The Flyers made their final visit of the season to Wales to play the Devils on St David's Day. The visitors were without the injured trio of Patrick Kyte, Phélix Martineau and Aiden Wilson. Ben Brown was on duty with the Dundee Rockets and also scratched were Cameron Keny and James Spence. The Devils were playing their 3rd game in four nights and scratched Bradley Schoonbaert, Mark Richardson, Reid Duke and Hunter Shinkaruk.

The Devils had the first couple of shots of the game both off target but they did get one behind Shane Owen after 92 seconds. Joey Martin set up the chance for Josh MacDonald who was able to stick handle the puck around the Fife keeper and find the net. Moments later and the Devils had another great chance when Ryan Barrow showed the Fife defence a clean pair of heels but Owen did well to shut him down with a pad save. Jonas Emmerdahl brought Ben Bowns into action in the Flyers next attack as he made a pad save. In the 5th minute Bowns was in action again as he made a kick save on Massimo Carozza. Owen made a huge pad save on a Josh Batch shot that was redirected in the 6th minute. Fife were then called for too many men on the ice on a line change and the Devils went to the games first power play. Owen showed excellent reflexes to stop a Martin one timer from the slot that was deflected off of a Flyers stick. Martin went even closer when his shot hit the Fife keepers shoulder and then clanked the crossbar. Owen ensured the Flyers completed the kill when he went post to post to get a glove on a shot by MacDonald lurking at the back door. Zach O'Brien gained the zone in the 10th minute and from the slot his shot was well saved by Owen. The visiting keeper then made a double save in the 11th minute when he stopped MacDonald again and then sprawled to keep Brett Perlini off the scoreboard. The Devils doubled their lead in the 13th minute when Martin carried the puck down the left wing and his cross ice pass was converted at the back post by Benjamin Almquist for his first ever Devils goal. The Flyers had a chance to get back into the game in the 14th minute as Lucas Chiodo broke in on Bowns from the neutral zone and was hooked on the play. The referee signaled penalty shot and Chiodo tried to beat Bowns on the stick side but the Devils keeper managed to make the blocker save.

## PERIOD 2

The Flyers had a chance inside the opening 10 seconds as Carozza drove the net but Bowns stood tall. Perlini went close in the 21st minute and a two minutes later Tyler Busch was stopped by Owen who was out aggressively as the Devils forward did a fly by in the slot. In the 25th minute Ben Davies had a shot from the circles padded away by Owen who then swallowed a blast from the blue line by Jarrod Gourley. The Devils increased their lead in the 26th minute when Owen was beaten cleanly on his stick side by a blast from Perlini from just inside the blue line.

In the 27th minute a give and go with Charles-Antoine Paiement saw Jordan Stallard get a look at Bowns who made smart save. The Flyers had another chance in the 29th minute when Kieran Craig went down the left wing and around the back of the net and with Bowns out of position he just couldn't quite execute the wraparound. The Devils added another goal in the 32nd minute when the Flyers were guilty of a giveaway in their own zone and Cole Sanford sniped the top corner stick side on Owen. Bowns made a great kick save on a one timer from Michael Cichy in the 33rd minute. In the 35th minute Busch fired a shot off the crossbar. Daniel Krenželok made a great diving check in the 37th minute to break up a dangerous Devils attack. Batch was then stopped by Owen in the 38th minute as he tried to go five hole and Owen shut the wickets. In the 39th minute Bowns was sharp as he smothered a shot that was deflected on his net. In the final few seconds of the period a sprawling Owen was lights out to stop Sanford who had a gaping net to hit.

## PERIOD 3

In the 41st minute O'Brien went in on goal but was denied by Owen who got the paddle down and with the help of his post the puck was scrambled clear. In the 42nd minute a streaking MacDonald forced a stick save from Owen. A minute later some fine passing by the Devils created an opportunity for MacDonald who once again was denied by the Fife keeper. The Flyers luck was clearly out in the 46th minute as they worked the puck down low and Paiement slithered the puck against the post and on the follow up Stallard was robbed by a desperation glove save by Bowns. The Devils went back on the power play in the 47th minute when Craig got the gate for a slash. The Devils controlled the puck from the face off and their patience paid off as Martin from the bottom of the circles picked the corner low on Owen's glove side to increase their advantage. Stallard got a shot in net in the 50th minute as he tried to go short side on Bowns who held on. Carozza then fired a shot off the mask of Bowns who then gloved a shot from Brodie Kay in the 53rd minute. A minute later and Owen produced a point blank save on Sam Duggan who was parked at the edge of his crease. Further misfortune for the Flyers in the 57th minute when Tyler Heidt had his stick explode on him when trying to pass the puck out of the zone and Riley Brandt from close range added the final goal of the night.

# A NIGHT TO REMEMBER

It's difficult to comprehend that it's almost a quarter of a century now from Tuesday, April 3, 2001 which was a night of celebration at Fife Ice Arena as players and fans from across the country came to pay tribute to club legend Mark Morrison. With thanks to the Fife Free Press Editor Allan Crow we look back on a memorable night.

The then player-coach's eight-year service to the Kirkcaldy club was marked with a special testimonial game and over 2000 supporters made it an occasion to remember. It was an emotional, but also a fun evening, a fitting celebration of the Canadian's contribution to Flyers.

The day after the game, a rather bleary-eyed Mark said he had thoroughly enjoyed his testimonial. "I thought it was outstanding," he said, "The turnout was brilliant, but then again I didn't expect any different from the people here who have always supported me. After being here eight years it is obvious I wasn't here just for the hockey and I have made many good friends. The game itself was a lot of fun and everyone in The Mighty Mo's enjoyed themselves. A lot of these guys took a night out of important schedules to be here and some travelled a long way which I was very grateful for."

On the evening itself there was some outstanding hockey and breathtaking goals – as well as a rinkful of pranks and tomfoolery and a whole load of family entertainment. Almost every seat in the rink was filled as the public of Kirkcaldy and visitors from around the country united to show Mark just how much they thought of him and his incalculable contribution to the Flyers during his eight years at the club. The Mighty Mo's team read like a Who's Who of ice hockey, including the much-loved Gordon Latto who won every honour going with Flyers; Tony Hand who re-wrote the record books and is regarded as the best hockey player Britain has ever produced; BNL star Nick Poole and Bill Moody – one of Flyers most popular imports ever.

