty Box illegally). In the case of a Player returning to the ice before their time has expired through an error of the Penalty Timekeeper, they are not to serve an additional penalty, but must serve their unexpired time this unexpired time is calculated from the time they left the Penalty Box through the error of the Penalty Timekeeper. At a stoppage of play following the expiration of their penalties, if a Player or Players exiting the Penalty Box get involved in an altercation, those coming from the Penalty Box shall be assessed the penalties they incur in the altercation. Should a Player coming from the Penalty Box at a stoppage of play get involved with an opponent and the opponent is deemed to be the instigator of the altercation, then the Player coming from the Penalty Box would not be subject to the Game Misconduct Penalty. If deemed appropriate, Supplementary Discipline can be applied by the Proper Authorities at their discretion. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline

## **70.5 BENCH MINOR PENALTY**

A Bench Minor Penalty shall be imposed on a Team whose Player(s) leave the Players' Bench for any purpose other than a change of Players and when no altercation is in progress. If a Coach or team personnel gets on the ice, unless directed to do so by On-ice Official or Medical Personnel, to attend to an injured Player after the start of a period and before that period is ended, the Referee shall impose a Bench Minor Penalty against the Team and report the incident to the Proper Authorities for disciplinary action. Where an injury has occurred to a Player and there is a stoppage of play, a Team Doctor (or other Medical Personnel) may go onto the ice to attend to the injured Player without waiting for the Referee's consent.

## **70.6 GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY**

A Game Misconduct Penalty shall be imposed on the Player who was the first or second Player to leave the Players' Bench or Penalty Box during an altercation or for the purpose of starting an altercation, from either or both Teams. Any penalized Player leaving the Penalty Box during a stoppage of play and during an altercation shall incur a Minor Penalty plus a Game Misconduct Penalty. The Minor Penalty plus the unexpired time remaining in their original penalty must be served by a replacement Player placed in the Penalty Box by the Coach of the offending Team. Any Player who has been ordered to the Dressing Room by the Officials and returns to their Players' Bench or to the ice surface for any reason before the appropriate time shall be assessed a Game Misconduct. If deemed appropriate, Supplementary Discipline can be applied by the Proper Authorities at their discretion. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline. Once a Player enters the Penalty Box, they must not leave until their penalty expires and their Team is entitled to an additional Player on the ice, or, at the end of a period to proceed to their Dressing Room, or, when they have received permission from an On-ice Official. At any other time, they shall be assessed a Game Misconduct Penalty under this rule.

## **70.7 PENALTY SHOT**

If a Player of the attacking side in possession of the puck shall be in such a position as to have no opposition between them and the opposing Goalkeeper, and while in such position they shall be interfered with by a Player of the opposing Team who shall have illegally entered the game, the Referee shall impose a "Penalty Shot" against the Team to which the offending Player belongs.



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## **70.8 AWARDED GOAL**

If, when the opposing Goalkeeper has been removed from the ice, a Player of the side attacking the unattended goal is interfered with in the Neutral or Attacking Zone by a Player who shall have entered the game illegally, the Referee shall immediately award a goal to the non-offending Team.

## **70.9 DISALLOWED GOAL**

If a penalised Player returns to the ice from the Penalty Box before their penalty has expired by their own error or the error of the Penalty Timekeeper, any goal scored by their own Team while they are illegally on the ice shall be disallowed but all penalties imposed on either Team shall be served as regular penalties. If a Player shall illegally enter the game from their own Players' Bench or from the Penalty Box, any goal scored by their own Team while they are illegally on the ice shall be disallowed but all penalties imposed on either Team shall be served as regular penalties.

## **70.10 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES**

If deemed appropriate, Supplementary Discipline can be applied by the Proper Authorities at their discretion. Rule 28 – Supplementary Discipline

