The Flyers welcomed the Guildford Flames for the final meeting of the sides this season. Phélix Martineau returned to home bench following injury with Aiden Wilson, Ben Brown Jānis Voris, James Spence and Joe Lynch all scratched. The visitors scratched Kyle Locke, along with captain Brett Ferguson and Jake Coughler.

Shane Owen made the first save of the game when he gloved a shot from Mike Crocock from the right circle. The Flyers went on the first power play when Austin Glover was called for a slash on Brodie Kay. Jake Kupsky saw his first serious action as he had to deal with one timers from Austin Farley and Olivier LeBlanc as the visitors returned to full strength. Charles-Antoine Paiement broke free of the Flames defence in the 6th minute but was thwarted as he shot by a great poke check by Zack Hoffman. Owen came up with a big pad save in the 7th minute as Travis Brown snuck in on the far side and from the slot let a shot go. Kupsky turned away a shot by Massimo Carozza with his stick in the 9th minute on a delayed penalty call as Sam Jones was binned for hooking to send the Flyers back on the power play. Lucas Chiodo tried to go top corner but Kupsky was alert to turn the puck over the bar with his stick and as the visitors returned to full strength Ryan Tait hit the outside frame of the goal from an angle. Owen was busy in the 12th minute as he made four stops all on Daniel Tedesco, the first two from close range then he swallowed a huge blast from the slot. Tedesco was denied again with a close in tip which saw a fine reaction from the Fife goalie. The Flyers had a chance in the 15th minute when Michael Cichy broke 2 on 1 with Chiodo and the latter saw his shot turned aside by the Flames keeper. Moments later Owen made a huge save as Josh Waller found space to drive the net as the Flyers were penalised for interference and Jonas Emmerdahl headed to the box. Owen started the penalty kill with two saves on Brett Welychka but he could do nothing to prevent the visitors taking the lead when Matt Alvaro set up Jack Jacome on the edge of the crease to lift the puck into the Fife net. In the 18th minute Evan MacKinnon had his shot blocked away by Kupsky.

PERIOD 2

The Flames went back on the powerplay in the opening minute of the second period as Emmerdahl was called for boarding. Owen was next in action to make a save on Waller and soon followed that up by denying Alvaro then Brown. With 6 seconds remaining Daniel Catenacci got the gate for the Flames after he slashed the stick out of the hands of Tyler Heidt. The Flyers were soon on the powerplay as Kupsky held a big blast from Chiodo. The Flames survived a breakout by the Flyers as Martineau fed the puck rink wide to Kieran Craig who then tried to find Carozza in the slot but the puck bobbled away and the chance was gone with Kupsky all at sea. The visitors returned to full strength and soon doubled their lead as Tedesco went strongly to the net and somehow the puck bounced in behind Owen. In the 28th minute Glover got in behind the Flyers defence but Owen shrugged away his shot.

INTRODUCING STEVEN KING...

Steven King, or 'Kingy' to many was born in Kirkcaldy and played through many successful seasons with the Kirkcaldy Ice Hockey Club's junior development programme. He made his senior hockey debut in December 1989 at 14 years of age, the second youngest player ever to play for the Flyers. He switched to his now synonymous number 12 jersey in 1991/92 when he scored his first ever Flyers goal against the Durham Wasps and went on to help the Flyers regain their place in the Heineken Premiership league that season. In season 1993/94 he was the Flyers top British scorer with 94 points and scored his first senior hat trick as he played on a line with Mark Morrison and Doug Smail. Steven gained Great Britian recognition but often missed out on furthering his International prospects due to work commitments. Steven's production continued through the 1990's and he was made an assistant captain in season 1995/96. In season 1996/97 he recorded a 10 point game with 5 goals and 5 assists and the decade ended with back to back British Playoff Championship trophy wins the second of which saw Steven playing with a double broken jaw as he also helped the club secured a Grand Slam. In December 2002 his second assist of the night against Dundee saw Steven score his 1000th point for the club. Season 2009/10 saw him achieve another couple of personal milestones as he became the only player so far to play 1000 games in a match against the Dundee Tigers in November and in March he registered his 1000th assist against the Charlestown Chiefs the only Flyers player to breakthrough that four figure threshold. A one club player Steven has the second longest longevity streak of 23 seasons as a Flyer and he recorded 1553 points from his 1034 games which are both all-time leading numbers that may very well never be broken.

The Flyers travelled to the Skydome for their final meeting of the season with the Coventry Blaze. The visitors were without the injured Olivier LeBlanc and also scratched Shane Owen with Jānis Voris getting the start and the youngster Joel Bearman from the Blaze NIHL side backing up. Joe Lynch found a space on the bench with Aiden Wilson, Ben Brown and James Spence also scratched. The home side were without Zach Heintz, Grayson Constable, Zach Vinnell and the long term injured Jakob Stridsberg.

