


MATCH REPORT



The Flyers made their first trip of the season on league business to Belfast. Returning to the Fife line up was Jonas Emmerdahl wearing number 18 who replaced Noah Delmas after his move to Injured Reserve following confirmation of a season ending injury. Brodie Kay and Aiden Wilson were also out injured but Kieran Craig was back in the lineup. The Giants who hold a commanding lead at the top of the standings were without long term injury victim Joe Cassetti as well as scratches Bobo Carpenter, Grant Mismash and Karl Boudrias.

The home side opened the scoring inside 90 seconds as they dominated the puck in the Flyers end and Jordan Kawaguchi found Captain Mark Cooper with a no look back hand pass and he had a lot of net to shoot at to give the Giants the lead. The Flyers responded well and Lucas Chiodo broke into the zone in the 3rd minute to feed Michael Cichy who saw his shot from around the circles flash just wide of the net. The Flyers regained the puck with Tyler Heidt gaining the zone before dropping the puck for Kieran Craig who went cross ice with his pass and Massimo Carozza skated in to fire a shot that found a gap five hole on Tom McCollum. A minute later and the Flyers almost had the lead as Phélix Martineau forced a turnover in the Giants zone and the puck went to Cichy who found Chiodo who rang a shot off the post. The Giants went the other way and Owen made a good save before the rebound also struck metal. Pierre-Olivier Morin almost captitalised on a loose puck but Owen made a block as the opening 7 minutes saw a wide open game with both sides creating lots of chances. In the 8th minute Martineau set up Cichy for a one timer that had McCollum scrambling and a minute later Cameron Pound had two chances from close range but fired the puck high over the net on both occasions. On almost the halfway mark of the period JJ Piccinich picked the puck up in his own zone and skated deep into the Flyers end before cutting across the ice and went against the grain with his shot which found the corner of the net on the stick side of Owen. The Giants really started to dominate possession at this stage and in the 12th minute Kyle Osterberg had a big one time blast from above the circles swallowed by Owen. In the 13th minute Scott Conway was the trailing player in Giants breakout but he fired wide of the net from the slot. David Goodwin on the follow up was denied and finally Owen got a stop in play as he held on to a Piccinich effort. Owen made a kick save on Pound in the 15th minute. The Flyers had a chance in the 17th minute when Ben Brown stepped in off the half boards and McCollum was at full stretch to glove his back hand effort. The Giants increased their lead in the 18th minute when Cooper took the puck to the net passed to Elijiah Barriga who whiffed on his shot which froze Owen and the puck slithered to Morin who found the net.

PERIOD 2

The Giants put the game to bed in the opening minutes of the second period. They added a fourth goal 23 seconds in when Gabe Bast found space for himself in the slot and his shot squeaked through Owen. 17 seconds later the Giants scored again as the home side passed the puck around smartly and Kawaguchi skated in from the bottom of the left circle and roofed the puck over the shoulder of Owen.

In the 24th minute it was the home side again who were just too crisp for the visiting defence with their puck control and Kawaguchi again on the left side had space this time to fire low past Owen. The Flyers cause wasn't helped in the 26th minute when Charles-Antoine Paiement left the game favouring his leg and he would not return. The Giants went on the first power play of the night in the 26th minute when Emmerdahl got the gate for cross checking. A Bast wrister was turned away by Owen who then blocked a Morin one timer and with the penalty time almost elapsed Barriga tried a through the legs effort that was thwarted as the Flyers completed the kill. Back at full strength for less than a minute the Flyers went short handed again as Austin Farley was called for a trip on Ben Lake who had broken through into the Flyers zone. The Flyers once again did a good job on the kill and Giants didn't get any really clear looks at goal as the visitors once again returned to even strength without any further damage on the scoreboard. The Flyers first shot of the period came in the 38th minute when McCollum made a solid stop on Martineau and moments later the Giants keeper again had to look sharp as Heidt carried the puck into the zone and from an angle got a shot away that had to be stopped.

PERIOD 3

The Giants were quick of the mark in the third period when they added another one in the opening minute. Piccinich couldn't get his shot away in the slot but he slipped the puck behind him to Scott Conway who had a lot of net to shoot at with Owen trying in vain to get across his goal. In the 42nd minute Patrick Kyte played goalie as he blocked a shot on the line but Kieran Craig was called for a hook on the play that sent the Giants back onto the power play. It was another solid kill for the Flyers as they returned to full strength without the Giants creating any quality scoring chances. In the 44th minute Jeff Baum tried to go short side on Owen who shut him down. A minute later and the Flyers keeper got a piece of a shot by Goodwin and as the puck spun up into the air it was scrambled clear of the net. The Flyers went on their only power play of the game in the 50th minute as Ciaran Long sat for a cross check. A shot from Olivier LeBlanc from the high slot was tracked by McCollum who made a fine shoulder save and just as the time was expiring the Belfast keeper made another save this time to deny Kyte. The home side returned to the power play in the 55th minute when Kyte was called for a cross check on Barriga and this time the Giants made their advantage count. A shot from Morin forced a pad save from Owen but the rebound fell kindly for Kawaguchi to bag his hattrick into a gaping net. Flyers had the last chance of the game when McCollum made routine save on a shot from distance by Daniel Krenželok.



MATCH REPORT



The Flyers welcomed Cardiff to Kirkcaldy for their second visit of the season. The home side scratched Charles-Antoine Paiement, Aiden Wilson, Ben Brown and Cameron Kenny with James Spence and Joe Lynch added to their lineup. The Devils who have endured a well publicised injury crisis were without Ben Davies, Brett Perlini, Duke Reid, Riley Brandt, Jarrod Gourley and Hunter Shinkaruk.

