The Flyers visited the Clan for the first of two games in four days at the Braehead Arena between the two rivals. The Flyers welcomed back Janis Voris and Kieran Craig following their one game suspensions but were still without the injured pair of Patrick Kyte and Aiden Wilson. Brodie Kay was added to the injured list after he left the game in the third period at Coventry on Sunday evening whilst James Spence and Cameron Kenny were also scratched. The Clan scratched Félix Paré and Nick Prkusic but otherwise iced a full bench. It was the visitors who had the first chance in the opening minute after a giveaway by the Clan in their zone and Landon Bow was happy to see the puck stick under his pads after a shot on the turn by Charles-Antoine Paiement. The home side however did open the scoring and indeed the floodgates in the 3rd minute when Darien Kielb sniped the top corner over the blocker of Voris. In the 5th minute the Clan doubled their advantage when the Flyers were guilty of turning the puck over in their own zone and Voris did a good job to stop two shots close in by Deven Sideroff but Chris McKay followed up to lift the puck high into the net. Voris gloved a snapshot from Alex Forbes over the crossbar but soon after the Clan had another when Sideroff beat his man high up in the Flyers zone and went in on goal to pick the corner of the net under the blocker of Voris. The Flyers at this stage called their time out and Shane Owen came in to relieve Voris in net. 40 seconds later and the Fife defence was breached again as Owen made an initial pad save on Sideroff but the puck broke to Mitchell Heard who walked it around the goalie and into the net. In the 10th minute Keaton Jamieson was penalized for boarding as the Flyers went on the first power play of the night. Within 30 seconds however the Clan broke up ice and Rylan Schwartz found Sideroff in the slot with all sorts of time and his shot beat Owen. The Flyers pulled a goal back on their man advantage when Bow made a stop from Massimo Carozza but couldn't control the rebound and Kieran Craig was on hand to find the net. With just 12 minutes on the clock the Clan had half a dozen on the board as Liam Finlay darted onto a pass from Tyson McLellan at the blueline and went down main street on Owen to beat him with a low shot. In the 15th minute Ryan Foss lifted a close in effort over the crossbar. In the 17th minute Owen gloved a shot from McLellan and in the final seconds he also made another stop from a shot from the tops of the circles to end a torrid opening period.

PERIOD 2

The opening couple of minutes on the second period saw the Clan camped in the Flyers end of the ice but weren't able to turn their possession into another goal. Cole Ully had a shot blockered away by Owen in the 23rd minute but moments later the home side did find a way past Owen again as they played the puck around in the Flyers zone and fashioned an opening for Matt Berry who had wide open net to shoot into. Owen made another blocker save in the 25th minute on Sideroff and in the 29th minute the Fife keeper did well to stop a close in effort from Robert Lachowicz. Sideroff broke through the Flyers defence in the 30th minute and headed straight down the middle but Tyler Heidt managed to make a great poke check to knock the puck away before

he could get a shot away. In the 32nd minute a pass from Foss found Carozza but his shot from the slot slid past the post. The Clan made it 8-1 moments later with Kielb getting his second of the game when his shot from the blueline squeaked under the arm of Owen. 30 seconds later the Flyers pulled a goal back when Phélix Martineau broke into the Clan zone and elected to take the shot that went low past Bow into the twine. Martineau almost got another in the 35th minute but just couldn't get his stick on the puck as it flashed through Bow's crease.

PERIOD 3

The Clan added to their lead in second minute of the final period when Finlay went down the right wing to beat Owen over the shoulder to fire high into the net. The Flyers survived a scramble around their net in the 45th minute as Sideroff went looking for his hat trick goal. A minute later Owen made a pad save to stop a Ully backhand. Kielb who was also looking for a treble went in on Owen on a 2 on 1 break but he mis controlled the puck without getting a shot away. The Flyers pulled a goal back in the 47th minute when Michael Cichy got the puck to Carozza behind the net and his pass out front found Craig all alone to beat Bow. The Flyers had their tails up momentarily and buzzed around the Clan net in the next couple of shifts with Martineau and Daniel Krenželok both having half chances. In the 51st minute Martineau was just wide with a shot and on the follow up Noah Delmas forced a save from Bow. A 2 on 1 break for the Flyers in the 53rd minute was broken up by Joe Hazeldine and a minute later the puck bobbled just wide of the Clan goal with Jordan Stallard in Bow's kitchen. In the 55th minute a redirect from Foss brought a smart save from Bow. Jamieson was denied a minute later by a leg save by Owen before Foss went the other way and weaved his way into the Clan zone but his shot from the slot on the backhand didn't seriously trouble Bow. Ben Brown had a couple of shots on Bow in consecutive shifts and when he next put the puck on net with two minutes remaining Martineau got a tip on it to send it looping past the Clan goalie for another consolation. The Clan had a chance to bring up double figures as Berry broke away with just 40 seconds remaining but his shot struck iron. A penalty shot was called on the play but Owen denied Berry. With just 5 seconds remaining Krenželok took only the second penalty of the game when he went to the bin for high sticking.


#7 - JIMMY'S FLYERS CAREER

Last Sunday before the game we recognised the induction to the British Ice Hockey Hall of Fame for Jimmy Pennycook.

Jimmy Pennycook started playing hockey in his hometown of Dundee progressing from the junior Meteors to the Rockets in 1973/74 where he won the Montford Trophy which was awarded to the Northern League's rookie of the year. When the Rockets paused playing in 1977 he signed for Murrayfield Racers until returning to Rockets for 82/83 season.

Jimmy joined the Flyers for the 1984/85 season and during his time with the club he played on what could be called a part-time basis due to his "day job" in the offshore oil industry. His debut for the Flyers was against the Murrayfield Racers in an Autumn Cup game at Kirkcaldy on 27th October. The Flyers beat their old rivals 9-6 with the debutant netting a hattrick. It was one of four trebles he scored in competitive games that campaign including a season high four goals against the Cleveland Bombers on 24th November in a Premier League match at Kirkcaldy. Jimmy played in the Flyers Bluecol Cup Final defeat against the Durham Wasps at Streatham in December. He played in all of the Flyers post season games on their way to a British Championship win at Wembley against one of his former teams the Murrayfield Racers. Jimmy scored the final goal in the 9-4 win and in his 24 competitive games that season he tallied 29+21 as well as a 1+4 in two Scottish Cup games.

