Fife and Cardiff met for the final time this season with the Flyers looking to avoid a season sweep at the hands of the Devils. The Flyers were still without the injured Phélix Martineau, Patrick Kyte and Aiden Wilson with Cameron Kenny and James Spence also scratched. The visitors scratches were Mark Richardson, Reid Duke, Hunter Shinkaruk and Josh MacDonald.

The Flyers got off to a slow start as the visitors pounced for a couple of early goals. With 65 seconds on the clock defenceman Jarrod Gourley was down low on the play and from the side of the net he lifted a backhand shot that found space above Shane Owen's shoulder. Just 23 seconds later and the Devils doubled their lead when Owen made the initial save on a Ryan Barrow shot but the rebound fell to Bradley Schoonbaert who was around the net to clean up the garbage. The Flyers were under further pressure in the 4th minute when a cross ice pass resulted in a one timer from Joey Martin that Owen made a blocker save on and moments later he made an instinctive pad save as Brett Perlini tipped the puck goalwards from the slot. The Flyers eventually made Ben Bowns work in the 6th minute when the Devils keeper let a rebound out from a Kieran Craig shot and he had to look sharp as Lucas Chiodo on the follow up forced a fine reaction save. The first penalty of the game was handed the way of the Devils as Barrow sat for two minutes for slashing the stick. The Flyers couldn't get the play set up in the Devils zone and they easily completed the kill without a shot on Bowns. In the 12th minute Evan Mosey cruised down the slot and his wrister was turned away by Owen. Brodie Kay went end to end with the puck and his shot from the circles was blockered away by the Devils goalie. Ben Davies went to the net in the 14th minute but Owen shut him down. The Devils went on their first power play in the 17th minute when Tyler Heidt shot the puck over the glass for delay of game. Owen made a pad save on a Martin one timer but could do nothing to stop a shot from the slot on the turn from Perlini creeping in at his post to extend the visitors lead. With just 12 seconds remaining in the period the Flyers had the puck in the net when Jonas Emmerdahl floated the puck on the Devils net and Bowns failed to track it as it hit the top corner. The officials indicated a goal on the ice but on review reversed it and washed it out.

PERIOD 2

The first chance of the second period went the way of the home side as Daniel Krenželok was denied by a toe save by Bowns. The Devils added another goal in the 24th minute with a swift counter transition and Cole Sanford picked the bottom corner on Owen. The Flyers had a let off in the 29th minute when they were guilty of a giveaway in their own zone and a tic tac toe play between Zach O'Brien and Kohen Olischefski saw the latter pull his shot wide of a gaping net with Owen dragged out of position.

MATCH REPORT

Heidt was in the box again in the 30th minute when he was guilty of a hook. The Devils made their man advantage count again when Owen made an initial save on a Martin shot but Perlini standing in the slot was able to force the rebound home. A minute later and Schoonbaert went close when his shot struck the outside of the post. Owen did well in the 36th minute to stop a mid-air bunt of the puck by Sam Duggan and as the puck went in behind the goalie he was able to find it again and cover up for a whistle. The Flyers got on the scoreboard in the 38th minute when they laid siege to the Devils net. Bowns made stops on Chiodo and Emmerdahl before Massimo Carozza fed the puck into the slot and Craig was able to redirect it past the Devils goalie.

PERIOD 3

Into the third period and in the 42nd minute Martin walked out of the corner after the Flyers turned the puck over and he tried to go shelf on Owen who stayed tall and got a shoulder on the puck to make the save. Some neat interplay by Charles-Antoine Paiement and Evan MacKinnon set up a chance for Austin Farley but Bowns was sharp to make the stop. A minute later and the Devils returned to the power play as Paiement sat for slashing. Once again they took advantage as Mosey put the puck on net and Martin redirected it over Owen and into the top of the net. The Flyers grabbed a goal back in the 51st minute as Heidt lugged the puck down the right wing and he had Michael Cichy going to the net who he hit with a pas and the puck was stuffed underneath Bowns. In the 54th minute the Devils missed another open goal when Sam Duggan fluffed on a one timer after Owen was frozen on the play. A minute later and another gaping net was missed as Olischefski set up Gourley who could only hit glass behind the net. In the 56th minute Martin saw his shot from the shot ping the post before he tried to go five hole on Owen as he went to the net but the Flyers keeper shut the wickets. MacKinnon made a big shot block in the 57th minute and the Flyers finished the game on the power play as Olischefski got the gate for cross checking at 59 minutes. Bowns made a good save on Chiodo and in the last few ticks of the game the Devils survived a scramble around their net as time expired with Gourley and Paiement getting roughing minors from the scrum of players that ensued.

THE CLASS OF '85



RON PLUMB No 3

Aged 34. Flyers player/coach has played at the highest level throughout his distinguished career. W.H.A. defenceman of the year in 76/77 and played in the NHI with Hartford Whalers. Voted coach of the month on two occasions this season. Has played a very important part in Flyers revival this season.



ANDY LINTON No 14

Aged 23. Returned to his home town club this season after a spell with Nottingham. Has fitted in well on the right wing and has proved he has an eye for the net.