Voris made the first save of the game as he comfortably gloved the puck from a point shot by Terrance Amorosa. The Flyers fashioned a nice flowing attack in the 4th minute and Michael Cichy passed the puck in from the boards to Evan MacKinnon who forced Mat Robson to make a fine pad save. A minute later and the Coventry keeper was again in action as he was well positioned to stop a shot from Charles-Antoine Paiement who hit him in the logo. The Blaze went ahead in the 6th minute with some misfortune for Voris who came out behind his net to play a dump in by Brady Pouteau and fumbled the puck which allowed Kim Tallberg to collect and hit the empty net. In the 7th minute Patrick Kyte and Michael Regush collected offsetting roughing minors in a tussle in front of the Flyers goal as the teams skated 5 on 5. Amorosa had another big blast on the Fife net in the 9th minute that Voris knocked into the corner with his pads. The Blaze almost doubled their advantage in the 11th minute as Nick Seitz ripped a shot off the underside of the bar. The Flyers went on the first power play of the game in the 13th minute when Amorosa was called for hooking. Robson blocked away a shot by Phélix Martineau and Cichy arriving at the back door saw his backhand effort denied as the Blaze keeper was well positioned as the home side completed the kill and returned to full strength. David Clements inadvertently set up a chance for MacKinnon in the 15th minute with a wayward pass but the Fife forward blasted wide of net from the slot. Voris made a stellar stop in the 17th minute with a full extension to make a toe save to deny Seitz what looked a certain goal.

PERIOD 2

In the 22nd minute the Flyers almost levelled when Robson juggled a puck put on net and with Lucas Chiodo lurking he finally managed to cover the puck up and get the stoppage. Jack Hopkins went short side on Voris who sealed his post and the Flyers went the other way with Chiodo taking advantage of a fortunate bounce of the puck off the referee to take it to the net but Robson stayed patient and outwaited him to make the save. In the 26th minute Voris made a blocker save on Jackson Cressey but the Fife keeper was left helpless in the next Blaze attack as Seitz finished a tic tac toe move with the final pass coming from Hopkins to leave him a slam dunk into a wide open net.

A minute later and Cichy was called for a hook and the Blaze on their first power play of the night wasted no time and within 15 seconds Brandon Alderson unleashed a bomb of a one timer from the circles that beat Voris on his glove side. The Blaze were penalised in the 29th minute for delay of game as Chase Gresock shot the puck over the glass but they completed the kill without the Flyers getting a shot on Robson. As they returned to full strength Pouteau got a shot away from the point that Voris saved with his stick. In the 32nd minute Paiement set up Austin Farley at the back post but he didn't get everything on his shot and Robson got a cross to make the block. A minute later and the Blaze had another as Seitz carried the puck into the zone and wired it over the pad and under the glove of Voris. In the 34th minute good set up play by Alessio Luciani allowed Alderson to step into another big one timer that was kicked away by Voris. The Flyers returned to the powerplay in the 35th minute with Hopkins called for a trip on Martineau. Once again the Flyers failed to get anything set up and the Blaze returned to full strength unscathed. The period ended with the Flyers again with the man advantage as Luciani was assessed a holding penalty. This time they did make Robson work who had to shoulder away a Daniel Krenželok shot before right on the buzzer Chiodo set up Cichy for a one timer that Robson made a great pad save on.

PERIOD 3

The Blaze returned to full strength at the start of the third period and within 40 seconds they added another goal as they broke 3 on 2 and Alderson snapped the puck top corner over the glove of Voris. In the 43rd minute Tallberg was assessed a tripping penalty as he upended Brodie Kay off the puck but the best chances on the Flyers powerplay fell to the Blaze who had shorthanded bids by Pouteau and Morten Jurgens. The Blaze completed the kill and in the 46th minute Amorosa tried to beat Voris with a wraparound but the Fife keeper was alert to the danger. The Blaze went back on the powerplay when Massimo Carozza got the gate for interference on Luciani. The Fife penalty kill was strong and they returned to even strength with Voris only called upon to make a couple of routine saves. The Flyers were in penalty trouble almost immediately as Tyler Heidt was binned for cross checking Luciani. The Blaze once again struck quickly with their man advantage as Tallberg picked out Alderson at the back post and he slipped the puck into the net for his hat trick. 9 seconds after the restart the Blaze had another as Jurgens beat Voris on his short side with a quick snapshot. In the 52nd minute Voris saved a Pouteau blast from the circles and a minute later Gresock missed a glorious chance when all alone in the slot and he fired wide then couldn't beat Voris as the puck bounced back out into the slot. The Flyers broke the Robson shutout in the 55th minute when Patrick Kyte rushed the puck up ice and after his initial shot was saved he picked the puck up behind the net to bank it in off the skates of the Blaze goalie from below the goal line. Robson made a save on Carozza in the 57th minute when he sealed his short side but the Flyers found another goal in the final two minutes when Martineau stole the puck and worked his way into the slot to beat Robson with a shot to his stick side.

Number Crunching

The Giants will be looking to extend their winning sequence against the Flyers this season and potentially complete a clean sweep in all 6 matches.