The following season Jimmy's work commitments meant that he missed more than 50% of the Flyers regular season games but from his 18 appearances in the Autumn Cup, League and Scottish Cup he registered 15+25. He appeared in all five of the Flyers playoff games, recording 4 assists, which culminated in the Wembley semifinal loss as the Murrayfield Racers exacted revenge for the previous season.




Early on in season 1986/87 Jimmy bagged four goals in a 22-2 drubbing of the Glasgow Eagles in the Norwich Union Cup as the Flyers won the Scottish section to progress to play the Nottingham Panthers in the Final at the NEC in Birmingham. It would be heartbreak in another big match for Jimmy and the Fifers as they lost 5-4 in overtime to the Panthers who had tied the game late to force the extra session. Jimmy got another treble against the Eagles in February in a road Scottish Cup game. The Flyers made it all the way back to Wembley but once again were the bridesmaids as the Durham Wasps eliminated them 7-5 with Pennycook grabbing one of the Flyers goals to finish the season with 33 goals and 32 assists from his 33 games played.

#7 - JIMMY'S FLYERS CAREER



As an Assistant Captain Jimmy once again played on a when available basis during season 1987/88 which included him missing a month when he was working in South Africa. His season ended when he played his final game at Murrayfield on March 20th before heading back off to the oil riggs in Nigeria which also saw him miss out on the Flyers return to Wembley where they were once again disappointed as they went down to the Durham Wasps in the British Championship Final. His points total in 28 games that season was 15+17 total for the season.



Jimmy then returned to his hometown to play for the now Tayside Tigers before heading south of the border for a three seasons before he made a somewhat unexpected to return to the Flyers in season 1992/93 after the Flyers returned to the top flight after their disastrous 1990/91relegation campaign. The now 35 year old Jimmy had been with Murrayfield to start the season but early in December he had been left out of the Racers line up and he decided to make the switch back to Fife. Once again it was the Racers he was up against in his second "debut" with his former team however running out 9-4 winners this time. His first Flyers goal on his return was a consolation in a 9-2 defeat in Nottingham with his last ever competitive goal also against the Panthers in the Lace City in a playoff game. In total he played 23 games that season and added 4 assists to the goals above with his final game being at home against the Panthers on 18th April ending in a 10-3 loss.

Jimmy's Flyers competitive career statistics total reads: P132 G94 A105 for a total of 199 points and 126 penalty minutes. He went on to finish his career at Dumfries then five seasons in the North West of England and he played his last competitive game at Fife for the Lancashire Hawks on 3rd March 1998 in a play-off game as his side went down 14-7 with Jimmy on target with a consolation goal. Later that season he also appeared on Fife ice as part of the Latto's Legends Team as his great friend Gordon Latto was honoured with a Testimonial game.

The Flyers and Clan met again for the second time in four days and the Flyers were looking to avenge their heavy defeat at Braehead Arena on Wednesday night. The visitors welcomed back Patrick Kyte from injury but were without Kieran Craig who had two of their goals in midweek. Also missing were James Spence, Aiden Wilson and Cameron Kenny with Shane Owen starting in net. The Clan started Lucas Brine in net and scratched Landon Bow. They added Felix Pare back into the lineup but were still without the injured Nick Prkusic and the scratched Reece Kelly.

Owen made the first save of the game in the opening minute when he gloved a Rylan Schwartz shot. Clan were dominant with possession in the Fife zone in the opening three minutes but to the most the Flyers kept them to the outside and Owen wasn't overly troubled. The home side did however make the breakthrough in the 4th minute after the Flyers turned the puck over at the blueline and Liam Finlay darted in on Owen to go around the keeper and slot into the net. In the 5th minute Brine made his first stop when he shut down Charles-Antoine Paiement on the short side. Owen made a solid save in the 10th minute when he got a pad on a close in redirect and a minute later the first power play of the game went the way of the Flyers as Matt Stief was called for hooking. The Flyers couldn't get the puck set up in the Clan zone who completed the kill without giving up a shot. In the 13th minute Michael Cichy from the high slot forced a save from Brine. A minute later and the Clan goalie was in action again when he made a shoulder save at his near post to deny Paiement. Owen then made a toe save on a Cole Ully effort in the 15th minute. The Fife keeper made a very good stop in the 16th minute when he got across his goal to make a sprawling save to keep McLellan out. Soon after Owen was again in action making another smart save on Schwartz from the slot. The sides traded a sequence of chances in the 16th minute when Phélix Martineau forced a glove save from Brine before Owen denied McLellan who skated in behind the Fife defence. Matt Berry saw his shot from the circles saved by the pads of Owen in the 18th minute and in the final few seconds of the period Brine made a kick save to keep Martineau off the board.

PERIOD 2

Owen swallowed a blue line shot from Schwartz in the second minute of the middle period. In the 23rd minute a give and go between Keaton Jameson and Deven Sideroff saw the later denied by a kick save by Owen. Moments later Brine held on to a Paiement effort after some good set up play. In the 26th minute the home side doubled their lead when Schwartz was left all alone in front of Owen and his back hand found some space under the goalies pad to put the puck into the net. In the 28th minute Mitchell Heard tried a wraparound that Owen got his pad to and as the puck broke to Sideroff Owen made an unbelievable blocker save as the puck was destined for the top corner of the net. The play was reviewed at the next stoppage of play but clearly had not crossed the line.