It could have been expected then that the Fife Flyers would be given a real showing up, but this was not the case as they put up a good fight and dominated the early stages of the game. Then the fun really began as Flyers' captain Frank Morris received a two-minute penalty for wearing a silly helmet, and an impressive goal scored by Todd Dutiaume was disallowed because he skated too fast. Todd and his younger brother Mark, who iced for The Mighty Mo's were each sent off for two minutes for swapping jerseys amid an amusing scuffle which delighted the crowd, while interference by the match officials added to the merriment. In the final few minutes of the game, by which time the scoreline was totally irrelevant, all the players from both teams took to the ice and chaos took over to the tune of a Scottish reel.

The final score probably should have read 7-6 to The Mighty Mo's but the Flyers sneaked one into the net when around 40 people were on the ice.

The game was followed by a whole wealth of presentations and tributes to a rather bashful Mark and as the crowd filtered away, there was no doubt everyone had had a night to remember.

The Fifers welcomed the Nottingham Panthers for their final visit of the season. The home side added Ben Brown and Joe Lynch back into the lineup and gave Jānis Voris the start in net but were still without Phélix Martineau, Patrick Kyte, Aiden Wilson, James Spence and Cameron Kenny. The Panthers scratched Hugo Roy and started Jason Grande in net who was looking to make it three shutouts in a row in games played this week.

The Flyers opened brightly and 30 seconds in a nice set up by Evan MacKinnon released Kieran Craig who took the puck to the net but Grande shut him down. Voris was also in the game in the opening minute when he came up with a great poke check to knock the puck clear to stop a dangerous Panthers move. In the 3rd minute Logan Neilson found himself all alone in the slot but Voris reacted well to save his shot and not give up a rebound. At the other end a close in tip by Massimo Carozza was well dealt with by Grande. The Panthers opened the scoring moments later when Jaako Niskala skated in from the blueline with the puck and he rifled it low into the bottom corner past Voris from the circles. The Flyers survived a scramble in their crease in the 6th minute and in the 9th minute Mitchell Fossier hit the outside frame of the goal with space on Voris's short side. The Flyers responded in the 11th minute with a big shot from the blue line by Olivier LeBlanc and Grande appeared not to see it until the puck hit him. Voris denied Sam Herr in the 13th minute with a shot that was labelled for the far bottom corner. The Flyers transitioned quickly in the 14th minute and Charles-Antoine Paiement was stopped by the Panthers keeper at close quarters and Grande was alert again on the next shift as he made a save on Carozza. A shot by Herr in the 17th went in and out of the glove of Voris and following up Tim Doherty managed to direct the puck past the wide open net.

## PERIOD 2

Voris was first in action in the second period when he held his short side post as Didrik Henbrant drove the net. The Panthers controlled most of the play in the early stages and had the Flyers hemmed in for spells but most of the shots directed on the Flyers goal came from the perimeter. Voris was at full stretch in the 26th minute as he stopped Jordan Kelsall. The Flyers first threat on the visitors goal in the period came in the 32nd minute as Austin Farley crashed the net but Grande did well to hold on to the puck and avert the danger. A minute later and Voris made a fine stop on a Doherty shot from the slot. In the 34th minute Grande once again appeared not to track the puck which came from distance and hit his pads without him reacting.

The Panthers doubled their lead in the 35th minute when the Flyers were guilty of turning over the puck in their own zone and Voris was called upon to make a great save on Fossier before the puck was recycled and fed to Matt Spencer and from the high slot his shot nestled in the bottom corner of the net. The Flyers went on the first power play of the game in the 36th minute when Davis Bunz was called for a high stick. Tyler Heidt had a shot go in and out of the glove of Grande who then made saves on Farley and Jordan Stallard to complete the kill for the visitors. The Flyers were soon back on the man advantage as Zsombor Garat got the gate for a slash on Kieran Craig. Lucas Chiodo drove the net and the Panthers keeper stood tall but the Flyers recovered the puck which went out to the blue line and Olivier Leblanc put it on net with Craig getting a tip in the slot to redirect it past Grande just inside his post.

## PERIOD 3

In the 42nd minute Fossier had some time and space at the side of the Flyers goal and he tried to out wait Voris who stayed with him to make the block. A minute later and the Flyers keeper got a piece of the puck off his glove as Matt Alfaro cruised into the slot and let a shot go. A streaking Henbrant was stopped by Voris in the 45th minute just before Stallard ripped a shot on Grande that caught the top of the crossbar. The Flyers went back on the power play in the 48th minute as Josh Tetlow was guilty of a hold on Craig in behind his net. The Flyers controlled the opening minute of the man advantage and Heidt saw Grande get a glove on his shot before smothering the puck to halt play. Late on Stallard had a shot saved as the Panthers returned to full strength. Herr from the slot forced a blocker save from Voris in the 51st minute. The Flyers came close in the 53rd minute with a scramble around the Panthers net before Paiement fired the puck wide of the target with net available to aim for. The Panthers got their first power play of the game in the 55th minute when Heidt was called for hooking. A shot tipped by Herr was matched by a fine Voris save but the Flyers found themselves two men down a minute in as Michael Cichy was called for interference. The Flyers almost killed the 5 on 3 but with 2 seconds remaining they were penalised again when Carozza was binned for a slash. This time the Panthers made the two man advantage count as Herr trickled one five hole on Voris from the top of his crease to make it a two goal game. The Flyers still had a 5 on 4 penalty to kill which they managed to do and with 96 seconds left they called their time out. Having won the draw they pulled Voris for the extra skater but couldn't get anything on the Panthers net and the game was iced when Herr found the empty net from the neutral zone.

# WEEK 26 – FLYERS STATS RECAP

## On Saturday night.....

**Cardiff Devils 6      Fife Flyers 0      - Elite League**

The Devils remained perfect on the season against the Flyers with their 5th consecutive win.