The opening spell of the game saw neither side create any clear cut chances but with 2 minutes exactly on the clock Evan Mosey played a cross ice pass from the point to Joey Martin who was positioned down low at the back post and he roofed the puck from an angle over Shane Owen. A minute later Owen did well to stop a close in effort from Gleason Fournier. The Flyers responded in the 4th minute when Austin Farley combined with Kieran Craig who saw his one timer kicked away by Ben Bowns. A minute later and the Flyers went close again when Lucas Chiodo stole in at the back post but couldn't quite direct the puck on net. Phélix Martineau and Craig combined in the 7th minute and from close in Craig just failed to get a touch on the puck as it flashed just past the post. Moments later however the Devils doubled their lead when a Cody Donaghey shot rebounded off the pads of Owen and fell nicely for Bradley Schoonbaert who had the easy task of finding the wide open net. Massimo Carozza then fired just wide in the 9th minute from the slot. In the 12th minute the Devils went on the first man advantage of the night when Olivier LeBlanc was called for boarding. Jonas Emmerdahl made a big shot block on Josh MacDonald before Owen made a fine pad save on Cole Sanford as the Flyers completed the kill and returned to even strength. In the 15th minute the Devils took a decisive three goal lead when Mosey cruised down from the circles and his shot found a space under the pad of Owen.

PERIOD 2

The second period opened with Owen making double save in the first minute when he denied Tyler Busch with a couple of full stretch leg saves. The Devils were adopting a shoot on sight policy with a lot of their efforts coming from the perimeter but it kept Owen busy on the opening minutes of the period. The Flyers were gradually starting to get more zone time in the Devils end of the ice and Bowns made a terrific pad save on Chiodo in the 28th minute as the Flyers enjoyed a dominant shift around the visitors net. At the other end a minute later Owen denied Zach O'Brien with a pad save. The Devils almost added another in the 31st minute but Busch saw his effort sit against the post after Owen got a piece of it and the Fife keeper flopped on the puck to get the stoppage in play.

The Flyers went on the power play in the 34th minute when Schoobaert was called for a trip on Daniel Krenželok. The Devils kill was effective however with the Flyers failing to get anything set up around Bowns net. The home side reduced the deficit in the 38th minute when Krenželok who had taken some shifts on the wing burst through the centre of the Devils defence and his shot stick side on Bowns found the side of the net. In the 39th minute Sanford was shut down by Owen but before the buzzer the visitors regained their three goal cushion when Kohen Olischefski went to the net and stick handled the puck around Owen to slide it home. In the dying seconds there was a coming together between Martineau and Donaghey on the edge of the Flyers crease with both receiving double minors for roughing and the Devils player getting an extra 2 minutes for a cross check.

PERIOD 3

The Flyers power play to start the third saw a drive from Chiodo turned away by Bowns as the Devils completed the kill. Owen flashed the leather to glove a shot to the top corner by Martin in the 43rd minute. He was beaten however on the next shift when Sanford went top shelf over his stick to add another for the Devils. The Flyers responded with a goal in the 47th minute when Krenželok fired the puck from the blueline and Carozza net front got a tip on it to beat Bowns. In the 49th minute Bowns made an instinctive save as a cross crease pass by Emmerdahl intended for Joe Lynch struck a skate an almost snuck past the Devils netminder. In the 51st minute Carozza was given the gate for an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty after disputing a non-call. Owen went post to post to stop Olischefski but the Flyers again came up with another solid kill. Bowns made a blocker save in the 54th minute on a Krenželok drive from the blue line. In the 55th minute Martin was penalised for a hook as the Flyers returned to the power play. Craig went close with a scramble around the net and Mark Richardson sacrificed his body twice to make big shot blocks as the Devils returned to full strength. The Devils added another in the final minute when Mosey picked up the puck in the circle and his snapshot found the corner of the net on Owen's glove side.

WEEK 24 - FLYERS STATS RECAP

On Friday night.....

Belfast Giants 8 Fife Flyers 1 - Elite League

The 61 Giants shots is the most that the Flyers have conceded in a game this season and the most since 62 against Stars in April 2024.

The Giants 28 shots in the first period was most given up by the Flyers this season in any 20 minutes.

Flyers had 2 second period shots which equalled their season low for any 20 minutes.

Flyers game total of 12 shots is the fewest this season and the fewest in the last 31 games against Giants since they were held to 10 in October 21.

Jordan Kawaguchi became the 10th Giants player to record a hat trick against the Flyers in all EIHL competitions. This now equals the Clans total as the most by a single team against the Flyers.

Massimo Carozza now has goals in each of the last three games against the Giants.

The game had 37 face offs which is the lowest total in a Flyers game this season.

Fife Flyers 2 Cardiff Devils 6 - Elite League

The Devils made if four wins from four against the Flyers this season who have been outscored 9-21 in those games.

Michael Cichy became the fourth Flyers player this season to register 100 plus shots on goal.

Michael Cichy and Massimo Carozza are now tied for the team best shots to goals ratio at 17 percent.

The Flyers have an 84.62 percent penalty kill success against the Devils which is second highest against all teams – 90.91 percent against is Sheffield is best.

The Flyers power play drought is now 4 games, their season high without a PPG is six games.

The Flyers have now conceded 202 league goals which was the season total last term.

The Flyers last met the Steelers in mid-January. The following weekend the Sheffield travelled to Glasgow and won 3-1 before heading over the Irish Sea for a meeting with the Giants the following night which the home team won 4-2. The Steelers returned home the following Saturday when they defeated the Manchester Storm before travelling to meet the Guildford Flames who inflicted the Yorkshire team's heaviest defeat so far of the season when they lost 6-2 at the Spectrum. Into February and the Steelers won 5-2 in Glasgow before shutting out the Cardiff Devils 3-0 at the Utilita Arena in what was a dress rehearsal for the teams meeting in one of the Challenge Cup Semi-finals. Number Crunching

The Flyers won on their last visit to Planet Ice Altrincham and will be looking to equal their best winning sequence of 2 games on Storm's home ice which has been achieved twice before in 2016 and 2022. Loren Ulett is the Storm's top scorer against the Flyers this season with 5 goals whilst Phélix Martineau leads the way for the Flyers in these games with 4 goals.

9 different Storm players have found the net against the Flyers this season with 9 different Flyers also finding the net in the four games played so far.