There are potential goal milestones for both teams with the Flyers needing two more goals for 200 and the Giants seven more for 400 goals in all EIHL competitions between the two excluding shootouts.

Massimo Carozza will be looking to keep his scoring streak going against the Giants as he has goals in the last 4 meetings with them. It is the joint best run with Derek Roehl of scoring for a Flyers player against the Giants in all EIHL competitions.

JJ Piccinich is the Giants top scorer against the Flyers this season with 7 goals whilst Massimo Carozza leads the way for the Flyers in these games with 4 goals.

18 different Giants players have found the net against the Flyers this season with 11 different Flyers on target in the games played so far.

The Giants lead all teams with 10 shutouts this season.

The Flyers will be looking to make it back to back home wins against the Steelers for only the second time in all EIHL competitions with the last time being in 2017.

Wednesday 19th March

Nottingham Panthers 5 Cardiff Devils 1 Elite League

(2-0, 1-1, 2-0,) SOG 35-31 PIMs 10-16 Att 4836

Nottingham Panthers moved into second place thanks to a convincing 5-1 win over fourth-placed Cardiff Devils on Wednesday night. Panthers head coach Danny Stewart probably couldn't have drawn up a better opening period. While the Panthers didn't create a huge amount, they gave up very little and came out with a two-goal lead. Logan Neilson put the home side ahead after just 92 seconds when Davis Bunz's shot took a nasty deflection off Ben Almquist and fell straight on the stick of Logan Neilson to shot home in the slot. The Devils were almost level when Sam Duggan stepped into a wrist shot in the slot but saw his shot come back off Jason Grande's post. Ben Bowns stopped all four Belfast Giants shots in the shootout to earn Cardiff Devils a 4-3 win over Belfast Giants on Friday night. A sold-out Vindico Arena crowd saw the Devils get their first win over the Giants this season. "We had our full team going tonight," began Joey Martin, who scored two goals for the Devils. 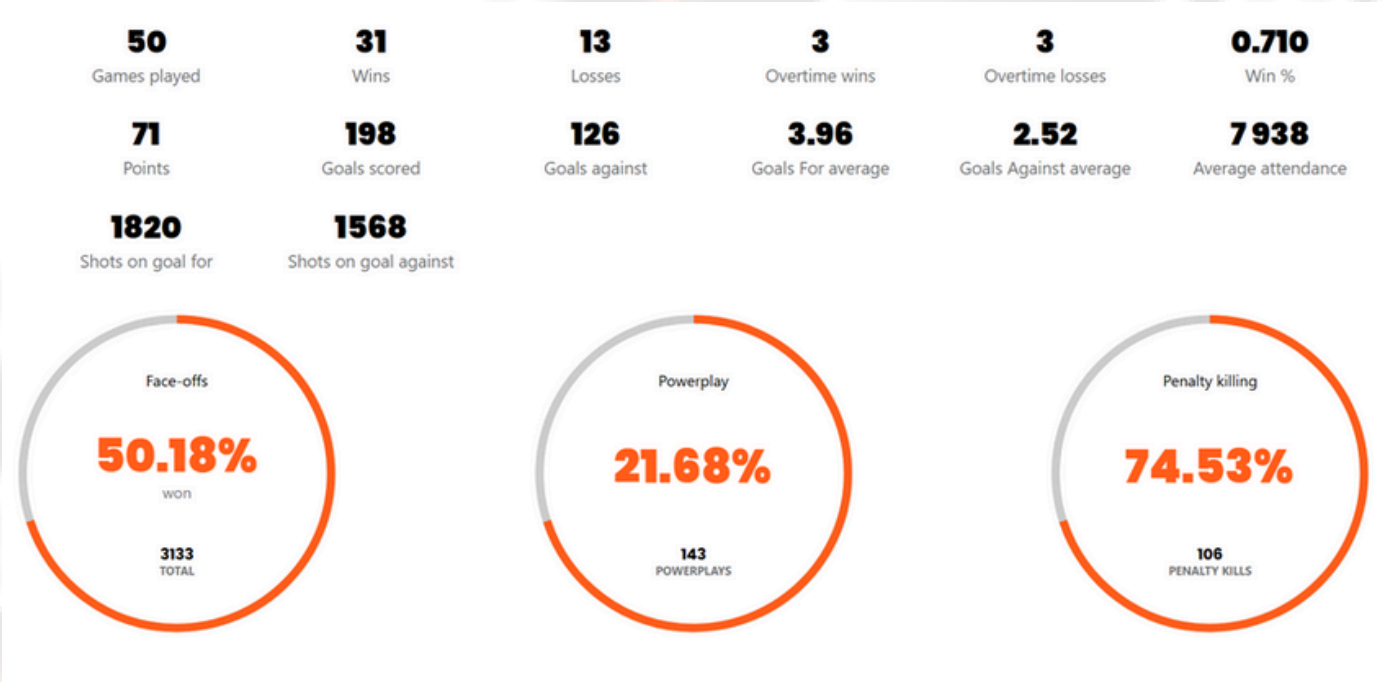

ON THEIR ROSTER

Today's player focus comes from a podcast interview conducted with **Matt Greenfield** in the summer of 2024 and focuses on a number of things in his journey to that point.