Canadian scoring ace Danny Brown had 11 stitches inserted in a facial injury sustained at Ayr on Sunday night and could miss Fife Flyers two important matches this weekend. Brown caught an accidental high stick from Bruins' player-coach Paul Bedard just above the eye, and it is touch and go whether he will be able to face either Dundee Rockets tomorrow or Durham Wasps on Sunday. While the absence of the Canadian would undoubtedly be a major blow to Flyers, they the resources not to lean too heavily on any one player. The Kirkcaldy side had only one fixture scheduled for this weekend until earlier this week when the BIHA announced their away match against Durham Wasps was to be brought forward from March 3 to Sunday. Tomorrow's game against Dundee Rockets at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink should ensure another full house with Flyers intent on consolidating their place at the top of the Premier League. However player-coach Ron Plumb has reaffirmed this warning about the dangers of complacency. "We have got to the top of the league by working hard and we will have to continue to work hard in order to stay there" he said yesterday. "It is very easy to get carried away but we have some very tough games ahead and we cannot afford to become complacent". Plumb was full of praise for the way Flyers' reshuffled side coped with the loss of Brown on Sunday. "I thought Gordon Latto had a tremendous game playing at centre in the first line, but we also switched Chic Cottrell and Steven Kirk, and they responded well," he said, "Ayr is another small rink and we took some time to adjust, but we came through at the end of the night. "Against Murrayfield on Saturday I thought we played an excellent all-round game," Plumb went on. "It was not that Murrayfield did not play well — we did not let them play at all." Flyers will be without Jimmy Pennycook this weekend through work commitments, but apart from Brown have no injury worries. Tomorrow will be the fifth meeting of Flyers and Rockets this season – and the Dundee side are still looking for their first success. However Flyers are unbeaten on their own ice and it would be something of a surprise if Rockets came away with the points. Sunday's trip to Durham pits the Flyers against the side that beat them in the Bluebell Cup final last month and the Kirkcaldy side will be going all out for revenge. It was Wasps who inflicted Flyers first defeat of the season back in October and Plumb's men will do very well to avoid defeat on the tight Durham ice. Flyers fans are advised that the supporters bus for Durham leaves Kirkcaldy Ice Rink at 1pm on Sunday.

### 05/01/1985 Fife Flyers v Dundee Rockets Premier League

Fife Flyers' stranglehold over defending British champions Dundee Rockets continued at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink on Saturday night as they skated to a victory as emphatic as the scoreline suggests. This was Flyers fifth successive win over Rockets this season — and each time the margin of victory has been increased. The Dundee side were a pale shadow of the team which swept all before them last season and offered little in the way of resistance to Ron Plumb's men. Flyers played well but they did not have to be at their best to take the points from the dispirited visitors. The determination to succeed in the Kirkcaldy camp was no better illustrated than by the courage of Canadian Danny Brown who played against Rockets despite having 11 stitches in a facial injury and scored a hat-trick. The rout began after only 65 seconds when Neil Abel had a shot blocked by the Dundee netminder, and Dave Stoyanovich bundled the rebound into the net. Flyers' second goal two minutes later arrived in similar fashion when Chic Cottrell squeezed the puck home from a very tight angle after Dougie Latto's effort had been pushed away. Gordon Latto added a power play goal in the fifth minute with a fierce shot which hit the keeper but spun over him into the net. Four minutes later, Danny Brown made it 4-0 with a shorthanded goal when he skated half the length of the ice before dummied the netminder. Rockets had hardly tested Craig Dickson in the home net, but they pulled one back in the 14th minute when Ronnie Wood tucked home the rebound of a Bois effort. Neil Abel got on the scoresheet two minutes into the second period with a tremendous shot from the blue line low into the corner, and then Brown made it six when he skated on to a Stuart Drummond pass. Although Wood pulled one back for Rockets in a rare attack, Brian Peat replied within second for Flyers when he found a gap between the netminder and his near post to score his first goal of the season.