Including shootout goals the teams are tied with 180 goals in their meetings across all EIHL competitions and both teams have also had 76 different scorers in these games.

The Flyers and Storm are the only teams yet to record a shutout this season.

Cardiff Devils 4 Sheffield Steelers 1 Challenge Cup

Cardiff Devils advanced to their first Challenge Cup Final since 2022 after overcoming a two-goal deficit to beat Sheffield Steelers in the Semi-Finals. The Devils won the second leg 4-1 at a sold-out Vindico Arena to advance 7-6 on aggregate. The opening period went about as well as the Devils would have been hoping, and probably almost the worst-case scenario for the Devils. Off a defensive zone faceoff, the Steelers turned the puck over on the Devils' blue line straight to Cole Sanford who raced away to beat Matt Greenfield with 13:55 played. A minute before the end of the opening period, a speculative throw at the net from Josh MacDonald went all the way through and past Greenfield to tie the game - Joey Martin ducking out of the way at a crucial moment in front of the net. All square on aggregate through 20 minutes. Sheffield pushed back in period two, but a little against the run of play found themselves down on aggregate. Zach O'Brien took one touch in the slot and fired a shot past Greenfield who was screened again at 30:45 to put the Devils three ahead - and one up on aggregate. The Steelers had two chances to get back into the game with the Devils taking a pair of minors before the period was out - Marc-Olivier Vallerand miss-controlling while unmarked at the far post the best of their chances. Sanford took an early high-sticking minor in period three, but the Steelers' powerplay came up short a third time. Just as the Devils had got back to full strength, Josh Batch threw the puck into the slot from below the goal line for captain Joey Martin to fire home backhanded and put the Devils two ahead on aggregate with 42:52 on the clock. Everything seemed to be going the Devils' way, but a poor Gleason Fournier clearance landed straight on the stick of Mitchell Balmas to fire past Carruth and bring the Steelers back to within one at 47:25. Balmas had probably the Steelers' best chance to tie things up, but couldn't take the puck first time when otherwise doing so would have been a certain goal. Greenfield was pulled with 1:47 to play as the Steelers pushed hard, the Devils just trying to freeze the puck along the boards in their own zone. With 24 seconds to play, Dominic Cormier stepped across Sanford as he tried to exit the zone and was called for roughing. Greenfield left the net as soon as the Steelers won the faceoff, but time ran out on the visitors who went down 7-6 on aggregate having led 5-3 after 60 of the 120 minutes.

Belfast Giants 3 Nottingham Panthers 0 Challenge Cup

Belfast Giants will take a three-goal lead to Nottingham in the second leg of their Challenge Cup Semi-Final after a shutout win against the Panthers at a sold out SSE Arena on Wednesday night. "I thought we were really good tonight," began Giants captain Mark Cooper, who scored his side's opening goal. "We knew they would push. They're a great team and we were able to keep them pretty quiet and defend hard, then take our chances when we had them and get a three-goal lead going into the second leg. Guildford Flames 2 Sheffield Steelers 5 Elite League

Sheffield Steelers scored four goals in the final period to beat Guildford Flames 5-2 at a sold-out Spectrum, twice coming from behind en route to victory. "I think we deserved to win that game. Kupsky was pulled with 2:15 to play, but Daniel Leavens' empty-netter settled the game with 97 seconds to go. "When we lose a defenseman like that, which was unfortunate because Charlie is a big part of our d-core, the five of us just have to step up, We have to take quicker shifts and make sure we think defense first," added Brown. "Sheffield defend very well. If you don't score they're very good in transition and will turn it around very quickly. You can't give them anything or they'll punish you for your mistakes."



ON THEIR ROSTER

Simon Després has had a distinguished career in terms of players to have played in the EIHL. Over 200 NHL games along with over 100 in the DEL is a mark of his pedigree and it would take more than we have space for to detail his entire career so far. In this article we will look back on an 18 year Després as he headed into the NHL draft of 2009 at the Bell Centre in Montreal.

NHL.com had two quotes in their scouting report that both excited and concerned the reader about Despres ahead of the draft:

NHL Central Scouting's Chris Bordeleau

"I think for a potential pro player, he's got the size and mobility. I've seen him [in] many games, and he never seems to make a bad play. He's never going to get 100 points, but definitely, when you want a guy to play defense, he's your guy. He does it all, he'll block shots and he moves the puck at the right time."

Saint John Sea Dogs head coach Jacques Beaulieu

"Simon is a very good skater with and without the puck. He has good hands for a big man and he has outstanding vision as well as hockey sense. To make it to the next level he will need to improve his upper body strength and his shot, but overall Simon is an outstanding person on and off the ice. He loves the game. He is without a doubt an NHL prospect."

While there was some serious praise in these comments, going a long way in explaining why some were thinking he'd go early in the first round: he was big, a good skater (a still somewhat rare combination), he was apparently very good in his own zone, and willing to do whatever it took for success. All good stuff so far. That said, it wasn't all golden for Després. Chris Bordeleau of Central Scouting, the organization high on Després , came right out and said he's not a scorer, though one would have to be really, really good on defense to justify the ranking. His coach's words were more telling. He was 6'4", 212 pounds and Beaulieu thought he needed to get stronger? His numbers at Saint John were evidence that offense was an area of improvement. But how much stronger could Després get?