So for those that don't know, originally from Florida ? How'd you become a goalie and what attracted you to the position ?

So early on growing up in Florida there's not a ton of hockey. My neighbour was from London, Ontario, and he had a kid that was four or five years older than me. So I was like, six or seven and they would always play hockey in the driveway. I always wanted to just hang out with them because, you know, any kid four or five years older than you is the cool kid. I wasn't good enough to play with them but they're always like, Oh you need to go take this baseball mitt and go stand in that. And that's what started it. So then that was kind of the beginning of the end as my parents like to say and I kind of just fell in love with the position right away. I was just always begging my parents to play roller goalie then transition to ice. And around that time, that's when Rob Tallas had just finished his playing career and moved to Florida to start his coaching career. And my mom just signed me up for a lesson with him one day and the rest is kind of history. It's actually a funny story how Rob ended up in Florida. So when he was finished playing, I think he didn't know where he wanted to live. And I think the story goes he blindfolded himself and threw a dart at the map of the US and he said it landed somewhere in the Atlantic Ocean. Florida was the closest spot. So him and his wife decided to move down to Florida. It worked out for the best for sure. I mean, I couldn't be more grateful. I was so beyond fortunate to have the relationship I have with him and especially to meet him at such a young age. And at a time in his career, he was kind of in between things and really had the time to work with just private clients.

Now that you meet Tally you start probably to learn some things that you hadn't learned before. What age are we talking here?

I would say probably when I was 11, if I had to put a year on it. I was always pretty serious. I always kind of wanted to play at the highest level I can since from a young age. Rob was always very much like a believer and it was like you can kind of do whatever you set your mind to. Like you want to play in the NHL, you can play in the NHL. This is what it's going to take. So that was kind of the way our relationship started at a young age. I was like, tell me how hard to jump and I'll jump, tell me what to do and I'll do it. So it was a real good relationship and the way it formed it was very natural in that way.

Where is your game now, how would you describe it and how it's evolved over time? I'm guessing with a lot of influence from Tally ?

It's definitely transformed. I think the biggest thing with Tally, and most guys that will work with him I would imagine would attest to this, is he's so good mentally and it's the habits and the way you think and the way you approach the game is so drilled in from him. And that's kind of I think the foundation of my game and everything else kind of stems out from that. As far as how I play now I like to have a foundation and then kind of freelance from that. So I got a kind of a foundation of I want to be big, I want to be set. I want to have my hands in proper spots. And then I want to just trust my instincts and trust my athleticism and my reflexes and kind of try to paint but paint with thinner lines, if that makes sense.

It does make sense. When you talk about, the mental aspect can you give us an example? Whether it's situational or just a mindset you have going into every game are there any takeaways that you could share that another young kid will be like, that would really help me?

I think it's just a quiet confidence. It's knowing that you've put in the work and you're prepared. And if you work as hard as you can you know you're prepared. You'll be able to go and have success. And it's about knowing that whatever you're feeling there's a very high probability, almost a hundred percent certainty, that the guy 200 feet away is feeling the same thing. And that everyone's kind of not in it together but everyone's feeling the same stuff, feeling similar stuff. And you know, just finding that

confidence, that inner belief, and that it's really a choice. I wasn't a very confident kid growing up and I think that's something that Tally really instilled in me and the way he made us work. I just remember all of the runs. We had a pool that was like a mile and a half away from the rink in the gym and we always had to run to the pool and run back. He would always be in his car yelling at us but at the end of the day it was all competition based and everything was kind of high pace competing. So yeah, just having that confidence that whatever it is you'll get through it and you know, you're going to be okay. Like there was one day I was struggling with my stick saves. I was in the OHL and I couldn't get the puck on my stick and get the puck in the match. He had an OHL shooter taking slapshots at me and he was so frustrated with me. He grabbed my stick, he was in a track suit, went down into his butterfly and he had this OHL shooter taking slapshots at him and he was getting a stick on him. He's like, execute, just do it, stop thinking and just do it. And then I got it and then sure enough everyone I hit just went right into the match. So there's just something about that aura and that inner belief that just being around him so much, it just starts to rub off.

I'm guessing there's not a lot of teams looking for goalies in Parkland, Florida. How did opportunities present themselves?

Yeah, I mean, for sure I was a really fortunate. So I'm trying to remember the full connection here, but again, I owe so much to Tally, so much of this comes from him. So obviously we were working together for years. He obviously thought I was a good goalie and he keeps in touch with the coach of the Panthers at the time, Pete DeBoer. Pete DeBoer has two kids and the coach of Pete DeBoer's kids were also the coach of my team at U16. I was playing double A hockey at the time and Pete DeBoer just left Kitchener, I believe. So Rob told Pete who told my coach who then had a scout from Kitchener come and watch us in the national tournament. I had a good national tournament, good enough that they liked me and they ended up taking a chance on me in the 12th round. And that's how I kind of got into the pool or the stream or however you want to call it. And then from there it kind of was more performance based. But that's kind of how I got the explosion, how I got seen.