CHIC COTTRELL No 15

Aged 30. He is Flyers senior player having made his debut as a 15 year old. Last season he received Kirkcaldy Ice Hockey Club's "Special Award" for services to ice hockey in Kirkcaldy. A Scotland and GB international. Has made a remarkable recovery from a serious injury sustained in training this season.



GORDON LATTO No 16

Aged 25. He is Flyers team captain and is without doubt one of Britain's best ever players. Had a spell in Sweden after leaving school and on his return was the N.I.H.A'.s "Player of the Year" for three consecutive seasons. Is a Scotland and Great Britain international who was voted Flyers Most Valuable Player last season.







NEIL ABEL No 6

Aged 24. Has been dogged by injury in his career but

this season has emerged as a top class defenceman.

Uses his excellent skating ability to good effect.

Aged 24. The biggest player in the Flyers line up, he has improved this season playing alongside Ron Plum. He has a very powerful slap shot.

JIMMY PENNYCOOK No 7

STUART DRUMMOND No 4

Aged 27. Signed this season from Dundee. N.I.H.A. Rookie of the Year season 73/74. Is a Scotland and Great Britain international who has played in 3 World Championships. A prolific scorer throughout his career.





DAVE STOYANOVICH No 9

Aged 26. A man who has rewritten all the British scoring records this season. Started his professional career in Canada and played last season with Nova Scotia Voyageurs of the American Hockey League. Possesses a phenomenal slap shot and in fact scored 13 goals in one game this season.

MURRAY McLELLAN No 11 Aged 27. Has played all his competitive hockey for Fife. An excellent skater who has the habit of scoring spectacular goals.

Aged 20. Joined Flyers from Glasgow last season. A player who always gives 100% he is a Great Britain










The Flyers made their final visit of the season to the Guildford Spectrum and travelled without the injured trio of Phelix Martineau, Patrick Kyte and Aiden Wilson. Cameron Kenny and James Spence were also scratched for the visitors. The Flames were without Kyle Locke, Austin Glover, Sam Jones the recently departed Charlie Dodero and Jake Coughler.

Shane Owen was in action in the opening couple of minutes as he made saves an Ryan Tait and Brett Ferguson. In the 4th minute Eamon McAdam made his initial stop of the game as had trouble with a one-time blast from Olivier LeBlanc from the blue line that caught him on the shoulder as he was slow to track the flight of the puck. The Flames goalie was in action a minute later when he fought off a snapshot from Charles-Antoine Paiement from the circle. Owen made a right pad save on a shot by Daniel Tedesco from the high slot in the 6th minute and as the game flowed end to end moments later McAdam had to be alert to take away the space for Kieran Craig who was parked on the edge of his crease. In the 7th minute a tight angled shot by Charlie Curti was held by the Fife keeper who then survived a scramble around his net. The Flames were denied the lead by a fantastic Owen save in the 8th minute when he stoned James Shearer on a back door play. The Flyers went on the first power play of the night in the 9th minute when Daniel Krenželok was tripped by Brett Welychka. The Flyers controlled almost all of the two minutes and McAdam made saves on Michael Cichy and Tyler Heidt but they couldn't break the deadlock. Just before the Flames returned to full strength Owen blockered away a shorthanded bid by Ryan Tait. Moments later Owen stood tall to deny Ferguson as he took the puck to the net. In the 12th minute McAdam didn't cleanly hold a shot from Brodie Kay and a minute later the Flyers were let off the hook as Owen was sprawling in his crease and Mike Crocock with most of the net to aim at sent the puck straight through the crease and past the far post. The Flames went close again in the 14th minute with Daniel Catenacci taking the puck to the net and Owen eventually got the whistle as he did a snow angle to freeze the puck. The Flyers were penalised on the play however as Heidt went to the box for slashing and the Flames made their man advantage count. Ferguson collected the puck down low and his cross crease pas was finished by Tedesco with Owen having no chance. McAdam made a toe save on Jordan Stallard in the 16th minute before Evan MacKinnon was hobbled blocking a fierce one timer from Travis Brown and he didn't return to the game. In the 18th minute a 2 on 1 break saw Massimo Carozza feed the puck to Lucas Chiodo who was denied by the outstretched leg of McAdam. Right on the interval buzzer LeBlanc was called for a hooking infraction.

PERIOD 2

The Flames on their second power play of the game worked Owen early who denied Tait with a full stretch stop. The home side did however double their advantage as Brown made a desperation play at the blue line to keep the puck in the Flyers zone and Tedesco fed to puck over to Tait who beat Owen with a shot top shelf. The Flames added another goal in the 24th minute as Lewis Hook pivoted at the face off dot and his shot hit the shoulder of Owen before spinning up into the air and it dropped behind the Flyers netminder and dribbled across the goal line. Matt Alfaro had all sorts of time and space in the slot in the 25th minute but Owen flashed the leather to deny him.