The Flyers were shutout for the 8th time on the season and the 6th time on the road against the Devils in the EIHL.

The Devils have now recorded 11 shutouts against the Flyers in all EIHL competitions, equal second most with Sheffield Steelers behind the Belfast Giants.

The Flyers were mathematically eliminated from the play offs with this result. The Flyers have missed the playoffs four times now in 12 seasons.

Jonas Emmerdahl was credited with a season high 7 blocked shots in the game.

Kieran Craig had his 5 game point streak snapped – the season best still belongs to Lucas Chiodo with 6 games.

The Flyers were awarded their 3rd penalty shot of the season and are now 0 for 3. Lucas Chiodo is 0 for 2 in his Flyers career on penalty shots. Overall the Flyers are now 7 for 18 on penalty shots in all EIHL competitions.

## On Sunday night.....

The Panthers also remained perfect against the Flyers this season and have now won their last six straight against the Flyers going back to last season.

The Flyers gave up their 10th empty net goal of the campaign which is second most behind Clan's 11.

The Flyers have now conceded a power play goal in each of their last five games – this ties their longest streak of the season.

The Flyers have now given up 103 goals at home in league play this season which is only the second time that the Flyers have conceded triple digits in the EIHL era and it's the most since the 105 scored against them in the 2011/12 season.




Excluding shootouts the Flyers scored their 200th goal against the Panthers in all EIHL competitions.

### Recent Form Guide

The Flyers and Flames last met in the first weekend of the New Year. Guildford's form in 2025 can be described as somewhat inconsistent. An overtime defeat by the odd goal in nine at Braehead was followed up the next night with a five goal shutout win at home to the Dundee Stars. Another road overtime defeat in Coventry was followed by a 5-2 home loss to the Belfast Giants. The following weekend a heavy 7-4 defeat in Nottingham preceded an excellent 6-2 win at the Spectrum against the Sheffield Steelers. A midweek win at the Skydome with another 6 goals scored came before consecutive 4-3 losses beyond regulation at Dundee and Belfast. The losses continued with a 3-1 reversal on home ice against the Cardiff Devils followed by a 4-2 defeat by the Clan in Glasgow. The winless streak, their longest of the season, was stretched to five games with the Steelers victorious at the Spectrum before the rot was halted in Nottingham with a 4-2 win. The following weekend the Flames scooped maximum points with a 6-2 win on Tayside followed by a 3-2 shootout success against the Steelers in Surrey. 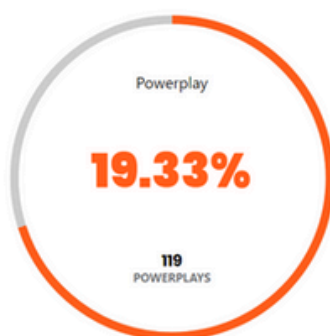

## ON THEIR ROSTER

In this edition we focus on a Devils record holder **Joey Martin**.

Joey played junior hockey with the Thorold Blackhawks and Aurora Tigers. Before playing four seasons (2007–2011) of NCAA college hockey with the Nebraska–Omaha Mavericks men's ice hockey team, registering 39 goals, 64 assists, and 116 penalty minutes in 152 games played. On September 6, 2011, the Toledo Walleye announced that Martin had signed to play with their ECHL team for the 2011–12 season. For the next three seasons he played 203 games in the ECHL for the Walleye and the Stockton Thunder with 21 games up in the AHL. 66 goals and 109 assists in the ECHL was enough to attract the attention of the Cardiff Devils and in July 2014 he signed his first contract abroad after agreeing to a one-year deal.

In an interview in 2019 Martin reflected upon his time with the Devils.

Cardiff Devils captain Joey Martin thought he'd only be here for a couple of years, now he's the club's all-time Elite League points scorer. The 31-year-old broke Max Birbraer's record on Sunday to reach 434 points in what was his 345th game for the club when Devils defeated Nottingham Panthers 5-3. And while he admits he was told he was closing in on the record, the hectic start to the season meant it had slipped his mind. "I've been here six years now and we've had some success so I consider myself fortunate to have been part of an organisation that puts a contending team every year with some great players," Martin said. "As far as the milestones go, I couldn't have done it without the players around me in being part of these successful teams. "At the end of last season, Fie, our social media officer, mentioned it to me last year, but it's been a hectic schedule so far with the CHL and everything, I never gave it a second thought. "In hindsight, that's maybe a good thing because then you don't think about it and you're not squeezing the stick too hard, but it's achievement I'm very proud. "When I first came here, I thought I would be here for one or two years maybe. Obviously, I'm hooked and it's a great place and I love everything about Cardiff. "The people and this organisation, we're treated so well by them all and it's like a family. I've established relationships with people throughout this team and I love working with 'Lordo' (coach Andrew Lord) as the coach and Todd (Kelman) as the GM. From top to bottom, I love it here."

Martin has become something of a legendary figure for the Devils fans since first joining the club in 2014 and has played a big part of their success in recent years. He was given the captaincy at the start of the season following the retirement of Jake Morrisette and he's taken it in his stride. And as Devils looks ahead to completing their Challenge Cup group campaign in their next three games, starting with a trip to Guildford Flames on Saturday before hosting Paul Dixon's men on Sunday, Martin wants to see the trophy back at the Viola Arena. He added: "Since I was given the captaincy, I've still prepared my game the same way although there is more responsibility with that. "I was guided by Jake Morrisette until he retired then before that Tyson Marsh was the captain so I learned a lot from them. "I'm still learning as I go, but it's a role I take great pride in. As far as my everyday approach the game, I've remained the same and I think that's why I was appointed. It's been a pretty good so far. "We're doing pretty well in the league, with a six and two record and going well in the Challenge Cup to be in a position to advance. "We want to be contenders for every championship. The Challenge Cup is something we've won before and we want to bring it back again. "Every game must be treated as a must win and we want to get better in every game and the next three games in the Challenge Cup are very important for us."