Some of these assets - and areas to improve - were highlighted further in Kevin Forbes' feature article on Després at Hockey's Future. The following section helped explain why Beaulieu stated that Després needed to get stronger:

"Despite all these pieces, the puzzle that is Després is far from complete. Although he has such tantalizing size, Després is not known for his physical play. As Kim Houston of Central Scouting described, "sometimes I think he plays a little soft, in the middle of the zone, maybe he doesn't feel he has to have that physical element, but he's going to find out at the next level, he's got to be a little bit more physical, especially in his own end." Sea Dogs assistant coach Jim Midgley attributed Després' preference to tie up opposing forwards instead of punishing them with his frame to his physical growth and his young age, saying "when his strength catches up to his body, he'll be fine." Naathan White reported on Després' performance at the CHL Top Prospects game said: "Working on his hitting is one of the next steps Després needs to take in his development, said one NHL scout who attended the propects game. "We'd like to see a little more physical (play) from him, especially when it comes to finishing his check in the last three or four feet," the scout said. "Let people know that they're going to be punished. When Dion Phaneuf is finishing his check or Zdeno Chara finishes his check, he finishes his check. The quality guys finish their check the last three or four feet." While Després' combination of skating and size have vaulted him up the scouting lists, the scout would also like to see him work on his shot. "He's got an average shot, which needs to get much better because he's got a lot of tools. He has good vision, he's a good skater, he makes good plays with the puck and he contains pretty well one-on-one."



In Montreal the Pittsburgh Penguins took Simon with their 1st round pick (30th overall) and that was regarded by some as the steal of the 2009 draft. One Penguins source indicated that the Penguins had Després rated among the top 15 prospects on their board. The 18 year old defenseman appeared to have fallen into the Penguins lap with the No. 30 selection in the 2009 entry draft and the Penguins hoped they would have another cornerstone defenseman among their core. Clearly the Penguins No. 1 prospect in their system, Després caught the eye of many during the Penguins prospect camp the previous July. After a slow start, Després established himself as the best defenseman on the ice near the end of the camp, along with 2006 second round pick Carl Sneep. Després at the time was 17 and Sneep was 22. Després continued to earn rave reviews after an impressive showing in training camp in September with the Penguins. A knock on Després by some scouts last year leading up to the draft was consistency and based on his physical skills, some felt that he should have been dominating games on a more consistent basis. Going into his third season (2009-2010) with the Saint John Sea Dogs of the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League, Després proved his critics wrong and is quickly developing into an NHL ready defenseman that was on the fast track to the NHL. Després had a strong regular season, scoring 9 goals and 38 assists for 47 points, including an impressive plus-26 rating in 63 games. Després' play in the playoffs was been even better and was characterized as dominant by a number of scouts. In just 18 games played, Després had 2 goals and 17 assists for 19 points. Després also has a team high plus-16 in the playoffs. By comparison, Després was a minus-5 in four playoff games last spring. Exceptional numbers for a young defenseman in the best Junior-A league in hockey. The 18 year old defenseman had made tremendous strides in his development and has drawn great praise from Saint John assistant coach Marc Hussey. Hussey who was the Penguins second round pick in 1992, said the following on Després; "Highly skilled player and has made "huge improvement" this season, " Hussey said. Biggest Strength: "Anticipation"....."He reads the play extremely well, "Hussey said. "See's the play before it happens," he added. What caught people's attention during that interview was how Hussey talked very highly of how Després strived to get better by putting the extra work in after practices and indicating that he's a highly motivated player to get better. Marc said that Després had taking the initiative to develop his shot, which many thought was a clear weakness of his game during Penguins training camp. "He's taking the initiative, working after practice on his shot and the results show that the extra work has paid off." Hussey said. Després had a 7 goal improvement in 2009-2010. Marc added that he in particular had spent a lot of time with Després working with him after practice on a number of areas including his shot. Could the 18 year old push for a roster spot in the NHL next season? Hussey said not to rule it out and believed that Després was on the cusp of making the jump to the NHL as early as next fall. "He has a great

opportunity in front of him and is prepared for a big summer, "Hussey said. Després who possessed exceptional size (6-4, 218), had the skills, hockey sense and size to make the jump to the NHL. Hussey though said that strength work will have to continue to be an area of focus for Després that summer.



So how did breaking into the NHL work out for Simon. The following article charts his first couple of seasons after he finished his Major Junior career with the Saint John Sea Dogs in 2011.

He got several firsts out of the way as an NHL rookie with the Pittsburgh Penguins. He got his first NHL point in his first NHL game, a 2-1 win on Dec. 1 in Washington. Then in an 8-3 win over the Buffalo Sabres on Dec. 17 he scored his first NHL goal - becoming the first former Sea Dog to ever accomplish the feat. "I've been wanting to score that first goal for a while now. I'm happy it's been done," said Després, who accomplished the milestone at home in his eighth NHL game, one night after a large group of friends and family watched him play in Ottawa. He could even check "first legendary NHL prank" off his list after veteran teammates hung his dress clothes from the rafters at a recent practice. The "Welcome to the NHL" moments just kept coming for the 20year-old defenceman, Saint John's alltime scoring leader among rearguards with 134 points in 240 games over four seasons. "Just playing against Ovechkin, Datsyuk, Jagr, it's crazy. ... The first few games I kept it very simple. I was very nervous but you get used to it. I find it hard when you first get called up, playing with players you looked up to when you were younger. It was a bit intimidating," a slightly winded Després said shortly after being one of the last Penguins off the ice for morning skate in Ottawa. "It's a lot of fun – a lot of hotels though. But I'm not

complaining. It's a great life, I'm enjoying it and I'm getting the most out of it." Després was disappointed when he didn't make the team out of training camp, being sent to Wilkes-Barre of the American League to work on his skills. But the six-foot-four, 205-pounder responded well to the setback, according to Pittsburgh scout Luc Gauthier. "He didn't cry for a long time, but he was mad and that's a good reaction for a guy who got sent down early at training camp. If a player thought that was normal we'd start to have some concerns," Gauthier said. "We knew he'd have some reactions but he turned it a positive way. That's why in Wilkes-Barre he progressed day after day, game after game and that's probably why he's in Pittsburgh now." Penguins head coach Dan Bylsma agreed the extra seasoning in the AHL has worked in the 20-year-old Laval, Que., native's favour.