MATCH

REPORT

The Flyers went back on the power play in the 26th minute when Tedesco was called for a high stick on Craig. McAdam made a save on a shot from the blue line from LeBlanc but it was home side who almost found the net when Jack Jacome raced away short handed and as he ran out of real estate he dropped the puck to Catenacci but Owen again produced a stellar save with the pad. The Flames completed the kill just after Austin Farley was stopped by McAdam. In the 29th minute Chiodo on an odd man rush feathered the puck over to Carozza at the lip of the Flames crease but McAdam made himself big to make the block. Jacome had his shot swallowed by Owen in the 30th minute. Two minutes later and the Flames added a fourth goal when a shot from the blue line by Curti was tipped in the slot by Welychka and the puck flew into the top corner. In the 35th minute McAdam made another save on Farley and the Flames keeper stopped a drive to the net by Craig in the 38th minute as Josh Waller was called for a slash on the play to return the visitors to the power play. Craig carried the puck towards the Flames goal but his back hand sailed over the bar before it nearly bounced into the net after coming back off the glass. The Flyers almost conceded a shorthanded goal when Catenacci was absolutely robbed by Owen before the teams played the final few seconds 4 on 4 following Paiement getting the gate for a slash.

PERIOD 3

The Flames returned to full strength and onto another power play early in the final period. Owen had to make a save from a close in effort by Alfaro before another tip in front of him by Ferguson forced a fine reaction save as the Flyers returned to full strength. In the 43rd minute Craig had a partial breakaway but pulled his shot wide of the post and moments later Owen made a stop again on Alfaro who was caught on the play by a check by Paiement who was sent to the penalty box. The officials decided to review the play and the Fife player was assessed a 5 plus game for a check to the head. The Flames extended power play produced a catalogue of chances and Owen as would be expected was a busy man. He held a blast from Brown before he made a pad save on Jacome and was in position to thwart Waller with the follow up shot from the slot. The Fife keeper made a scrambling save to stop Ferguson before the Flyers had a short handed chance when Craig saw McAdam blocker away his shot. Owen got help from his post as Jacome struck iron from a bad angle. With three seconds of the kill remaining the Flames were called for too many men and the Flyers went back on the power play after returning to full strength. The visitors got their reward for their endeavor when Carozza and Cichy combined to set up Craig in front of the net who was able to steer the puck home past an out of position McAdam. In the 51st minute Waller put a wrist shot just wide of the Fife goal and in the 53rd minute McAdam almost a let a dump in by Krenželok get past him. The Flyers defenceman was moved up to the wing as the Flyers were now down to seven forwards. In the 56th minute Hook loaded up for a big one timer but Owen was across his goal in an instant to make a solid pad save. A minute later and Krenželok forced a save by McAdam before the Flames keeper made a huge stop on Craig with a couple of minutes remaining. Marcus Tesink was sent to the box for hooking as the Flyers finished the game on the power play. The visitors called a time out and when they won the draw the pulled Owen to skate 6 on 4 but despite controlling the puck in the Flames zone they couldn't find an opening and almost gave up an empty net goal in the final seconds as a blocked puck slithered towards the empty cage but stopped inches from the line as the clock expired.

The Flyers entertained the Coventry Blaze for the final time this season. The home side were still without the injured Phélix Martineau, Patrick Kyte and Aiden Wilson with Evan MacKinnon joining them on the sidelines after leaving the game in the first period the night before in Guildford. James Spence and Cameron Kenny were also scratched. The visitors were without Zach Vinnell and Jakob Stridsberg and had a couple of familiar faces on their bench with the return of Brady Pouteau and Andy Little who was called in as an emergency back up goalie for the night.

The visitors took advantage of a breakdown in the Flyers zone in the opening minute as Jānis Voris was beaten by Alessio Luciani who went top shelf over the keepers shoulder from a tight angle. The Flyers first effort on goal came in the 4th minute with Lucas Chiodo at the side of the net but Mat Robson held his post to make the save. A minute later and Massimo Carozza let a shot go that Robson couldn't handle but Austin Farley knocked the rebound past the post. The Flyers went closer still in the 6th minute when Kieran Craig deflected the puck mid air and it dipped on goal to hit the base of the post before being cleared. The Flyers had another chance in the 11th minute when Chiodo tipped the puck at the side of the net but the Blaze keeper got over to make the block. Voris made a double save in the 15th minute as the Blaze threatened with both teams going up and down the ice trading chances. Moments later the Flyers were back on level terms when Voris made a save and Jordan Stallard picked up the puck to set Chiodo away down the left side. He drove to the net and went forehand backhand to beat Robson with a low shot. The home side took the lead in the 18th minute with another well worked goal involving Chiodo and Charles-Antoine Paiement with the puck being dropped to Daniel Krenželok who stepped in off the blue lined and his rip found the bottom corner stick side on Robson. The period came to a close with Voris denying Mike Kennedy who was up supporting the Blaze rush.

PERIOD 2

30 seconds into the middle period the Flyers were assessed the first penalty of the game when Carozza was given the gate for slashing. The Fife penalty killers did a good job of keeping the Blaze to the perimeter and with just seconds remaining Voris had to make his first save when he got a pad to a Michael Regush shot as the Fifers returned to full strength. Voris made a good stop on Zach Heintz who came down the left side with speed in the 24th minute.