Martin remained with the Cardiff Devils until 2020 and wore the 'C' in the 2019-20 season, before he joined Norwegian GET-ligaen side Stavanger Oilers in August 2020. It was a crazy time as we know with the pandemic and a short time into that season he had the following to say in an interview. Joey Martin says he feels fortunate to be able to play this season after the suspension of the Elite League as he enjoys life in Norway. The Cardiff Devils legend joined Stavanger Oilers a few weeks ago as the situation regarding the viability of a new campaign became further and further in doubt. And the 32-year-old spoke of how he's adapting with the Fjordkraft-ligaen side, seven games into their campaign which sees the Oilers in second bottom of 10 teams following a season where they were streets ahead in the regular campaign standings. "I'm feeling fortunate to have this opportunity where we're seeing leagues postponed and not playing, so it is a tough time for hockey players in general," Martin said. "I was talking to a lot of guys I know who play overseas and they were already practising with their teams, but nothing much was happening in the UK. The rinks weren't even open so I started to get a feeling that something might be happening. Or not happening rather. "I was optimistic at the beginning of the summer, but as time went on, I began to realise there was a distinct possibility we might not play or not start until early next year. "I just felt that was a long time to wait so I quickly made a decision to hire an agent and get my name out there. The chance to come to Stavanger happened quickly. It wasn't an easy decision with the uncertainty, but I have to thank Todd Kelman for his assistance and honesty. "It's been great so far over here, even if the form hasn't been so good for us. We have a really good group of guys with a lot of talent. We've underachieved, but we're confident of turning it around. "I find myself adapting quite nicely where the style of hockey is quite different. It's taken me a bit to get used to it, but I'm enjoying it so far. "It's a fast league here. A bit younger in terms of the players flying up and down the ice and you don't get as much time on the puck. That's been different to get used to, but the hockey's fun, very offensive and I hope to keep producing this year." Martin has seven points from his seven outings so far, scoring four and assisting in three as Stavanger look to improve on a run that has seen them lose four of their last five, including Tuesday's 7-2 defeat to Stjernen. They take on second place Frisk Asker on Saturday, a team they beat in all five meetings last season and once more, Martin will be looking to add to his tally. His heart remains in Cardiff after committing to return next year, all going well and admits he's had conversations with the new coach, Jarrod Skalde and kept tabs on his team-mates who also made the move into Europe. "Covid disrupted my plans to return to Cardiff of course and I'm really sad the whole has been suspended for this season," he added. "I feel bad for everyone involved and in my six years, I saw it improve every year. "The product and depth continued to grow and I'm really hoping it doesn't affect things next year, but I have been given the opportunity to play elsewhere and I'm embracing it as much as I can. "I've spoken with the new coach in the interview process and he came across as a great guy, very confident and has a great resume so it was exciting for Cardiff to bring in a guy like that. "In fact, he called me a couple of weeks ago to touch base and see how I was getting on and update me on what he was doing. We didn't discuss next year or anything like that, but I appreciated him reaching out. "He's the same as everyone. Basically, waiting to see what happens and

hopefully start to get plans in place for a start next year. "I'm closely watching how some of the other guys are getting on elsewhere and it was really unfortunate what happened with 'Bownsy' in Austria with his injury. I know how hard he worked to earn that move. "But the other guys I think are the same as me, taking this year as a new experience and you have to embrace it. It wasn't what we all planned for, but sometimes you're led down a path and you simply have to make the most of it."



He had initially agreed to return to Cardiff for a seventh season but, due to ongoing coronavirus-induced uncertainty over the 2020-21 EIHL season's proposed start date in December, the Devils allowed Joey to seek a temporary move away from the club. It was expected Joey would stay at Stavanger for a season and return to Cardiff in 2021. However, in May 2021 it was announced he would join Austrian side Graz 99ers ahead of the 2021-22 season. Joe rejoined Cardiff for a second time in May 2022.

The 2024-25 campaign is Martin's ninth season with Devils discussing Martin, head coach Pete Russell said: "I cannot say enough good things about Joey Martin as a player or as a person. He is one of the most coachable players I have ever had, and he turns up to compete every day. He plays hard at both ends of the ice and is someone we rely on to play in every situation. He makes guys around him better and still has the knack for putting the puck in the net. He leads by example and has been tremendous for this organisation over his entire career. I am very pleased to get him signed up for another season."

Martin helped Devils win the Challenge Cup in 2015 and 2017, the Elite League in 2017 and 2018 as well as successive Playoff Championships in 2018 and 2019. He also claimed a league record this season in November when with a second assist on Zach O'Brien's third period goal Joey Martin became the all-time leading scorer amongst imports in the history of the Elite League. That assist gave him 597 points in all competitions, which put him 1 point ahead of Sheffield Steelers' legend Jeff Legue who played in the EIHL for 9 seasons from 2007-08.

Devils' Managing Director Todd Kelman spoke about Joey Martin: "Joey Martin has been a superstar for this club since the day he arrived. In those first few years, he was our top scorer and the best forward in the league. He was a huge part of the success we had in those first 6 seasons starting in 2014-15 and he helped set and maintain that winning culture. Joey called me at the end of the 2021-22 season, just after we won the playoffs and all he said was 'I want to come home.' It took us less than 5 minutes to get the deal done and he was a Devil again," explained Kelman. He is obviously a great player and continues to show that on the ice a decade later, but he is one of the best individuals I have ever known. He is great with the fans, especially with kids, great with our sponsors, great with the media and obviously a great teammate. Simply put, Joey Martin is the best import signing we have ever made.

The Devils will celebrate the career of Joey Martin this summer when he hosts his Testimonial match on Saturday 14th June, 2025.

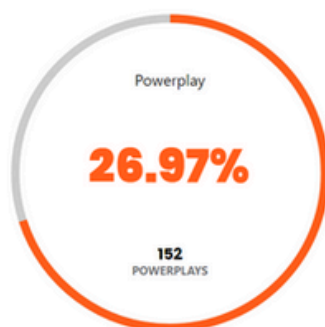

## ON THEIR ROSTER

In this edition we focus on **Jackson Cressey** and catch up on his hockey journey through a recent podcast interview.