In the 31st minute Finlay broke up the ice but Owen flashed the leather to deny him. A minute later a shot rebounded off Owen and hit Tyler Heidt and almost rolled back into the net but was scrambled clear. The Flyers were under constant pressure at this stage and Owen made a blocker save on Heard and was happy to scramble the puck away seconds later. The momentum that Clan had paid off with a third goal in the 36th minute when Owen made an initial save but Stief at the side of the net banked the puck home off the prone goalie. Owen made another solid save in the 37th minute when he stopped Sideroff from close range. Brine made a blocker save on Ryan Foss in the 38th minute before Felix Pare was binned with a minute left for a slash. The Flyers didn't get anything set up before the interval buzzer.

PERIOD 3

The Clan completed the penalty kill to start the final period and added another goal in the 42nd minute when Heard collected the puck on the centre line and skated through the Flyers players unchallenged to flick the puck over Owen and into the net. In the 43rd minute Lucas Chiodo saw his snap shot kicked away by Brine. The Clan remained in full control of the game and although they continued to get more shots on the Flyers net there were few that troubled Owen. In the 51st minute Steven Seigo skated down the slot but Owen was out at the top of his crease to take the angle away and going the other way Ryan Foss carried the puck into the Clan zone but couldn't get enough on his shot to trouble Brine. Flyers were back on the power play but once again the Clan had a comfortable kill without giving up a shot on Brine. Owen was again in fine form in the 53rd minute when he shut down Ully coming in from the slot. In the 55th minute the Flyers won the puck back in the Clan zone and Chiodo tried to stuff it past Brine at his post but the Clan goalie stopped the puck underneath his pads. The home side got a chance with the man advantage in the 57th minute when Heidt was called for a trip. Owen made a good save from McLellan as he got a shot away from close range. Owen then made another save and the rebound fell to Finlay who couldn't hit the gaping net as the Flyers completed the kill and the Clan saw out the rest of the time on the clock.

The Flyers hosted Dundee for their last regular season trip to Kirkcaldy with the visitors enjoying a dominant run against the home side in recent match ups. The Stars were without Alexander Tonge, Brogan O'Brien and Jake Elmer. The Flyers gave Janis Voris the start but Noah Delmas was added to the list of scratches as he missed his first game of the season. Brodie Kay and Kieran Craig were both game time decisions and although Kay made the bench in the first period he saw no ice time and Craig was scratched before puck drop. Aiden Wilson, James Spence and Cameron Kenny were also scratched. The Flyers made a bright start to the game and after just 30 seconds a quick transition down ice saw Phelix Martineau feed the puck to Massimo Carozza who was in too tight on Jarrett Fiske to be able to lift the puck over the Dundee goalie. In the 2nd minute a shot from Michael Cichy from the high slot was turned away by Fiske. The Stars went on the games first power play of the night in the 3rd minute as Daniel Krenzelok was called for a cross check. Voris made his first save of the night when he got a pad on a Spencer Naas effort from close range. Later in the penalty kill the Flyers threaten on a 2 on 1 shorthanded bid and Carozza was again denied by Fiske. Back at full strength the Flyers went close again when an Austin Farley shot was swallowed by the Stars goalie in the 5th minute and a minute later Farley again saw Fiske deny him with a solid save. The visitors much against the run of play opened the scoring in the 8th minute when Philippe Sanche got in behind the Flyers defence and his shot appeared to fool Voris by going low along the ice. 40 seconds later and the Stars doubled their advantage when they scored on an odd man rush as the puck found Kameron Kielly who beat Voris on his glove side. In the 10th minute Charles-Antoine Paiement went on a solo bid down the right wing but Fiske was well positioned to make the save. A minute later and the Flyers had a let off as Brett Gravelle had all sorts of time in the slot but shot wildly over the bar. The next 90 seconds however defined the game as the roof fell in on the Flyers. A face off win by the Stars saw the puck go back to the point before setting up Spencer Naas in the slot for a one time shot that beat Voris through the five hole. Stars added a fourth when Sanche in the slot held off his marker to spin and send the puck again between the legs of Voris and the Flyers called a time out. 30 seconds later the Flyers rearguard were in complete disarray as Kielly was all alone at the side of the goal to easily beat Voris as he dinked the puck past the stranded goalie. The Flyers pulled a goal back in the 18th minute when Fiske gave out a rebound from a Cichy shot and Lucas Chiodo was on hand to bury the puck.

PERIOD 2

The Flyers replaced Voris in net with Shane Owen to start the second period. The opening five minutes saw the Stars remain mostly in control but neither team could fashion any grade A chances. In the 27th minute Owen did well to shrug off a shot from Kielly who was looking for his hat trick. The Fife keeper produced a good shoulder save in the 30th minute and a couple of minutes later Fiske saw his first real action of the period as he kicked away a onetime blast by Olivier LeBlanc from the point.

Owen denied Xavier Pouliot from the circles who was moved up to the wing from his normal blueline duties. The Flyers reduced the deficit with a well taken goal as Chiodo went down the right wing and feathered a pass on to the stick of Ryan Foss who was going to net and he gave Fiske no chance in the 35th minute. The Stars should have added to their lead in the 38th minute as Brendan Harms and Naas broke 2 on 1 but the former missed a wide open net with Owen drawn out of position. In the final 30 seconds of the period the Stars went back on the power play as Tyler Heidt was given a unsportsmanlike misconduct penalty.

PERIOD 3

The Flyers started the third period with a strong kill and Owen did well in the dying seconds of the man advantage to snuff out a tic tack toe play as he trapped the puck underneath his pads and the Flyers returned to full strength. In the 43rd minute Farley was set up and his strong shot was well saved by Fiske before the Stars went the other way and Gravelle pinged the post with a wrist shot from the slot. In the 45th minute Chiodo saw a gap and tried to go up high on Fiske but his shot was over top of the goal. The Stars struck again in the 46th minute when Owen let out a rebound following a shot from the point by Ben O'Connor and Harms was on hand to knock the puck into the net. 40 seconds later and the Flyers had a goal back when Patrick Kyte was up supporting the play and the puck bounced his way in the slot and he buried it past Fiske. In the 50th minute Owen made a good pad save on a Drydn Dow shot from the circles and a minute later he made another solid stop this time on Gravelle as the Stars searched for more goals. Two further goals did arrive in the space of 20 seconds in the 54th minute when firstly Zach Tsekos finished on a quick transition as he deked the puck around Owen and then Dow from distance saw his shot find the corner of the net on the blocker side of Owen.