MATCH REPORT

The Blaze were enjoying more zone time in the Flyers end of the ice and almost levelled the game in the 26th minute when Alexander Kuqali floated the puck on net through traffic which Voris didn't pick up and the sound of the pipe pinging would have been music to his ears. The game was tied however moments later when Nick Seitz picked out Luciani with a pin point pass as he drove the back door and he tapped the puck past a sprawling Voris. The Blaze had their tails up and in the space of a couple of minutes Voris made two good blocker saves to deny Jackson Cressey. The visitors got the go ahead goal in the 30th minute when former Flyers defenceman Brady Pouteau found a gap to beat Voris with a low shot from the high slot. In the 33rd minute Paiement tried his luck short side but Robson had his post well sealed to make the save. The Coventry keeper then kept a Ben Brown shot out a minute later with a shoulder save. The Flyers were unlucky not to find the puck in a scramble around Robson as Chiodo and Carozza dug away at the loose puck. The Blaze then transitioned down ice and Brandon Alderson was denied by the metal work. In the 38th minute Cressey was afforded room to come in off the half wall and shot from the circles which forced a good stop by Voris. Voris made another solid save when he flashed the glove to snag a Regush one timer from the slot following a drop pass. The Flyers went back on the power play with a few seconds left of the period when David Clements was called for holding the stick.

PERIOD 3

Starting the third period with the man advantage the Flyers were unable to get anything set up until the last few seconds when Robson made a save on a Paiement shot as the visitors returned to full strength. In the 43rd minute Carozza carried the puck into the Blaze zone and found Chiodo who was in close on Robson with the keeper able to block the puck away. The Flyers were back on the power play in the 44th minute when good speed by Paiement forced Cressey to trip him. The Blaze killers did the job however without the Flyers getting a shot on Robson as they returned to full strength. Voris fought of a big blast by Alderson in the 48th minute. A minute later and Jonas Emmerdahl fired a shot in that Robson let out a big rebound on but Brown knocked the rebound wide of target. In the 51st minute the visitors survived a scramble around their net as Chiodo tried to bank the puck home from an angle before Stallard had a shot blocked and with a mass of humanity in the Blaze crease the puck was scrambled clear. In the 56th minute Voris made a big pad save on Morten Jurgens and two minutes later Regush tried to go top corner on Voris but his shot from below the circles flashed over the net. Into the final two minutes and Jurgens was called for a trip on Krenželok. The Flyers called their time out clearly to draw up a plan for pulling Voris. They did so with 90 seconds left to skate 6 on 4. Kim Tallberg had a chance at the empty net but missed but the Flyers just couldn't get the play set up in the Blaze zone as the visitors held on for the win.

The Giants saw a shot come back off McAdam's post as they almost went ahead, but the scores were tied heading into the third. "Making sure we came out hard against Belfast was important," explained Flames' Charlie Curti. "They'd lost a few coming into this one but they're really structured and you can't under-estimate them. "We played a good game, just didn't get what we deserved in the end." An early kill by the Giants came after they thought they'd scored - Scott Conway batted the puck into the net, but play was whistled down for an interference minor on JJ Piccinich in the build-up. Belfast then called a timeout at 48:28 as they were about to go on the powerplay. The Flames survived two minors as the clock ticked down, but then themselves hit a post to deny them going ahead. On the very next play, Piccinich saw a shot come back off the crossbar. With the game seemingly heading to overtime, Josh Roach rocketed a shot off a Conway faceoff win past McAdam to put the Giants back ahead with 58 seconds to play. On the resulting faceoff, loose play by the Flames in their own end allowed Jordan Kawaguchi to make it 3-1 just nine seconds later. Brett Ferguson added a consolation for the Flames on the buzzer, but it was a win for the Giants in a game which 60 seconds before had looked like it might take overtime to decide. "It was exciting to see that one go in!" added Roach. "We'd talked about a faceoff play and it worked out as good as we'd planned. I made a good shot there, and then it was great to see the Kawaguchi goal go in on the next shift to give us some breathing room." Roach concluded: "I think it was a good game by both teams, we're proud of our effort. We controlled parts of that game against s really good team. Just towards the end they had a nice shot, and that was the difference."

Dundee Stars 4 Manchester Storm 3 Shootout

Dundee Stars wrapped up a six-point week despite being down to just three lines with a 4-3 shootout win over Manchester Storm on Tayside. 1,842 fans saw arguably the most exciting game of the season at the Dundee Ice Arena. "The team played great head to toe, even with a short roster we were really really good and managed to find a way all week and even today we found a way to win and that's all that matters" said Jarrett Fiske, who logged his third win of the week. "Morale is really high, and you know the boys are buying in and we're doing a lot of the little things right and it's adding up to big things." Manchester entered Dundee looking to secure two vital league points, as they sit seven points behind the Stars in the standings who currently occupy the final playoff spot. Brendan Harms struck first for the home team, netting his eighth point in his last four games with a shot that beat David Tendeck top corner just 45 seconds into the game. It didn't take the visitors long to respond, as Jake Durflinger equalised less than a minute later at 01:38 after redirecting a shot past Jarrett Fiske to make it 1-1. Fiske made an initial pad save on a shot from the Manchester blue line, however Ryan Hughes was first to the rebound and sent the puck into the Stars' net to give his team their first lead of the night at 15:51. ON THEIR ROSTER

In this edition we focus on former Giants Captain **David Goowin** with extracts from a recent interview.