***Was it a little bit of an obvious choice for you as a kid growing up to get into the game of hockey?***

Yeah, for as long as I can remember, it's been hockey. Hockey's my favorite sport. Obviously, growing up in Canada and being just crazy about hockey over here, I started, I think, started skating when I was three or four years old and I've been playing ever since.

***You have an older brother that plays, a dad that's played, and your uncle Terry Richardson was a first-round pick. He played in the NHL and also played here in the UK in the 1970s. I imagine he was a pretty big influence in your career, particularly when you were a youngster ?***

Yeah, I actually think he might have given me my first hockey stick way back when. I think I got one of those old wooden flat blades that he gave me from forever ago. But I remember going over to my cousin's place and his place and playing around with my cousin Kevin, who also played professional hockey for a bit over in Europe. And I was just amazed by all of it. Obviously, Terry has some of his old goalie masks from way back when, which are, I mean, it's crazy that people used to wear those and try to stop these rubber pucks flying at them. But yeah, they were definitely kind of role models for me as I was growing up.

***Jumping to your under-18s, because you were playing with Coquitlam, you won the AAA U18 title there. What was that year like and was it quite important to you in terms of your development and in your career?***

Yeah, I think I learned a lot that year. It was my first year playing junior hockey. So I was still in high school at the time. And so I was learning to kind of manage my course load at school and also playing a higher level of hockey. And for being a young player on a team, obviously, I had to kind of earn my playing time. I didn't play a ton that year. But being a part of a championship team, you learn a lot. You learn how to play in the playoffs, and you learn how to be successful. And I think you kind of, at every stage, you try to take a couple of lessons and continue them and carry them forward.

***You go from winning one title to winning a second when you step up to playing in the BCHL again, with Coquitlam when you sweep Vernon to take the Fred Page Cup. Tell us about that year and tell us about that run as a group?***

Yeah, it was a pretty special year. We weren't necessarily the best team in the regular season, but we kind of seemed to find our groove kind of into the playoffs, kind of into February and then March and the playoffs. And it was special. I mean, any time you're winning hockey games, hockey is a lot of fun. Everyone's supporting each other. I mean, those were the best times. So it was really cool. And we were able to win a championship. And then we were able to go off to the Western Canadian Cup and play a team from different provinces. And so we were over in Dauphin, Manitoba, which is an interesting place, but a really cool experience.

***Going from high school hockey, U18s to your first year in the BCHL, what is that step up like in terms of, speed, the level of hockey, just the whole experience?***

It's a big step. All of a sudden, you're playing against 20 year olds who are a lot bigger, a lot stronger, the pace is much faster. And then also, like, it's kind of your first taste of their being allowed to be fighting and stuff like that. And I remember being called up the year before and seeing a couple of these fights and being like, oh, my God, these are some big guys throwing real punches, not like what we used to do, you know, with the gloves on, everyone's still got the full face shield. But yeah, it's a lot tougher, but you just kind of, it takes a little bit to get used to, but you get acclimated and then you just try to do whatever you can.

**No two paths in junior hockey are the same and you stuck with Coquitlam for your whole time in the BCHL. What was playing in one place like and was it beneficial for your development as a player ?**

Yeah, I think it I think it was very beneficial. I was able fortunate enough to stay with the same coach. And you can kind of really see how your game grows with the people around you. And you kind of start that first year as a young person not playing a lot. And then right into my second year, I see a lot more minutes, I was kind of put into a leadership role. I wore an A for an assistant captain. And I started to be able to impact the game more offensively and stuff like that. And then taking it one step further to my last year, I was the captain, I mean, a lot more responsibility, you add that all you add that under the pressure and everything else and higher expectations coming back and committing to a school and everything like that. So it was really kind of a really special three years that I think I grew a lot as a player and as a person.

**Obviously, being a captain, there are different type of captains. What kind of captain do you think Jackson Cressey is?**

I think I tried to be a little bit tougher. I tried to keep the guys engaged. And I expected a lot out of each individual player and their determination on and off the ice. I think as I've grown, and been captains at different levels, I'm kind of more keeping everyone in a good mood. I mean, being vocal when I have to, but kind of just making sure everyone's feeling good and having a good time.



**You went from the BCHL to NCAA. At what point in that four year period, or even before then, did you decide that you were going to go down the college route and go for NCAA?**

I think it was always a goal of mine to go NCAA. Over here, you kind of the two routes, you can go for junior hockey, you can go play in the CHL, which is like the WHL, OHL, QMJHL. But then you lose, or you used to lose at least your NCAA eligibility. And I've, while I was here, I kind of made the decision I wanted to try to go to the NCAA. My best friend's older brother, Alex Kerfoot, was committed to Harvard. So that sounded pretty amazing to me. And it just kind of seemed like the better route. I knew I wasn't one of the top players of my age. And so I kind of seemed like it would give me more time to develop if I ever wanted to continue with hockey after school. And the whole college in the US, I mean, looked amazing. All the schools are very good athletically, academically, and it just kind of seemed like the better path for me to take.

**So maybe it's a silly question, but why did you choose Princeton?**

I didn't have that many opportunities or that many offers kind of, I didn't have any until going into that third year junior hockey. And then I had a strong start. The offers kind of started to come in. And I went on official visits to a couple schools, very good hockey schools. And then I started talking to Princeton. And I think Princeton, I mean, obviously, it stands out as an Ivy League school. And I just

didn't really think I could pass up an opportunity like that with the amazing academics they have. And their hockey program was getting better. And I knew I could go there and really have a shot to play college hockey, which can be tough. If you go to one of these top end hockey schools, obviously, there's more players and the competition is great. And I figured if I went here, I'd get an amazing opportunity to play hockey, college hockey, which was the dream. And then also, being such a vigorous academic school, it kind of prepared me better for after hockey as well.

## ***What your major was in?***

My major was operations research and financial engineering.