So two years in Kitchener and then you go to Tri-City for a year in the USHL. And then the West Colona Warriors of the BCHL for a year. So that journey, that bouncing around a little bit at that point from the OHL to USHL to BCHL, just walk me through your progression?

So like I said, I wasn't a confident kid and I really struggled with that in the OHL. I didn't handle it very well. I didn't play very well. So my 20 year old year they were kind of like you can come and maybe back up. But at the time we had just signed an 18 year old kid that was on an NHL deal and I was like, well I got to play. So I ended up leaving there. Fortunately, Phil McColt took a chance on me in the USHL. So I went down there to try out for the team, made the team, played well. That was where I first started to kind of find my confidence. I was kind of the older guy. It was a whole new chance for me to write a new slate. A lot of times, especially growing up and in the OHL, everyone was kind of telling me how to play. They would tell me we think you should do this, we think you should do that and then when I kind of pretty much got released from there I said, you know what, if I'm going to go down I'm going to go down doing it how I want to do it. And so that's kind of where I started to kind of play the game that I wanted to play. And with having success with that, then my confidence started to grow a little bit. And so I went down to the USHL, started off real well and played okay. Then I met Jake Kielly when he was in the Canucks system. So Jake was my goalie partner and that was kind of his coming out party. He was unbelievable for that team, like unbelievable. So Bill calls me into the office one day, he's like, listen, I can't have a 20 year old taking up our all-star spot that's not really playing. So he trades me to the BCHL in West Kelowna which at the time I didn't know it was a thing. But then it happened so I was like, oh I guess this is a thing. So I reported to West Kelowna and it was just an unbelievable group of guys there. Fortunately, I got traded to a team that I think were in third place at the time and then we just went on an unbelievable run, won a National Championship and then I ended up committing to school out of that.

What was your experience like at University in Calgary, both from a development side, but you're also there to go to school as well, student athlete life ?

It was awesome. I think it was really eye opening. I was very sheltered in the hockey world before that. Going to university, it's kind of like, oh whoa, like there's a whole other world out there that there's lots of real cool opportunities and neat things to do and you meet cool people. The level of hockey was something I was pretty blown away by. There's everyone there, I think I went through a whole team and we had one guy that didn't play in the CHL. It's an unbelievable level of hockey. Everyone's just bigger, stronger, faster. It comes with its own challenges though. Cause you've got some guys that are on their way up and some guys that are on their way down and it's the end. So you end up getting a real interesting kind of mix of guys. But as far as the talents and when puck drops on Friday night it's fast, it's competitive, it's tough. I think a lot of guys think they're going to come from the CHL and dominate and more times than not that's not how it goes.

Stockton Heat you were there with Dustin Wolf, walk us through sort of getting there?

So I remember it was training camp and as a guy on a two-way contract in an organisation that had like seven or eight goalies signed I was like, I got to make an impression here. Then Thomas Speer he comes along and he's trying to teach me the Panda technique on like day three of camp. I'm like, yeah, that sounds great, I'm not going to do that because I don't want to get scored on because I tried something new. But like I said, he's my coach. I'm like you know what let me try this thing and I went down and I just butterflyed and pucks just kept hitting me. I'm like, oh my goodness, maybe this guy's onto something, maybe he knows what he's doing. He's worked with Wolfie and that turned out pretty good so I was like maybe I should listen to him. Then I went down and I just started to do it and I was like, this is unbelievable. I think just being open-minded and just being like I'm not going to through the motions and be like, oh yeah, not for me but committing to it and trying it to learn it. Cause like I said, he's the coach, he knows best. And I did it, learned it and now I probably overuse it. I use it so much. I love it.

And what situations do you like it specifically for?

I like it specifically when if it's a good shooter on the other team and he has speed and time and there's no other thoughts. Guys coming off the rush, especially if he's on a strong side I know that, okay I could just hold my posts here drop down and be big and he's got nothing. And then it just takes away threat. It calms me down especially in those moments in games where you're like, okay, I can't give one up here. Like it's the start of a period, start of a game, end of a game, like those big moments where it's not like I'm taking a risk. I'm going to just go down and be big, take this away. If he wraps and throws out to someone else I'll live to fight another day but I think it's specifically moments where you got guys kind of on an island, guys by themselves or guys with speed when you have defensive support.

You had success at the University of Calgary, but you're in the Calgary organisation with Kansas city. You didn't get a chance to play with Stockton, but you were up with them. Were you still aiming for a pro career to that opportunity?