Sheffield Steelers will take a two-goal advantage into their Challenge Cup Semi-Final second leg tie against Cardiff Devils after logging a 5-3 win on Wednesday night at the Utilita Arena. The Steelers restricted the Devils to just one shot in an opening period that the home side dominated. Marc-Olivier Vallerand had a shot come back off the crossbar early, but the Steelers were deservedly ahead at 9:17 when Veeti Vainio's shot from the point was deflected en route to Mac Carruth by Daniel Ciampini and then by Cole Shudra. Under five minutes later it was 2-0 as a Daniel Leavens pass was one-timed home by Joona Huttula from a tight angle. Ciampini got another post before the period was out as the visitors were lucky to escape just two behind. Cardiff started period two the stronger, and had the Steelers pinned back in their own zone for long stretches. Their efforts paid off with a powerplay goal converted in front by Joey martin while Brien Diffley sat a holding minor. Having then had chances to tie the game, the Devils took a slashing minor in the offensive zone and were punished back the other way - Mitchell Balmas being given too much space and beating Carruth blocker side from an angle. The momentum began shifting back to the Steelers, but after a Cole Sanford penalty had been killed off the Steelers turned the puck over while entering the zone, allowing the Devils to break the other way, Kohen Olischefski fed Sanford in front who beat Greenfield at the second attempt to make it 3-2 at 34:22. Jarrod Gourley cleared a puck off the line after Kevin Tansey's shot got past Carruth, while a speedy Mikko Juusola break down the wing was stopped by a combination of Josh Batch and Carruth. Andrew MacWilliam stopped Mitchell Balmas as the Steelers broke 2-on-1, but his hook put the Devils short and they were back two down at 42:23 on the resulting powerplay off a Patrick Watling onetimer. Tyler Busch then took another minor some 90 seconds later, and after chaos around the Devils net which Carruth did well to turn away, the puck broke to Daniel Leavens to score with 46:36 played. The Devils pulled a goal back with 9:57 remaining on a strange play. While most of the crowd, and indeed the cameras, were focused on a scrum developing between Colton Saucerman and Tyler Busch, the Devils broke up the ice and saw Sanford slot the puck under Greenfield to make it a 5-3 game. While the referee had his arm up for a penalty, there was no whistle and the play correctly continued, eventually resulting in the goal. That would be the final goal of the game. With an offensive zone faceoff with 34 seconds to go, the Devils opted for a timeout but couldn't hold the puck in the zone.

Saturday 8th February

Belfast Giants 4 Guildford Flames 3 Shootout Elite League

Belfast Giants stayed seven points clear at the top of the Elite League table, but did it the hard way against Guildford Flames in front of 6,633 fans at the SSE Arena. "I thought in the first period, if you look at the shot storyline, we dominated. I think we played ok in the first but could've been a little more direct and inside and played with a little more intent, but in the second period, they took it to us." explained Giants' captain Mark Cooper post-game. "We were on our heels, and they were winning every battle. "In the third period, we were a desperate team, and we weren't going to be denied. I thought we probably could've won it in regulation. We had a lot of chances in the third but ended up getting it done in the shootout. Guildford came out of the blocks quickly and took the lead after 55 seconds. Charlie Dodero hit a shot that hit off the pipes that went straight to Austin Glover, who had an easy tap in to put the Flames ahead. Nottingham Panthers logged their eighth straight win with a 2-1 victory over Dundee Stars in Scotland in front of 1,902 fans at the Dundee Ice Arena. "I think we started hot with two quick goals," began Brad Bowering, who was playing just his second Elite League game with the Panthers. "I don't want to say we took our foot off the gas, we had a few chances, but they hemmed us in a bit during the second but Jason played amazing as he always seems to do and we managed to squeak out the win in the end." The opening period in Dundee was largely controlled by the Panthers, as Zsombor Garát opened the scoring just 02:31 in with a shot from the left circle that beat Jarrett Fiske. Nottingham doubled their lead just over two minutes later at 04:25, with Mitchell Fossier sending a cross ice pass to Kristoff Kontos, who beat Fiske with a wrist shot. In the end, it would be that period that did the damage for the visitors. Dundee came close to getting on the board throughout the period, however they couldn't find a way past Jason Grande and the score remained 2-0 heading into the second period. Bowering logged 11 minutes and 18 seconds of ice time in his second EIHL game. "It's amazing, it definitely is a step up" said the defenseman on a two-way deal with Peterborough Phantoms. Cardiff Devils celebrated a game-winner with 156 seconds to play to beat Guildford Flames at a sold-out Spectrum in Surrey on Sunday night. The game was delayed starting by over an hour due to problems with the ice, but when it did get going was a tight throughout. "It was a big relief for our team, we've been battling for a few weeks to find a win, I think we've been working really hard for it and it was a relief for us to get it no matter who scored the winner," said Jarrod Gourley, who hit the game-winning goal with under three minutes to play. Cardiff opened the scoring just five minutes into the period. A giveaway by the Flames allowed the Devils to rush down the ice with Zach O'Brien slotting past Jake Kupsky with 5:16 played. The Devils probably could have ended the period further ahead, were it not for Kupsky, who kept his side in it. "Cardiff had been struggling lately, and our big thing was to jump on them early. I think we came out slow in the first period," admitted Flames' Daniel Catenacci. "It wasn't easy with the delays, we found some energy in the locker room, but at the end of the day it wasn't enough. The Flames were quicker to start period two, and more energetic. An excellent Ryan Tait pass from behind the net set up Daniel Catenacci for a one-time finish at 25:37 to tie the game. Glasgow Clan broke Nottingham Clan's eight-game winning run by giving the Panthers their first home defeat since late December, a 3-2 victory after a shootout at a sold-out Motorpoint Arena. The game started pretty evenly, but an early powerplay for the Panthers shifted momentum in their direction. Landon Bow saved as Didrik Henbrant didn't get all of his shot, while the Panthers also saw a few pucks whistle just wide. Clan scored a textbook powerplay goal with Jason Grande screened by two players as Simon Despres fed a shot through from the point to open the scoring seven seconds past the midway point of the period. Tim Doherty was sent through on Bow by Davis Bunz but saw his shot saved, although as he went wide, he threw the puck back on net and after a couple of bounced the puck slid across the line to tie the game with 1:10 left in period one. The best chance of the early stages in period two saw a no-look Doherty pass feed captain Sam Herr in front that Bow was equal to. The Panthers were the better team for some 12 minutes of the second, but fell behind to a Reece Kelly shot from the point finding its way through at 34:33. 