So David, take us back and remind us exactly where you're from?

Yeah, originally from St. Louis, Missouri in the United States, obviously, and thank you, which is just a little bit south of Chicago, so right in the middle of the country. And yeah, kind of lived there my whole life. One of five children, two loving parents, and have nothing but very fond memories of my childhood and growing up in St. Louis.

Have you a message for them out there?

I appreciate their support and getting me to a great place like Belfast and to this opportunity here.

Tell me about the young David, was he always going to be an ice hockey player professionally? What would they say?

Well, my mom's from Memphis, Tennessee, which is in the south, so she has a pretty strong southern accent, so she would probably say something like, oh, that David, he was such a troublemaker growing up. But yeah, I mean, I think they knew I was always very committed to ice hockey and a driven kid and quite competitive, so I don't think they're overly surprised that I've had the career that I've had. What number did you come within those five children and how that shaped you ?

Yeah, so I'm right in the middle. I have two older brothers and two younger sisters, and I always say that being a middle child, you kind of fly under the radar a little bit, so maybe you get away with a little bit more than my older brothers or my younger sisters did growing up.

So when we think of America, maybe we <mark>might think</mark> of baseball and American football. Why ice hockey?

Yeah, of course, a lot of my classmates played soccer and baseball growing up. I was a little unique playing hockey, but I just like the competitiveness of it, and I've always been, you know, intrigued by the uniqueness. It is a little bit off the beaten path in terms of the sporting world, and I just love, you know, obviously the physicality as well, so it just seemed to be a good fit for me growing up. And of course, my older brothers played ice hockey as well, so I think my parents, out of convenience, it was convenient for them to just take all of us to the ice rink and not have to take ice rink, baseball, diamond, soccer field.



Could you give us a little bit of a story of what your, your sporting life was like in the states ?

Yeah, so growing up, I, probably similar to, you know, youth sports here in Belfast, but, you know, I was going to school at, you know, normal times, and then all my ice hockey activities was after school, but as I got older into high school, it was every day after school for a few hours and then I went to Penn State University, and I played college hockey there for four years, and I had a really good career there, and I had professional opportunities, after Penn State just because I had a good college hockey career, and, then in 2017, I turned pro, so that's kind of the normal progression.

Culturally in the UK a lot of us would have grown up kicking a football, how do you realise you've got a hockey talent? Do you start ice skating first, or is it straight to hockey?

You certainly have to start with skating, like if you can't ice skate, you can't play hockey. So, ice skating is by far the most important thing for ice hockey, but yeah, no, I started playing probably at age four or five, and I think my parents just realized that I was a little bit better than the rest of the kids type of thing, and so they were, you know, oh, maybe we should keep him in ice hockey. He's doing quite well at this, so I think it was really as simple as that.

And fast forward, when did you realize that you could make a career out of it?

Yeah, I think in high school, so maybe 2008, 2009. That was when I really kind of took ownership of my career and really kind of fully committed to it and kind of decided that this wasn't just, you know, an after-school sport for me, and you know, of course, I'm grateful for that commitment because it's taken me to a lot of great places and had a lot of great experiences.

I went to school with Rory McIlroy, the golfer. He was a little bit younger than me. Everyone was saying to him, you know, being a professional sports person, it'll never work out. Did you have a bit of that when you were growing up?

Yeah, maybe a little bit, mainly because of, as someone mentioned, I'm not the tallest athlete they've seen, but I like to think I make up for it with other, you know, attributes to my game, but yeah, I guess me and Rory McIlroy are more similar than I thought. I can promise you, though, if anyone's wondering out there, our salaries are nowhere the same.

Do you play golf, by the way?

Yeah, we actually play at Hollywood Golf Club, which is his home course. They have like a parking space for him, and me and my teammates always joke about like parking in there and seeing what would happen. I think those guys with like the red hats, like the parking people, they would get pretty upset with us.

You ended up in Scandinavia. How did that happen?

Yeah, so when I graduated Penn State in 2017, I had some professional opportunities to stay in North America, but I had this contract offer to go to Finland, and I'd always been intrigued and, you know, maybe living in a different country, learning different culture. And so it was kind of a no-brainer for me, you know, the opportunity was good, the money was good, and I was kind of like, heck yeah, let's do it. So it was actually only seven miles from the Russian border, so I don't know if I would go there right now, but at the time in 2017, it was a good decision.



And speaking of that phrase, I don't know if I'd go there right now, there was a time when maybe your folks back home would be saying, David Belfast? Really? Did you have any of that? Yeah, a little bit. So in 2019, when I first made contact with Belfast, I think, you know, I don't think there was any pushback, but there was just some, like, maybe we should do a little bit more research on this than some of the other places. You know, I think in general, Americans are naive to anywhere else in the world besides America, and so, you know, it was just something that I had to do my due diligence on.

And did you hear all these stats and people throw them out about, you know, how relatively few Americans have a passport? Did you grow up always having a passport?