"He's had a great chance to develop in Wilkes-Barre, fine-tune his game and understand the pro game. I think coming in at this point in time he's been tossed into a couple tough situations," Bylsma said. "He's been very strong, very good defending and able to make a good first pass for our team. I think you can clearly see why he was a first-round pick and you can see he's going to be a very good player in the NHL for a long time." Looking back, Després said the circumstances worked out well, as Wilkes-Barre implemented the same hockey systems the Penguins used at the NHL level. "I was able to adjust to the system, work within the system and work on all that stuff down there. I learned a lot, the coaches down there were very good," Després said. The "Big Horse" also looked back fondly on his time in Saint John, where he finished as assistant captain of the 2011 MasterCard Memorial Cup Champions. "The Sea Dogs were a great organization. They treated us like professionals and the coaching staff were unbelievable. It was a great time, the best time in my life and I miss it too," Després said. "You don't have any worries really (off the ice). You've got your billets, you hang out with the guys and that's it. Here you've got bills to pay, you've got hotels, you've got to take care of your house, everyone's got families and kids, so it's a lot different." Gauthier said the Penguins were surprised Despres was still on the board when they selected him 30th overall in the 2009 NHL Entry Draft. The first overall pick in the 2007 QMJHL draft may have slipped after a so-so performance in Canada's fourth-place finish at the 2009 World under-18 championship. "We found out he was playing with some pain and some injuries, but we put everything (from under-18s) on the side and put more on what we saw all year long," Gauthier said. "He was between 10 and 15 on our list. The people on our staff agreed Simon would turn into a pretty good NHL player." So far it seemed that Gauthier and the Pittsburgh scouts were right. The former pro player and coach, who had been scouting for NHL teams for 15 years, said the Sea Dogs organization deserved some credit for developing players. Along with Despres, the Penguins had defenceman Alex Grant and forward Nick Petersen waiting in the wings at Wilkes-Barre. "I'm sure a lot of teams in junior are looking at Saint John to find out why they're so good at drafting players, how they develop players and how they manage."

A couple of years into his entry level contract with the Penguins, in the Summer of 2013, NHL.com named Simon Després the best #30 draft pick in league history as outlined in the following article. Després had three career goals. Almost every fan and scout would agree that Despres will become a solid NHL player, but he's not there yet. The Pittsburgh Penguins' management and coaching staff had an important decision to make heading into training camp this year. Després, 21, was knocking on the door of the NHL. He was impressive in 18 regular season games in the 2011-12 season, but his ice time was very sheltered. What does 'sheltered ice time' mean? Even though stats can be misleading and twisted to tell any story, let's look at his performance from a few basic perspectives. From an even strength Quality of Competition angle, Després had the second weakest rating among Penguins defensemen in the 2011-12 season. Only Alex Picard played against softer competition:

It comes as no surprise that Picard and Després also led the Penguins in Corsi rating. Corsi is a measure of a team's even strength shot differential when a particular player is on the ice. The numbers above are expressed on a per-60-minutes basis, meaning the Penguins directed 16.55 more shots on goal than they allowed per 60 minutes while Despres was on the ice. 16.55 is impressive (for perspective, Zdeno Chara led all regular defensemen with a Corsi rating of 17.54 that season) even if Després' limited number of games creates some sample size issues. On the other hand, Després' production obviously came courtesy of ideal circumstances. Not only did he face weak competition, but he also started close to 65 percent of his shifts in the offensive zone. The concerning stat is that he only finished 51 percent of his shifts in the offensive zone. Players trusted with more defensive responsibilities (i.e. more defensive zone starts) should see a positive zone start-to-finish percentage trend. The opposite should be true of players in Després' offensive role, but compare his trend to the rest of the list. He was being given very easy offensive assignments by the coaching staff and doing very little to maintain that offensive advantage. This was the dilemma facing coach Dan Bylsma and General Manager Ray Shero in camp. They knew Després had talent and potential. They just had no idea if he was ready to handle the challenges of being an everyday NHL defenseman. On top of that, they had eight NHL defensemen on the roster not named Simon Després that required waivers.

When writing a training camp preview in January it was concluded that based on this info there was only a 3 percent chance of Després making the opening day roster: Simon Despres is simply a victim of a numbers game. Shero says he'll keep no more than eight defenseman on the final roster and may possibly cut that to seven. Barring a trade, with eight defensemen eligible for waivers and no exhibition games for Després to steal a job, it'll be very difficult for him to make the team. It also wouldn't make sense from a development standpoint. A young, promising defenseman like Després can learn a lot more from having a big role at the AHL level as opposed to spending most evenings in the press box or getting limited minutes at the NHL level. The Detroit Red Wings wouldn't have thought twice about sending Despres to the minor leagues. Their philosophy — especially when it comes to young defensemen — is that you can never bring a guy up to the NHL too late, but you can always bring a guy up too early. Once confidence is destroyed in a young player, it may never come back.

Despite the 3% prediction he would make it Shero and Bylsma did decide to put Després on the NHL squad. Brian Strait was placed on waivers (and eventually claimed by the Islanders) to make room. The decision indicated that the Penguins felt Despres' development was better served by being thrown into the fire at the NHL level. In most respects, they were right. This season, the training wheels were taken off and Despres received more challenging roles. His Quality of Competition rank jumped to fourth and he still maintained the second best Corsi rating among Penguins defensemen.

Després also maintained offensive zone starts at a respectable rate (if you're looking for an explanation why Robert Bortuzzo didn't get more ice time this year, look at his Offensive Zone startfinish trend). Després passed the eye test and he performed well from this basic statistical perspective, but he never received additional ice time. The Penguins kept him in the lineup during stretches when he was struggling. They tossed him in the press box after some of his most impressive games. There was no rhyme or reason to the moves. I'm of the Red Wings belief that it's better to give players too much time in the minor leagues as opposed to too little. Patience is an advantage that only deep organizations possess. The Penguins had a solid group of defensemen and didn't need Després at the NHL level. He could have played big minutes in important situations in Wilkes-Barre (AHL) and stepped into training camp next year completely prepared. I can also appreciate how the details of the Collective Bargaining Agreement threaten that philosophy. Young players have value because the team possesses full control and leverage over salary demands in their early years. Once a player finishes seven pro seasons or reaches the age of 27, he gains unrestricted free agency rights and the value (and possibly the ability to retain him) is gone. Simon Després is entering the third and final year of his entry-level contract. His value to the Penguins at the pro level is his ability to contribute at a salary cap hit of just \$840,000. If Pittsburgh keeps him in the minor leagues for his entire entry-level deal, they lose the value he's capable of providing to a cap-strapped organization. The issue is that while the Penguins made the decision to keep Després at the NHL level, they didn't put him in a situation to contribute and deliver any value. You can't enjoy a nice bottle of wine by just placing it in the middle of the table.