So it's actually a funny story. When I was in school I probably tried to leave every single year I was there. I was like, I'm going to play it for a year and then I'm going to go try to prove myself as a pro. Then after my fourth year at school I didn't have a good year. And for those that don't know, you get five years of eligibility in USports. I had another year left and I was like, okay, let me just come back from my last year and then I'm going to go. Then what ended up happening was COVID. So the Flames are getting ready for a late season start, I think at the time it was Markstrom and Rittich who were both still home in Europe. So the Flames needed to practice and so they pulled me out onto the ice with them. I went and skated with them and did that after the bubble before the late start in the season. So I practiced with them and I was fortunate enough to turn a couple of heads and they're like, yeah, let's just get you down on the coast and see what happens. Unfortunately, Andrew Shortridge got hurt and that opportunity presented itself where Kansas City needed a guy on the coast for that time. I mean, obviously it was super bad luck for Shorty but that job opened up and I was able to go down there and that was kind of the beginning of my chance.

East coast can be a little scrumbly. Was that a big adjustment?

Scrambling is the wrong word because that has a negative connotation. A lot of young players and it can be a game of mistakes. As a goalie it's hard to make clean reads because things tend not to go as planned as often. I actually found the adjustment a little easier. One of the things that they were big on in Canada West for university was puck possession and I remember playing against the University of Alberta and they'd have some nights they'd have 18 shots and five goals and you're like, I actually played good but all 18 are just great. Then you get down to the coast and it looks more scrumbly, guys have the puck on their stick and they want it at the net. So having that kind of steady action I was like this is fun. At least my mindset was this is more suited to the way I play. Like I'll feel on the park. We weren't very good in Kansas city but I kind of relished in the fact that if we lost it was kind of on me.

So it was opportunity to get lots of shots and try to steal a couple of games. Do you have to have that mindset? Is that part of being a goalie? Can you survive as a goalie?











You don't want to be the guy that the game can turn on. I think it's just kind of something that comes with the territory, right? Like a lot of times you hear basketball players talk about wanting to take the last shot or not wanting to take the last shot and in basketball you can pass and you know you could just fit into the shadows. There's no doing that in overtime or with a minute left as a goalie, you're front and center with a lot of times at that moment. If you win you're going to be in the paper celebrating. If you lose you're going to be with your head down and the puck in the net on the front page the next day.

Tell us about the pro skates in Florida ?

I was very fortunate because growing up in Florida, there's some openings for goalies because you got Luongo down there for a billion years and he's not going to that. He does his drills with Tally takes a couple of warm down drills and gets off. Then you got Craig Anderson down there and he'll also come out towards the end of the summer but that's about it. So there was kind of not many options. I got thrust into it at a young age, probably like 18, 19. I would say, okay, and it's like a freaking all-star game out there, man. I remember the one day and somebody's like, Ovechkin's out there. And I was like, good one. And then we get on the ice or we go out and we would always try to be early and it's just Ovechkin sitting by himself on the bench, dead serious, ready to go like 10 minutes before the game and I'm like, oh my goodness. I always treated those like they were game sevens for me. I always treated those as like, hey this is my opportunity, you never know who's watching you right now. I'm giving everything I got, follow every rebound, don't take a shot off. I don't care if it's Ovie, he's not scoring and that's something that also bred confidence. I found my confidence later. That was a big factor in it.

TWO NUMBER NINES: CHAUMONT AND VOLK

Two players who wore the number nine jersey for at least a part of their Flyers career were defenceman Dreu Volk and right winger Bobby Chaumont. Dreu Volk played most of the 2004/05 season and Bobby Chaumont played in Flyers' Elite League seasons 2012/13-2014/15.



Dreu Volk from Saskatoon, Saskatchewan played his junior career in the WHL, firstly for Swift Current Broncos then for Moose Jaw Warriors. He then spent four seasons at University of Saskatchewan and arrived in Kirkcaldy at the start of 2004/05 as a replacement for fellow Canuck Ian Fletcher, who had undergone knee surgery following the 2003/04 season.

Dreu's arrival in Fife was delayed as a result of the late granting of his work permit and he made his Flyers' debut on 11/09/04 in a home Winter Cup tie against Edinburgh Capitals, which the visitors won 4-3 after overtime. He played that night despite having arrived in town less than 24 hours before facing Capitals.

He scored his first Flyers' goal on a powerplay two weeks later in a 7-4 BNL victory over Dundee Stars. The FFP reporter described his effort as "goal of the night" and this "blistering slapshot" sealed a fine win against one of Flyers' local rivals.

Volk's career as a Flyer came to an end in the middle period of the Winter Cup semi-final against Newcastle Vipers at Metro Radio Arena on 19/01/05, when he dislocated his shoulder in a 4-3 overtime win, which levelled the tie, but Vipers advanced to the final on penalties. By this time though, Dreu had been taken to hospital for treatment.

His last Flyers goal was in a Winter Cup tie away to Hull Stingrays on 19/12/04. Dreu Volk was a steady defenceman, whose priority was in a defensive role and played over 40 times for Flyers in the last BNL season. Unfortunately his pro career was ended by the serious injury sustained while wearing Flyers' number 9 jersey.