Yeah, th<mark>ankfully my mom mainly, she really had that desire that h</mark>er kids would travel a lot, so we've kind of had passports our whole lives, but yeah, under 50% of Americans have passports.

The US is a big country. How does it compare with here (United Kingdom)?

It does not compare at all. I don't know if I could think of a single similarity from here, from the US to Belfast. It's just, yeah, it's a different world.

An American pastor was saying on the radio this morning that culturally the UK and US are poles apart. Are there similarities in the people?

You know, obviously, like you said the country of America is massive, so, you know, the people in the South, people on the East Coast, Midwest, they're all kind of different, but speaking of the people of Belfast, I've had nothing but very pleasant experiences with them. I was actually thinking on the way over here about one of my first experiences in Belfast. We all live in the Titanic Quarter on the Giants, and I walked into town. I was going to a restaurant, and I didn't know where I was. I didn't have a SIM card in my phone yet, and so I asked the locals, like, hey, can you help me find La Taqueria, which is now one of my favourite Mexican places, and they were like, yeah, yeah, so I was just assuming they were going to, like, point me in the right direction, you know, like, oh, it's that way. This gentleman walked me to La Taqueria. He's like, here it is. I'm like, yeah, I see that now. Thank you so much, you know, which is about, like, a seven minute walk, and that was one of my first experiences in Belfast, and I think from there, I was like, this place is, it has, you know, it has something, like, it's unique in a way, very friendly, very welcoming.

You came, you went away, and you came back again?

Yeah, so I arrived here in November 2019, only a few months before COVID. That kind of threw a wrench into the plans, but when I got the opportunity to come back last season, again, no brainer to get back to Belfast.



Ice hockey in this part of the world, you know, it's not at the same standard, maybe, as America, but it has really taken off in recent years?

Yeah, absolutely. Of course it's not like the NHL back in the U.S. or in Canada, but it is very respectable on the European stage, and we're starting to compete really well with other leagues in Europe for, to get, to bring in the top players, and so it's come a long way. The Giants are roughly, 20 years old, and they've made a lot of strides in that time.

What's the makeup of the Giants team and how do you find integrating into Belfast when your life is so focused on, you know, the Giants?

80% of the guys on the team are North American. Of that 80%, the majority are Canadians. There's a few Americans like myself, and then the rest are either Scottish or English, but mainly North American, and yeah, like I mentioned, well, pretty much everyone on the team lives in the Titanic Quarter, which, of course, great area, like, you know, it's right by the Odyssey, which is very convenient for us. That's where we play our matches and do our training, but it is a little bit removed from the city center, and so it's kind of like anything. If guys are really wanting to immerse themselves in the culture here in Belfast, they have that opportunity, but there are some guys that really are just here for the hockey and really just here for work, which is also fine, and they'll more likely just stay over in the Titanic Quarter and stick with work and the apartment, so, yeah.

Tell us a little bit about what you believe in, your faith ?

Yeah, so my Christian faith has been kind of the bedrock of my life. Um, it's something l, I prioritize greatly, and, you know, I think it parallels well with, with being an athlete. Obviously, in the athletic world, you have ups and downs and, and, you know, highs and lows, and, and, uh, you know, I credit a lot of my, my Christian faith of getting me through some of those tougher times, uh, throughout my career, and, um, you know, it's cliche to say, but, you know, you never know where you're going to be if you didn't, if I didn't have that, and I think that's applicable for my situation, so something very important to me and something I really cherish.

Tell us about being the captain, and you know, it has a bigger role in some sports than others. What's it like in hockey?

Yeah, of course, first thing I would say is it's a massive privilege to represent, you know, the team in the capacity that I do. So it's something I don't take lightly at all. But yeah, in my time as being captain, as the fans here would know, we've had a lot of success. We've won a couple trophies, hoping to win a couple more this year. And so things have gone pretty well under my reign so far. So hoping to keep that going. But yeah, first and foremost, it's an absolute privilege.



How important are the fans to you?

They are a big reason for a lot of the success we've had. And we really feed off of their support. So very appreciative to you all and to all the fans of Belfast. And a lot of the matches recently and still to come have been sellouts. The capacity is, what, 6,000? Just over 6,000? Yeah, certainly over 6,000. I know last year we were still kind of dealing with some of the COVID stuff, but this year the fans have just been spectacular. The attendance has been excellent and it's something that certainly doesn't go unnoticed. So yeah, they've been incredibly supportive this year particularly.

All of us that have wanted to be footballers or rugby players or whatever, and you see the man or the woman with that kick in the last minute, and some of them seem to relish it. Give it to me. I don't care about the pressure, just give me the chance. Are you like that?

I am like that, but I would have to admit in our most recent game I shot fifth in penalties and I didn't score. So I do like the moment, but I didn't come in clutch last weekend. So I got some work to do.

I spoke to the BBC's Nigel Ringland, who was at the match, and he tells me that those shootouts are a bit of a lottery. Like all penalty shootouts, you know, if the keeper or the goal... Goalie, we would call it goalie. Goalie just chooses the right way, it's a lottery?