Després could have been uncorked. He could have potentially played top-four defensive minutes this year if he was given the opportunity. He could have developed into a reliable option for the playoffs. He could have even shown enough promise to make the Penguins think twice about meeting Kris Letang's \$58 million salary demands. Of course, all of that would have required taking minutes from Letang, Brooks Orpik, Paul Martin, or Matt Niskanen, but that's the path the Bylsma and Shero chose to pursue with their training camp decision. They made the gutsy call. They weren't willing to live it. Was that a result of disagreement amongst the coaching staff or management? Was Després not as good as he looked in person and on paper? Does salary dictate who plays on a nightly basis, despite the Penguins' constant claims to the contrary? Who knows. The Penguins coaching staff took a lot of heat for not giving Després more of a chance in the playoffs — he only dressed three games — but that's actually the one decision they did get right. Bylsma needed a sixth defenseman he could rely on. If a sixth defenseman can play 10 to 12 minutes a night and not let up a goal, he's successful. He doesn't need to score or create offense. He needs to be invisible. Després wasn't capable of that. He struggled in front of his own net and with one-on-one battles. His lateral movement in the defensive zone was a weakness. It was tough to tell whether those are physical limitations or mental ones that can disappear with confidence. When Després had the puck on his stick, he made patient yet decisive plays and sidestepped opponents with ease. He made good decisions when pinching in the offensive zone — a rare attribute for a young defenseman. He wasn't afraid to unleash his hard, low shot and was great in the Penguins' transition game. Simon Després could have helped the Penguins win a Stanley Cup. He could have been a lot of things, or he could have been a bust. The Penguins never gave themselves a chance to find out.

On March 2nd 2015, Després was traded to the Anaheim Ducks in exchange for defenceman Ben Lovejoy however his career was far from over.

NICE TO MEET YOU BRAEHEAD CLAN

Braehead Arena was opened in September 1999, but it was three years before the first hockey match was played there between the arena's first tenants, Scottish Eagles and the original Manchester Storm. Eagles played only five games there before folding.

Pro hockey returned to Renfrewshire in 2010 with the formation of a new club, Braehead Clan, who joined the Elite League for their first season. Flyers played season 2010/11 in the Northern League, but had played at the arena against Paisley Pirates in the Scottish National League.

In Clan's squad for Flyers' first Elite season were a few players with Kirkcaldy connections, Jim Jorgensen, who was to have one season at Flyers in 2017/18, Fifers Adam Walker and Lee Mitchell, and Vince Connon, who played a handful of games for Flyers in 2007/08. Clan's bench coach that season was Flyers legend Frank Morris.



Flyers' first ever encounter with Clan was on 22/10/11 at Braehead in the Challenge Cup. Flyers had started the season poorly, while Clan were unbeaten at home in the games before Flyers' first visit of the year. Eleven minutes in Clan were three up as Flyers struggled to get a grip of the game and it took until two seconds before the end of the first period for Matt Siddall to get Flyers on the board.

Flyers were 1-4 down a couple of minutes into the middle period, but in a much better spell Flyers started to compete and Flyers got back into the game with a second from Siddall and one from Mike Hamilton. Two early penalties in the third period didn't help Flyers' cause, killing the first one, but conceding a fifth goal of the evening during the second penalty kill. Danny Stewart made it 4-5 but another Clan powerplay goal and an empty netter for the home side which resulted in Flyers' first game against Clan finishing in a 4-7 loss.

A 1-10 thrashing back at the shops three weeks later kept Flyers' dismal start to the season going. Seven behind after two periods saw Flyers' shell shocked goalie Garrett Zemlack pulled and replaced for the third period by Blair Daly. It was 0-9 before Matt Cohen got Flyers' only goal of the game as the team extended their loss streak to thirteen games.

A Challenge Cup/League match up a further three weeks later saw Flyers defeat their West of Scotland rivals for the first time 5-4 at Kirkcaldy, a game in which Mike Hamilton scored Flyers' first ever Elite League hat-trick. Siddall and Stewart got Flyers' other two tallies.

In January 2012 Flyers took three points from Clan with a first ever away win against them 4-3, Toms Hartmanis with two goals and singles from Tim Maxwell and Denis Kadic. On 31/01/12 Flyers gained a point in a 1-2 shootout defeat at home. Kadic was the only Flyers scorer as Clan prevailed on penalties.

That was to be the last point Flyers won against Clan in the initial season of their rivalry as a 2-7 and a 2-6 defeat ended the series with Clan having the upper hand overall.

Since that time, the teams have developed a fierce rivalry and as of the end of 2023/24 season Flyers have won 40 and drawn one game out of 101 against their Braehead foes including games following Clan's name change to Glasgow.