## ***When you joined Princeton that first rookie year, you led the team in assists. Did you feel that you had a really solid start that year?***

Yeah, it was a really fun year. The coaches put a lot of trust in me right away. And so they gave me great opportunities. And we were fortunate to have a really strong power play. So coming in as a freshman and being on the top power play unit obviously helped a lot. And playing with really good players makes that a heck of a lot easier.

## ***And that year, you were roughly about 500 in the ECAC. What was the step up again, like going from BCHL to that sort of college level in the ECAC?***

I think that was a big jump. It was a lot faster. And the BCHL isn't necessarily the most structured league. And then when I took the jump to college, it's extremely structured. All the teams have four checks, neutral zone four checks, and are very tight. And ECAC is extremely tight checking. We're on smaller rinks. I mean, some of the colleges have the bigger Olympic sheets. But the ECAC is really tight. Really, I think it's almost always the lowest scoring league in the NCAA. And so it's tough hockey.

## ***Moving on to the 2017-18 and that was a big year for Princeton. ECAC champions, White Law Cup, ranked 15th in the nation. What was that cup run like?***

That was a really special run. We really just kind of came together as a group after Christmas, I think. I think we kind of had a slow start. We held a couple players-only meeting, and I'll give a lot of credit to our captains at that time, Eric Robinson and Joe Grabowski. And we kind of just really came together and started winning a lot of hockey games. I think we even finished maybe seventh that year in the regular season, and I think we had to beat one, two, and three to make it all the way. It was a really special run, and it just kind of was one of those feelings like, we're just not going to lose. And it just kind of was, even with Clarkson tying up the game in the final, I think with like two seconds left, where the puck went off, we had to tie it up, unfortunately. But even going to OT, we were all still pretty confident that we were going to come away with a win. And come away with a win.

## ***A certain Kevin Moore was involved in that team as one of the assistant coaches and volunteers at that time. What do you remember of Kevin Moore at that age in Princeton?***

That was a while ago now. But I just remember Kevin being extremely dedicated to his work. He was always ready to go. Just a great person, just really cared and was just willing to do anything coaches asked from him, players needed from him. He was always around and willing to work. And I loved his attitude. And I'm excited to start working with him again. I suspect that question might come up a little bit later on.

## ***If we stay focused on the college side for just one more moment, you ended up getting an invite to the national tournament, which in NCAA terms is pretty big, right? You get to the regional semis, but you meet a pretty strong team in Ohio State and end up going out. But what's it like to just make the tournament? And how are those regional, what's it like to be part of that regional group?***

I think that was kind of a big step up for us to get up to the national stage. And so obviously winning the CAC, we automatically get a bid into the tournament. And so we came in as one of the lower seeds because our season wasn't the strongest. And so Ohio State was a very, very good team that year. And we came in and I mean, everyone was ready to go, but just kind of felt from the start that they were a little just better prepared. They were ready a little bit. They were definitely bigger, bigger than us. And you know what, we fought hard, but it just wasn't our night. They were definitely the better team,

unfortunately, but it was really cool being on that stage. We were playing in, I think, a 12, 13, 14,000 seat arena, which is kind of a big step up. We were staying and it was in Lehigh Valley and this amazing rink and facilities and it was like, oh, boy, here we go. Now it's our time.

***You've still got a little bit of time at Princeton to run, but were a lot of guys kind of graduated and moving on at that point?***

Yeah, I think we lost some very good players that year. We lost a few good, really good defensemen and we lost a couple forwards. We lost Eric Robinson, who was obviously very good, our captain, who's now playing in the NHL. We had another guy who like would just score goals somehow, just no matter what. He wasn't necessarily the best hockey player, but somehow everything he shot went in the net, a couple of key pieces. And unfortunately, we just couldn't really, we didn't have the same success over the rest of my college career.

***So you are now on that final year, you led the team in points, you mentioned earlier that individual honours aren't necessarily as important, but does it give you a sort of stake in the ground to know you're a good player at this level and put yourself in the shop window for the pro game?***

Yeah, I think I would have liked to have a stronger end to my college career, I think I could have. I don't know if things just weren't going in for me, or just kind of a lack of chemistry built with my mates and teammates. But yeah, it wasn't necessarily ending on a high that way, I really think I could have produced more, but I was ready to kind of move on to the next level and hopefully start a pro career.

***Princeton's season ended along with many things due to COVID ?***

So we had just won the first round. And so we were about to go play the number one seed, I think was Cornell. So we were about to head up to Cornell for the weekend. And that's kind of when everything picked up. And then everything got cancelled.

***Season 2020-21, that was your first pro year. I think it's safe to say that the hockey world was very disrupted at that point. And you managed to find some nice time in Sweden in Tyringe, which isn't a town that comes up too often. How did that move come about? And how important was it to actually find a place to play?***

Yeah, so that was, obviously, an interesting year for everyone all over the world. But for me, it was slow. And I was originally signed to play in the East Coast Hockey League. And then the team I was signed with, Reading, decided not to play that season. And I was looking at a few different offers from other East Coast teams and trying to decide where the best place for me was. I was under the assumption that I didn't think the East Coast was going to continue with all the cases continuing, even though it was mostly in the south. I didn't think the hockey season would continue down there. And so I started looking overseas just to kind of stay in game shape as much as I could not go a whole year without playing any hockey games. And so opportunity came up to go over to Sweden. But it was a cool experience. I was living in a really small town in Sweden. And so it was very new for me, first pro experience. But it was good. It was fun, great group of guys. And it wasn't necessarily the best end for us. But it was just cool to see the pro game and learn a kind of different culture and live in a different country. Etan's quite a fun level of hockey as well. But compared to other leagues in Sweden, like the Allsvenskan, the tier above, and certainly the SHL, it's a little bit more open. So, you know, you have a little bit more fun for the fans and I think maybe also the players.