Kind of. I think it's less of a lottery than soccer. I think in soccer it's truly like if they guess the right way. Okay. But in hockey, I mean, the net's small enough where the goalie really can react to the move or the shot that the player is presenting. So I would argue with Nigel, if you want me to, that it's absolutely not a lottery and that it is a very reactionary situation.

Is your dad a bridge builder or was he a bridge builder?

Yeah, he still is. Bridge industry.

You know, without sort of taking this too far, but, you know, it's part of what you're trying to do as a player on and off the ice?

Yeah, you know, I think that kind of came once I got more familiar with Belfast and the role that the Giants have in the community. But of course, like the intro said, like, you know, we promote, you know, we want all fans from all sorts of, you know, all four corners of Belfast to support the Giants. And for me to play a small part in that, it's a privilege.

And when you say the fans play a big part, what does that do to you as an athlete on the ice? Yeah, you know, I think it just kind of gives us that sixth gear. Obviously, it's such a long season there. Fatigue plays such an enormous factor for all the teams. And when we come home to the SSE Arena and we have such an electric and enthusiastic crowd supporting us, it allows us to push through some of that fatigue that obviously the away team is not able to do. So it absolutely is a big plus for us.


TWO NUMBER 77S BEAUSOLEIL AND KADIC

Only half a dozen or so players have worn No77 as a Flyer and this article highlights a couple, one from 1989/90 in the Heineken Premier Division and one from Flyers' first Elite League season 2011/12. Both players were Flyers for one season only, the two seasons differing in terms of Flyers' success.

Luc Beausoleil was a French Canadian who played his junior years at Laval in the QMHL and was a high scoring right wing in his time there. At the end of his junior career he moved to Scotland and joined Murrayfield Racers as a replacement for fellow Canadian Denis Paul, who returned home injured after the Autumn Cup campaign and three league games.

It didn't take him long to forge a high scoring partnership with player/coach Louis Haman. Between them they scored 156 goals in league and play-off games, with Luc averaging around three goals a game. This evidently attracted Flyers' management and he was signed to partner another former Racer Rick Fera to spearhead Flyers' first line.

In his early Flyers career Beausoleil wore the number 7 shirt but changed to No77 in October 1989. His competitive debut was on 09/09/89 against Ayr Raiders in a 2-5 Autumn Cup defeat at Kirkcaldy. He scored 1+1 in that game, having tallied 4+4 in three challenge games prior to the season's start. The team was clearly missing the firepower of Beausoleil's strike partner, who missed five Autumn Cup games with injury, Flyers losing four of the games in which Fera was absent.



That said, Beausoleil scored in each of his first twelve competitive games for the club and had points in his first 19 Autumn Cup or league outings, before being held pointless in a 2-17 thrashing at Cardiff on 09/12/89. In fact he was only prevented from recording at least a point in only a handful of league games.

His play-off output wasn't quite as prolific and scored his last Flyers goal in a 13-3 win over Durham Wasps on 31/03/90 netting 2+4. His last Flyers appearance was at Wembley on 20/04/90 in a 1-5 semi-final defeat by Cardiff, being credited with a lone assist.

After leaving Flyers he signed for Swindon where he averaged over four points a game in British League Division 1 and finished his career with nine years in minor pro hockey mostly in North America.

His time at Flyers was mostly positive and generally matched the scoring expectations placed on an import forward during that era, scoring around four points a game.




The next No 77 was Flyers' first Slovenian import, Denis Kadic who was part of Flyers' squad which toiled for nearly the whole season 2011/12, a year in which the team won only eight of 54 and finished eight points adrift of Edinburgh Capitals at the foot of the table and a whopping 73 points behind champions Belfast.

Flyers were already bottom of the table when arguably the top two imports on the team Matt Siddall and Mike Hamilton walked out on the club. Their replacements were Frantisek Bakrlik and Denis Kadic. Denis had played the majority of his career in his homeland and in Croatia, having represented Slovenia at Under 20 level.

Kadic made his Flyers debut in a 1-3 home defeat against Cardiff on 14/01/12 and recorded an assist on Kyle Horne's shutout breaking goal with 27 seconds remaining. His first Flyers goal was the game winner at Braehead against Clan on 18/01/12 and netted the winning penalty shot in the next home match against Coventry in a 3-2 win.

Kadic was part of a battling squad who dragged themselves off the foot of the table albeit for a very short time before eventually finishing in the place they had occupied for most of the season. He played his last Flyers game in a penalty strewn 3-11 defeat at Murrayfield against Capitals on 25/03/12 and had scored his last Flyers goal the previous week in a 2-6 home defeat to Braehead on 17/03/12.

This was to be Denis' only spell playing in the UK and played in parts of the next eleven seasons in France, then back home in Slovenia. A hard worker, Denis didn't fully match the quality of import he was expected to replace, but looked like he gave his best in his short stay at Kirkcaldy.