The return of fan favourite Jonas Emmerdahl was a bright spot from last weekend and listening to him postgame on Sunday confirmed that despite the obvious skill and compete level the team has to offer the confidence is broken. There were spells against Cardiff where Flyers were all over Devils like a rash but again, with the visitors opening the scoring it was another kick in the danglies for the guys. In our wee area we talk about puck luck and it seems that Flyers get very little of that these days which seems to compound Flyers' woes. Ryan Foss took himself home and Jonas arrived to replace Noah Delmas who is finished for the season through injury and I hope he makes a full recovery. Whilst Charles-Antoine Paiment iced over in Belfast he was unfortunately missing on Sunday, adding to Flyers' troubles. With Ben Brown also missing from the line up Flyers welcomed back James Spence and Joe Lynch with both seeing valuable ice time. Shane Owen saw more rubber at the weekend than the A92 with sixty-one shots against him in Belfast before coming back to the Auld Barn on Sunday to face forty-three shots against Devils who flattered their win with a last-minute goal. Massimo Carozza kept up his good spell of scoring with a goal in each game whilst Kieran Craig also chipped in with a point in each game with two assists followed up by Flyers only goal down in Sheffield as Shane Owen saw another sixty-one shots. Steelers took advantage of tired legs to flatter the score line with three goals in the last ten minutes. We know Chiodo, Martineau, and Cichy are also capable of putting up numbers whilst other guys seem to be struggling to even get shots away. When you look at league leaders Belfast Giants there are only two players in and around a point per game however they have eleven players sitting with over twenty points. It's getting that production from a team that means you don't rely on one line of players to keep you in a game or get you over the line. Four goals from fifty-two shots in three games isn't conducive to success but stats are sometimes like sand in eyedrops and make for painful reading. Flyers have three guys sitting with twenty plus points in the bag with Carozza and Craig getting on there with their points per game. If we are to make anything from the last couple of months of the season it's going to need maximum effort every shift from all and that may be too big an ask for a team that can see the curtains slowly closing on an era, never mind a season. So how do we as fans set our expectations and what do we really see as a reasonable outcome for the rest of the season?

I'd love to see Ben Brown, James Spence and Joe Lynch in the line up at every opportunity with regular ice time, maybe not regular shifts but certainly a good amount of minutes a game wouldn't harm their development. If we get anything from the season it would be great to see those three along with Brodie Kay in a position to step into another team in the league if Flyers are unable to ice a team in the league next season. No great surprise that next season is on everyone's minds at the moment. With Tom and Jack having started selling off the merch and surplus equipment to wipe their slate clean prior to retiring from the club it seems to have raised some concern. Having a hand in a small business I see it is only logical to sell off the bits and pieces whilst you still have an engaged fan base and before you sell the rights to the brand which would put you in a tricky place when it comes to selling the branded merchandise. Nothing to worry about and no signal of doom, simply getting prepared for a clean handover of the brand. All just an educated guess though. If our esteemed editor indulges me I'm going to be contentious for a paragraph. What if Flyers had fallen by the wayside earlier this season when the wheels came off? The players would have had time and opportunity to find themselves a new team, possibly in a very different league that would allow some of them to flourish and achieve their full potential, Flyers would likely still be up for sale and certainly the season ticket holding fans would have lost out. The Elite League is not the most perfect league for Flyers as the team lost the best links it had to the community when the local lads couldn't get a decent crack at the league and fighting to stay competitive in the league went hand in hand with fighting to get people through the doors. Despite getting good crowds both Glasgow and Dundee have struggled to compete and that's with wellseasoned coaches that know the league. I don't think the issues Flyers face are unique in Scotland and this moment could be a catalyst for something much bigger. If Dundee and Glasgow lose the Fife games and the income they generate it could cause a cataclysmic effect to senior hockey in Scotland. Coming into the weekend and Flyers face a trip to Manchester before Glasgow come calling on Sunday. Two very tricky games against teams fighting at the bottom of the league with Manchester more desperately in need of the points as they see qualification for the play-off play-offs drifting further and further out of reach.

Fife Flyers are through to the Heineken Premier League play-offs — and that's official! Saturday's victory over Ayr Bruins confirmed the Kirkcaldy side as the first team to book their place in the play-offs for the championship finals at Wembley. While it has been apparent for some time that Flyers were virtual certainties to reach the play-offs, it is now a reality. Finishing in the top six has always been Flyers' primary objective this season — and they've done it in style. A delighted player-coach Ron Plumb said yesterday: "We have accomplished our first goal, and to do it as well as we have is a real bonus." The six teams who qualify for the play-offs in April are split into two groups of three who play each other home and away, with the top two in each section going through to Wembley. "It will be like starting a whole new season," said Plumb. "Whether a team finishes first or sixth in the league, they will have an equal chance and anything could happen." Flyers, of course, still want to finish on top of the league, but Durham closed the gap to just two points at the weekend and they have three games in hand. However, the English side have several tough away matches still to play, D and it is vital that Flyers continue to pick up as many points as possible. "We have to win as many of our remaining games as we can in order to put pressure on Durham," commented Plumb. Flyers travel to Nottingham tomorrow where they could only draw 7-7 in November, and will be boosted by the return of manager John Haig and the Kirkcaldy players who have been representing Britain in the World Under-20 Championships in Belgium this week. However, they will be without the unavailable Jimmy Pennycook and the suspended Stuart Drummond who has two games of a five match ban still to serve following his gross misconduct penalty at Ayr. Tomorrow's match presents Dave Stoyanovich with the opportunity to set a new record for the number of league and cup goals scored in a season. Stoyanovich requires just one goal to equal Roy Halpin's existing record of 128, having hit the target 91 times in the Heineken League after scoring 36 Bluecol Cup goals. Barring injury, it seems a question of by how many the Canadian will exceed Halpin's total. There are still some seats available on the supporters' bus for Nottingham which leaves Kirkcaldy Ice Rink at 8 a.m. tomorrow. Anyone interested" should contact Joe Rowbotham (tel. Kirkcaldy 54637) or turn up at the Rink in time for departure.

The British Ice Hockey Association this week announced that forward Dean Edmiston (16) and defenceman Richard Phillips (15) of Fife Flames will be in the under-19 team to travel to Italy for the European Championships from March 19-24. Both youngsters are currently in Belgium with the under-20 squad, Meanwhile, Flyers will play their outstanding match against Ayr Bruins at Kirkcaldy on Sunday, March 31, giving them a double header that weekend with Streatham the visitors the night before.