***What was the effect of COVID on the hockey. You see some of the guys that play in NCAA at that time when they got going that year were having to play with face masks on under their cage. They were having to live very sheltered in bubbles. What was it like in Sweden?***

Yeah, it was strange. I kind of went to Sweden because they were still very open at that time. And so I kind of thought the hockey would continue. So we didn't have anything special, really. We had to wear masks and we were testing a lot. We had a couple kind of slowdowns. But I think the weirdest part for me is that we were allowed only about five fans in the building for the games. So we had five very loud fans. But still, it was just five people. They were very passionate. But it was strange because kind of the first pro hockey experience and you kind of expect some crazy crowds and stuff like that. And it kind of felt more like minor hockey all over. Sweden was still pretty open and so you're still allowed to have everyone in the dressing rooms and train and stuff like that. So I was fortunate that way.











***You mentioned that you signed in Reading initially and you went back there for your first year in the East Coast. And actually, it was probably worth the wait in many ways, because you guys won the Eastern Conference title. Tell us a little bit about that group, because there was also quite a lot Elite League alumni in there, wasn't it? I think Patrick Bykov led you guys in points. He was in Guildford last year. Tell us about that group and that run ?***

Yeah, that was a great group of guys. That was a cool kind of first year pro hockey in North America experience. We saw everyone's kind of living close together, either in little like kind of town homes or in apartments. And so you spent a lot of time with the guys. And then obviously, there's a ton of travel and a lot of time on the bus. So you create some great friends. And I still keep in touch with a lot of those guys. And we had a lot of veterans, older guys in that team. And we, we kind of came together and we want to win a lot of hockey games. And it was a lot of fun. Just kind of hanging out on the road and stuff like that. I'd never been on like, we'd be gone for like a few weeks from home, which I never kind of experienced before with a hockey team.

The two seasons before Jackson arrived in Coventry he played in the DEL2.

## TWO NUMBER 19'S COYLE AND BROWN

This week's article features two No 19s, one from the BNL era and one from the Heineken years. One came to the club late in the season and helped Flyers to trophy success in 1999, while the other played two seasons at Kirkcaldy and was a fan favourite and part of the Heineken Championship winning team of 1985.

John Coyle was a native of British Columbia and played his early hockey in that province, before heading to North Michigan University for a season and a bit, with the remainder of 1997/98 playing for Tacoma Sabercats. He joined Telford Tigers for the 1998/99 season in the BNL and joined a number of big names on Tigers' books including John Lawless, Claude Dumas and Todd Dutiaume.

Tigers barely survived the season and were wound up in March 1999 having incurred substantial financial losses. It was reported that several players had not been paid, so it is understandable that many players left Telford, including Coyle and Dutiaume, who headed north to Flyers.

John Coyle ironically made his Flyers' debut at Telford on 06/02/99 and started as he meant to go on, scoring on his debut and adding an assist in a 6-5 overtime win. He went one better the next night at Kirkcaldy against the same opponents, scoring 2+1. He scored his only Flyers' hat-trick on 13/03/99 against Edinburgh Capitals in a fine 8-2 play-off win. He failed to score in the next three play-off games but found the net once more in the semi-final tie against Guildford Flames at Hull on 27/03/99.

He played his final game as a Flyer in the BNL play-off final on 28/03/99 against Slough Jets.

Flyers started the final in fine form and 4-1 ahead at the first break, Dutiaume, Steve Brown, John Haig and Steven King hitting the net. It was 5-2 after two periods as Dutiaume netted his second of the evening despite being outshot 3-13 in the middle session. In the third period, Jets turned on the heat and put three goals past Joe Watkins, on loan from Telford, in Flyers' net.

After a scoreless overtime period it came down to penalty shots and it was Watkins and Coyle who emerged as Flyers' heroes as the penalty shots went to sudden death. Coyle netted for Flyers then Watkins stopped Derek Higdon's effort for a Flyers' victory.

This meant that despite playing a relatively few number of games for the club, John Coyle's last goal in a Flyers uniform was the championship winning one.

Danny Brown was one of the key elements in Flyers' success story in 1984/85 and went about his job without much fuss, but was a highly effective centre as his stats reflect. He was scouted by Flyers in the summer of 1984 as Flyers aimed to wipe out the memory of a disappointing 1983/84 campaign. Along with fellow imports Ron Plumb and Dave Stoyanovich, Danny made his Flyers' debut in a challenge match against a Canadian touring team "Air Canada" on 15/09/84. He made his first competitive start as a Flyer in the tight confines of Ayr's Limekiln Road rink the following Saturday, scoring three goals and an assist in a 12-5 Autumn Cup win for a positive start to Flyers' season.

Teamed with strike partner Stoyanovich, Danny and Dave caused havoc in the opposition defences and seemed to be scoring at will. He scored points in every game up until another visit to Ayr on 10/02/85, a game he missed due to injury. This was the only game of the season in which he failed to trouble the scoreboard, recording at least a point in all the remaining games. He had season highs of seven goals v Durham on 10/11/84 and thirteen points (3+10) against Southampton on 22/12/84 and the icing on the cake was his hat-trick in the Wembley final triumph against Murrayfield.

Danny returned to Fife for 1985/86 and had a new strike partner in the form of former NHLer Todd Bidner. His strike rate once again was impressive, only failing to score at least a point in a 3-11 defeat by Murrayfield in a Scottish Cup tie on 06/03/86. He played his last competitive game for Flyers at Wembley on 26/04/86 versus Racers.

He scored his last Flyers goal in the 6-3 semi-final win against Durham the previous day, his best scoring effort was a six goal haul against Peterborough on 16/11/85 and he recorded ten points (5+5) in a 17-2 win against Glasgow on 21/0/85.

Flyers' fans were disappointed when Danny didn't return for 1986/87 as he returned home to Canada to start a business, but those Flyers who were fortunate to watch him in his two seasons as a Flyer, have only good memories of him in the No. 19 jersey.