WEMBLEY WIZARDS SEASON 1984/85

Fife Flyers complete their home fixtures in the Heineken Premier League with a double header against Streatham and Ayr this weekend. However, while bidding to retain their unbeaten record in Kirkcaldy, Ron Plumb's men will take more than a passing interest in the result of tomorrow's match in Dundee where Durham Wasps are the visitors. If Flyers are to finish on top of the table, Durham have to slip up somewhere, and Dundee would seem to present the best chance of that happening. Nevertheless, Flyers must concentrate on taking full points from Streatham and Ayr to maintain their challenge. "We want to keep the momentum going for the play-offs," stressed Plumb yesterday. Jimmy Pennycook is not available this weekend while both Stuart Drummond and Andy Linton are doubtful through injury and have no more than a 50-50 chance of playing. Dave Stoyanovich requires just five goals from this weekend's matches to bring up his 100th Heineken League goal of the season. Meanwhile Plumb was delighted at his team's success in the Scottish Challenge Cup. "It was a great game for the fans and the guys are thrilled to have won the trophy" he said. Flyers will parade the cup at tomorrow's game against Streatham.

30/03/1985 Fife Flyers v Streatham Redskins Premier League

Fife Flyers recorded another convincing Heineken Premier League victory at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink on Saturday night, but were never fully stretched by a disappointing Streatham outfit. With the disheartening news of Durham's win at Dundee, the game was something of an anticlimax, and the rather muted crowd saw one of the season's less spectacular matches. Nevertheless, the 71-19 shot tally in Flyers' favour shows how remarkable the scoreline might have been but for a defiant performance by Redskins' netminder, Jeff Smith. Although winger Jimmy Pennycook was unavailable, Stuart Drummond and Andy Linton were both passed fit to play. Flyers took the initiative from the start, but had to wait until the eighth minute to open the scoring when Smith could only block a slapshot by Neil Abel, and Ron Plumb rapped home the rebound. Five minutes later, Danny Brown shook off some tight marking to increase the lead from a Drummond assist, and soon after the same player netted against with a fine solo goal when his persistent fore-checking allowed him to win possession and coolly round Smith to score. Although Flyers continued to dominate, it was Streatham who scored the last goa! of the period through Quiney. In the second period, the home side peppered the Redskins' goal with 2z. shots which produced five goals. An unassisted effort by Dave Stoyanovich was followed a minute later with a goal by Danny Brown to complete his hat-trick after good leading up work by Gary McEwan and Chic Cottrell. Seven minutes later, Flyers produced another two-goal burst, with Stoyanovich setting up scores for Andy Linton and Brown. Two minutes from the buzzer, Stoyanovich himself slipped home his second goal of the night for his 97th Heineken League goal of the season. Flyers were content to coast through the final period, allowing the visitors to salvage some pride when Streatham skipper Goldstone beat Craig Dickson with two minutes remaining. However, this was another competent display by Flyers, with several more of the home players unlucky not to find the net. The match again demonstrated the Kirkcaldy sides soundness in defence especially in short-handed situations, giving them easily the best goal difference in the league.

An outstanding performance by Canadian Danny Brown helped Fife Flyers complete their unbeaten home league record against Ayr Bruins on Sunday night. Brown was involved in every goal, scoring five and assisting on the other four, despite being the target for some rough treatment meted out by the visitors. Flyers' defence continued their recent impressive run, while the form of both netminders augers well for the playoffs. It took the Kirkcaldy side only two minutes to go ahead, Brown scoring with a back-handed shot after Ayr keeper McCrone had failed to hold a powerful Neil Abel effort. Two minutes later, a sweeping move by Brown and Andy Linton left Dave Stoyanovich with the easy task of sliding the puck into the net. Despite three power play opportunities, Flyers were unable to add to their score before the buzzer, but just 50 seconds into the second period, Linton fired home a third goal. Despite chances at both ends, it was midway through the period before there was another goal — but it was worth waiting or! With Flyers skating three men against four, Brown picked up a loose puck and skated the length of the ice before calmly back-handing the puck high into the net. Bruins finally opened their account five minutes from the buzzer when player-coach Paul Bedard scored, and two minutes later, Ayr were right back in the game when Bedard netted a power play goal with Ron Plumb in the penalty box. The final period started at a furious pace, with both teams knowing that the next goal could be vital However, with Bruins' discipline slipping, Flyers kept their cool, and the home side stretched their lead to 6-2 with goals by Plumb and Brown. The game exploded into controversy seven minutes into the period when Flyers' defenceman Brian Peat and Ayr winger Jim Dailly were sent to the penalty box after a fracas on the ice. Bruins' skipper Kevin Murphy took exception to the referee's handling of the situation, and appeared to butt the official, ensuring that he would take no further part in the proceedings. Flyers gave the perfect answer to this when Brown netted just 14 seconds later. Ayr were again in trouble with the officials when Slaughter returned from a seven minute penalty to clash with Brown, and was given a match misconduct. In an eight minute spell, Bruins had been given a remarkable 46 minutes in penalties! However, the match settled down, and Dave Stoyanovich scored his 99th league goal of the season with 90 seconds remaining. With the whole crowd urging him on towards the "ton", Stoyanovich made another break with just 10 seconds left, but the puck ran to Danny Brown who had little option but to net. Straight from the faceoff, Stoyanovich had another chance, but after rounding the netminder, he was unable to convert.