ON THEIR ROSTER

In this issue we will do something slightly different and look back on the Devils Continental Cup winning campaign which culminated in them lifting the trophy in January.

The Continental Cup which is the second-level ice hockey tournament for European clubs (behind the Champions Hockey League), began in 1997 after the discontinuation of the European Cup. It was intended for teams from countries without representatives in the European Hockey League, with participating teams chosen by the countries' respective ice hockey associations.



IIHF Federation Cup

The Federation Cup was an official European ice hockey club competition created in 1995. It was the second European competition for club teams, intended for those teams who could not qualify for the European Cup, especially for those from Eastern European countries. It was the direct predecessor of the IIHF Continental Cup, which was played two seasons later. In the first year of competition, 13 Eastern European teams from twelve countries participated in the tournament. In a KO-system with three qualifying groups, which qualifies the four participants in the finals. The following year was played in the same mode. Due to the increased number of participants (some Western European clubs had registered for the competition), an additional qualifying round was introduced.

IIHF Federation Cup

The Federation Cup was an official European ice hockey club competition created in 1995. It was the second European competition for club teams, intended for those teams who could not qualify for the European Cup, especially for those from Eastern European countries. It was the direct predecessor of the IIHF Continental Cup, which was played two seasons later. In the first year of competition, 13 Eastern European teams from twelve countries participated in the tournament. Due to the increased number of participants (some Western European clubs had registered for the competition), an additional qualifying round was introduced. IIIHF Continental Cup

The competition began in season 1997/98 with 42 clubs from 26 countries, which expanded to 48 teams for the next two years. The tournament was played in seeded rounds of qualifying groups. There were three rounds of qualifying groups, with winners of qualifying groups progressing to the next round. The three winners of the third round groups entered the semifinals, along with the host club. The first round was held in September, the second in October, the third in November and the finals in December. In the 2000/01 season, with the European Hockey League on hiatus, the Continental Cup became the de facto European club championship. The format remained the same, with 36 teams from 27 countries. With the beginning of the IIHF European Champions Cup from 2004 to 2005, participants included national champions of countries not in the Super Six (the top six European nations according to the IIHF World Ranking), as well as teams from Super Six leagues, which included HC Dynamo Moscow and HKm Zvolen.

The Cardiff Devils were also in last season's competition after finishing fourth in the EIHL but with the two sides above them, the Guildford Flames and Sheffield Steelers, declining to participate the Welsh side represented the UK. They made it all the way to the Final round which was hosted in Cardiff but finished third after dropping two of their three games with the winners being Nomad Astana from Kazakhstan.

ON THEIR ROSTER

Throughout the season we will pick out a story on a player(s) on the opposition bench as well as summarise their career to date. In this edition we feature forward **Brendan Harms**.

Born in the province of Manitoba, Canada, Brandan turned to ice hockey as a sport. After winning a silver medal at the 2009 Western Canada U16 Challenge Cup, he joined the Portage Terriers, a team playing in the Manitoba Junior League (MJHL). His two seasons in green and yellow were successful. Collectives first of all, as he lifted the Turnbull Cup twice. He also won the ANAVET trophy in 2011. From an individual point of view, he totaled 120 points (50G, 70A) in 101 games, or about 1.07 points per game in his first year, and 1.37 in his second. This allowed him to obtain several awards and a selection for the MJHL All-star Game.

His minor hockey statistics opened the doors for him to receive an offer to join the USHL and Brendan packed his bags and left his native Canada to play for the Fargo Force. He finished second in scoring with 70 points (25G, 45A) in 64 games, three places ahead of Alex Iafallo, who is currently in his 8th season in the NHL having played for the Los Angeles Kings and currently the Winnipeg Jets. Unfortunately, he would fail in the Clark Cup final, after being crowned champion of the Western Conference of the championship. His tenth place finish in the USHL regular season standings got him the attention of NHL teams and he attended the Winnipeg Jets' training camp before he went the NCAA route and played for his four years of university life. Recruited by the Bemidji University State Beavers, he met Matt Prapavessis and Phil Marinaccio who he would hook up with again in France, and scored 21 points (7G, 14A) in his first steps in the University Championship. Over his entire career in green and white, he totaled 88 points in 141 games despite a few injuries, and was awarded an "A" on his jersey for his final season. During these years, he won several individual titles, best rookie and best offensive player, and was also part of the WCHA All-Academic Team three times. After graduating with a degree in business management, he had the chance to play a few games in the ECHL with the Florida Everblades, where he scored his first professional goal in his second game. He the signed with the Utah Grizzlies for the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 seasons. His start to the season was mixed but he doubled down on the second half and managed to climb to seventh place on his team scoring and was then traded to the Greenville Swamp Rabbits shortly after the start of his second year. He remained productive and reached the top 4 of his team's top scorers in this second professional season. In 2019, several options are available to him, but his thoughts were turning to Europe. After a brief stint with the Cincinnati Cyclones, he made contact with Stephan Vigier, a long-time friend, and headed to Norway and joined Lillehammer with whom he would face some of his former university colleagues. With 33 points in his first incomplete season, he reached first place on his team and sixth in the league in the points per game ranking. He then left Norway for Denmark and SønderjyskE Ishockey, alongside Matt Prapavessis. Second best scorer of his team tied with Cameron Brown, he lost in the playoffs, but still received a contract extension offer that he refused in order to sign with the Rødovre Mighty Bulls, wishing to try something else. He was then traded to Sønderjyske where he made a thunderous comeback at more than a point per game. Without a team at the very beginning of the 2022/23 season, and in order to strengthen the Angers attack, Harms was recruited by the Dukes where he spent a season in Ligue Magnus before joining the Dundee Stars for the last two seasons.