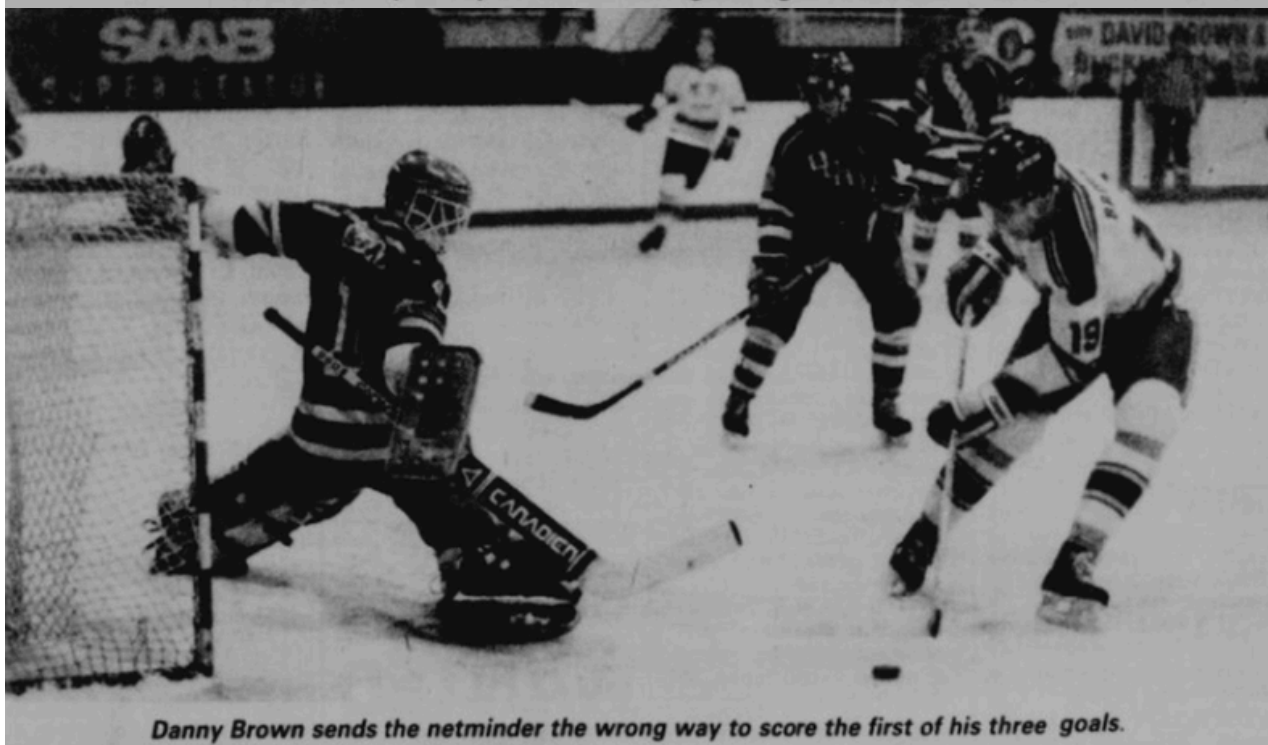

### 06/01/1985 Durham Wasps v Fife Flyers Premier League

Fife Flyers became the first team to take a league point at Durham for more than a year on Sunday – and it could so easily have been two. The Kirkcaldy side led 5-3 early in the final period, but conceded two power play goals, and had to be content with a share of with the spoils. Flyers were looking for revenge for their defeat in the Bluecol Cup final last month and they were given the perfect start by player-coach Ron Plumb who shot them after only 35 seconds. However, Pete Johnson brought Wasps level, and in the eighth minute the home side went ahead when Stephen Johnson was on target. Although Dave Stoyanovich equalised after 10 minutes, Paul Smith made it 3-2 for Durham at the first buzzer. The second period brought only one goal with Gordon Latto again making it all goals square with just two minutes played. It was Latto who again found the net early in the third period to put Flyers ahead, and when Andy Linton made it 5-3 in the 46th minute, Wasps looked set to lose their first home match in 13 months. However, with the visitors under penalty two powerplay goals by Stephen Cooper set up a nail-biting last 10 minutes. Play swung from end to end, and Flyers almost snatched a dramatic last-minute winner when Dave Stoyanovich was clean through on goal but sent his shot against the bar.

Fife Flyers reach the half-way stage of the Heineken Premier League tomorrow with an away match against Cleveland Bombers in which they will be bidding to consolidate their position at the top of the table. And they have another chance to maintain their current superiority over Dundee Rockets on Wednesday evening when they visit Dundee for a match to be televised by BBC Scotland. Tomorrow's match at Cleveland is the first of two meetings between Flyers and Bombers within the space of eight days, with the English side due to visit Kirkcaldy next Saturday. Player-coach Ron Plumb commented yesterday: "seem to be going well and it will be a hard game. "We will be going for both points, but it is another small rink and we will have to play it tight." Jimmy Pennycook is not available tomorrow, but he will be back to face his former club on Wednesday when the face-off is at 8 p.m. We have been

doing well against Dundee but they can be a very dangerous side and we cannot take anything for granted" said Plumb. The good thing about our win over Rockets on Saturday was the way the goals were spread throughout the team, and that should give the players a lot of confidence. "It was very similar to the Murrayfield game the previous week, because we did not let Rockets get going, and before they knew it they were 4-0 down. "We have got them under the thumb at the moment, and we want to keep it that way." Plumb was also delighted with the point gained at Durham on Sunday night. "It was a point that not many teams will get, and we know that we don't have to go back to Durham," he pointed out.