The second No.9 was a fan favourite from the Elite era, Bobby Chaumont, a native of Sudbury, Ontario, where he played his junior years for the Sudbury Wolves of the OHL. After a year at Dalhousie University, he turned pro, playing in the Central Hockey League, the ECHL and in Norway, prior to signing for Braehead Clan in 10/11. He scored around a point a game with Clan, then returned to USA and signed for Fort Wayne Komets of the CHL.

In 12/13, Bobby re-signed for Clan, but early in the season, he made the move east and joined a Flyers organisation desperate to improve on their disappointing first Elite League season. He made his Flyers' debut in a fine 4-1 win against Edinburgh Capitals on 17/11/12 and opened his Flyers' scoring account with a third period goal.

In his first season, Bobby scored consistently from his first game onwards in a decent side that finished seventh in the table, a vast improvement on the previous season. Flyers then lost 4-5 on aggregate to Nottingham Panthers in the play-off quarter final. His second season ended with Flyers finishing seventh again, but on this occasion went one better by qualifying for the play-off finals weekend at Nottingham. Chaumont contributed 2+1 in the first leg semi-final tie against Dundee Stars and recorded an assist in the second leg. Flyers lost the semi-final 0-1 in a pulsating match against Belfast and Bobby's output over the season was about a point a game once more.

Bobby's third season as a Flyer resulted in Flyers finishing eighth, one place lower in the league standings than the previous two campaigns, but his point production was as steady as ever, still averaging over a point a game, as did Ned Lukacevic, Matt Reber and Jordan Fulton, but the good seasons had by these three players, Kevin Regan and Bobby didn't result in any silverware.

In the play-off quarter final Flyers were paired with league champions Sheffield Steelers, who had finished 27 points ahead of Flyers in the final table. Flyers ran the champs close though, losing 2-3 at home and drawing 3-3 at Sheffield to go out, 4-5 on aggregate, despite a fighting, second leg comeback. The second leg game on 29/03/15 was Chaumont's last as a Flyer, his last goals coming in a two goal effort during an 8-4 win at Dundee on 15/03/15.

In 2015/16, he headed north and one more time had a point a game season, this time with Dundee Stars, then had spells in Netherlands, Fayetteville in the SPHL and finished his career in the third tier of German hockey. Bobby Chaumont was a fine finisher, who always seemed to be in the right spot for a shot on goal and is currently Flyers' second top Elite era scorer with 81 goals.

It was a pity when he left Flyers, if only because we wouldn't hear his goal song, T.Rex's "I Love to Boogie" as the fans sang along.

SEASON 1984/85

Fife Flyers are poised to become the first team to qualify for the 1985 Heineken British Ice Hockey Championship Finals. With maximum points from their opening two fixtures against Ayr Bruins, Ron Plumb's men need just one point to make certain of a trip to Wembley on May 4 and 5. And with two games coming up against the weakest side in the group, Cleveland Bombers, it seems a foregone conclusion that Flyers will complete the play-offs as section winners. It is just possible that all three teams could finish on four points if Cleveland were to defeat Flyers twice and Ayr took full points from the English side. That would leave the British Ice Hockey Association with something of a headache — but the possibility is so remote that Flyers' fans can look forward to a weekend at Wembley next month. Flyers should rubber stamp their appearance in the finals when they travel to meet Cleveland tomorrow. With four league wins over the English side already under their belt, the Kirkcaldy team will be expected to qualify in style. Flyers will travel south with a full squad, with the exception of defenceman Dougie Latto who is undergoing hospital tests for a stomach complaint. Cleveland — who visit Ayr on Sunday — will play their return match against Flyers in Kirkcaldy on Sunday, April 28. Good news for Fife fans is that centre Jimmy Pennycook will be available for all Flyers' remaining matches this season — including Wembley. Flyers can expect massive backing in London, with seven buses already booked for supporters. Any fans wishing to travel by bus should submit their names to Kirkcaldy Ice Rink by Sunday. Meanwhile, Flyers have arranged an attractive challenge match in Kirkcaldy on Sunday when Dundee Rockets are the visitors. Rockets will ice five Canadians, with two imports of recent seasons, Al Le Blanc and Mike Walker, lining up alongside their current trio. Le Blanc and Walker are in Scotland to take part in Roy Halpin's Testimonial, and both finished second top scorer to Halpin during their years with Dundee. With this season's top marksman, Dave Stoyanovich, on the opposing side, an interesting match is in prospect.