02/03/1985 Nottingham Panthers v Fife Flyers Premier League

Dave Stoyanovich claimed a new British ice hockey scoring record on Saturday when two goals against Nottingham Panthers took him past Roy Halpin's total of 128 goals in a season. The dynamic Canadian has now hit the target 93 times in the Heineken Premier League to add to his 36 Bluecol Cup goals, and with a minimum of 11 competitive games still to play, he looks set to establish a record that may never be beaten. But while Stoyanovich took the limelight as Flyers crushed a disappointing Nottingham outfit, his compatriot Danny Brown made an encouraging return to scoring form by registering a nap hand. This was one of Flyers' best away performances this season, and although Panthers kept the game tight in the first period, the visitors rattled in eight goals in the second to make the final spell a formality. Stoyanovich — 26 last week — took only nine minutes to equal Halpin's record when he opened the scoring with a rasping shot from the blue line. This was quickly followed by further long range efforts from Brian Peat and Danny Brown to give the Kirkcaldy side a comfortable 3-0 lead at the first buzzer. Brown wasted no time in stretching Flyers' lead when he scored just 34 seconds after the restart, and five minutes later ex-Panther Andy Linton scored a fine goal after good play by Brown and Ron Plumb. Then came the goal that Fife fans had been waiting for — and it was certainly worthy of being a record breaker. After fine work in his own end zone, Ron Plumb sent an inch perfect pass to Stoyanovich who was lurking on the left wing, and he accelerated past his man before drawing the netminder and calmly slotting the puck into the corner of the net. With the pressure of waiting for the record now off, Flyers really opened out, and by the 32nd minute had increased their lead to 9-0 with goals by Brown, Gordon Latto and Neil Abel. Panthers pulled one back through Gauthier, but Flyers continued to dominate and a fine long range effort by Abel and another goal by Brown left the home side with an impossible task. Although Nottingham scored a second goal through Fraser with 15 seconds of the period remaining, the third period was

purely academic. Danny Brown hit his own personal fifth goal, and after Fraser had netted Panthers' third, Flyers finished the match on a high note with goals in the last five minutes from Linton and Peat.

Fife Flyers take a break from the pressures of the Heineken Premier League when they entertain Canadian tourists Toronto Eagles at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink tomorrow night. The Toronto side made a poor start to their visit to Britain when they went down 10-2 to Glasgow Dynamos on Sunday, but having shaken off their jetlag, they will be expected to give a better account of themselves against Flyers. The Canadians have taken on a hectic schedule during their week-long tour. They are due to meet Dundee Rockets tonight, and after tomorrow's game in Kirkcaldy they go on to play Ayr Bruins on Sunday! Not much is known about the opposition, which is made up of players in the Toronto area, but their line-up does include former Ayr player Gary Steven. "We have a lot of hockey coming up over the next month, and it will be nice to have a little break from the league," said Flyers' player-coach Ron Plumb yesterday. "There is always the possibility of picking up some injuries, but I am thinking about bringing in a couple of our younger players for this match." Stuart Drummond completes his five-match suspension tomorrow, while Jimmy Pennycook s unavailable. Netminder Andrew Donald did not play in Nottingham on Saturday because of a leg injury, while Steven Kirk picked up a back injury, and both will have late fitness tests. Plumb felt that Flyers played a good offensive and defensive game at Nottingham, and commented: "It was good to see the goals being spread around the team. "| felt that Nottingham's goaltending was a little suspect, but we played a solid hockey game." With Flyers not having a league match this weekend, Durham Wasps have the opportunity to go to the top of the table when they visit Murrayfield on Sunday, but the Kirkcaldy side will be hoping that Racers can do them a favour. Flyers have been asked to play Glasgow Dynamos in a Scottish Challenge Cup match in Dundee, but a suitable date has still to be agreed. Meanwhile, the seven Kirkcaldy players who were included in the British team for the World Junior Championships in Belgium last week earned praise from Flyers manager John Haig who was the British team boss. "They did us proud and the experience will do them the world of good" he commented. "These lads are the nucleus of the British team of the future. Britain finished fourth in the tournament, defeating Spain 5-3 but going down to Bulgaria, Holland, Hungary and the host nation.

09/03/1985 Fife Flyers v Toronto Eagles Challenge

Saturday's challenge match at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink gave Flyers the chance to relax from the pressures of the Heineken Premier League Toronto Eagles, playing the fourth match of their Scottish tour, were looking for their first win — but despite giving a good account of themselves, Flyers proved too strong for them. The Kirkcaldy side were without Stuart Drummond, completing his period of suspension, but player coach Ron Plumb took the opportunity to ice young defencemen Blair Page and Gary Fyfe. The first period was closely contested, with Flyers going ahead through Dave Stoyanovich, only for Newby to equalise for the visitors with a welltaken goal. However, Stoyanovich restored Flyers' lead within a minute to give his side a 2-1 advantage at the first buzzer. As has been the case so often before this season, a middle period burst put Flyers firmly in the driving seat. In the dying seconds of a power play, Danny Brown brought the crowd to its feet with one of the goals of the season. Picking the puck up in his own end, the big No. 19 weaved his way the length of the ice, leaving the tourists trailing in his wake, before calmly beating the netminder. Another power play goal by Brown followed four minutes later, and soon after Stoyanovich completed his hat-trick from a Brown assist. Stoyanovich then snapped up the rebound of a Neil Abel pile-driver which was blocked by the netminder to give Flyers a 6-1 lead at the break. Just a minute into the final period, Abel himself got on the scoresheet when he crashed an unstoppable shot into the top corner from the blue line. Two minutes later, Brown completed an excellent hattrick when he capitalised on good work by Murray McLellan to scoop an angled back-hander into the roof of the net. Eagles' persistent efforts were rewarded by a second goal from Newby, but within 25 seconds Stoyanovich brought up his nap hand after McLellan had again done the spade work. Period scores: 2-1, 4-0, 3-2 With Flyers threatening to run riot, the visitors, to their credit, raised their game sufficiently to prevent any further goals. Indeed, it was the Canadians who had the final word when Clark scored just two minutes from time. After the game, man of the match awards were presented to Danny Brown of Flyers and Newby of Eagles, and the sporting crowd gave the visitors a rousing send-off after an entertaining and clean fought encounter.

All tickets will be £25 and booking fees will apply for online purchases.