There was an added boost for Flyers this week when Plumb was voted Heineken's Coach of the Month for December, with Dave Stoyanovich collecting the award for the Premier League's top point scorer in the same month. Meanwhile, Flyers will make another attempt to set up a world record for the shooting speed of a puck at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink on Saturday 19th January. Last month's bid had to be abandoned because of technical difficulties and the new attempt goes ahead at 12.30pm next Saturday.

### 12/01/1985 Cleveland Bombers v Fife Flyers Premier League

Dave Stoyanovich became the first man to score 100 competitive goals this season when he bagged two in Fife Flyers' comfortable victory over Cleveland Bombers on Saturday night. The big Canadian reached the magic 'ton' early in the second period of a game which saw two Flyers — Andy Linton and Brian Peat — pick up match misconduct penalties. It was Stoyanovich who gave Flyers the perfect start with a goal after just 37 seconds, and the Kirkcaldy side continued to hold the upper hand without adding to their lead. The match boiled over, however, in the 12th minute, when Andy Linton became involved in an incident between Neil Abel and Bombers' player-coach Jim Earle and received a game misconduct penalty. With Flyers skating four men against three they increased their lead after 14 minutes with a goal by Gordon Latto. Two minutes from the buzzer, Earle was involved in another incident, this time with Brian Peat, and both players were given match misconduct penalties. Flyers did not let this upset them however, and with 22 seconds of the period remaining, Danny Brown made 3-0. Although McDonough pulled one back for Cleveland seven minutes into the second period, Dave Stoyanovich hit back for Flyers within 60 seconds to claim his 100th goal of the season in Heineken League and Bluecol Cup matches. Brown then struck twice in the last three minutes of the period to give Flyers a commanding 6-1 lead. McDonough was on target for Bombers midway through the final period, but with the home side in penalty trouble towards the end of the match, Gordo Latto and Ron Plumb added further goals for Flyers.

### 16/01/1985 Dundee Rockets v Fife Flyers Premier League

Dundee Rockets extracted some revenge for five previous defeats by Fife Flyers this season with victory in Wednesday's televised Heineken Premier League match. Boosted by a hat-trick from their overnight signing from Nottingham Panthers, Steve Salter, Rockets thoroughly deserved to take both points. However, it was a result which left Flyers wondering just where they went wrong. In terms of performance, it was a repeat of their poor showing in last month's Bluecol Cup final defeat by Durham Wasps, with the whole side choosing this match to have an off night. Incredibly, Flyers held a three-goal lead midway through the match, before an astonishing collapse saw Rockets change the pattern of the game with four goals in the space of five minutes. After their recent fine defensive performances, it was a major disappointment for Flyers to concede 10 goals for the first time this season. Yet there was no indication of what was to follow as the Kirkcaldy side built up a 4-2 lead during the first period. Dave Stoyanovich fired Flyers ahead in just 40 seconds, but with Ron Plumb in the penalty box, Rockets equalised in the fourth minute through Ronnie Wood. Two minutes later, Chris Brinster put the home side ahead with a shot from the blue line. After 11 minutes, however, Flyers got back on level terms when Neil Abel took advantage of a scramble in front of the Dundee net to send the puck through the keeper's legs. Chic Cottrell then put Flyers 3-2 ahead when he scored after a Brian Peat effort had rebounded from the boards behind the goal, and a minute later, Dave Stoyanovich reached his second 'ton' within the space of five days when he scored to notch his 100th league point of the season. When Danny Brown made it 5-2 for Flyers with a power play goal nine minutes into the second period, another joy night for the Fife fans looked on the cards. However, Flyers were stunned as Rockets rattled in four goals in five minutes through Salter (2), Ally Wood and Roche Bois to lead 6-5 going into the final period. Less than a minute after the restart, it was all square as Danny Brown scored a fine solo goal but Ronnie Wood restored Rockets lead seven minutes later and Bois then put Dundee side 8-6 ahead. Although Stoyanovich scored Flyers' best goal of the night just a minute later Salter completed his hat-trick with four minutes remaining. With 60 seconds on the clock, Flyers gambled by withdrawing netminder Craig Dickson, but this last-ditch effort failed as Bois stroked the puck into the empty net just 15 seconds from time. Highlights of the match can be seen on 'Grandstand' tomorrow. Flyers' coach Ron Plumb said later that he felt it was "purely coincidental" his side's two worst performances of the season had come in front of the TV cameras.