The following interview was conducted in 2022 as he joined his new team in France.

Could you introduce yourself?

I was born and raised in Steinbach, Manitoba. My parents are both from that province and still live there today. I have a brother who is four years older than me, he is married and has two young boys. I have a girlfriend who works there and comes to visit me when she can. I am very fortunate to have a great family and support that means a lot to me.

How did you start in hockey, what made you want to get into it, and what made you decide to make it your profession?

I started playing hockey at a young age. Skating started when I was about 3 years old and I was playing

Friday 15th November - DEVILS 5 - 1 RITTNER BUAM

The Devils opened their Continental Cup campaign with a comfortable win over Rittner Baum on Friday afternoon. Ben Bowns got the start in goal for the Devils and Colin Furlong was in net for the Italian side. The Devils dominated the play in the opening period but took until 8:02 to open the scoring through Gleason Fournier. His shot sailed through traffic in front of the net past Furlong to make it 1-0 at 8:02. Just 33 seconds later, Joey Martin set up Josh MacDonald who beat Furlong high on the glove side to double the lead. The Devils ended the period holding onto their 2-0 lead, but Rittner puled a goal back midway through the second period when Ethan Szypula scored on a two on one rush at 29:40. On that play, Bowns stretched to make the save and injured himself in the process, leaving the ice with Mac Carruth replacing him for the remainder of the game. Reid Duke scored on the powerplay at 33:18 after Fournier's shot was deflected right onto Duke's stick and he beat Furlong to make it 3-1 for the Devils. Cody Donaghey extended the lead at 37:40 when his shot from the blueline fooled Furlong and made it 4-1 for the Devils. The Devils added a fifth goal at 45:22 when MacDonald set up Joey Martin on a two on one play to make it 5-1 with just under 15 minutes to play. Rittner had a couple of powerplay chances in the final 12 minutes of play but the Devils' penalty killing was on point and any good scoring chance was smothered by Carruth who stopped all 15 shots he faced. Joey Martin scored a goal and assisted on two others, while Josh MacDonald and Gleason Fournier both had a goal and an assist in the 5-1 win.



Saturday 16th November DEVILS 4 -1 ZILINA

The Devils officially qualified for the Continental Cup Final in January after winning on Saturday night against their Slovakian hosts, Vlci Zilina. The Devils started with Mac Carruth in net, but he was replaced near the end of the second period by Ben Bowns after Carruth was injured on Zilina's only goal. The Devils opened the scoring on the powerplay 18:27 into the game when Kohen Olischefski tipped in a shot from Cole Sanford. Zach O'Brien's wrist shot snuck through the pads of Connor Lacouvee at 29:52 to put the Devils up 2-0. A bad bounce off the glass ended Carruth's night and got the hosts back in the game when a deflected puck bounced onto the stick of Simon Betak at the side of the wide open net to make it 2-1. Carruth was following the puck as it was rung around the boards, but when it bounced out, he dove back to make the save and looked like he injured himself on the play at 36:50. Bowns came in to finish the period while Carruth was helped off the ice. At 43:24, Ben Davies scored the nicest goal of the game when he walked around a defender and fired the puck past Lacouvee to make it 3-1. Four minutes later, a deflected puck landed on the stick of Josh MacDonald who beat Lacouvee for the final goal of the game to make it 4-1 for the Devils. The win saw the Devils go through to the Final of the Continental Cup in January 2025.



Sunday 17th November - DEVILS 3 - 6 HC ARLAN

The Devils lost their final game of the Continental Cup Third Round in Slovakia on Sunday afternoon to Kazakhstan side HC Arlan. With two wins from their first two games, the Devils had already qualified for the Final in January. Maksym Dubé was called upon to start in goal for the Devils and he performed well in his first start with the club. The Devils struck first through Josh MacDonald at 12:13 of the first period, but Arlan came straight back to tie the game at 13:32 when Fedor Khoroshev scored with the Devils on a 5 on 3 penalty kill after Tyler Busch and Andrew MacWilliam were both called for minor penalties on the same play. Zach O'Brien put the Devils in front with a powerplay goal at 22:17 after he corralled a poor clearing attempt by the Arlan defender. At 26:15, Evan Mosey's shot from the blueline through traffic beat Sergei Kudryavtsev to give the Devils a 3-1 lead. Midway through the period with the Devils on the penalty kill again, the Arlan powerplay pulled a goal back when Vladimir Borovkov beat Dubé to make it 3-2. Before the second period was done, Arlan tied the game up when Vladislav Nikulin's shot found its way into the back of the net, making it 3-3, which is how the period ended. The Devils penalty killers were called upon twice in the third period when Tyler Busch and Ryan Barrow were both handed minor penalties, but Arlan failed to capitalise with the man advantage. The game looked destined for overtime, but with just over 2 minutes to play Stepan Sannikov picked up a loose puck and fired it over the shoulder of Dubé to give them a 4-3 lead with 2:03 left in the game. The game fell apart in the final two minutes with three Devils players getting ejected and Arlan scoring two late powerplay goals to end the game 6-3.



Cardiff Devils were now aiming to win their first ever IIHF Continental Cup when the final round began on home ice at the Vindico Arena. The 2025 event saw a reduced field after Kazakh side HC Arlan withdrew following issues in obtaining visas for players. That left the Devils to face GKS Katowice (Poland) and the Brûleurs de Loups of Grenoble (France) in order to win the trophy. Only the Nottingham Panthers from the Elite League had ever won the Continental Cup. Cardiff began their campaign against Katowice on Thursday night. The Poles were on a five-game winning streak in their own league and overcame a group containing Grenoble, Aalborg and Brasov in the previous round. In the Polish championship, Katowice found themselves second behind rivals Tychy coming into the competition, two points behind but having played a pair of games more.