20/04/1985 Cleveland Bombers v Fife Flyers Premier League Play Off

Fife Flyers confirmed their place in the championship finals at Wembley when they recovered from a slow start to end the hopes of a gallant Cleveland outfit on Saturday. Bombers skated to a 3-0 lead after 13 minutes with goals by Smith (2) and McDonough, while teenage netminder Young coped well with everything Flyers could throw at him. However, the Kirkcaldy side got back into the match when a Jimmy Pennycook effort was deflected into the net. This proved to be the boost the sluggish visitors needed, and they showed greater determination in the second period, drawing level within four minutes of the restart with goals by Danny Brown and Dave Stoyanovich. Flyers went ahead for the first time at the halfway mark with a vicious slapshot by Stoyanovich, and the big Canadian completed a fine hat-trick with a power play goal five minutes later. Cleveland kept their hopes alive with a power play goal by McDonough in the final minute of the period to reduce the deficit to one. However, any chance the English side had of registering their first victory over Flyers in five starts this season ended as Ron Plumb's men struck with three goals in the space of two minutes. Stoyanovich brought his tally to five with two goals assisted by Brown, and Brown himself scored Flyers' ninth with a back hand into the bottom corner. Flyers capped an excellent third period performance in which they out-shot Bombers 22-5 when Andy Linton scored with an angled shot from the right wing.

21/04/1985 Fife Flyers v Dundee Rockets Challenge

After a poor first period, Fife Flyers bounced back to score a convincing victory over Dundee Rockets in Sunday's challenge match at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink. Overall it was a disappointing match with Rockets not icing their promised five Canadians. Colin Wilson of Glasgow Dynamos guested for the Dundee side, and grabbed a first period hat-trick as. Rockets raced to a 4-1 lead. Wilson opened the scoring after only 90 seconds, and although Andy Linton equalised in the ninth minute, ex-Flyer Rab Petrie restored Dundee's lead, before Wilson added two further goals. Flyers were a different side in the second period, hammering home six goals without reply. Dave Stoyanovich netted just one minute after the restart, and two power play goals by the same player and Danny Brown within the space of 40 seconds brought the scores level. Ron Plumb's men then raced into a 7-4 lead before the buzzer with Stoyanovich (2) and Brown on target. The final period was equally one-sided as Flyers continued to dominate. Gordon Goodsir scored a fine goal and Stuart Drummond also got his name on the scoresheet with a close range effort. Although Roch Bois pulled one back for Rockets, Flyers emphasised their superiority with three goals in the last six minutes through Danny Brown, Chic Cottrell and Brian Peat.

Fife Flyers should complete the only unbeaten home record in British ice hockey when they meet Cleveland Bombers in their final play-off match at Kirkcaldy Ice Rink on Sunday night. The match presents Flyers' fans with their last opportunity to see their side in action before they bid to lift the Heineken Championship at Wembley next weekend. Ron Plumb's men are already assured of finishing top of Section B, but are anxious to defeat Cleveland and maintain their 100 per cent record. "We want to keep the momentum going and give ourselves a good foundation for Wembley," explained player-coach Ron Plumb yesterday. Dave Stoyanovich with 15 play-off points already to his credit, requires just 10 more to reach 200 league points for the season. The doors open at 6 pm on Sunday, and the players will be available for a short time to chat with the fans and have their photographs taken. All fans attending the match will also have the chance to vote for their player of the year, the result to be announced on May 10. Wednesday's challenge match between Flyers and Murrayfield was cancelled when the Edinburgh side pulled out. Meanwhile, negotiations are currently being held with a view to re-signing the Canadian trio of Plumb, Stoyanovich and Brown for next season.

28/04/1985 Fife Flyers v Cleveland Bombers Premier League Play Off

Fife Flyers rounded off the ice hockey season at Kirkcaldy with an emphatic play-off victory over Cleveland Bombers on Sunday night to retain their unbeaten home record for the season. It was an impressive all-round display by Ron Plumb's side who look as if they have timed their Wembley preparations to perfection. The pattern for Sunday's match was set as early as the second minute when Jimmy Pennycook opened the scoring for Flyers. Three minutes later, Danny Brown added a second goal, and although Earle pulled one back soon after, Flyers sealed a competent first period display with a power play goal by Brown three minutes from the buzzer. Brown completed a richly deserved hat-trick 90 seconds after the restart, but Bombers reduced the deficit within three minutes when Earle was again on the spot to net. The teams then exchanged power play goals, with Neil Abel scoring for the home side, and McDonagh replying for Cleveland. Another power play goal by Chic Cottrell five minutes from the buzzer extended Flyers' lead to 6-3, before the league's leading scorer, Dave Stoyanovich, eventually got into the act with a goal three minutes later. Flyers emphasised their superiority with three goals in the first six minutes of the final period. Neil Abel set the ball rolling with a fine solo effort with Brown and Pennycook adding two more. Although Flyers ran into penalty trouble, this did nothing to slow down their scoring rate. The Kirkcaldy side hit an astonishing three consecutive shorthanded goals, two by Stoyanovich and the other by Pennycook, completing hat-tricks for both. As the game entered its final five minutes, Cleveland snatched two quick goals through Land and McDonagh. However, Flyers went out in a blaze of glory, with, appropriately enough, further goals from Stoyanovich and Brown, both assisted by Ron Plumb.