## WEMBLEY WIZARDS

### SEASON 1984/85

A capacity all-ticket crowd in Kirkcaldy Ice Rink and a television audience of millions will tomorrow witness the eagerly awaited showdown between Scotland's two leading ice hockey teams, Fife Flyers and Murrayfield Racers. This will be the sixth meeting of the sides this season, and with just one exception, all the previous matches have been tightly contested. With Flyers still hard on the heels of league leaders Durham Wasps and defending an unbeaten home record, and Murrayfield anxious to snatch second place, everything points to another gripping encounter. Player-coach Ron Plumb knows that this is a match that Flyers must win if they are to have any chance of finishing on top of the Heineken Premier League — and is confident that his side will achieve the desired result. "We have to keep the pressure on Durham and we cannot afford to slip up," he emphasised yesterday. "It is always a close game against Murrayfield, but as long as we play to our capabilities we should come out on top. "However, we will have to play sound hockey to beat them, and we cannot take anything for granted."

Tomorrow's match has a 1 p.m. face-off and will be screened live on the BBC's "Grandstand" programme — reviving memories of Flyers' flop in the Bluecol Cup final. "We played Glasgow Dynamos in the Scottish Challenge Cup in front of the cameras on Sunday and it did not seem to bother us," said Plumb, "but there will be added pressure on us on Saturday. "The guys will be hyped up a little more than usual, but once the game starts I hope they will forget the cameras." Both teams will have to adjust to the earlier face off, and Flyers' preparations for the match will start with breakfast at Anthony's Hotel in Kirkcaldy before going to the Ice Rink for a warm up. Skipper Gordon Latto is slightly doubtful with a groin strain, and although he missed practice on Tuesday, he is expected to play. Flyers have another TV date on Sunday night when they meet Dundee Rockets in the final of the Scottish Challenge Cup at Dundee, with a 7 pm face off. Although it is a meaningless competition Plumb stressed, "We want to win every game, and we will be giving it our best shot" Meanwhile, Flyers have released defenceman Bobby McEwan who has been unable to claim a regular place in the side.

#### **23/03/1985 Fife Flyers v Murrayfield Racers Premier League**

As a spectacle, Saturday's televised match at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink was something of an anti-climax, with Fife Flyers sweeping aside the disappointing challenge of Murrayfield Racers. However, there were no complaints from the predominantly Fife support in the capacity crowd who roared their side on to a victory which virtually assures them of at least second place in the Heineken Premier League. In what was essentially a good team display, six players got their names on the scoresheet, with Dave Stoyanovich claiming a new record for the number of league goals scored in a season. If one man was to be singled out for special praise, however, it would have to be player-coach Ron Plumb who did much to blunt the Murrayfield attack as well as grabbing a couple of goals himself.

Racers played the first period without their top scorer Tony Hand who was flown back from the European Under-18 Championships in Italy especially for the match, but failed to reach Kirkcaldy in time for the face-off. There was a tremendous atmosphere in the Rink as both teams appeared on the ice, and the match began with Racers' netminder Moray Hanson in superb form, making half a dozen brilliant stops. But the pressure on the visitors' goal had to pay dividends, and it was no surprise when Danny Brown took advantage of a power play situation in the 12th minute to score with a fierce shot low to Hanson's left. Another power play opportunity two minutes later gave Flyers their second goal, with Ron Plumb finding the corner of the net with a shot from the blue line. Totally against the run of play, Hastings pulled one back for Murrayfield in a breakaway, but within a minute, a deflected effort by defenceman Stuart Drummond made the period score 3-1. Racers ran into further penalty trouble early in the second period, and with Flyers skating five against three, Dave Stoyanovich blasted home a glorious goal to break Roy Halpin's record of 94 league goals in style.





## WEMBLEY WIZARDS

### SEASON 1984/85

Former Flyer Gordon MacDougall scored a close range goal to reduce the deficit to 4-2, before tempers boiled over as Brian Peat and Tony Hand came to blows on the ice and were both penalised. Peat made a more constructive contribution to the game in the last six minutes of the period, assisting Danny Brown and Ron Plumb to stretch Flyers' lead to 6-2. Two minutes into the final period, Gordon Lattc deceived Hanson with a shot which went through a ruck of players to kill any chance of a Murrayfield recovery. Although Kelland beat Andrew Donald from close range to score Racers' third goal, Andy Linton — who had been on the receiving end of some rough treatment — had the last word with a couple of well taken goals. His first was a simple power play chance set up by Danny Brown, and the second brought a clinical finish after he was left with only Hanson to beat.

#### **24/03/1985 Dundee Rockets v Fife Flyers Scottish Cup Final**

Fife Flyers became the first winners of the new Scottish Challenge Cup on Sunday, defeating Dundee Rockets in a thrilling final which proved to be a great advertisement for British ice hockey. More than 1500 Fife fans made the journey to Dundee, and they were rewarded by the sight of skipper Gordon Latto lifting Flyers' first silverware for many seasons. The lead changed hands several times during the course of the match, and it took two goals in the last 70 seconds to bring the trophy to Kirkcaldy. Yet the game had started badly for Flyers, with Rockets racing into a two goal lead in under two minutes through Bois and Salter. Flyers hit back immediately when Andy Linton scored straight from a face-off in the Dundee zone, and a power play goal by player-coach Ron Plumb made it 2-2 after only six minutes. Just 30 seconds later, however, ex-Flyer Charlie Kinmond restored Rockets' lead with a breakaway goal which separated the sides at the first buzzer. The second period was only four minutes old when Bois again put the Dundee side two ahead, and Flyers looked in trouble soon after when Neil Abel was sent to the penalty box. However, not only did Flyers keep their goal intact, they managed to reduce the leeway through a fine Dave Stoyanovich goal. Midway through the match, Danny Brown made it 4-4, and with less than a minute of the period remaining, Stoyanovich put Flyers ahead for the first time. With both sides skating a man short, the visitors went further ahead through Brown, but Wood brought the score back to 6-5 with 10 minutes left. Five minutes later, Dave Stoyanovich completed his hat-trick with the best goal of the evening — but the drama was only just beginning! Two goals in two minutes by Bois, one from a power play situation, levelled the scores three minutes from the end. When Kinmond was given a two minute penalty for tripping, however, Flyers had the power play chance they needed, and Ron Plumb put his side ahead with just 70 seconds on the clock. Andrew Donald twice denied Rockets the equaliser, but Flyers made certain of victory in the dying seconds when Stoyanovich drilled a low shot into the net.