Friday 17th January - DEVILS 6 - 3 GKS KATOWICE

The Cardiff Devils opened the Continental Cup Final with a dominating win over Polish side GKS Katowice on Thursday night. Cheered on by a very loud home crowd competing with impressive travelling support for Katowice, the atmosphere inside Vindico Arena was electric from the opening face-off. Mac Carruth got the start in goal for the Devils while Polish International netminder John Murray was in net for GKS. The Devils dominated the opening period but could not find a way past Murray despite firing 18 shots on goal compared to just 8 on the Devils' net. A late hooking call on Josh Batch meant a powerplay for Katowice that finished the first period and carried over to the start of the second. The Devils killed off the penalty but just as Batch returned to the ice, Patryk Wronka made a great pass from behind the net to Jean Dupuy who beat Carruth with a shot over his shoulder to make it 1-0 just 40 seconds into the period. After that, the period belonged to the Devils who scored 5 straight goals to take a commanding lead into the second intermission. First Joey Martin broke up a breakout attempt by Katowice and set up Josh MacDonald to beat Murray and tie the game at 24:00. Then some excellent forechecking by Sam Duggan saw the Katowice defender cough up the puck right to Reid Duke who patiently outwaited a sprawling Murray before shooting into a near open net to put the Devils in front at 29:32. The Devils' powerplay made it 3-1 when Codey Donaghey found Zach O'Brien at the side of the net, and he tapped it out front to Brett Perlini for a one-timer that beat Murray along the ice at 33:07. Just over a minute later, O'Brien tipped in a shot from the blueline by Mark Richardson to make it 4-1 at 34:18. Then with just 1:14 to play in the period, Cole Sanford tipped in a shot from Gleason Fournier to make it 5-1 at the end of 40 minutes of play. Katowice pulled a goal back on the powerplay through Bartosz Frazsko with Bayley Harewood sitting for tripping at 49:30. The Devils responded with another powerplay goal of their own when O'Brien scored his second of the game, tipping in a shot from Duke at 53:01 to put the Devils in front 6-2 with 7 minutes left to play. At 55:23, Fraszko scored his second goal of the game to make it 6-3, which is how the game ended. The second period was the obvious difference with the Devils showing just what they are capable of. After that, they were in cruise control to see out the game and get ready for Sunday's class with French side Bruleurs de Loups from Grenoble. The Devils knew that a win on Sunday would see them lift the Continental Cup.



Sunday 19th January - DEVILS 6 - 1 BRÛLEURS DE LOUPS

The Devils became only the second British team ever to win the IIHF Continental Cup, beating Grenoble 6-1 at Vindico Arena to take the prize with an unbeaten record in the final round. Tyler Busch opened the scoring for the Devils 5:17 into the first period when he finished off a goal mouth pass from Kohen Olischefski. The Devils had the perfect chance to extend their lead when they had a 5 on 3 powerplay midway through the period but failed to score with the two-man advantage. Grenoble struck back with less than 4 minutes remaining in the period through Aurelien Dair who made it 1-1 at 16:13 on the powerplay with Andrew MacWilliam in the box for interference. The period ended all tied up despite the Devils outshooting Grenoble 12-6 after 20 minutes. The second period belonged to Cardiff as they outskated, out hit and outscored Grenoble, ending the period with a 4-goal lead. First it was Brett Perlini who was sprung on a breakaway by Olischefski to beat Matija Pintaric in goal for Grenoble at 23:46 to give the Devils the 2-1 lead. At 30:51, Perlini scored again, banging home a rebound after Bayley Harewood was stopped by Pintaric on a breakaway. Josh MacDonald took a pass from Zach O'Brien on the powerplay to make it 4-1 at 37:44, then Cole Sanford scored on a breakaway with 1:15 left in the period to give the Devils a 5-1 lead after 40 minutes of play. The Devils only allowed 4 shots on goal the entire period and peppered Grenoble with 14 shots, scoring 4 times. The final period saw the Devils control the majority of play and see out the game in style. Grenoble pulled their netminder early to try and find a way past Carruth, but the last goal of the game came from Perlini for his hat-trick after O'Brien broke up the play and turned up the ice to find Perlini to make it 6-1. The celebrations began with the final buzzer and lasted for a long time on the ice as the Devils celebrated their first championship under Head Coach Pete Russell.

WE DON'T PLAY YOU ANYMORE: NORTHERN STARS

Flyers' history of games against the club named Northern Stars was a very short one. Stars were essentially the team that played for a number of seasons as Newcastle ENL Vipers. In 2010/11 they competed with Flyers in the Northern League. In this one season, Flyers played Stars on five occasions before joining the Elite League for 2011/12 season. Stars merged with Billingham Bombers prior to 11/12 and played as Billingham Stars.

The first of the five matches between the two clubs was in a pre-season tournament held at Stars' home rink, Newcastle Arena. This was to be Flyers' only defeat to Stars, a 1-3 loss in the group stages on 28/08/10 with Steven Lynch netting Flyers' only goal. In the other games in the tournament Flyers defeated Sheffield Spartans 5-3 and Bradford Bulldogs 9-0 in Flyers' only game ever against the West Yorkshire club, who withdrew from the Northern League prior to the season kicking off.

The first meeting of the regular season between Flyers and Stars was a feisty one to say the least with 156 minutes in penalties handed out at the Newcastle Arena, including Match Penalties to Josh Scoon and Steven McAlpine for clipping and checking to the head respectively. The first period was scoreless, but Flyers took control in the second with two goals in just over two minutes from Lynch and Stephen Gunn. As in the first period, the penalty box was a busy place. With Flyers killing a 3 on 5 penalty, Lynch broke away to complete the scoring. The third period was also scoreless but the penalty timekeepers were kept from wearying, including the two Match Penalties.

In a one-sided affair six weeks later on 31/10/10 Flyers were four goals ahead in three minutes through Chris Wands, Scoon (2) and a first Flyers goal for Callum Adamson. Flyers fell foul of referee Alan Craig in the first period, but Andy Samuel made it 5-0, shortly after returning to full strength. The only goal of the second came from defenceman Aaron Greger and in the first minute of the third Lynch made it seven before Stars broke the shut-out. Greger netted his second and Jamie Wilson finished the scoring in a straight forward 9-1 victory.


By the next time the two sides met on 29/01/11, a Stars game played at Kirkcaldy, Flyers were on a 14 game unbeaten league run and Stars were dispatched with ease 6-3. Samuel and Gunn both scored twice, while McAlpine and Wilson got singles.





In the last ever game between the two clubs on 19/02/11, Flyers were 1-2 behind after 20 minutes, despite Samuel opening the scoring. It appears that Stars awakened Flyers by taking the lead and were punished as Flyers looked to be scoring at will to win 10-2 and put themselves in sight of winning the Northern League title. Gunn helped himself to a hat-trick, Wilson scored twice and Wands, McAlpine, Daryl Venters and Tommy Muir got a goal apiece. Once more the penalty box was a busy place, McAlpine taking 16 minutes for fighting and Chad Reekie being thrown out of the game on a 5+ Game penalty for scrapping at the final whistle.

The following season Flyers moved to the Elite League and Northern Stars were no more, so it is unlikely that these two clubs will ever meet again.

Fife Flyers have protested to the British Ice Hockey Association after being asked to bring forward the face-off time of last Saturday's match against Cleveland Bombers to allow television coverage. The BIHA got in touch with Flyers at 2 p.m. last Thursday requesting that they travel to Cleveland for a 1.15 p.m. face-off instead of the regular starting time of 6.30 p.m. — and demanding an answer within an hour. Flyers would not have received any fee for appearing on TV — that goes to the BIHA — and the spokesman added: ""We looked at every possible option, and much as we would have liked the television exposure, it could not be done." This was to enable the match to be televised on the BBC's "Grandstand" programme, but at such short notice Flyers were unable to make alternative arrangements. A spokesman for Kirkcaldy Ice Hockey Club commented: "We estimated it would have cost us about £I500 to change our plans, and it was just not feasible. "Some of the players who work shifts would have had to travel without getting any sleep, and we had 90 supporters coming with us who could not all be contacted. "We could not have left without these supporters, and it would not have been in the team's best interests to have an early face-off." The Kirkcaldy club were further angered when a prepared statement was read over the public address system at the Cleveland rink to the effect that Flyers had refused to consider an earlier face-off. Flyers have now written to the BIHA pointing out that every possible step was taken to accommodate their request, but they were unable to do so in the circumstances. Meanwhile, Kirkcaldy's representation in the Great Britain squad for the World Under-20 Championships this weekend has been increased to seven. Following the withdrawal of all 'Murrayfield players, Blair Page (19), Dean Edmiston (15 15-year-olds Bobby Richard Phillips and Taylor were all drafted, the squad which left for Belgium yesterday They join Gordon Goodsir and Craig Dickson in the British side which is managed by Flyers' boss Haig. After taking full points from last week's trip south of the border, Flyers face in-form Ayr Bruins at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink tomorrow night in their only match this weekend. And the Kirkcaldy side will be out for revenge after crashing 8-2 to Bruins two weeks ago. "We have a point to prove after that defeat," commented player-coach Ron Plumb, "but the match will only be as difficult as we allow it to be."

23/02/1985 Fife Flyers v Ayr Bruins Premier League

Ayr Bruins' run of eight games without defeat was brought to an abrupt halt on Saturday night as Fife Flyers took full revenge for their recent 8-2 thrashing in Ayr. Yet during the first period it seemed Flyers unbeaten home record might be in danger as Bruins lead by two goals. However, the visitors' depleted squad could not keep up as Flyers increased the pace and eventually finished comfortable winners. Dave Stoyanovich — chasing Roy Halpin's record 128 goals in league and cup — hit the target five times to emphasise his return to top form. Netminder Andrew Donald had a shaky first period, but went on to redeem himself with several fine stops. Much of the credit for Ayr's resurgence has gone to Canadian defenceman Steve Slaughter, and it was he who opened the scoring in the second minute with a tremendous long range shot which left Donald rooted to the spot. And two minutes later Donald was beaten again as Ayr's player-coach Paul Bedard skated forward from defence before firing the puck low into the corner. It took a typical goal by Ron Plumb just 30 seconds later to open Flyers' account, and although Gordon Latto had a goal disallowed for kicking the puck into the net, Dave Stoyanovich made it 2-2 after 10 minutes with a close range effort. Straight from the faceoff, however, Bruins went back in front when Donald seemed content to allow a Bedard shot to go wide, and Kidd coming in on the blind side had a simple task to score. Flyers again found themselves trailing by two goals when Slaughter netted a power play goal with Plumb in the penalty box, but they pulled back to 4-3 in the 17th minute when 'Stoyanovich blocked a shot in his own end and raced up the ice to score. The Kirkcaldy side made it all square two minutes into the second period when Gordon Latto got on the end of a Chic Cottrell pass, and they went ahead for the first time in the match three minutes later when Stoyanovich flicked the puck high into the net for his hat-trick. Stoyanovich then converted a Plumb pass to make it 6-4, but Ayr struck back with a goal by Bedard. However, a mistake by the Bruins' netminder allowed Andy Linton to stretch the home lead, and with 45 seconds of the period remaining, Jimmy Pennycook coolly rounded the keeper before slotting the puck into the empty net. It was Pennycook who scored Flyers' ninth with a power play goal eight minutes into the final period, and 30 seconds later Stoyanovich brought up his nap hand and put Period scores: 3-4, 5-1, 3-0 the home side into double figures. With the points sewn up, Dougie Latto set the seal on a fine performance by Flyers seven minutes from time with he stroked the puck past the helpless netminder to send another huge crowd home happy.

All tickets will be £25 and booking fees will apply for online purchases.


